Commissioners Ordered In 91st Court Sept. 30

Judge T. M. Colnie of 91st District has ordered Eastland County Commissioners' Court members to appear at 10 a. m. Monday, Sept. 30, in his court "to show why a temporary restraining order should not be issued as prayed for" in the suit styled J. L. Butler vs. Glenn Justice et al.

The judge's order, filed with District Clerk Roy Lane last Thursday, follows:

"Be it remembered that on this the 18th day of September, 1963, came on to be considered the application of the plaintiffs in the above cause for temporary order restraining the defendants from the continued and further use of Eastland County property for private purposes and on private and municipal property, and it appearing that said petition is in due form, said order should be granted."

The citation named County Judge Scott Bailey and Commissioners Glen Justice, J. B. Arthur, Buck Collins and C. B. Dill.

The plaintiff has alleged that county equipment had been used on private and city property in the Gorman area, it was reported.

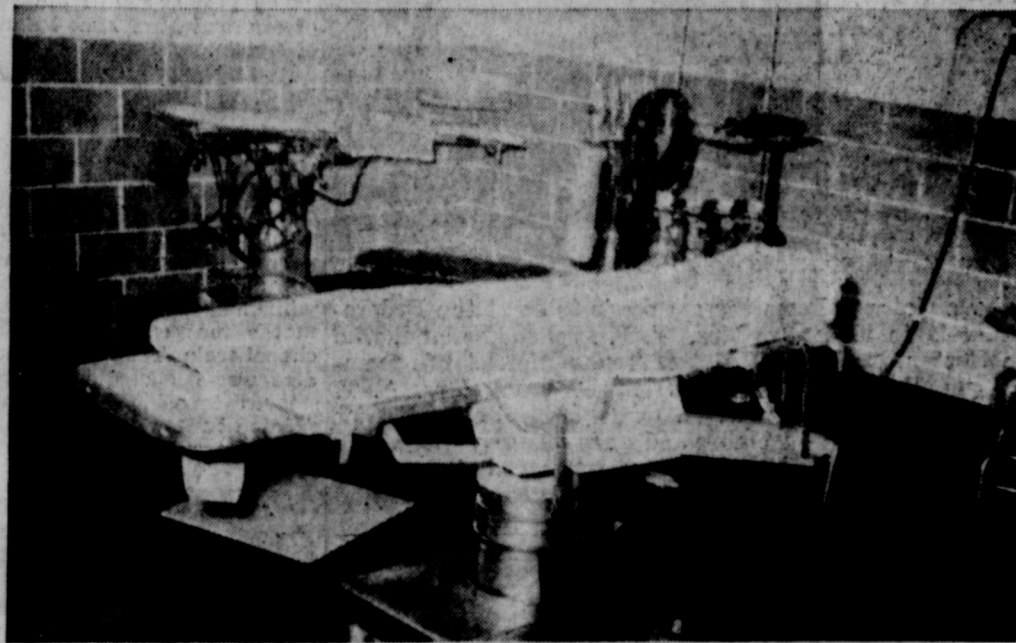
Gas Tax Refund Forms Are Due

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has issued a reminder to farmers and ranchers that claims for the federal gas tax refund must be submitted before Sept. 30.

The refund is on the four cents per gallon excise tax paid on gasoline and diesel fuel used by operators on their farms during the period July 1, 1962, to June 30, 1963. New farmers and those who have not received Form 2240 were invited to drop by the Farm Bureau office where a form may be obtained and filled out there.

'BADLY NEEDED'

New Surgical Table In Use At Eastland Memorial Hospital

There is a brand-new piece of equipment at Eastland Memorial Hospital — and ironically, those for whom its use is intended, will rarely, if ever, actually "see" it.

It's a new surgical table for use in the surgery wing, and its a champion model among the latest surgical devices. In fact, it is a Shampaine, Model S1501 Surgimatic, and it has been "sorely" needed for quite a while.

The old table was an original piece of the community-built hospital's equipment and although it was still serving its purpose, it was being looked on as an out-dated device by physicians and hospital staff.

Most patients who cross the threshold into surgery at the busy hospital will have already been given sedation, so may not get to inspect the modern-designed medical tool. Chances are, with surgery in their future, they won't be particularly interested in the furnishings anyway, except to know that all is as up-to-date and convenient as possible.

And that's the goal of the hospital board and staff. Judging from the patient load at EMS, people in this area are more than pleased with the service and facilities of the immaculate Central Texas medical center.

With the aid of quite a bit of "tradin'", the hospital acquired the new table, complete with accessories, for \$3,000. The old table, which had been

used here for 11 years, was a trade-in.

Board President Jim Parks and Administrator Leon Musgrove are convinced that the hospital "got its money's worth," because they both spent weeks checking markets, prices and decided on the present table.

Its standard accessories include an anesthetic screen, kidney support, body support, leg holders, shoulder support and pads and conductive wristlets.

Also bought as optional equipment was a special X-Ray top which will permit "on the spot" X-Ray of patients while surgery is in process. This is a big feature of the equipment and will permit physicians to check patients without removing them from the surgery wing.

Dr. Bob Alexander said "We are most happy and fortunate to have the new table and lighting in the operating room. The table is versatile and adaptable to the many different types of surgical needs and makes working a lot easier. We have been

needing the new table for a good while."

Another important addition to the operating room is new conductive linoleum flooring for safety. According to Musgrove there are over 30 operating room explosions a year caused most often by static electricity and the gases used in anesthesia. Every piece of equipment in the room is now conductive, with the use of static chains.

"We're trying to take every precaution to make this room, and the hospital as safe as possible," the administrator said.

And the life-saving devices in that room will rarely be idle judging by the present surgical schedule. The hospital is averaging 46 surgeries per month, with an average daily patients census of 32.5 persons. On three different occasions in past few weeks, all 58 of the hospital's beds were filled.

The modern new surgical table will surely do its part in maintaining Eastland's reputation as "Medical center" of the area.

Abilene Firm Is Awarded Contract for Local School

The firm of Kinard and Beck of Abilene has been awarded the general contract for construction of the new Eastland elementary school and gymnasium, according to a report by Supt. Wendell T. Siebert.

Low Bid submitted by the Abilene firm was \$317,926.

Two other contracts, a n electrical and a combination plumbing, heating and a i r conditioning, have not been let at this time. Those two contract will up the total cost to the neighborhood of an estimated \$450,000, which does not include payment on sewer line and paving work, it was reported.

Construction by the Abilene firm was expected to begin this week and plans call for completion by the beginning of the 1964-65 school term.

Mr. Siebert said that no major revisions have been made in building plans.

The board of trustees of the Eastland Public Schools opened bids for the contract about two weeks ago. The awarding of the contract was held up until the board completed studying the various bids.

Bonds for the project were approved by the taxpayers in an election several months ago.

The Abilene construction company has been active in

school building work in this area for more than a year. Their work has included two dormitories and a science building on the campus of Cisco Junior College.

Both of them appeared on the Bob Hope Show staged on the Oklahoma University Campus in 1962.

The Jubilee celebration will open at 7:30 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 3, with the coronation of the Diamond Jubilee Queen at Brogden Field and the presentation of the Tarleton State College Band under the direction of John Giordino.

A giant down-town parade will be held on Saturday, Oct. 5, featuring floats, bands, riding groups and novelties from Gorman and surrounding towns. The celebration will conclude with the Gorman-Hico football game Saturday night.

Cisco Beats Eastland 34-13 In Friday Night Grid Battle

The Cisco High School Lobos scored a 34-to-13 victory over the Mavericks of Eastland High as the two county rivals held their annual football meeting Friday night at Chesley Field in Cisco. An estimated 3,500 fans filled the stands for the Cisco home opener.

The game had action aplenty and a lot of color to make for an evening of interesting entertainment. There were long runs to provide thrills for fans on both sides. The bands of the two schools had outstanding half-time shows.

Both teams scored in the first quarter with Cisco drawing first blood. The Lobos got the ball on their 30 after they kicked off and held. Jimmy Brown got 11 yards, and Danny Phipps drove for 14, 10 and 14 on three bucks. Brown got five, Phipps 12 and a first down on the Eastland 20. Phipps then drove for 5, 1 and 14 and a touchdown. He missed on the extra point try.

Cisco kicked off, and Jim Moylan and Gaylon Graham teamed up to make a first down before Cisco's Richard Coats fell on a fumble on the Cisco 44. Brown got 16 yards to the Eastland 40 and then broke loose for a touchdown. The conversion fizzled.

Tim Bennie's kickoff following the score was caught by Joe Cooper, Eastland's field general who played a fine game generally, and the fleetly back raced 80 yards for a

touchdown. Mike Miller kicked goal.

Cisco took the kickoff and with Phipps, Nick Lopez and Brown grinding out yards, they set the ball up on Eastland's 28 from which Brown broke through and went all the way. Phipps then drove over for two points.

STATE FEDERATION SPEAKS FOR LUNCHEON IN CISCO

Mrs. A. T. Carleton of Houston, president of the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, declared libraries and library science scholarships to be of special interest to her in a talk given at a Federation Day luncheon held Friday afternoon, Sept. 20, at the Victor Hotel dining room in Cisco. Hostesses for the luncheon were presidents of Federated Clubs from Eastland and Cisco.

Mrs. Carleton's talk, entitled "Step by Step, We Reach Our Goal," touched on the departments of state federation and the way in which the work of the organization is carried out. She described the program as necessarily broad so that every club might select projects of special interest.

Junior clubs, the state official said, are being stressed by the current administration and were described by Mrs. Carleton as necessary in order that the work of the federation might be carried on. She urged the two federations represented at the luncheon to promote libraries program-wise and to present books as memorials and to channel scholarships to library science.

Mrs. Carleton commended the 20th Century Club of Cisco on the establishment and maintenance of the Cisco Public Library and said that area boys and girls were fortunate to have at their disposal the Cisco Junior College Library, which she visited.

The Texas Federation, third largest in the United States, according to Mrs. Carleton, has 13 library scholarships. She said that the Indian Affairs and International Affairs were relatively undeveloped areas of the federation.

Mrs. Carleton told of plans of the General Federation to provide a mural in an area at the base of the Statue of Liberty where immigrants will be processed; and a memorial in New Hampshire commemorating the military service of U. S. women, and urged that these projects be supported financially.

Mrs. Carleton also spoke of education, music and fine arts scholarships available to the federation through club work.

Mrs. Henry Fry, Cisco City Federation president, presided, giving the welcome and also introducing special guests and the speaker.

Mrs. W. V. Gardenhire, of Cisco led the Salute to the Flag preceding the luncheon and Mrs. S. E. Hittson, also of Cisco, led the singing of the Federation Song, accompanied by the piano by Mrs. Donald Kinnaird, Sr. of Eastland. Mrs. W. P. Leslie of Eastland gave the invocation.

ten students from Eastland have completed registration at Cisco Junior College, bringing the total number of students from Eastland to 24. Registrar E. W. Mince said.

Five of the 10 are sophomores, including Judy Blewins, James Fambrough, Don Massingill, Roy Millican and Bobby O'Steen. The remaining five freshmen are Patrick Armstrong, Deloris Cogburn, Walter Cox Jr., Bill Turner and David Wood.

College officials announced a record enrollment of over 400 following completion of registration last week. In addition to the 15 per cent increase in full-time academic students, approximately 200 more are expected to enroll in adult education classes.

Registration is currently underway for an IBM course, and will continue until Sept. 23, Dean Registrar E. W. Mince said. Night classes will also be offered, he added. No definite schedule of classes has been established, since any course will be offered if there is sufficient demand.

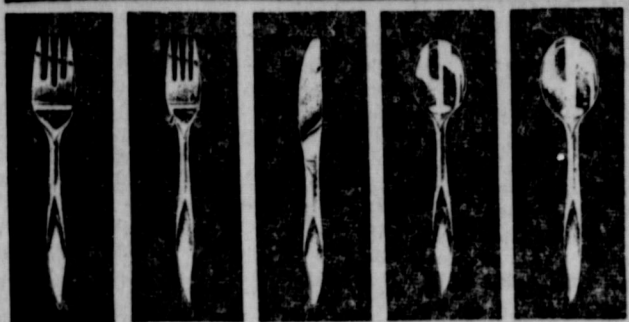



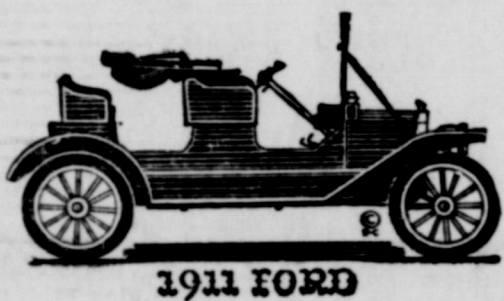
