CROP REPORTS NEEDED - - During the last half of May, a random sample of some 24,000 Texas farmers will receive a crop acreage questionnaire from W.H. Walther, Agricultural Statistician In Charge of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, Austin This information will be the basis for determining the planted acreage for the state of Texas and for each county. Texas covers such a wide area that state totals alone do not provide adequate information on Texas' most basic industry - agriculture. The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimates for each county. This is a cooperative effort of USDA's Statistical Reporting Service and the Texas Department of Agriculture. Accurate estimates are of great importance to farmers in planning production and marketings and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture. Farmers who receive questionnaires are urged to complete and return them by mail. All individual reports are confidential and are used only for state and

Statewide participants in the Texas visitor industry are whistling a happy tune these days. It's entitled "1975 Was a Very Good

By all previous standards, last year's sun, fun and vacation business went through the ceiling, shattering all previous records for total visitors, length of stay and, most important, expenditures by travelers from out of state.

The cheerful details are contained in the state's annual Texas Visitor Industry Report released today by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation. Their tallies, which they've been conducting since 1947, show an all-time high of 21, 819,000 out

of - state visitors in 1975 who spent \$3.5 billion in Texas. The Department points out that the number of such visitors is Services For actually some 80 percent greater than the number of Texas residents and represents the largest numerical increase in visitors in a single year since they started counting out - of - state license plates almost 30 years ago.

Rebounding from uncertainties of the oil embargo that cast a pall of gloom over the tourist industry, highway travelers surged back into Texas in unprecedented numbers, topping their previous year's volume by 14.2 percent.

Driving station wagons, pickup campers and herds of recreational vehicles, over 18 million visitors, two million more than in 1974, fanned out over the Lone Star State.

The average auto traveler drove 1,213 miles while in Texas, somewhat more than during the previous year, but still fewer miles than the free - wheeling pre - embargo travelers of 1973.

Twenty percent, exercising their freedom of mobility prerogative, cited no single destination for 1975 vacations. Rather, they rambled on flexible schedules sampling lakes, beaches, historic sites, scenic drives and hosts of campgrounds.

Nation Looking At Texas 1st Presidential Preference

The whole nation is going to be looking at Texas as it holds its first (and probably last) presidential preference vote in connection with the party

primaries next Saturday. Eastland County voters are now on Daylight Saving Time 2nd, 3rd and Honorable and have one week to ponder Mention - - Myrtle Wilks of the complexities of the ballot. The Democrats will find a

combination Eastland - Latin American ballot when the polls open at 7 a.m. Saturday at the nine county precinct voting spots. Three presidential hopefuls

each have three delegates on the ballots as well as one set of totally uncommitted group of three delegates.

Statewide Gov. Dolph Briscoe and others are urging that voters check all three of the Lloyd Bentsen delegates in order to insure a strong leadership for Sen. Bentsen and Gov. Briscoe at the New York Democratic Convention in June. In Eastland County Mike Collins is one of the Bentsen delegate nominees.

It's true that Bentsen is a dropout of the presidential race, but his leadership of the Texas delegation is considered necessary in the wide - open convention where he and his delegates could be, if not kings, then at least king - makers.

Therefore Bentsen is being considered the Texas favorite son, even though delegate nominees for Wallace, and Carter also appear on the ballot.

Further down, voters find the

Incumbent Bentsen opposed by Leon Dugi, Hugh Wilson and strongest of all Phil Gramm for the United States Senate seat.

Cong. Omar Burleson of the 17th District is for the first time. in a while unopposed for re election.

It's a horse race in the railroad commission race where eight (count 'em) include Jerry Sadler (former land commissioner), R.R. Williams, Lane Denton, Robert (Bob) Wood, Woodrow Wilson Bean, Terence L. O'Rourke, David Finney and Jon Newton. Associate Justice Supreme

Court Jack Pope is unopposed. Charles W. Barrow and Don Yarbrough are vying for Place Two on the top court and James G. Denton is unopposed for Place Three as is John F. Onion, presiding judge, Court of Criminal Appeals.

Truman Roberts is opposed by Jerome Chamberlain for Judge Court of Criminal Appeals; and Carl Dally, W.T. Phillips and Jim Vollers are each seeking the unexpired term to the Criminal Appeals Court judgeship.

Closer to home, Incumbent State Sen. Tom Creighton, 22nd Senatorial District, is opposed by Alex R. Tandy of Weatherford, and Incumbent State Rep. Joe Hanna, 54th District, is opposed by Eastlander Bob Vaught.

Chief Justice Austin McCloud of the 11th Court of Civil Appeals is unopposed, as is 91st District Court Judge Earl Conner Jr.

Now the County Sheriff's Office has attracted four candidates when Sheriff L.E. (Lefty) Sublett announced that he is not seeking re - election. Candidates are Ronnie White, Johnnie W. Morren, Benny Mosley and Louis Hollywood. County Tax Assessor Collector Nancy Trout is

Reports On Child **Abuse And Neglect**

A record 60,000 reports of child abuse, neglect, runaways, children in need of supervision, and other similar cases were handled by the State Depart-ment of Public Welfare in 1975 it was announced recently. Of these, almost 11,000 involved confirmed abuse and neglect, and many other cases were highly suspect but could not be confirmed.

"Child abuse and neglect can touch even the smallest com-munity," according to Ann Carson, Regional Coordinator for the Child Abuse Campaign Lubbock. "There is a need for every person who suspects that child is being abused, physically, emotionally, or sexually, to report the situation to the local Child Welfare Office. Or he can call the toll-free 'hotline,' 1-800-292-5400."

Ms. Carson went on to say that it is important to report

neglect because the child may be exposed to dangerous persons or situations. "Accidents are the leading cause of death among children," she added, "And accidents occur often in cases where the child is chronically neglected. 'Under the law, the State

Department of Public Welfare is responsible for all children in Texas up to age eighteen. Abuse and neglect occurs among every racial group, an at all income levels. Perhaps this is because child abuse most commonly occurs in cycles, i e., people tend to be the kind of parents their parents were.

'It should be kept in mind,' Miss Carson said, "That it is not necessary to have proof that child abuse or neglect exists before making a report. The Child Welfare Unit will be responsible for proving or disproving the situation exists, so a suspicion is sufficient for a

report.
