## Hussey Murder Trial Begins in Palo Pinto

One hundred and fifty prospective jurors have been summoned to appear in the 29th District Court in Palo Pinto at 9 a. m. Monday, Oct. 14, where District Attorney Earl Conner hopes to obtain a jury and try 18-year old Nathan Curry of Cisco for murder with malice.

A murder charge against young Curry was filed in Eastland County on July 5, 1961, for the slaying of Mrs. Florence Hussey in her home in Cisco on June 28, following a purported confession of the slaying by him. Curry, 15 at the time, remained in the Eastland County jail until a hearing in the County Court, sitting as a juvenile court, on August 9, 1961, at which time the murder charge had been withdrawn and he was tried on a substitute charge of breaking into Mrs. Hussey's home and committing an act of burglary. He was declared by the court to be a delinquent and was sentenced to the state reform school at Gatesville. At that time, Mr. Conner explained that as a delinquent, Nathan Curry could be held at Gatesville until he reached the age of 17, at which time he could be charged and tried for murder as an adult.

The closed door hearing, and the instruction by the county judge to all attorneys and witnesses to make no comment regarding the hearing other than the above mentioned facts, were the first of many contributing factors which have appeared to veil the case with secrecy.

A series of legal actions began when young Curry was not charged with murder following his 17th birthday but remained at the state school at Gatesville. Attorney John Watts of Odessa was employed by the Currys, and failing to gain a hearing in Eastland County on a habeas corpus, he eventually obtained a hearing in the district court in Odessa last winter, where young Curry was ordered released to the custody of his parents.

## SPACE-AGE DIET?

## 'Instant Nourishment' On Tap For Infants at Eastland Hospital

Babies born at Eastland Memorial Hospital now get their first taste of this rocket age world by way of a new instant formula system adopted by the hospital.

"This new system provides the safest possible way to feed infants in the hospital, and it is cutting hospital costs, too," Leon Musgrove, administrator, says.

What's more the infants' first meals are served at room temperature.

This unique feeding system developed after five years of research by Ross Laboratories, a leading maker of prepared infants' formulas, works this way:

The formula is sterilized in disposable bottles at the manufacturers' laboratories and shipped to the hospital in a special plastic wrapping. At feeding time, the nurse opens each bottle of formula needed and caps it with a nipple in a plastic cover.

That's it — no more sterilizing, mixing, adding, bottling, bottle warming, etc. The babies bottle is ready in two steps.

According to Mrs. Mary Sue Lee, Director of Nurses, there is no room for human error in preparation such as accidentally using salt instead of sugar in the infants' formula. It is made under rigid standards of quality control before it leaves the manufacturer's plant and is delivered ready to feed.

The new system, hospital officials said, will probably reduce the cost of formula feeding more than half. With the elimination of time consuming procedures like bottle washing, formula mixing etc.

The personnel who work in the formula room are free to perform other important duties in the hospital.

"We are always looking for ways to improve the efficiency of our hospital," Mr. Musgrove said. "And this new system appears to be doing just that." More than two hundred other hospitals in the United States have adopted this system too.

No one has asked the babies how they feel about this new instant system, although they are doing fine on the formula.

By the time they are worried about such things, they will probably be taking trips to the moon — the system will work there too.

A budget of \$7,375, an increase of only \$75, was recently approved the board of directors. The advance gifts committee, headed by Tom Wilson, and consisting of Virgil Seaberry and Jack Frost, are reported to already be working with excellent results.

"We're hoping to wind this

campaign up in about a week," Drive Chairman James Reid said, as he was personally contacting workers at mid-week. "I've got 60 people to talk to. 
She lived there until her marriage to Will Lovell Nov.



## Farm Bureau To Stage Annual Member Drive

Ten dollars is a small fee to pay to protect an investment amounting to thousands of dollars, but that's all a membership in Farm Bureau costs, according to Jack Cozart of Cisco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Cozart announced that the local county organization is staging its annual clean-up membership drive beginning October 14 and continuing through October 18.

The county farm leader declared that membership in Farm Bureau is the best assurance that a farmer or rancher has that his economic future is protected.

"Farm Bureau is owned and controlled by its members and is primarily designed to safeguard and promote agricultural interests on the local level, in Austin and in Washington," Cozart said. He explained that one of the benefits a membership in Farm Bureau buys is full-time representation in the Texas Legislature and national Congress.

"Three out of every four organized farmers and ranchers in this nation belong to Farm Bureau," he explained. "And our organization spares no effort to obtain maximum membership participation in the development of policies that guide the organization on all levels."

The Eastland County Farm Bureau has set a quota of 575 member families for 1963. Last year the organization had 562 enrolled.




