## Could Rains Be Drought Breaker?

A drought breaker?

In most ways, the rains of this week could be called that, even though much more is needed to flush creeks and rivers and fill stock tanks and the lakes.

Rainfall through 7 a.m. Tuesday amounted to 1.41 of an inch, the heaviest since 2.21 was recorded on April 8, 1975, according to official Weather Bureau records here. Reports of over three inches were reported south of Carbon.

More rain was forecast for Tuesday and Wednesday so maybe the drought will have been truly broken. The Monday rain brought the total for the year up to 3.36 inches which is about on a par with the 3.24 inches at this time last year.

Traditionally the month of May is the "rainy month" here (5.18 inches last year), so, the rainwater could conceivably get ahead of itself this year as spring progresses.

In Ranger, 2.10 inches was recorded.

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**

**AUSTIN** — Crime continued to rise in Texas during the last year.

The Department of Public Safety reported a dramatic leap of 14.7 per cent over the previous year. The count: 654,760 major criminal offenses during 1975, compared with 570,640 the year before.

Largest increase was in heavily populated rural areas near major cities, where crimes were up 29.4 per cent.

By contrast, the smallest increase was in most sparsely-settled rural areas, where the rate change was only 4.2 per cent.

Col. Wilson E. Speir, DPS director, said Texas law enforcement officers continued to improve their crime clearance rates, reporting overall clearances of 25 percent compared with 23 per cent in 1974.

Most major crimes were committed in urban areas,

**New Rules Set**

Texas Public Utility Commission's new proposed regulations would require users of lots of electricity to pay more.

Home consumers would benefit, but only those in rural areas will be under direct P.U.C. control starting next September.

Rules will not be adopted until after public hearings.

One of the regulations would require that electric utilities uniformly bill fuel costs to their customers by kilowatt hours of consumption, no matter how much is used. Big consumers now get lower rates. Utilities could still base rates in part on lower cost of serving industrial consumers.

Rules would allow more time for paying bills and smaller penalties in event of late payments.

**Vets Bonds Sold**

Thirty-five million dollars worth of veterans land bonds have been sold at a low interest rate of 4.0623 per cent.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong said the sale will permit funding of veterans loans for the backlog of applications accumulated since last fall. New applications were suspended in December 1975.

Armstrong emphasized the sale did not mean immediate, full-fledged reopening of the Veterans Land Program. Another \$65 million in bonds is authorized. To get money for new loans by late summer or early fall, the Veterans Land Board must go to the bond market again, Armstrong said.

Rhodes Drilling Co. of Abilene staked No. 1 Lattie Gertrude Anderson in Eastland County Regular Field five miles north of Rising Star.

The planned 3,600-foot venture is located on a 145 acre lease.

It spots 2,702 feet from the south and 6,080 feet from the east lines of Samuel Forney Survey, A-102.

T.J. Well Service of Graham will re-enter to 3,650 feet a regular field project two miles northwest of Cisco.

It is No. 1 Lee, located on an 80 acre lease.

Site is 700 feet from the north and 1,700 feet from the west lines of Section 63, Block 4, T&P Survey.

Jackson Oil Co. of Ranger will drill No. 5-D Robert Jackson. The planned 1,850-foot venture is located eight miles south of Caddo on a 40 acre lease.

Drill site is 220 feet from the north and 467 feet from the east lines of the south-half of Section 77, Block 4, T&P Survey.

A wildcat is slated for 3,750 feet in the area five miles southeast of Eastland in Eastland County.

It is H. Bryan Poff of Fort Worth No. 1-A Danny Woods, located on a 40 acre lease.

**Bids High**

Oil producers bid a total of \$9.37 million for rights to lease state school lands in a recent sale and set a recent-year high of \$75.63 an acre.

A sale last October yielded only \$39.03 an acre.

The sale also brought a near-record-high bid of more than \$1.6 million from Corpus Christi Leaseholds Inc. for an offshore Matagorda County tract.

It reportedly reflected renewed interest in offshore development.

**Meeting Set**

A legislative ad hoc committee on utility regulation will conduct a meeting of interested persons and groups here April 22 to consider suggestions for cutting gas and electric costs.

Lawmakers said they will poll every legislator to see if a consensus can be arrived at on legislative proposals for a possible special session.

**Courts Speak**

Texas Supreme Court turned down the state's effort to collect \$262.5 million from Superior Oil Company for oil and gas produced in San Patricio County on land involved in an ownership challenge.

In another case, the high court held persons charged with crimes cannot be committed to mental institutions without jury trials in civil proceedings.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the conviction of a Houston-area massage parlor operator on charges of promoting prostitution.

A judgment in a felony case or a probation order should reflect a definite period of time, Atty. Gen. John Hill held in an opinion.

Lawyers for five convicted of murder urged the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals to reverse the penalty on grounds the attorneys did not hear interviews of their clients with psychiatrists.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe has been cited for distinguished contributions to agriculture and received a centennial award.

A Texas Advisory Commission on intergovernmental Relations Committee heard strong recommendations to impose property taxes on stocks, bank accounts and other "intangible" property.

Comptroller Bob Bullock warned the state sales tax is due on Mexican bricks used in the state.

Lower Colorado River Authority dropped objection to allowing use of Colorado River water to cool South Texas Nuclear Project generators. LCRA still claims it should be paid up to \$1 million a year.

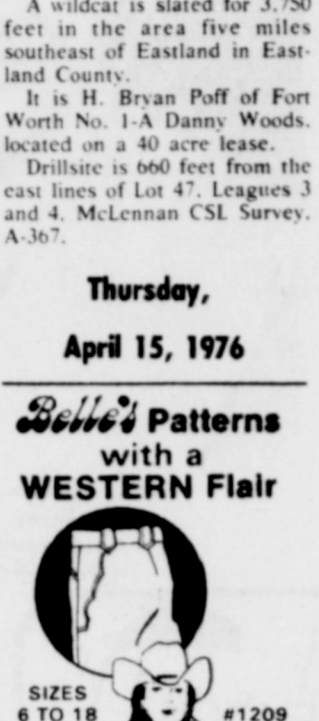

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- AT INTERVALS DURING THE LAST YEAR OR SO, attempts have been made to call attention to the new budgetary process under which the Congress is now operating. We have commented that the legislative machinery is now in place to get control over spending but that it will take real determination on the part of Congress to make it work.

THE RESOLUTION SETTING CEILINGS ON EXPENDITURES for various programs and estimates of revenues to pay for them has now been voted out of the Budget Committee in both the House and the Senate. The Resolution really pleases no one. The liberals object mainly because the recommendation provides defense spending more than they like and they claim curtails social programs too severely. Conservatives are unhappy because the recommended outlays are too high and a deficit too big.

THE LIBERALS CONTENT THAT MORE SPENDING and larger deficits are needed to create jobs and sustain a strong economic recovery from the recession. Conservatives warn that severe inflation may be triggered again unless the budget is tightened more.

THE RESOLUTION WILL BE UP FOR DEBATE, tentatively the week of April 26. It will be a hard and long fight from both sides.

FOR THE 1977 FISCAL YEAR STARTING NEXT OCTOBER 1, the Resolution calls for a ceiling on spending of \$413.7 billion with estimated revenues at \$363.1 billion. This leaves a deficit for next year at \$50.6 billion whereas the latest Administration estimates for the 1976 fiscal year project a deficit of \$76.9 billion.

ALTHOUGH THE SPENDING TOTALS RECOMMENDED by the Budget Committee were substantially above President Ford's budget, they are about \$11 billion below the amount which would be required to pay for existing programs to keep up with inflation and population growth.

SOCIAL PROGRAMS WERE INCREASED SIGNIFICANTLY above the Administration's budget recommendation but, even here, they were restrained some as compared to immediate past years. The Committee held defense preparedness pretty near what the military requested.

BY PULLING TOGETHER THE PRESENT PRACTICE of fragmented spending, this process is intended to set deliberate budget policies and gain fiscal control over the Govern-

ment's huge operations. As stated earlier, it remains to be seen how the Congress makes the process operate. Those of us who feel that the spending limits set too high and that the deficit is too great, will attempt further reductions in certain programs by amending the Resolution when it is up for debate.

THE LIBERALS WILL WANT TO ADD more to social programs and to create make work schemes to reduce unemployment. There is already \$2.2 billion in outlays in the Resolution for this purpose. It was adopted by a one vote margin and an effort will be made to remove it by amendment later on.

ANOTHER AMENDMENT ADDS \$100 MILLION for preliminary work on National Health Insurance which has not yet been enacted into law. This amount is included in anticipation that such legislation will be passed.

THOSE OPPOSED TO LARGER MILITARY EXPENDITURES will attempt reductions. Allowing for inflation, the amount for national defense barely keeps us where we are now and should be increased but we will do well to hold the figure as approved by the Committee.

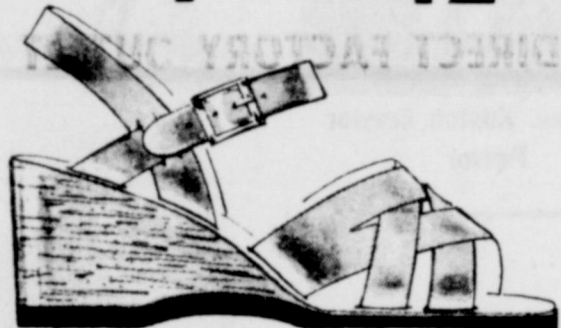

# 100th Birthday To Be Celebrated At First Baptist With 7 Former Pastors

One hundred years of religious history in Eastland will be marked with the Centennial Revival Celebration which begins Easter Sunday at First Baptist Church.

Some 37 years of local pastoring will be represented by the seven former pastors and the present pastor in the celebration.

The participating ministers date back to 1936 and except for a three-year span (1938-1941) represent pastorages continuously to today.

Three of the former pastors are still active and four are now retired. They're coming to Eastland from a wide area of the United States: one from California, two from Arizona, and the other four from wide points in Texas.

The Rev. J.I. Cartledge was pastor here from 1936 to 1938, is now retired, and lives at Marshall, Texas.

Rev. Franklin Swanner was pastor here from 1941 to 1942, is now retired and lives in Brownwood.

Rev. H.J. Starnes was pastor here from 1943 to 1945, is retired and lives in Waco.

Rev. Fred Porter was pastor 1945 to 1947, is retired but active in supply work in California.

Rev. Lloyd Chapman was pastor from 1947 to 1951 and is now pastor of First Baptist Church Marlin, where he has served since leaving Eastland.

Rev. Melvin Ratheal, was pastor from 1951 to 1954, and is

now pastor First Baptist Church, Coolidge, Ariz.

Rev. Harvey Kimbler was pastor from 1954 to 1960 and is now director, Church Services Division, Arizona Southern Baptist Convention, a post he has held since March, 1975.

Rev. Cartledge, a native of Nacogdoches, was from 1972 until his retirement at the end of 1975, vice president for Development of the East Texas Baptist College. His pastorates over the years included McGregor, Grand Saline, Nacogdoches, Corsicana, Waco, Gilmer, and Eastland. His listings of denominational service are many and varied, including former chairman of the executive committee of the Baptist General Convention of Texas.

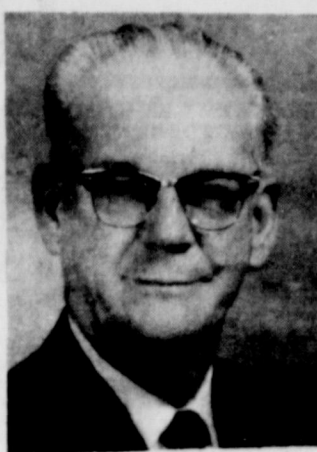
Rev. Swanner, who held a revival in Eastland in the spring of 1970, is a native of Kentucky. He has held pastorates in Park Springs, Haidenheimer, Collinsville, Bailey, Denison, Goldthwaite, Paducah, Port Neches, Levelland and Eastland. He served as district and area missionary for many years.

Rev. Starnes has held pastorates at DeLeon, Weatherford, Wharton and Eastland, and was a chaplain in the Navy after leaving Eastland. Retiring in 1967, he has been busy with pulpits.

Rev. Kimbler, a native of Point, served churches at Ballinger, Tye, Weatherford, Santo, Lometa, Eastland, Tucson, Arizona, Chandler, Arizona. He served as director of Sunday School and Church Administration Departments, Arizona Southern Baptist Convention from 1968 until March, 1975, when he was named director of church services, Arizona, Southern Baptist Convention.

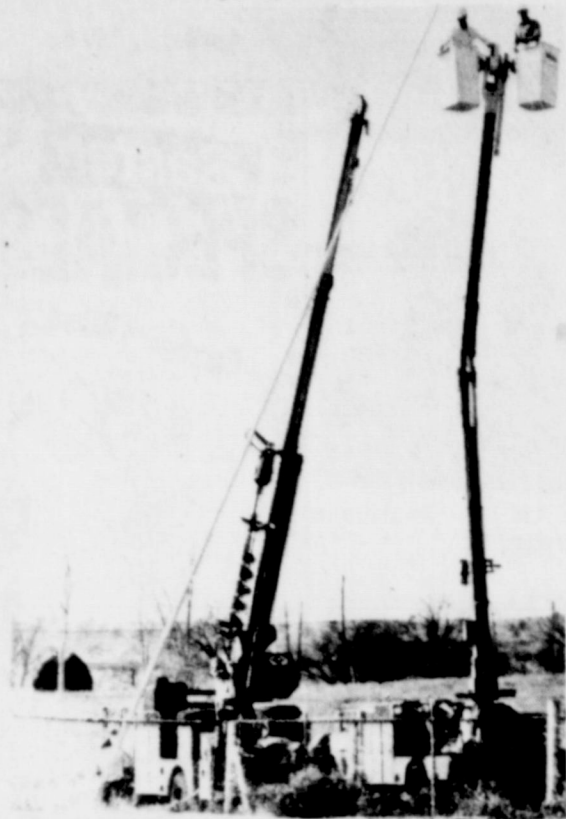
