

al interests on the local level, in Austin and in Washington, Cozart said. He explained that one of the benefits a membership in Farm Bureau buys is full-time representa-tion in the Texas Legislature and national Congress.

"Three out of every four organized farmers and ranchers in this nation belong to Farm Bureau," he explained. "And our organization spares no effort to obtain maximum membership participation in the development of policies that guide the organizaion on all levels.'






