

April 12 Deadline For Closing Depot Protests

Monday, April 12, is deadline for filing protests with the Texas Railroad Commission regarding T&P Railway Co.'s application to close the Eastland freight station and demolish the depot.

Quite a number have already filed formal opposition to the application, and further requested that hearings on the matter be held in Eastland so that local residents may more conveniently be heard.

County Judge Scott Bailey has received word back from Railroad Commissioner Mack Wallace that he has recommended that no action be taken until a hearing be held, and he further recommended that the hearing be held at the Eastland County Courthouse.

The Brotherhood of Railway, Airline and Steamship Clerks have formally protested T&P Application, according to

Railroad Commission data forwarded here.

Others who have lodged protests include State Representative Joe Hanna, Bruce Pipkin, Victor Cornelius, John A. Beil, Chairman City Commission, Eastland; Curtis Turkey Farm and Texas Light Weight Aggregate.

Railroad Commission data indicates that copies of protest letters be forwarded to other "parties in the proceedings", which would indicate that copies specifically should be sent to William A. Deposits All Time Record

Deposits have hit an all - time record high of \$20 million at Eastland National Bank, according to information from the current statement of condition just released.

The March 31 deposit figure of \$20,095,678.36 is up from \$19,593,226.33 reported at the end of December.

Up too is the total assets, reported at \$21,458,579.97, up from \$21,203,209.59 three months ago.

Up from December, but still not quite as high as September, 1976, are loans, reported currently at \$7,016,441.19. They were at a high of \$7,051,275.19 at the end of the third quarter of 1975.

The March ending figures are especially good in view of the fact that the State Banking Commission called for the report on Wednesday, and also that the first quarter totals are traditionally lowest of the year.

JUST BACK from a down - state trip, we can vouch that the highway situation in Texas is getting serious. You really don't have to go far: say for instance just down 183 from Cisco to Rising Star to see what kind of a mess our state's highways are going to become if SOMETHING ISN'T DONE SOON.

ONE BRIDGE in every ten in Texas is deficient by federal engineering standards, says a study released here today.

A total of 5,346 of the state's 54,555 bridges are structurally deficient or obsolete, according to The Road Information Program (TRIP) of Washington, D.C.

The research and information agency's findings are based on projections of data in the National Bridge Inventory conducted by the Federal Highway Administration.

The most serious category of deficiency involves 54 bridges that are too weak structurally to handle the maximum vehicle weights and traffic volume on connecting roads, says TRIP. These are the bridges with major structural deficiency according to federal standards. All need to be replaced.

TRIP emphasizes that there is little danger of collapse because bridges weakened by age and use are posted for maximum safe loads. A far more prevalent safety hazard exists where narrow clearances, dangerous approaches and badly worn deck surface increase the chance of accidents on bridges, the agency says.

Another 2,728 bridges have minor structural deficiency and are adequate to handle all traffic for now, but need substantial repairs to prevent serious deterioration, says the study.

A third category involves 2,564 obsolete bridges with narrow clearances, poor deck surface or roadway approaches that make passage difficult, the study says. Most of these bridges are more than 40 years old.

The study covers bridges on the interstate system, state highways and local roads and streets.

"It doesn't make sense to have one construction worker in every seven unemployed in Texas when one bridge in every ten needs major work," said TRIP state chairman J.C. Dingwall of Austin, who announced the study findings. Dingwall is a former state highway engineer.

Dingwall said the state's Highway Department is doing a superior job of maintaining and upgrading the 27,194 bridges



A solution to the estate tax crunch that forces many families to sell business and farms to pay estate taxes may be at hand.

The Bursleson - Curtis Estate Tax Reform Bill now in Congress contains increased exemptions that will help alleviate the tax burden when an estate is passed on to heirs. The bill: (1) increases the exemption from \$60,000 to \$200,000; (2) increases marital deduction from 50 percent of gross estate to \$100,000 plus 50 percent of gross estate; and (3) provides an option to value farm and ranch estates at their agricultural value rather than speculative value.

The need for passage of the Bursleson - Curtis Bill is obvious, especially in agriculture. A 640 - acre farm valued today at \$1,000 per acre could have a net estate value in excess of \$800,000 - - including farm machinery and improvements. The federal estate tax on this amount would be approximately \$252,000 payable within nine months after death of the owner.

Under these circumstances, the present \$60,000 federal estate tax exemption would help very little. Heirs to this property would probably have to sell it to pay the taxes. Very likely, both the land and the heirs would be taken out of agriculture - - at a time when food and fiber production are essential.



GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

Recent rains in this area have certainly been welcomed, but everyone agrees that we need a lot more of the same. James Dubney of Eastland reports that we had 1.31 inches during the first quarter of 1976. If the rainfall continues at that rate we could expect 5.26 inches for the entire year. We don't really think that will happen. During the last eight months the weather Bureau has recorded 7.23 inches in this area.

Now is the time to do something about fireblight on apples and pear trees. We had a lot of fireblight last year so there is plenty of bacteria for infection this year.

Fireblight causes a sudden wilting and browning of new growth on pear and apple trees. It is a bacterial disease that can severely damage and even kill trees.

The first step in controlling the disease is to locate the holdover cankers and cut them out. Disinfect the wounds with a solution of one part of household bleach to nine parts of water and then cover with a tree wound paint, also use the solution to disinfect the knife or pruning tools between cuts.

Next, cut off the brown, dead portion of each twig at least eight inches below the infection, again dip the pruning tool in the bleach solution between cuts and avoid spreading the bacteria. Remove all the pruned material from the area and burn it.

Do not overfertilize with nitrogen. Too much nitrogen causes lush, succulent growth which is easily invaded by

fireblight bacteria. Copper bordeaux spray will help reduce fireblight spread. Copper bordeaux should be applied at petal fall and at 10-day intervals for three applications. Be sure to follow label directions closely.

Do you want good healthy pecan trees this year? If you do, now is a good time to apply the first application of Zinc. ZINC IS A FOOD THAT IS NECESSARY FOR PECANS TREES. The best way to provide the zinc is to spray it on the young foliage.

The zinc should be applied again when the pecans are sprayed for casebearers in late May.

The Texas Rodent and predatory Animal Control Service recently completed an aerial coyote hunt in Eastland County.

Rick Allen is the new predatory animal trapper in Eastland County. Anyone interested in his services should contact Jim Chost, Chairman of the county predatory animal control committee.

Powdery mildew is a major disease problem of many vegetables and ornamentals. It is characterized by a white powdery growth on the upper surface of leaves. It develops rapidly under dry, hot weather conditions while most diseases prefer high humidity and mild temperatures. Once leaves become severely infected, they turn yellow and die.

The fungicide Benomyl and Karathane have proven effective in controlling powdery mildew if applications are started as soon as the disease appears. Spraying must continue at five to ten day intervals until the disease is no longer a problem.

APRIL 9-15

JEFFERSON — Ward Taylor, editor of the Jefferson Jimplecente shot and killed E. J. Patillo, editor of the Leader, in Jefferson last Saturday. The difficulty grew out of an editorial quarrel between the newspapers. Patillo attempted to cowhide Taylor on the street when the latter shot him through the heart and killed him.

AUSTIN — The state comptroller estimates expenditures for the fiscal years 1876-1878 yearly at \$730,000, not including \$20,000 necessary to support the Blind Asylum or money to pay interest and provide a sinking fund and to take up bonds falling due. Some \$400,000 in bonds falls due in the course of the next twelve months, and no sinking fund exists. State funds are inadequate to meet the demand, so holders of the bonds will be obliged to accept a reissue, or the state will be compelled to issue bonds to meet the payment. The new constitution requires the 15th Legislature to either pay or fund \$440,000 due school teachers for services, and the comptroller suggests bonds, as it will be impossible to pay this obligation otherwise.

LAREDO — At the request of a special deputy U.S. Marshall, Major Merriman planted a 12-pound gun on the Mexican bank of the river this morning. At 1:00 this afternoon the Mexicans opened a hot fire from New Laredo (Mexico) on our guard at the ferry, but they were compelled to withdraw. The fire was concentrated on the gunners, whereupon Lieutenant Saxton threw two shells into New Laredo from his 12-pounder, which silenced their fire on American citizens and our soldiers.

\$2 Bills Returning 10 Year Absence

After a 10-year absence, \$2 bills are returning as official currency. On Tuesday, April 13, in commemoration of Thomas Jefferson's birthday and in conjunction with the bicentennial year, the Federal Reserve System will make available at commercial banks a new series 1976 \$2 Federal Reserve note. Eastland National Bank will have a large

supply Tuesday.

Like all \$2 bills since 1918, the note features Mr. Jefferson on the face of the plate. The reverse plate, however, is completely new. It shows a vignette based on John Trumbull's famous post-Revolutionary War painting, "The Signing of the Declaration of Independence", capturing a bicentennial theme and tying in with Jefferson, author of the document.

Although issued in conjunction with the Bicentennial, the \$2 bill is seen as a permanent addition to currency in circulation. In announcing the reissue last November, Treasury Secretary William Simon said public acceptance would ensure the issue's success.

The Treasury withdrew \$2 bills from circulation in 1966, largely because their relative scarcity dampened public acceptance. About 6 million \$2 bills - only a third of one percent of the Nation's outstanding currency - were circulating in 1966.

By contrast, about 225 million notes will be available on April 13. And about 400 million notes - the projected average annual production - will be circulating by July 4.

The new \$2 note is expected to reduce the huge volume of \$1 notes in circulation, producing savings of about \$30 million to the Treasury Department and the Federal Reserve System over the next five years.


