SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty "14) Needy children who are actual HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to

(3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years, and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set upresidence requirements for eligibility: provided that presidence requirements for eligibility: provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient such presidence requirements for eligibility: for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds on behalf of such amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as matchable out of federal funds for such purposes: providing that the amounts expended out of state funds for such purposes shall not exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000): providing for the acceptance of fi-nancial aid from the Government of the United States; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

TEXAS:
Section I. That Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same are hereby amended, so that the same shall hereafter consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a of Article III, which shall read as follows:

"(2) Needy Individuals, who are eltizens of the United States, who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (55th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not feasible for vocational rehabilitation; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided further, that no individual shall receive assistance under this program for the permanently and totally disabled during any period when he is receiving Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Needy Blind, or Aid to Dependent Children, nor while he is residing permanently in any completely state-supported institution; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"(3) Needy blind persons who are actual burns fide citizens of Textual burns fide citizens of

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

"(1) Needy aged persons who are actual bona fide citizens of Texas, and who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmite of any state-supported institution, while such immate; provided that the Legislature shall prescribe the residence requirements for eligibility; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to any individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and provided further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds for appropriations out of states funds to any individual recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.



Vets Questions And Answers

- Am I automatically eligible for nonservice-c o n nected disability pension because I have become 65 years

A - The VA nonserviceconnected disability pension is not based on age but on the fact that the veteran has be come totally and permanently disabled. However, your age may be a contributing factor. Since each case is decided individually, you should consult your nearest VA office.

Q - My claim for death pension for our children was denied in 1959 because their father had no service-connected disability. Should I reap-

A - Yes, reapply immediately. On July 1, 1960, the requirement was eliminated that a World War II or Korean veteran must have a service connected disability at the time of death.

Q - I am in need of money. May I obtain a personal loan from the VA?

A - No. The various benefits granted to veterans by Congress do not include provisions for personal loans.

Q - My claim for disability pension was denied five years ago because my disability was not severe enough. How can I have my clain reconsidered?


