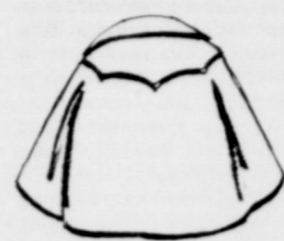
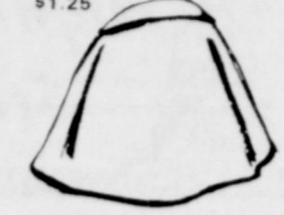

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Pressure is on Gov. Dolph Briscoe to call a special legislative session in an effort to get relief from rising gas and electric bills.

Electric cooperatives and legislators publicly have urged emergency action.

Briscoe said he is keeping an open mind on the subject and would consider special session action if presented a program that might accomplish anything — and which could pass.

Most proposals advanced to date have centered on outlawing fuel adjustment allowances which permit gas companies to pass along costs of their supplies to customers regardless of long-term contracts.

Others have included repeal of the sales tax on gas and electricity and reforming the occupation tax on gas production.

House Speaker Bill Clayton called a two-day

workshop session for April 1-2 on legislation to shift more of the gas production tax to out-of-state users.

Clayton estimated Texas consumers might save \$25 million a year if the tax were shifted to a flat rate rather than percentage of price basis.

The Senate's consumer affairs sub-committee also set hearings April 12-13 on the entire range of natural gas problems including price, supply, taxation, the price pass-through and regulation.

Funds "Vanish"

Millions of dollars in Duval County funds have "simply vanished." Comptroller Bob Bullock said in a new audit report on the stormy South Texas county.

Bullock said Duval faces financial crisis, is "going broke" and cannot meet its August 1 payroll at current spending levels.

Highlights of the report included an account of an "unknown depositor" who walked off with a quarter million dollars in public funds with no accounting.

Bullock also said Duval County Conservation and Reclamation District has collected \$11 million in revenue and has only \$1.6 million in improvements

and fees to show for it. He said the county ignores millions of dollars in tax delinquencies and has "excused" major taxpayers of hundreds of thousands of dollars in taxes.

Study Ordered

The State Welfare Department is seeking an outside opinion on how it can improve its \$1 billion-a-year operations.

The Welfare Board April 15 will consider a proposal to hire a national management consultant firm to take on the job.

Top state officials recently told agency heads they should review their financial needs and find new ways to improve their productivity.

Completion of the evaluation would be expected early in 1977.

Courts Speak

Texas Supreme Court declined to prohibit questioning of law officers about a tipster whose confidential information led to arrest of gambler Amarillo Slim Preston. The court further refused to order dismissal of three charges against Preston and another.

The Court of Criminal

Appeals reversed a life sentence of a Tarrant County man for aggravated robbery, due to improper reading of a parole law to the jury.

The Supreme Court took under review lower court rulings that rejected a \$375,000 libel suit against Laredo Newspapers Inc.

AG Opinions

Atty. Gen. John Hill, in his 123rd opinion dealing with the open records law, said names and addresses of police officers are not necessarily confidential. He earlier held identity of undercover agents is excepted from the act.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

—Irrigation potential may be considered in determining tax value of land.

—A county may compensate retiring employees for a portion of sick leave accrued but not taken.

—A deposition taken in a Securities Board investigatory proceeding is confidential.

—Hutto Independent School District is limited to a \$1.50 tax rate for both maintenance and bonds.

Gov. Briscoe appointed 23rd District Judge Thurman M. Gupton of West Columbia to succeed retiring Court of Criminal Appeals Judge W.A. Morrison for the rest of the year.

Danny Burger has been named executive director of the Municipal Advisory Council of Texas, succeeding W.E. Tinsley.

Briscoe reappointed Dr. Warren Travis White of Dallas to the state board of trustees, Teacher Retirement System of Texas.

He appointed Gerry Gammage of Austin to the State Commission for the Deaf.

Short Snorts

Public Utility Commission members urged selection of Texas as site for a proposed federal solar energy research institute.

Comptroller Bob Bullock notified 9,700 businesses their corporate charters are forfeited for failure to pay franchise taxes.

The Texas Guard is still looking for former guardsmen who have not claimed back pay for three months service in 1972.

State prison officials report a critical growth in inmate population.

June 19 is the date of a special congressional elec-

tion in District 1 to fill the vacancy created by death of Wright Patman.

Texas Water Rights Commission reversed an earlier decision and set aside a water contract for South Texas Nuclear Project, then set hearings April 12 to re-examine the entire nuclear power controversy.

There are fewer registered voters in Texas (not yet 5 million) than there were in 1972.

Sales Tax To Boast State Revenue

AUSTIN - Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that increased collections of the sales tax, natural gas production tax and motor vehicle sales tax have helped boost state revenue at the mid-point of the fiscal year to \$3 billion, 18 percent higher than a year ago.

"The sales tax is up \$87.5 million over last year", Bullock said. "The gas production tax is up \$46.4 million and the motor vehicle sales tax up \$27 million. Altogether, tax collections are 12 percent higher than the same period last year."

However, the Comptroller noted in his March monthly financial statement, expenditures through the first six months of the fiscal year totaled \$3.3 billion, 24 percent

higher than during fiscal 1975. The biggest chunk of the expenditures, Bullock noted, has been for education.

"The state has paid out \$1.8 billion so far this fiscal year on education," he said. "That amounts to 54 percent of the state's total expenditures."

Bullock's report showed the state collected \$603.2 million during the month of February and paid out \$510.6 million in expenditures.

The February report also contained information on bond issuances by local governments in Texas, comparing 1976 issues with those during the same period in 1975. All bonds issued by local governments must be registered with the State Comptroller's Office.

EASTLAND PROSPECT SCHEDULED

An Eastland County wildcat location was staked five miles west of Desdemona as Leon Harvey No. 1 Noah Young. The planned 3,600-foot venture is located on a 188 acre lease.

It spots 2,050 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of Lot 4, D.S. Richardson Survey.

EASTLAND--Potential has been taken at a regular field well completed on Olden townsite. It is Leon Harvey of Graham No. 1 C. Pettit, et al, Wanda Hood.

Location is 410 feet from the south and 2,150 feet from the east lines of Mat Finch Survey.

Daily pumping potential was 10 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus three barrels of water. Production is from perforations at 1,452-68 feet, fractured with 10 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2-inch casing at 1,527 feet and the hole is bottomed at 1,530 feet.

DROUGHT ASSISTANCE AVAILABLE

"Eastland County farms that develop severe damage to farmland as a result of drought may receive financial assistance for repairs through USDA's Emergency Conservation Measures (ECM) Program" reports David W. Martin of the Eastland County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS). The damage from the drought must materially affect the productive capacity of the farmland and impair or danger the land if not treated. In addition, the damage must be so costly to correct that the farmer cannot do it without Federal assistance.

Federal assistance for those farmers who qualify will be determined by the Eastland County ASC Committee. The Committee will be required to determine how much of the cost of restoring the damaged farmland the farmer can bear. After this determination is made, assistance will be the cost of restoring the damaged farmland minus the amount the farmer can bear, not to exceed 80% of the cost, but this is not true in all cases.

Approved practices for Eastland County are enlarging farm reservoirs, digging or deepening wells for livestock water, livestock watering facilities and pipelines for livestock water. There are no provisions for the livestock feed program at the present time.

Farmers who feel the damage is sufficiently severe and their capabilities are such that assistance is necessary to correct the problem, should contact the county ASCS office, and request assistance by not later than April 16, 1976, the deadline for filing request.
