## Eastland County Plants Expanding

The importance of Eastland County's peanut industry is reflected in the expansion of the facilities to handle the 1963 crop.

Ranger Peanut Co., which opened another plant in Carbon last year, is now expanding and improving the loading and unloading facilities at Carbon, to be ready for the 1963 crop. Peanuts are expected to begin coming in about Sept. 1.

The company also has its Ranger plant ready.

The Carbon plant was opened late in the 1962 season, but handled 1,500 tons of peanuts. This year officials expect to triple that amount. The Carbon plant is equipped also with drying facilities; the Ranger plant handles only cleaning and shelling. The two plants can handle 75 tons a day.

Gorman Peanut Co., owned and operated by Melvin and Wilbur Shell, is again expanding. It is installing 40 more drying bins and a new peanut cleaner which will enable the firm to increase its cleaning capacity to 75 tons per hour, four times greater than last year.

The first load of 1963 peanuts came to the Gorman plant Aug. 2 from the W. E. Caudle farm two miles west of Rising Star. They were plant-

ed early in May. The normal planting time is later than May.

The Businessmen's Club of Gorman paid a \$50 bonus for this first load.

Rains Tuesday, Aug. 13, measured more than two inches in parts of the county. Peanuts, the county's largest agricultural crop, were in need of rain and observers say the yield will be much improved by the moisture.

Eastland Junior Chamber of Commerce sponsors an annual Eastland County Peanut Bowl Festival. This year's annual event will be held Sept. 14.
