

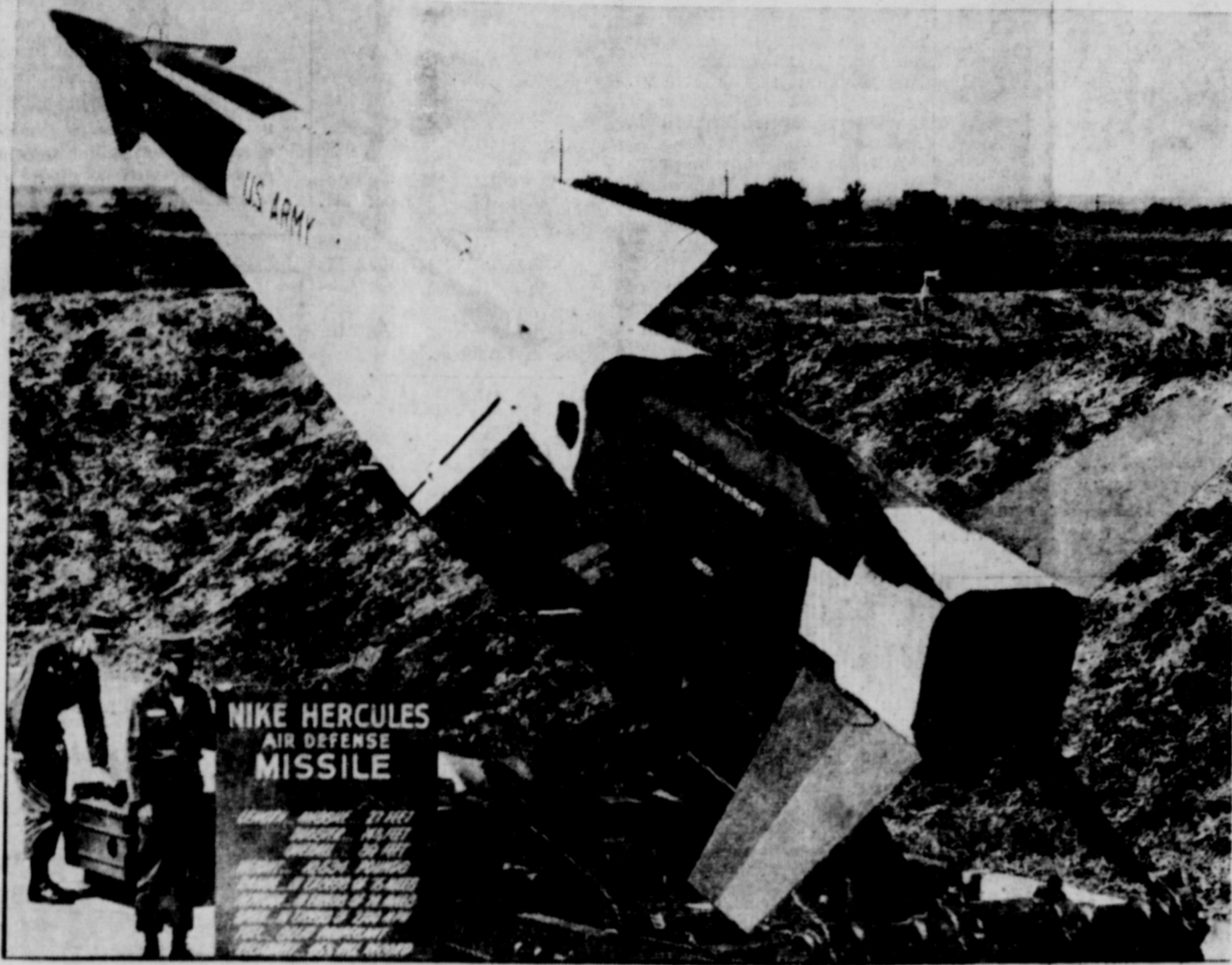

Nike-Hercules Defense Missile Will Be Peanut Bowl Feature

The Army's Nike-Hercules surface-to-air guided missile is coming to Eastland County and will be on display at the Fourth Annual Peanut Bowl Festival in Eastland, Saturday, September 14, it has been announced.

Ex-Miss Texas, Linda Loftis Will Be In Beauty Pageant

Eastland Jaycees voted Tuesday night to have Miss Texas of 1961, Linda Loftis of Fort Worth, serve as master of ceremonies for the Peanut Bowl queen contest here Sept. 10.

Dick Dixon is chairman of the contest. John Foster, Eastland High School band director, was appointed chairman of the twirling contest, to be held from 8-12 a. m. Saturday, Sept. 14.

Hit And Run Driver Being Sought Here

The Department of Public Safety and Eastland County officials are attempting to locate a 30-year-old Latin American accused of failure to stop and render aid at an auto accident near Desdemona Sunday.

Charges have been filed in Justice Court in Eastland, Highway Patrolman Jack Therwanger said, naming Raul Escobar, who formerly worked on a ranch near May, South of Rising Star.

The accident happened about 3 p. m. on State Highway 16 about one-half mile north of Desdemona. Driver of the other vehicle was not injured. The Latin American is owner of the light green 1950 model Ford, involved in the accident, although he may not have been the driver, Therwanger said. License number is Texas, DR 8863, and anyone knowing the whereabouts of Mr. Escobar or the auto, is asked to contact the Eastland Sheriff Department.

near Abilene and Denton in this area, will be trailer-mounted and will be exhibited both in the giant Peanut Bowl Parade, set for 2:30 p. m., and for special exhibit on the parking lot at Maverick Stadium.

The stadium will be the site for the clash of the day's activities when the grid teams of Cisco and Ranger junior colleges meet for the fourth time. Game time will be 8 p. m. and there will be special pre-game events, as well as half-time performances of particular note.

Eastland County lies within the scope of protection of the Abilene-based missiles because their "kill-range" is listed as being in "excess of 75 miles."

Peanut Bowl visitors will be given a free, close-up look at the gigantic weapon system, and there will be specialist on hand to answer questions. There are several Eastland County young men assigned to the Army's Abilene Nike station, so the missile and its mission is not all-unknown to this area.

Emphasizing the theme of this year's Festival, the club has made arrangements for the Nike and other "space-age" displays for the benefit of the Festival visitors. Glynn Gilliam, president of the sponsoring Eastland Jaycees, said, "We are happy to announce the appearance of this weapon, and hope that all in important national defense this area will take advantage of the opportunity to see it."

Selections are now being made for entries in this year's annual Peanut Bowl Queen Contest, which will be held at the Majestic Theater on Tuesday, September 10, just prior to the "Big Day."

The Queen will be recognized at the Bowl game. Other special attractions are now being arranged for and announcements of their appearance will be made soon.

Nike-Hercules is the first combat-ready missile with an atomic capability to enter the active air defenses of the U. S. Its altitude capability ranges from less than 1,000 feet (for low-level attack) to more than 150,000 feet (over 23 miles). With its booster, the "Herc." weighs approximately five tons and has an overall length of 39 feet. The missile alone is 27 feet long and has a diameter of 32 inches. Its cluster of four boosters is 14 1/2 feet long. Nike-Hercules is a two-stage missile using a solid-fueled propellant rocket booster and a solid-fueled propellant rocket motor to sustain it in flight. Solid fuels are superior to liquid fuels in the

Phil Hewitt, Paschal Band May Be Here for Bowl Event

Festivals are the time for bands — and in spite of some close calls, it looks as though the Peanut Bowl Festival in Eastland, Saturday, September 14, will be a mecca for bands.

And indications are that there will be a twirling contest — thanks to the ambition and enthusiasm of Eastland's new band master, John Foster, who only moved into town last weekend.

And a former Bandsman may bring his 4-AAA-A aggregation to town, too. "Yes, indeed," Foster told Jaycee President Glynn Gilliam, "we can put on a twirling contest for you." Such an event has been an important part of the annual Peanut

Bowl Festival for its first three years, but with the recent loss of EHS Director John Bailey, who resigned to accept another position, it looked as though the twirling contest was "out", because neither of the other Jaycees considered themselves qualified to put on a twirling contest show.

Plans are now being worked out, and final announcements will be made, but it appears certain that the youngsters in the county will again vie for trophies and medals with twirling and strutting talents.

Former Eastland Director Phil Hewitt has given the word that his 100-member plus Fort Worth Paschal High School group will come to the Peanut Bowl for a performance, if arrangements can be made with the Jaycees for meals, etc.

Final arrangements on this too are yet to be announced.

Lions District Governor Visits Here This Week

"Lionism is in good shape in the district, the state and the nation, but not quite as good in the district as I'd like to see it," District Governor Charles E. Davis of Wichita Falls told the Eastland Club Tuesday.

In asking for an increase in membership, Gov. Davis said that the district and the state "has got to get moving" to keep up with the advances being made nationally by Lions.

"We have to be unsatisfied," Davis said, "and urged the club to increase its membership." He complimented the club for its activeness and good spirit.

The governor was introduced by International Counselor H. R. Garrett.

City Buys \$2,432.25 Bill Machine

Automation is on its way to the City Hall, and the billing department will have its work speeded up when a new semi-automatic billing machine arrives in about three weeks.

Commissioners approved the purchase of the \$2,432.25 Burroughs machine following a regular commission meeting Monday evening. At the close of the meeting, it had been taken under advisement, but during a later meeting with the machine's salesman and his district manager, the cost was trimmed by \$300, and two commissioners were polled by phone and the okay given for buying the machine.

Use of the billing machine will save about 50 per cent of the billing clerk's time, City Manager Lewis Tiner said. The city will pay \$200 down and \$120 a month for 18 months, with no interest.

The machine, a "401 Sensomatic," is the same as recently purchased and being used by the City of Ranger. In fact, it was Ranger's machine that the Commissioners saw demonstrated at their meeting.

A purchase of radio equipment was approved for the volunteer fire department at a cost of about \$750 for speed and convenience in locating rural fires. The out-of-town calls, made under contract with the county at 50 each, account for about half of the department's runs, Tiner said. In other business, commissioners discussed, but took no action on these matters: Loss of five million gallons of water per month in the local system. Relocation of the city dump grounds to an area north of Eastland adjacent to the airport to eliminate odors near the present site in the east part of town. An increased city auto tax was discussed to raise revenue for street improvements. Mayor Pro Tem Frank Deaton presided. 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PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1952.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 21 proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Sections 51-a and 51-b-1 of Article III so that the same shall consist of one Section to be known as Section 51-a; providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to (1) citizens of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years; (2) needy persons who are at least eighteen (18) years of age and less than sixty-five (65) years of age who are permanently and totally disabled; (3) needy blind persons over the age of twenty-one (21) years; and (4) needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility for such assistance; repealing the Constitutional limit on the amount paid out of state funds to individual recipients of Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled; providing that the amount for such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds for such purposes; providing that the amount of such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Government of the United States such financial aid for such assistance as such Government may offer not inconsistent with the restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of state funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds for such assistance shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"The Legislature may enact appropriate laws to make lists of the recipients of aid hereunder available for inspection, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed appropriate by the Legislature."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1952, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing that the amount of such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing for assistance payments to (1) needy aged, (2) needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled, (3) needy blind and (4) needy children; authorizing the Legislature to set up residence requirements for eligibility; authorizing the Legislature to make appropriations out of state funds for the payment of assistance grants on behalf of such recipients; providing that the amount of such assistance payments shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of federal funds; and providing further, that the total amount of such assistance payments out of state funds shall never exceed Sixty Million Dollars (\$60,000,000)."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

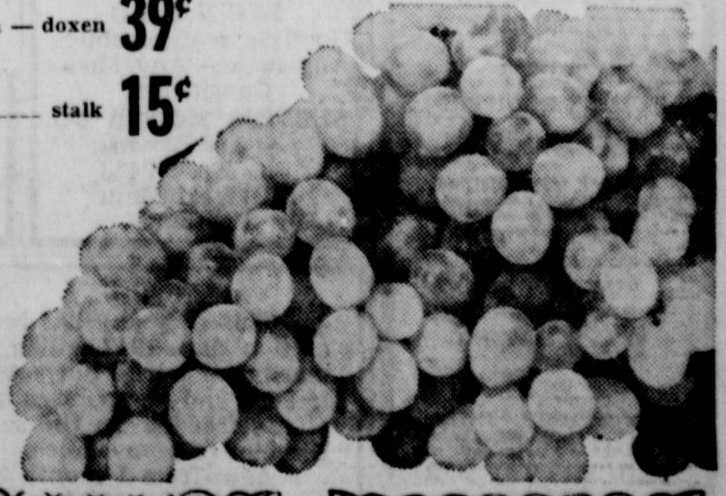

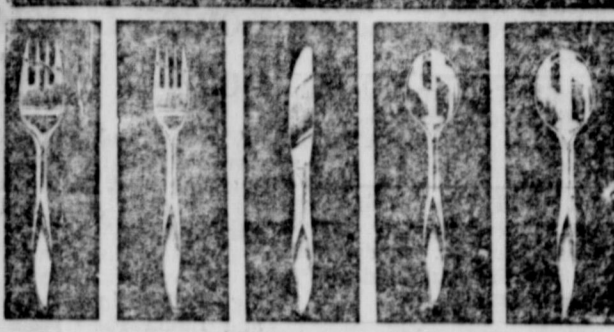

Gibbens Arrives For Hawaii Meet

Representative Wayne Gibbens of Breckenridge, arrived in Honolulu, Hawaii, Monday to attend the National Legislative Conference, Aug. 19 through Aug. 23.

The National Legislative Conference — organized in 1947 by the Council of State Governments — serves as a forum for the legislatures of the fifty states in which the legislative process is reviewed and analyzed with a view toward improvement of methods and procedures.

Present with Rep. Gibbens to represent Texas are Speaker of the House Byron Tunnell; Lt. Gov. Preston Smith; the new Director of the Texas Legislative Council, former Member of the House from Dallas, Robt. E. Johnson; House Members Dick Slack of Pecos, and Ben Jarvis of Tyler; and Senator George Parkhouse of Dallas.

Mr. Gibbens represents Eastland County in the State legislature.

MOTORISTS ASKED TO 'USE KEEN JUDGMENT' IN SPEED

AUSTIN — The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety warned motorists today "not to take the new, higher speed limits too literally" when they go into effect August 23.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr. reminded that "there are a multitude of circumstances and situations under which even the old limits were too fast for safety."

"With more than two-thirds of the Texas highway system under a 70-mile-per-hour daytime maximum speed for passenger cars and 65 miles per hour at night, we wish to appeal to all Texans to exercise keen judgment and drive responsibly and prudently regardless of what the signs say. The law prohibits driving a vehicle too fast for existing conditions."

"The Department of Public Safety believes that the objective of speed legislation is to contribute to the efficient movement of traffic on the highways. We feel the new law will help to accomplish this, and our objective of enforcement is to secure substantial compliance with the speed law by all users of the rural highways. The prima facie speed limits fixed by the Legislature or established by zoning authority will be construed to be the maximum permissible speeds under normal conditions, and speeds in excess of such limits will be considered illegal."

"Our enforcement personnel will stop and initiate appropriate enforcement action against all persons observed by them to be committing clear-cut and substantial violations of the speed law."

Garrison urged motorists to be particularly cautious in assuming the higher night speed limit of 65 miles per hour. He said research by the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads shows that increasing night speeds from 55 MPH to 70 MPH doubles the accident involvement rate, and that the severity of accidents increases rapidly at

speeds over 70 MPH.

"We repeat that serious problems may develop with the new speed laws unless the driving public accepts and applies them with a high degree of responsibility to themselves and their families and others," he said.

"And we would like to emphasize at this time that traffic deaths are running far ahead of last year already, with an increase of about 100 deaths. Unless we can hold the line against this trend, we will wind up with an all-time high traffic death toll in 1963."

Q — I am a veteran who was discharged six months ago. I have a disability which I believe is traceable to my service. Is there a deadline for applying to the VA for disability compensation?

A — There is no deadline. You may apply at any time. However, if you apply within one year from your release from active duty, payments may be retroactive to your first day as a civilian. If you wait longer than one year, payments can become effective only as of the date you apply.

Vets Questions And Answers

Q — Am I automatically eligible for nonservice-connected disability pension because I have become 65 years old?

A — The VA nonservice-connected disability pension is not based on age but on the fact that the veteran has become totally and permanently disabled. However, your age may be a contributing factor. Since each case is decided individually, you should consult your nearest VA office.

Q — My claim for death pension for our children was denied in 1959 because their father had no service-connected disability. Should I reapply?

A — Yes, reapply immediately. On July 1, 1960, the requirement was eliminated that a World War II or Korean veteran must have a service-connected disability at the time of death.

Q — I am in need of money. May I obtain a personal loan from the VA?

A — No. The various benefits granted to veterans by Congress do not include provisions for personal loans.

Q — My claim for disability pension was denied five years ago because my disability was not severe enough. How can I have my claim reconsidered?

many years back. For the same reasons, hunters couldn't take redheads and canvas-back ducks last year.
"It's this department's responsibility to look after the game in this great State of ours. And, when our wildlife scientists conclude through research, observations, experience and concern that a species has been reduced to the danger point, it's our duty to protect this species, even if it means closing a season." This isn't the first time the whitewing hunt has been shut down. Back in the 50's the season remained closed for three years to give the birds a chance to build up their populations. Closing the season worked, and since 1956 hunters have enjoyed the thrills of trying their hunting skills against the darting dodging doves with the white slashed wings. "A drop of the season this year may mean open seasons for the next several years," said Dodgen. "A

hunt this year could force us to drop the hunts for the next several years. The people in this State, including those in the Valley, realize this and very few are complaining. Texans know that guessing was not, and is not, one of the techniques the Commission uses for determining a season. Facts revealed through constant study resulted in the decision to withdraw the open season this year."

The 20 year old soldier attended Cisco High School. Before entering the Army, he was employed by Parker Drilling Company, Odessa.

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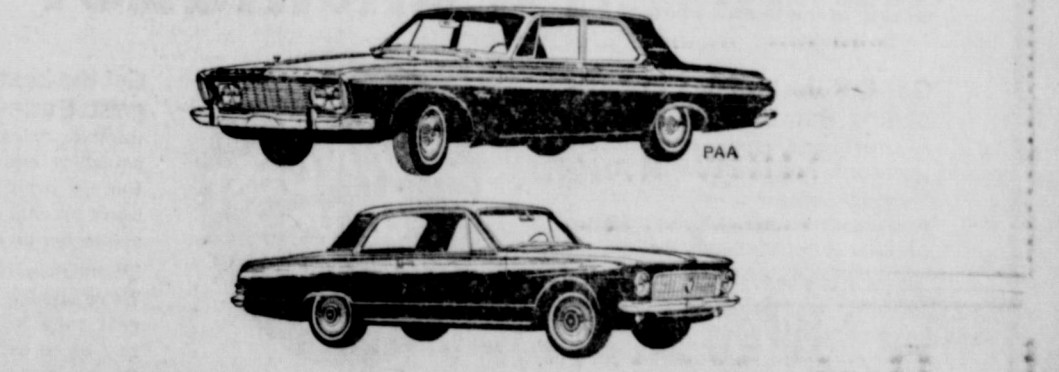
