### Native of India Tells About His Country's Problems, Advances

The average American appears to honor highest the specialist, N. B. Roychowdhury, said in Eastland this week, whereas in his native India, the administrator is held in highest regard.

A year-long visitor in this country, Mr. "Roy" as he is abbreviated being called, is staying in Stephenville, observing the County Extension Program. His visit will end in September and he will return to his homeland where among the first thing he plans to set into motion, will be a "4-H Club" program similar to that so popular in this part of the country.

He was luncheon speaker for the Eastland Lions Club Tuesday, describing his country's history, its recent gain of independence, and its current problems.

The 42-year-old Indian is an employee of this country's extension service which was organized a little over a decade ago.

When India loosed itself from British rule in 1947, Mr. Roy was living in East Bengal. This "state" which elected to join Pakistan rather than India. He, and thousands of others from that area, later fled into East Bengal, where he now lives. He is married and has two children. He is one of three Indians in Texas observing Extension work.

Lewis Tiner was in charge of the program Tuesday and arrangements for Mr. Roy's appearance were made by County Agent J. M. Cooper.

Here are interesting excerpts from Mr. Roy's Eastland talk:

"Due to the misfortune of long foreign domination, our country was in acute shortage of food and other daily necessities often. Famines and epidemics were common. Malnutrition, low income and illiteracy were acute problems."

"The problem was aggravated when the Hindus in the newly-formed Pakistan found it impossible to continue there with safety and honor. They migrated and took refuge in India. About 3.5 million Hindus took refuge with absolutely empty hands. Communism found this situation ideal breeding ground and endangered our freedom and Democracy. So our government concentrated all efforts to eradicate hunger, epidemics and illiteracy and to develop industry and agriculture and economy of the country."

"India is 1.27 million square miles in area and has 320 million acres in cultivation to feed her 438 million human and 210 million cattle and livestock population. Density of population is 384 per square mile against 64 in the USA. In my state of West Bengal it is 1,031 per square mile. 80 per cent of the people live in rural area compared to eight per cent in USA. Average farm size is only 50 acres

and 60 per cent of the 64 million farm families have less than 50 acres. Only 25 per cent have land over 10 acres. The income of a family of average size of five members was \$250 a year. Nutritional level was low at 1,800 calories a day; 50 million cows, with five dairy breeds, produced only four ounces of milk per capita. In our dietary habits, over 50 per cent of our people are vegetarians. Hindus do not take beef and consider cattle as "pet" or "sacred" animals. Most Moslems do not take pork.

85 per cent of the population is Hindu, 10 per cent Mos-

lems and the rest Christians, Budhists, Siklos and Parsees. We speak 15 different languages.

"Progress — Literacy has increased from 9 per cent to 24 percent. Epidemics are now absent and span of life increased from 23 years to 42 years. Agricultural production has increased by 56 per cent and production of food grains raised from 43 million tons to 80 million tons and expected to be raised to 100 million tons in 1966. Food shortage is now reduced to only four per cent. Irrigation has been provided for 70 million acres of total area under cultivation (3 times as much as U.S. irrigation).

### MAN ROBBED AND BEATEN AT RANGER SUNDAY NIGHT

Weldon Cunningham, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dell Cunningham, was beaten and robbed Sunday night about 12 a. m. near Olden.

Cunningham, alone, was traveling into Ranger when a car behind him kept blinking his lights at him, signaling him to stop. As he stepped from his car, two negro men and a negro woman attacked him.

After he was hit on the head knocked to the ground, he was stomped and beaten. The negro woman took a about \$23 from his bill fold and threw it back into his car. The assailants then left in their car.

Cunningham says he never lost consciousness and managed to drive his car to the Ranger Police Station. He was taken to the hospital where he is a patient now. Besides the bruises he has three broken ribs.

### 2 Observers Appointed For Saturday Vote

County Judge Scott Bailey has appointed two election observers for the Saturday Ranger wet vote after being petitioned by requests for such officials.

Named are W. M. Ross, who served in a similar capacity in the March election, and Jack Robinson.

The petition, signed by approximately 40 residents, declared the signers to be in favor of the legal sale of intoxicants in Ranger, and asked that the two recommended named men be appointed, Judge Bailey said.

Unofficial word was that the dry forces did not plan to ask for observers, however, Wednesday was the deadline — three days before the election.

Two men from each faction were named observers during the earlier elections.

### Ranger Resident For 60 Years Dies Monday

Funeral services were held Wednesday at the First Baptist Church for Charlie Lee Cantwell, 73, who died at 5:45 p. m. Monday in Eastland Memorial Hospital. He had been in ill health for about two years.

Born February 2, 1890, in Straun, he married Miss Susan Coffman Oct. 19, 1910 in Bullock. She died June 16, 1926. Mr. Cantwell had lived in the Bullock Community for 60 years and was a member of the new Hope Baptist Church No. 2.

Rev. Avery Sullivan, pastor of the First Baptist Church, officiates. Interment was in Bullock Cemetery under the direction of Killingsworth's Funeral Home.

Surviving him are two sons; Robert L. and Willie O., both of Rt. 3, Ranger; five grandchildren, Mrs. Jack Hilliard, Willie O. Cantwell Jr., Johnny F. Cantwell, all of Ranger, Mrs. Alton Patton and Miss Nancy Cantwell both of Fort Worth and one great grandchild, Allen James Patton of Fort Worth.

### 3 Fatalities So Far This Year In Area

There were no highway traffic fatalities in Eastland County during June — but with two earlier this year the county's record for the year compares unfavorably with that of last year.

And there has been one fatality in the county this month.

The county had five personal injury accidents and eight property damage accidents during June, the District Department of Public Safety has announced.

There were seven persons injured in traffic mishaps in June, and property damaged from accidents amounted to \$5,890. Damage in this county was higher in June than in either of the other counties in the district (Brown, Callahan, Coleman, Shackelford or Stephens.)

For the first half of the year, Eastland County's traffic count looked like this:

Fatalities, 2 (none in first part of 1963); 25 personal injury accidents (29 during the first six months last year) 47 property damage accidents (44 in first half of '62); 49 persons injured (compared to 43 in six months last year); and \$52,110 in property damage, (compared to \$80,905 for first half of '62.

### Robbery Suspects Picked Up in Idaho This Week

The Federal Bureau of Investigation was holding William Splawn, 40, and Mrs. Millie Jones, former Eastland waitress, Wednesday in connection with the March 8th armed robbery of the Worth Food Market in Ranger, according to reports here.

Splawn, returning from Nevada and a visit with his girl friend, Mrs. Smith, was stopped by a sheriff's roadblock as he entered Idaho. Although he had in his possession, a 22 caliber pistol, he made no attempt to use it, giving up with out resistance. In the March eighth robbery

the bandit, armed with a revolver, robbed the Ranger store about 6:15 that evening, just after closing time. The store was still full of shoppers waiting to be checked out.

The man had been in the store for some time and had aroused the suspicions of employees and some customers.

It was reported that the man ran from the store and jumped into a blue Pontiac parked at the side of Worth store. The get-away car was driven by a woman.

Later, an abandoned car believed to be the auto used in the get-away, was discovered about five miles north of Kokomo, by residents of that area. The sheriff's department was notified but no trace of the car's occupants were found. The vehicle had a blown-out tire and was stuck in deep sand in the roadway.

Later, it was learned that the couple had been staying at a lake Leon cabin for about two weeks prior to the robbery.

After they left the scene of the robbery, the car developed a flat tire, near the vicinity of Lake Leon. After changing the tire, they proceeded to the home of a nearby farmer. He was apparently leading the pair out of the community when their car had a second flat tire.

The farmer then took them back to his home, where they spent the night.

Later, the farmer reported

the incident to Sheriff Lee Horn and stated, "The three days are up, now I can talk."

Reports later indicated that the couple had fled to Idaho.

The Idaho sheriff reported that Splawn was wanted in connection with two truck thefts and a saw-mill burglary in Idaho, as well as the hold up in Ranger.

According to Sheriff Horn of Eastland County, Mrs. Jones has waived extradition and is returning to Eastland on her own accord. Splawn will face extradition charges.

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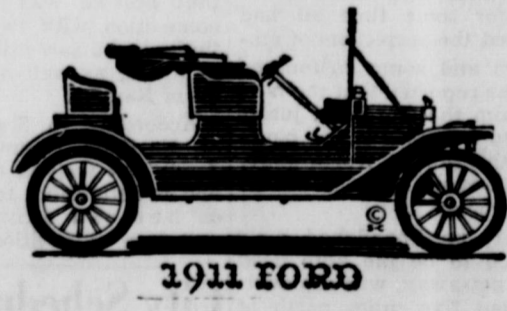

## BLACK MOLD IS PROBLEM FOR AREA PEANUT GROWERS

A fungus called Black Mold has caused the major portion of the problem of unsatisfactory peanut seedling stands throughout the peanut belt this spring, according to information from the local county agent's office.

Several local peanut growers have complained of poor stands due to the seedling dying upon emergence.

J. M. Cooper, local agent, received a letter recently from B. C. Langley, Superintendent of the Stephenville Experiment Station and E. R. Spears, A. & M. Extension Service Agronomist, advising of the cause of the wide spread damage.

The fungus may infest and kill seedlings before they emerge from the soil. Most often infected seedlings emerged and then wilted and died. Some die within a two or three weeks period from this fungus but a few die as late as six weeks after emergence.

The fungus causes more trouble where a part or all of the skin is damaged or rubbed off, or the seed is split in the planter box.

No difference in variety susceptibility to damage from Black Mold has been observed in state wide variety tests.

Black Mold is a common fungus and therefore occurs

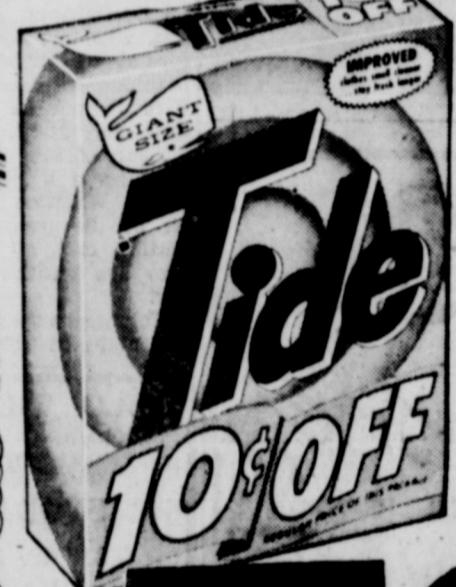

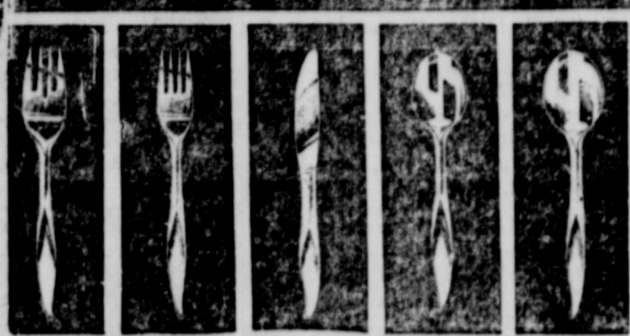

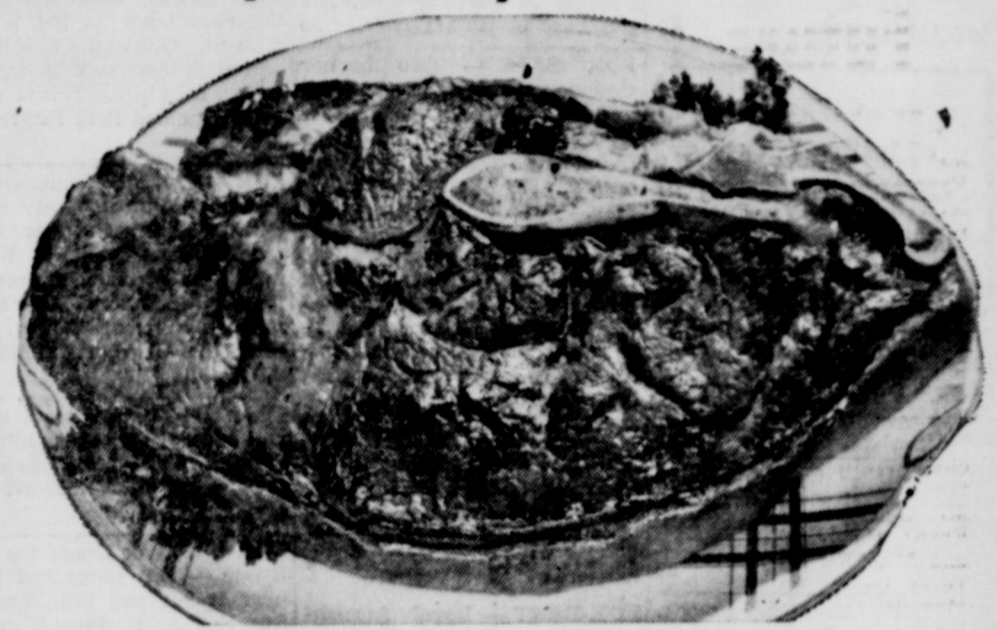

**Backstage at the E.V.F.D. When the Whistle Blows**

When the fire bell rings do you know what goes on behind the scene? This time of the year there are several grass fires, and we will have more. The Eastland Fire Dept. has four trucks and one rescue unit. While fire-men are not answering calls they help out the local police dept. by being dispatcher. When someone calls the fire station the bell is automatically sounded and the lights go on. Eastland has three firemen who receive salaries, Bill Green, Jim Hutcheson and Jack Wood. They are assisted by 23 volunteers. Guy Robinson is the volunteer fire chief, and Wayne Jackson is the assistant. The firemen answered eight fires in June, two house and six grass fires. This month they have answered three calls.

When we hear the fire bell ring many times we do not know what it means. Here is a code that the firemen use to sound the alarm: 1-Long 25 sec. and 1-short - fire out of town 1-short 10 sec. - grass, car, trash fire in town. 2-long bells - distress 3-automatic bells-house, building, fire in the city limits. 1-2 min. blow and 3 automatic blows - tornado-or disaster. The fire station has two switches, one of which is manual and can be operated in any pattern. The other is automatic and will blow three times then cut itself off. In order to keep up to date on firefighting, Jim Hutcheson, who has been a fireman for about three months, is planning to attend the Texas Fire School in College Station, July 21-27.

Each of the volunteer firemen have a phone in their home. When an alarm is turned in the men at the fire station call all of the men who are on the same number. Volunteers meet every Monday night at 7:00 p. m.

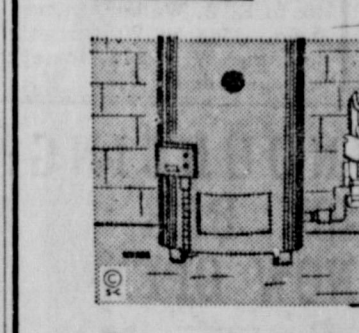

It has approximately 200 feet of ladders. It has a basket on top to carry ropes, nozzles, and other equipment. The 1951 combination truck is the most used and best looking of the trucks. It has a capacity of 500 gallons in the tank, and can be used with plug or tank. It has three two and one half inch outlets.

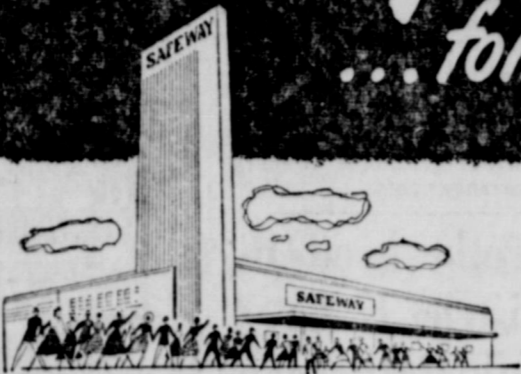

## Peanut Growers Association Plans Annual Meet Aug. 16

The annual meeting of the Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association will be held August 16 at Stephenville. As has been the custom for sev-

eral years, the meeting will be conducted in the Agriculture Auditorium on the campus of Tarleton State College. This year's program will fol-

low the theme of research which proved so popular last year with the capacity crowd which was present. Staff members from Texas A&M College and Oklahoma State University will present the very latest findings in important production phases such as disease control, weed control, insect control, varieties and fertilization and harvesting and curing. In addition, the peanut outlook will be reviewed covering the whole realm of marketing.

Following the lunch hour a panel will be formed to answer growers' questions regarding production problems. It is felt that this type program gives the grower the rare opportunity to direct his questions to those in the best positions to provide answers. Better education of growers and handlers is one of the best ways of building a better peanut industry. Many express the belief that last year's meeting which stressed improved curing techniques made a major contribution to improved quality of our peanuts. Last year SWPGA worked closely with the Southwestern Peanut Shellers' Association and research and extension branches of Oklahoma State University and Texas A&M College in the

effort to make known the latest recommended practices in harvesting and curing peanuts. A committee on harvesting and curing practices was selected from the staff members of the two colleges. This committee, through a series of meetings, prepared its recommendations which were presented as a part of the 1962 Annual Meeting. In addition, the report was distributed to all peanut buyers and handlers in the Southwest. The meeting this year, therefore, is a continuation of the effort to bring about better yields and quality of peanuts produced in the Southwest.

Lunch will be served at noon, compliments of Southwestern Peanut Growers' Association. Tarleton President, E. J. Howell, Dean, Paul A. Cunyus and Agriculture Department Head, Joe Sutrey have assured Association officials of the same courteous and efficient hospitality this year as has characterized the college in the past.

## MRS. BURNETT DIES AFTER BRIEF ILLNESS TUESDAY

Mrs. Ulala Howard Burnett, a resident of Cisco and Eastland County for most of her life, died at 6 a. m. Tuesday in Eastland Memorial Hospital after an illness of two days. She lived at 1505 Avenue D in Cisco.

Mrs. Burnett, the widow of the late Jim Riley Burnett, was stricken with a stroke soon after she dressed for Sunday School last Sunday morning. She was found where she collapsed in the floor at her home by friends who drove by for her. A Rust ambulance took Mrs. Burnett to the hospital.

Born Dec. 12, 1882, in Magazine, Arkansas, Mrs. Burnett came to Eastland County via Comanche at the age of two years. She was in Cisco when the 1893 cyclone caused considerable death and destruction.

A member of the First Baptist Church since early childhood, Mrs. Burnett began teaching in the Sunday School at the age of 14 and was a popular teacher throughout her life. She seldom missed a Sunday and was devoted to her church.

Mrs. Burnett was connected with the schools of Eastland County for some 60 years. She taught in rural schools for 12 years and spent some 10 years in the Cisco School. She served six years as Eastland County School Superintendent, and served for over 25 years as a member of the county school board of trustees.

All of Mrs. Burnett's college training was obtained by attending summer sessions and

taking correspondence courses. While she was serving as county school superintendent, Mrs. Burnett attended evening law school conducted in Eastland by Judge Grady Owens. She and Mr. Burnett, whom she married in 1923, took the state bar exams and obtained their law licenses in 1929. They had offices in Cisco for many years. Mr. Burnett died in 1948.

A student of the Bible, Mrs. Burnett was the author of a booklet, "Handbook of Bible Rules and Remedies," which enjoyed considerable circulation.

Mrs. Burnett is survived by one sister, Mrs. J. S. Yeager, of Dallas, formerly of Putnam and Cisco; and one brother, Edgar L. Howard, an official of the MKT Railroad at San Antonio. Also surviving are 10 nieces and nephews.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Thursday at the First Baptist Church with Rev. Lee Bailely and Rev. Mart Agnew officiating. Burial will be in Oakwood cemetery with Rust Funeral Home in charge of arrangements.

**Thomas R. Snider Dies In One Car Accident**

Dead on arrival at the Ranger General Hospital was Thomas Ray Snider 22, from Gorman, who was killed in a one car accident near Strawn Monday morning at 12:10 a. m.

According to patrolman E. M. Rogers, the accident occurred 1 1/2 miles south of Strawn on highway 16. The automobile left the road on the left side, swerved back across the road and turned over on the right hand side.

A companion in the car Douglas Craig, 21 of Desdemona was treated for injuries and released from the Ranger General Hospital.

Justice of the Peace Underwood reported that an inquest held Monday revealed that he cause of death was a broken neck and a skull fracture.

A 1960 graduate of Gorman High School Mr. Snider worked as a farm and construction laborer.

**Large Turn-Out Forecast For Ranger Election on Saturday**

A large turn-out of voters has been forecast as the citizens of Ranger go to the polls Saturday, July 20, to ballot on the proposition of legalizing the sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption within the corporate limits of the city.

Voters of the city approved the proposition of legalized sales in an election last March 23 with a record 1,301 ballots being cast. After sixty days of sales, the stores were ordered closed by the 91st District Court and the new election was called on the same petitions.

A. H. Powell, appointed election judge by the county commissioners' court, announced today that everything was in readiness for the Saturday voting. The polls will open at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. All voting will be at the National Guard Armory.

In keeping with the election laws, Mr. Powell said there would be no ballot counting before the polls close. Named as clerks for the election were A. E. Crawley, Ross Hodges, Bobby Patterson, Don Yarborough, Helen Boen, and Eva Kay Poyner. Tally keepers will be

Mrs. Arthur Deffenbach, Mrs. H. H. Oliver and Mrs. N. E. Landers.

The March victory for wet forces was by a 11-vote margin. The court ruled the election null and void after a hearing before Judge T. M. Collie on June 17. After a ruling by the attorney general, the retail beverage stores were ordered closed and the stock removed.

The court held that the election judge's use of a rubber stamp instead of signing the back of each ballot personally was illegal and the election was declared null and void.

Following the court decision, Judge Collie ruled as follows:

"It is also ordered, adjudged and decreed that the County Commissioners Court of Eastland County, Texas, be, and such Honorable Commissioners Court is hereby ordered to call and order a local option election to be held within the incorporated city limits of Ranger, Eastland County, Texas, to determine the following propositions, to-wit:

"(a) for the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for off-premise consumption only, and

"(b) against the legal sale of all alcoholic beverages for

off-premise consumption only. This will be the fifth election on the wet-dry issue in Ranger in the past 13 months. The first election was held June 9, 1962, with a total of 929 votes being cast, the dry forces winning by a 506 to 423 margin.

On Sept. 8, 1962, voters cast 1,032 ballots in another wet-dry election. A total of 480 votes favored the proposition and 552 were against it.

The third election was on Dec. 8 with 848 votes being cast, resulting in a 198-vote victory for the dry forces.

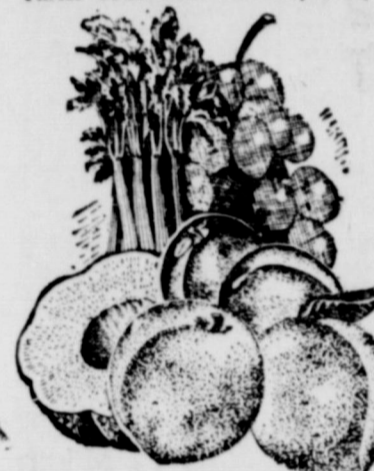
