TESCO TOLD

'The Fabulous Future Depends On Now and You'

"The fabulous future is dependent on the magnificent present and your finding your place of service," Dr. Carl Winters told several hundred Eastland district employees and guests at Texas Electric Service Co.'s annual Quarter Century Banquet Tuesday evening.

The famous national lecturer, a member of the General Motors Lecture Staff, spoke too, of the "Space Age," pointing out that the space around us, and the space within us, is equally as important as "outer" space, because the power for the fabulous future is within man.

"Choice and attitude make the difference," he said. The "race" we're constantly reminded of, he called the race for intelligence, or explosion; the race for growing up, or blowing up.

Frank Sayre, Eastland District Manager, was master of ceremonies for the event which annually honors TESCO employees who have served the company for 25 years or more. This year was the first in many that no new members are joining the club from the Eastland District.

Company President Beeman Fisher briefly described progress in the past year, and talked of coming projects including the programed addition of some 500,000 kilowatts capacity by 1967. Glaucoma Examination Clinic Considered by Eastland Lions

A county-wide, public-service glaucoma detection clinic and a Sight Conservation Halloween Candy Sale to help pay for the clinic were approved by the board of directors of the Eastland Lions Club this week.

Glaucoma is a blinding eye disease that needs to be detected in its early stages to be corrected.

The projects will be recommended to the entire club at next Tuesday's meeting, subject to approval, President Marcus O'Dell announced. Test for the disease is simple, but must be administered by eye specialists. Int. Counselor Tom Ward of Breckenridge reported to the Eastland club that his club conducted such a clinic recently and there were over 650 persons tested. Eight persons were recommended for further tests.

The Eastland club will invite the Ranger and Cisco clubs to assist with the program, but will conduct the project alone, if the other two county clubs elect not to assist, the directors agreed.

The clinic will be available to every person in the county, especially those over 40 as a public service of the Lions Club, as a continued phase of their sight conservation theme. The national average is 12 per cent.

Light refreshments will be served following the special Sunday afternoon service at the church the pastor said.

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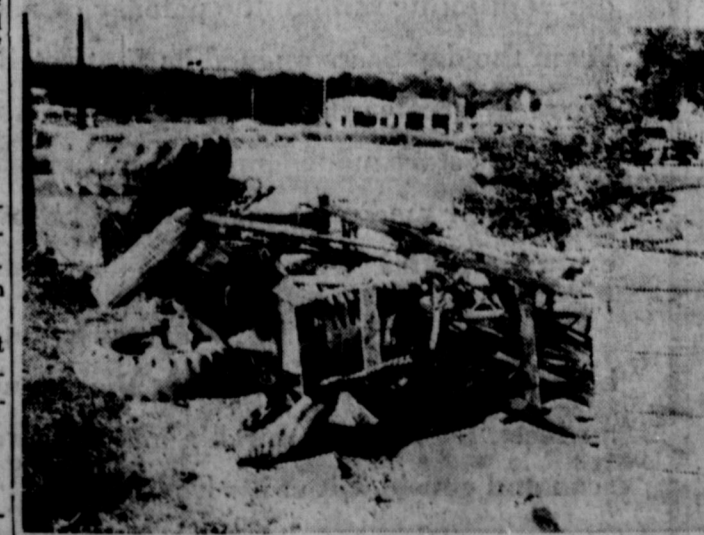

County Equipment Injunction Case Given To Appeals Court

The Eleventh Court of Civil Appeals will decide if streets and alleys in Gorman will be maintained with county equipment.

Judge T. M. Collie granted a temporary injunction in 91st District Court Tuesday restraining the county commissioners from using county equipment for work on streets within the city and on private property.

Notice to appeal was immediately given by O. C. McMillan of Stephenville, attorney for Commissioner Glen Justice and the commissioners court.

At the request of McMillan, Judge Collie also increased bond on the plaintiff from \$1,000 to 2,500. McMillan asked for \$10,000.

Frank Sparks, representing J. L. Butler and Bryan L. Johnson in seeking the injunction, was instructed by Judge Collie to draw up the order of the injunction. Questioned after the hearing, Sparks said that the plaintiff would ask that the injunction be made permanent after a hearing in the appeals court.

Approximately 50 people were in the court room as the two attorneys argued the case. A ten day order was issued by Judge Collie after a day long hearing in his court last Thursday.

Judge Collie held that there had been no violation of penal statutes, and said in his statement that the only remedy for the situation that is, permitting a county to assist a city to maintain its streets) lies with the legislature.

In his argument, Sparks said

that his clients were not questioning any contract but were merely asking that the commissioners court refrain from using county machinery for work on private property. "They can build all the roads and airports in Gorman they want to," he said. "We just don't want them to use the county equipment to build them."

McMillan said that the City of Gorman is the party to gain or lose most by the decision of the court, because that city does not have machinery to take care of its streets. He also asked that Gorman be made a party to the suit and

pointed out in his argument that the streets named in the original document were streets connecting highways and farm to market roads.

Judge Collie refused to admit Gorman as a party to the suit in his decision, and called the use of county equipment a mis-use of public property.

Judge Collie also specified in his decision that county equipment is not to be used on any city streets "except those designated as highways." Sparks said after the hearing that there are no such county designated streets in Gorman at this time.

Television, like radio before it but to a far greater degree has brought about major changes in the advertising picture. 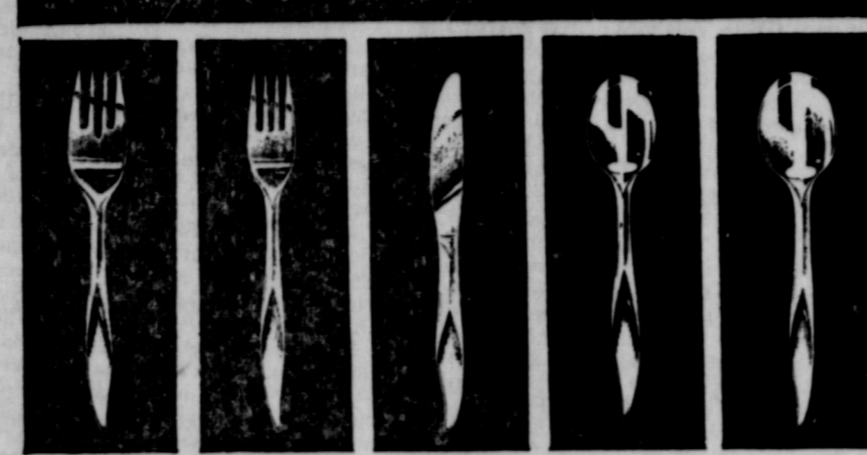

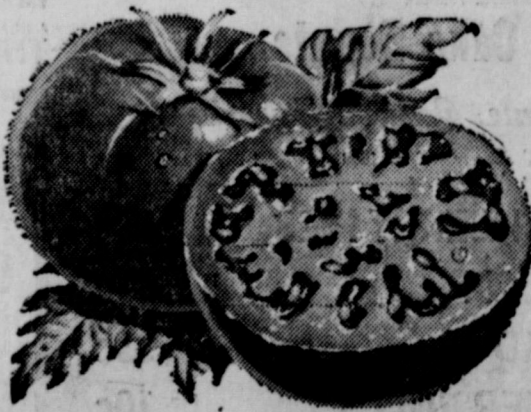

Control Wildlife' Vet Says Eastland Rotary Speech

Control of wildlife in Eastland is important to the safety of livestock and humans. Dr. Foster pointed out this area could be a site for an outbreak of rabies, and that it is important to keep lower the skunk and fox population for the safety of livestock and humans.

A rabid skunk was killed about five miles north of Ranger this last spring, he said, and added that he thought the county needs to continue the

employment of its professional trapper.

After the completion of the talk, which included a discussion of the many "misunderstandings" about rabies and the history of vaccines, Dr. Foster was joined in his opinion about the government trapper by Sam Kimmell, a Cisco area rancher.

Mr. Kimmell said that petitions are now being circulated asking a county election to discontinue the services of the trapper. "Speaking for the sheep and goat raisers who provide a large segment of this county's economy," he said, "We're asking you not to sign the petitions because we need the trapper."

A Ranger firm has already bought over \$2 million worth of wool and mohair this year, Mr. Kimmell said, and this represents no small part of our economy. And the sheep and goat raisers will sustain great losses if the predatory animals aren't controlled.

Dr. Foster emphasized the importance of bearing shy of "nocturnal (skunks, fox, raccoons, etc.) animals prowling in the open in the daytime. They are generally sick, and possibly rabid, he said, when they go about in the daytime. He also warned against shooting rabid suspects and re-

commended cautiously confining them so they may be observed, and if necessary tested. "And if you must shoot them, don't shoot them in the head."

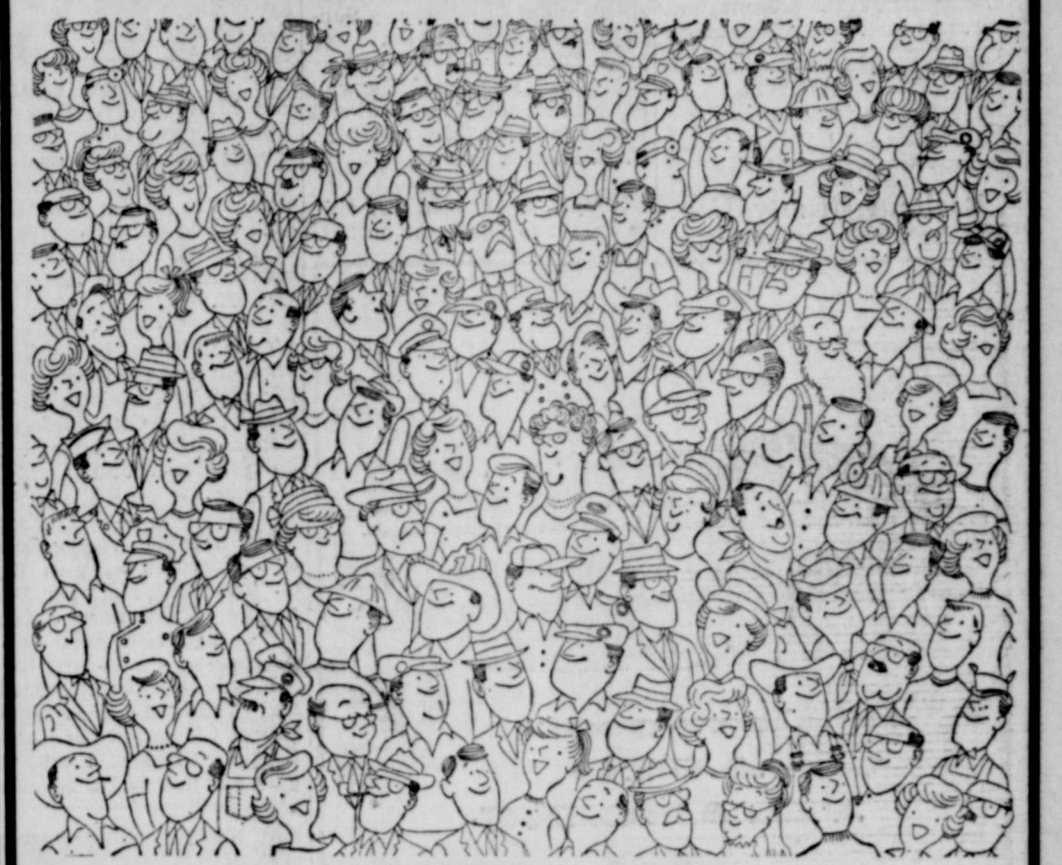

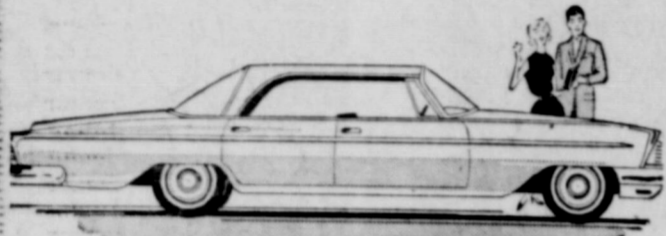

ERNEN HABY IS SPEAKER FOR BI-COUNTY COUNCIL P-TA

Ernen Haby, dean registrar at Ranger Junior College, was the speaker Friday morning when the Bi-County Council of Eastland-Callahan Counties met for the opening meeting of the school year in First Methodist Church in Ranger. He was introduced by Mrs. J. D. Johnson of Ranger. Mrs. C. W. Huffman, president, presided.
Mr. Haby, who as recently as last summer attended an administrators' workshop at the University of Texas for four weeks study, spoke on the problems of the "Dropouts." This vital problem to both parents and students, as well as school officials, was researched as part of the required reading for the course.
"To the student who has ability and wants to succeed in life, an education, hard work, with a planned approach and having everything right with the Lord, is the surest way to success that I know," he said by way of introductory remarks.
The most practical example to explain the necessity for further education was cited by the speaker in telling of the military's approach. "They come as recruiters to our campus each year; wanting the boys to continue their education and then go to officer's training school. Those boys who follow this advice are our military leaders of tomorrow. Those who drop out of school will end up in the lower ranks."
Mr. Haby said that educating youth is the most important job facing America. By 1970, three million young people per year can be expected to start their working careers, as compared with two million in 1960. This is an increase of 40% over the 1950's. Of 2,000,000 June 1962 high school graduates, only 800,000 of them went to college.
He pointed out that lack of maturity was a great factor in keeping young dropouts out of industry. They need the extra years of school for this reason as well as valuable education acquired.
"Automation in industry is replacing 1,800,000 jobs per year. In highly advanced industrial countries, the largest employed group is among people who work with knowledge. These groups, the knowledge workers, are the only employ groups growing rapidly," Mr. Haby said.
Among other ideas developed by Mr. Haby were:
Teachers are the largest single employ group. These, rather than workers on the automobile assembly line, are

the representative employees of an educated society.
Magazines, books, newspapers, etc., still think and speak of two classes in our society; the bosses and the workers. This is no longer so. A balanced education with emphasis on spiritual qualities and achievements is what we need. This is a problem for every member of our society.
