NEWSPAPERS ARE TOP SALESMEN

Television, like radio before it but to a far greater degree, has brought about major changes in the advertising picture. It has been an aggressive competitor with the other media, and its appetite for the advertising dollar, with the cost of producing even Grade B programs running to comparatively astronomical sums, seems insatiable.

But the power of the written word still gets top recognition. An announcement from Sears, Roebuck and Company will interest those who like to read as well as to stare. Last year the figure was \$58 million, which represented 71.2 per cent of Sears' total retail media expense. The balance went to advertising through circulars, magazines, radio and television, and other media.

A spokesman tells the story: "This is tangible evidence of our continuing faith in the potency of newspaper advertising. From the day Sears opened its first retail store, the company has made greater and greater use of newspapers. It is obvious that Sears store managers continue to regard the newspaper as their major medium for more than historical reasons. Their evaluation is based on the day-to-day results in their stores."

Television advertising is a catch-as-catch-can affair — you have to be looking at the set at the moment and it's gone in an instant. Print is durable and the prospective buyer can scan and consider it at his leisure.

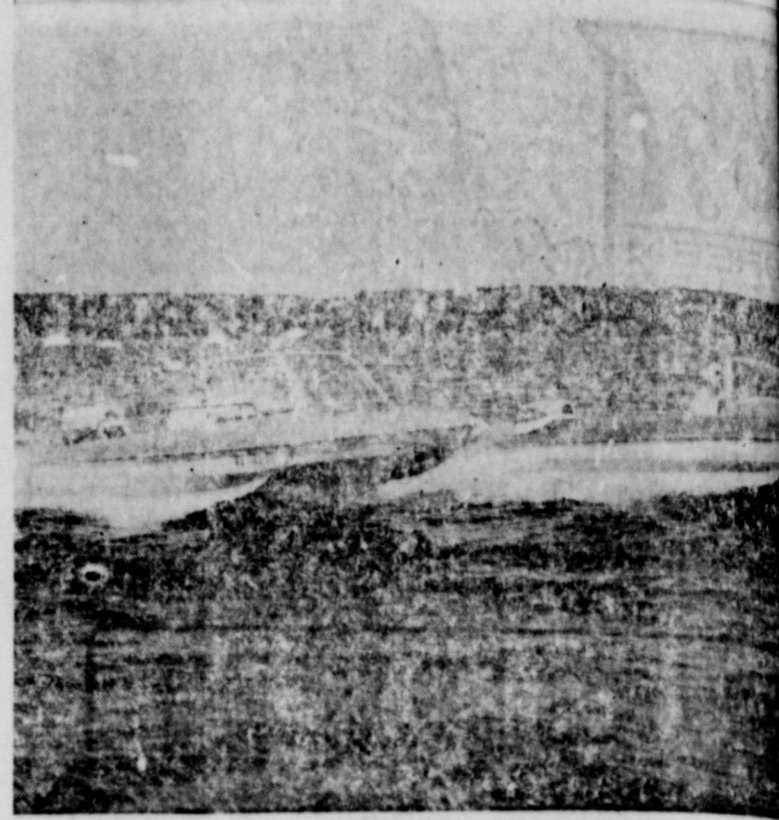

Y MEASURES URGED IN WEEN NIGHT PRANKS

The Texas Safety Council issued a special alert for Halloween night. The alert is for parents and youngsters to be on the alert for "trick 'n' treaters." The safety director has also warned that many of these youngsters will be wearing dark hard-to-see clothing as they carry out the traditional "spook and goblin" custom.

"It is difficult to see anyone on the street at night who is wearing dark clothing, but more difficult to see a small child. In addition, drivers should remember that their own eyes often play tricks on them at night and any vision defect is exaggerated," he added.

"You can see a familiar object much farther away than an unexpected one. So, you must be prepared for the sudden appearance of a child in the road. Remember, your judgment can make up for a child's mistake."

Musick also had these tips for parents:
Never allow very small children to go out alone, even if it's next door.
Make sure face masks have wide eye openings for better vision.

Put luminous tape strips or something white on clothing. Give each child a flashlight and plan his route for the night.

Drill your youngsters on all safety rules, emphasizing he must cross streets at intersections only — NEVER in the middle of the block!

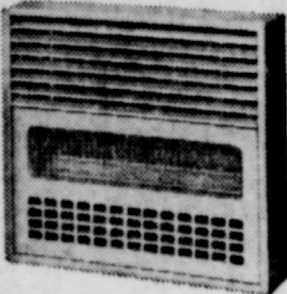

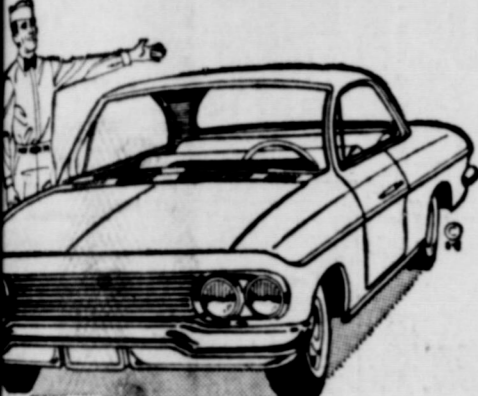

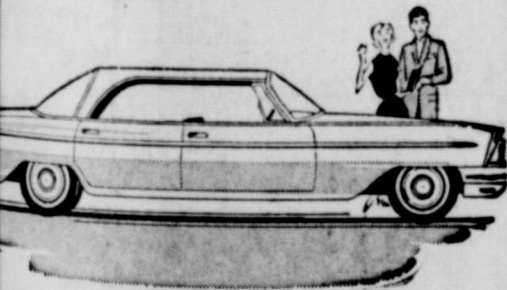

Party Line Chatter

Hello there all you good Eastland County homemakers! If this column comes as a surprise to you, we hope it is one for which you have been wishing. It is one in which you can participate by sending us your favorite recipes, household hints and ideas. (So the name of the column doesn't refer to party politics!)

We are beginning by snaring one of our cool-weather favorites with you, and in the future, we hope to use yours.

After a summer of soups, sandwiches and salads, most families are ready for a steaming meal from the oven. This delightful casserole dish seems to "fill the bill" at our house and is a meal in itself.

OVEN-BAKED CHICKEN WITH PEACHES

Heat oven to 425 degrees. Mix in a paper bag . . .

1 cup flour
2 tsp. salt
¼ tsp. pepper
2 tsp. paprika

Place ½ cup shortening (half butter) in large oblong pan and melt. Shake chicken in bag to coat thoroughly. Place pieces, skin-side-down, in single layer in hot shortening. Bake 45 min.; then turn.

Meanwhile, make dough for biscuits (below). Roll dough ¼" thick, cut into biscuits. Drain No. 2 ½ can cling peach halves and place a whole clove in each. Push chicken to one end of pan; place biscuits on the other end. Place peach halves on top of chicken. Bake another 15 min., or until biscuits are lightly browned and the chicken tender.

TO MAKE GRAVY:

Remove chicken, peaches and biscuits to serving platter. Add 2 tbsp. flour (saved from dredgings) to drippings in pan. Bring to boil. Add about 1½ cups hot milk. Boil 1 min.

BISCUITS

Sift together . . .
2 cups sifted flour
3 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. salt
Cut in finely —
¼ cup shortening
Stir in —
¾ cup milk
Round up on lightly floured surface and knead lightly before rolling.

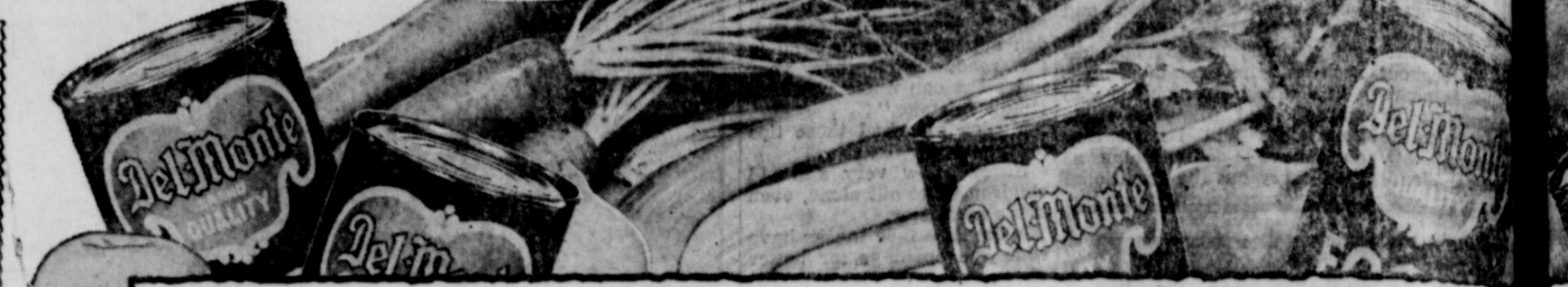

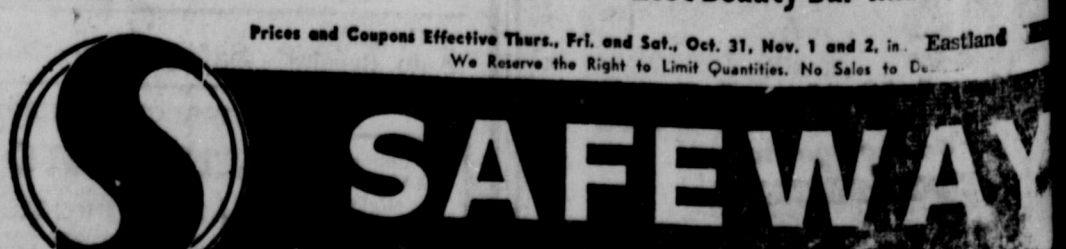

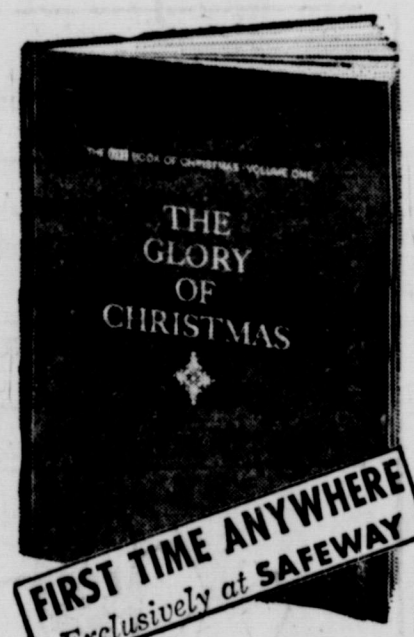
