



### There's An Art Mrs. M. E. Nix, et vir to To Nose Blowing

Do you know how to blow a d to leave b

vour nose? This seems very much like a foolish question. Blowing the nose to clear mucus is a very simple affair.

But physicians have long known that blowing the nose too hard can cause trouble in the ear.

How does this happen? Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Associatio , explains. Two tiny tubes that have an opening in the upper part of the throat connect with the middle ear, one on each side. The tubes are basically "safety valves" to keep air pressure in middle ear the same as outside The eardrums do not cormally permit any air to get in our middle ear.

Adjustment of air pressure in the middle ear is normally carried o u t automatically and without conscious effort. If there is too rapid a change in outside air pressure, such as occurs when ascending of descending in a plane, the air in the middle ear may expand or contract. The eardrum will either bulge out or curve in and ear pain may be produced.

Then a co scious effort is needed to open the tubes in the throat and let air in or out of the middle ear. This can be done by swallowing, chewing gum or holding ose and then trying to blow. The mage ghanted be blown





Highlight of the convection was the opposition of the pro-fessional Nurses Practice Act, which if passed by legislature, would create a work stoppage for some 50,000 people in addition to close hospitals and nursing homes of Texas.

The act, sponsored by the Texas Graduate Nurses' Associatio , will require that (1) any person practicing or offering to practice professional nursing in Texas for compensation shall be lice sed and currently registered; (2) any person practicing or offering to practice professional nursing for compensatio: in Texas shall hereafter be required to submit evidence to the Texas Board of Professional Nursing that he is qualified and shall be licensed and registered; and (3) the registration of every perso: licensed under the pro-visions of this law shall be renewed annual. Any person practicing professional nursing for comne setion during the time such person's registration has langed shall be considered on illaral practitioner and shall be subject to penalties provided for violation of this law. In all, the act includes some

20 sectio:s with subdivisions. Objections of the Texas Hospital Association and its member hospitals to the proposed nursing law include the follow-ing: (1) a "mandatory" nursing law would make illegal use of mary personnel in hospitals who are now valuable in supplementing the short supply of registered nurses; (2) A 'mandatory" act would endanger the position of the no :-profit hospital in lawsuits: and (3) the proposed definition of professional nursing is so broad as to include virtually all paramedical professio al employes in the hospital.
