



## Second Annual Sheep & Goat Field Day Friday, Sept. 20

The second annual Eastland County Sheep and Goat Field Day will be held Friday, September 20, at the old Sinclair pump station at Tiffin.

The all-day affair which will start at 10:00 a. m., is being co-sponsored by the Ranger Chamber of Commerce and the Eastland County Agent, J. M. Cooper.

The purpose of this program is to offer the ranchers and farmers in the area an opportunity to meet with men who are directly connected with the industry. Through this, they may share their own experiences with other sheep and goat raisers.

The program got off to a good start with last year's show, which saw about twice the number in attendance as was expected.

This year's Field Day is expected to be even and better than last year's.

Many specialists from the A&M extension service will be on hand to give talks and demonstrations on the various aspects of better breeding, feeding methods and the price out-looks on wool and mohair.

Scheduled to take part in the program are: Jim Gray of San Angelo and Jack Goff of Kerrville. Both are specialists from the A&M extension service. A top economist in the livestock field and scheduled to take part is John G. McHaney, two veterinarians, Dr. J. B. Henderson, area vet for Texas Animal Health Commission, and Dr. C. M. Patterson, A&M University, will round out the program.

Dr. John Foster, Ranger Veterinarian, will be program chairman.

According to Roy Plumley, Chamber of Commerce Manager, many ranchers from adjoining counties will be in attendance as they were last year.

A ranch-style barbecue lunch will be served, courtesy the Ranger Chamber of Commerce.

Both the Rotary and Lions Clubs have forgone their weekly meeting and lunch at the College Cafeteria to join the ranchers.

The old Sinclair building is now owned by the Ranger Junior College which is donating it's use for the day.

All business men are invited to attend, as much as their trade area will be represented in the meeting.

## Salary Increases Being Considered for Employees

An increased minimum salary scale and the addition of an incentive payment plan for city employees is now under consideration by the City Commission and Manager Lewis Tiner.

Commissioner Dale Troutt recommended at Monday night's regular meeting that a minimum salary of \$225 per month be established for all city employees, and a salary increase of \$5 per month for each five years of city employment be instituted.

After a study of comparison of wages paid by Eastland and other similar-sized towns, Commissioners agreed that local wages are low and need adjusting.

However, the now-frequent question of "can we afford" raises was brought up, and Tiner was instructed to study the matter with a view to increasing the lowest-paid workers, and implementing the incentive program "if the city can afford it."

Asked about the city's finances, Tiner said that the auditor is still working, and that he (Tiner) will attempt to present a financial statement by next meeting time.

"Is the auditor still interested in doing work for the city?" Mayor Don Pierson asked, and Commissioner Virgil Seaberry replied that he didn't know.

"Is he through with the audit," Pierson asked, and Tiner replied, "With last years, but not this years."

Tiner also reported during the brief meeting:

That city police are asking for a city jail because the County Jail (now being used) is constantly full, and some prisoners have to be taken to neighboring towns.

That the billing machine recently bought by the city is expected to arrive before

next billing time (Thursday or Friday). Company representative Tom White will be here to help set up the billing, Tiner said.

Commissioners also heard

two Abilene salesmen, discussing the trading of the city's present street sweeper for a re-built model, for \$1,800 trade. No action was taken.

The 1964 version of Chrysler's "alphabet" series of high performance cars, which originated in 1955, is the 300K which has a sports car interior with a center transmission console and a 413 cubic-inch police pursuit type engine with a four-barrel carburetor and dual exhausts. The front end of the 1964 model is extensively changed. The bumper is wider and is mounted high to provide superior protection to the grille. The grille has a new horizontal design extending the full width between headlights.

In the rear, the most noticeable change is in the tail lights which are vertical in shape and follow the contour of the rear quarter panels.

**Nine Models Offered**

The 1964 Valiant line consists of nine models in five body styles — 2-door sedan, 2-door hardtop, 4-door sedan, convertible coupe and 4-door station wagon. In the deluxe Signet series, an attractive new sporty looking vinyl roof is available as an option on the two-door hardtop.

**4-Speed Transmission**

New Features, available for the first time in the Valiant line, include a Chrysler Corporation-engineered fully synchronized, floor-mounted 4-speed manual shift transmission; a Sure-Grip differential to minimize rear wheel spinning on slippery surfaces, and a push button electric windshield washer.

The 5-year or 50 thousand-mile warranty on the engine and drive train components introduced on 1963 models is continued for 1964.

Higher compression ratios for both the standard and the optional engines provide improved economy on regular grade fuel. The previous 8.2 to 1 compression ratio, standard for both engines, is increased to 8.5 to 1 for the standard 170 cubic inch engine, and to 8.4 to 1 for the 225 cubic inch optional engine.

Since it has no sliding parts, the need for maintenance is eliminated. The diaphragm action offers no resistance to the closing action of the automatic choke spring in returning the choke blade to starting position after the engine has been stopped and allowed to cool.

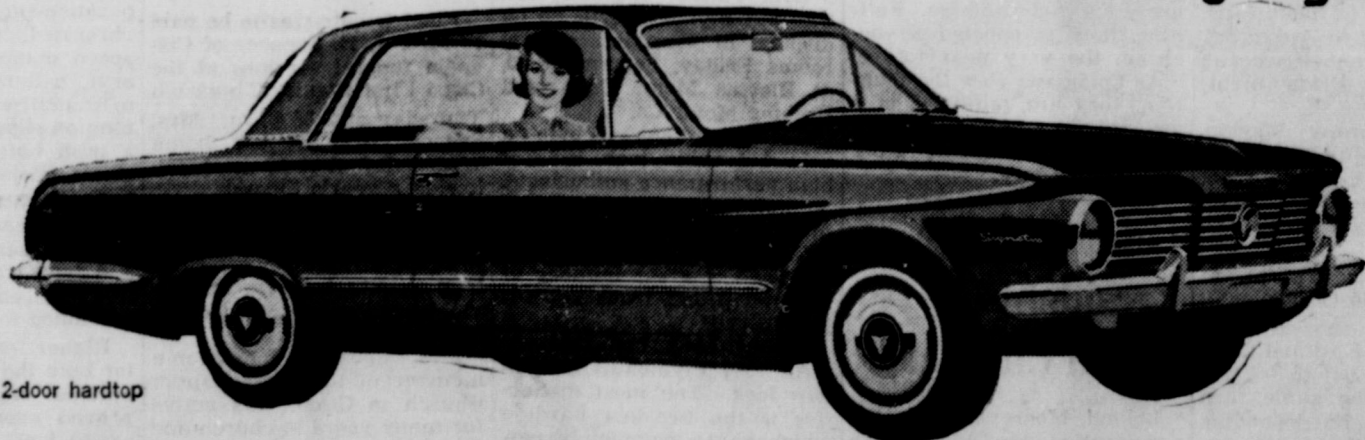

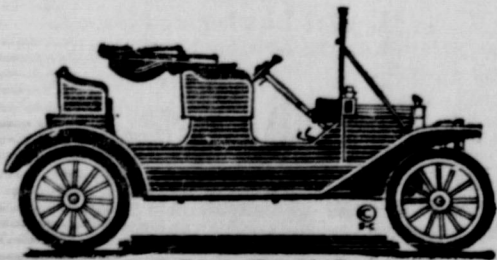

## Smoking Really Does 'Cut Wind' Science Reports

Anyone who ever "went out" for football or some other team sport in school remembers that the coach told him to cut out smoking.

coach said. Usually we believe him and avoided smoking.

Now science can prove that smoking really does "cut the wind" — that is, cause a marked decrease in breathing capacity.

The Committee on Medical Aspects of Sports of the American Medical Association and the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations in a recent joint

comment on smoking and sports point out that the ability to produce maximum effort and to build endurance for sports is related to the capacity of the athlete to take in and utilize oxygen.

After reviewing reports on Scientific studies of breathing capacity, the AMA Committee recommends that athletes should be strongly advised against smoking. In fact, ten inhalations of cigarette smoke have been shown to materially reduce airway conductance to the lungs. The decrease is as much as 5 per cent and lasts for as long as an hour.

One effect of smoking on breathing is to slow down the rate at which stale air can be expelled from the lungs. The heavy smoker has trouble in breathing quickly and easily under heavy exertion.

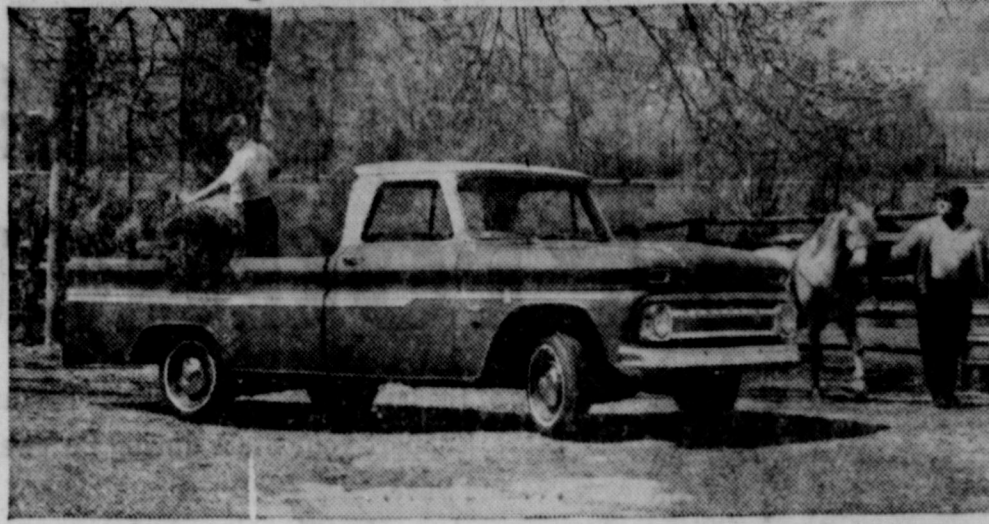
There comes a time in most team and individual sports when an absolutely maximum effort is required for a brief moment. It may be a hard sprint in football, a leap for a rebound in basketball, a fast run to try to beat a throw to first base in baseball, a quick jump to reach for a high tennis ball, a hard finish sprint in swimming.

The smoker, even though he may be a fine natural athlete, highly trained and skilled, may find that his capacity for that all-important finish sprint or leap is slightly less than it might have been if he laid off tobacco.

In a close finish between well matched athletes, the non-smoker has the edge.

There is no longer any room for doubt that athletes should not smoke.

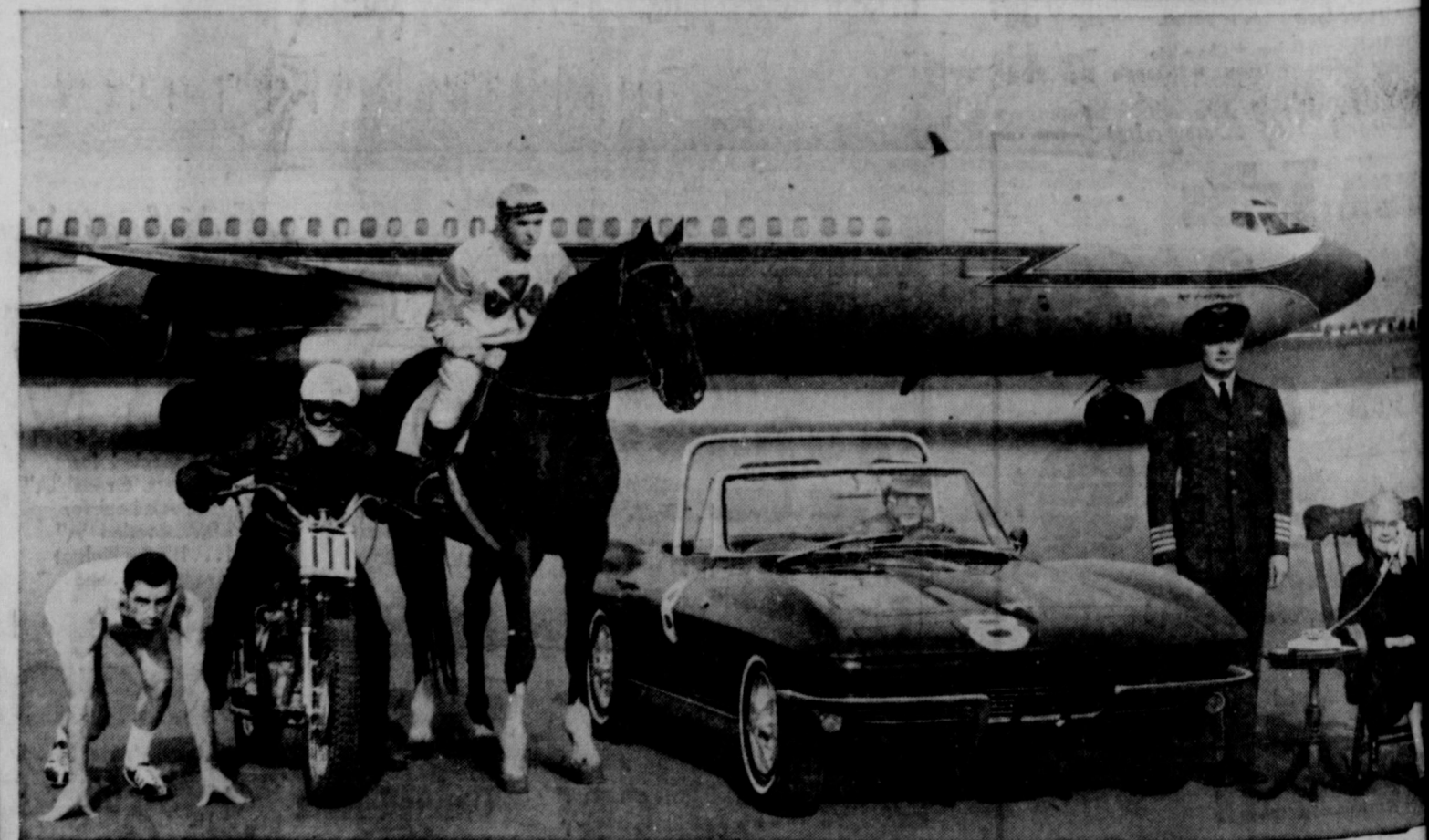
