Mayor's Three-Man Committee Begins City Charter Review Here

Donald Kinnaird, Jr., Willard Griffin and J. T. Gregory have been named by Mayor Don Pierson to review the Eastland City Charter with a view to "up-dating" it.

The three-man study group is to report to the City Council at the next regular meeting, Monday, Nov. 18.

Mayor Pierson said late this week that he hopes that the people of Eastland can vote on a revised charter at the April election. He first mentioned renewing the charter at the October council meeting and a brief discussion was held at that time.

The council authorized him to name the study group. It was pointed out then that amendments to the present charter would probably be in order rather than an out and out adoption of a new charter.

In inviting the three men to serve, Pierson asked that each consider the charter particularly with a view to annexation of a great deal of land now within the city limits.

Pierson estimated that there is as much as 20 to 30 per cent of the city not currently included. "A more realistic city limit," he said "would

present our city accurately and more favorably to outside business and industrial prospects."

Fire Safety Demonstration Set At Eastland High Friday

Students of Eastland, Ranger, and Cisco schools will have an opportunity to see for themselves how fire can be man's best friend or his worst enemy, by observing a graphic fire demonstration to be presented at Eastland High School at 1 p. m. Friday, Nov. 8th, Wendell Siebert, superintendent, announced today.

The demonstration, in seven parts, will be given under the direction of Joe Smetana, Safety Director of the Texas Farm Bureau.

A variety of demonstration equipment will be placed on tables 16 feet in length to illustrate seven basic points: (1) what fire is; (2) kitchen fires and their control; (3) fuel vapors; (4) the power of petroleum products; and (5) household wiring and overloaded electrical circuits.

Smetana will point out that fire is like a three-legged stool — it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are: (1) fuel, (2) heat, and (3) air. Yet, in American homes these three things come together in deadly and destructive combination every 57 seconds — an average of 1,500 homes fires every day, according to Smetana.

"That's eight times the number of fires in factories and

stores. Worse yet, four times the number of fire deaths occur in homes, and for every death there are about 100 serious injuries," the TFB Safety Director explained.

As part of a program for fire prevention, the Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department is presenting this demonstration before the high schools of the state. The program is being brought to Eastland under the sponsorship of the Eastland County Farm Bureau. The public is invited to attend.

Gordon Moore Drowns In Leon River

Gordon Bedford Moore, 72, Eastland resident for about two years and a native of Ranger, drowned while on a fishing trip on the Leon River east of DeLeon, in the back waters of the Proctor Lake Thursday afternoon.

The tragedy occurred about 1 p. m. Mrs. Moore, her husband and Floyd Peck of Eastland had gone to fish. They were packing their car to come home when Mr. Moore decided to go down a steep bank to get fresh water for minnows they were to bring home.

Mrs. Moore said she heard a noise, and went to the bank and saw her husband's head above water before he went under. The water was about 12 to 15 feet deep.

Mrs. Moore said there were people in the area and she summoned help. The body was recovered between 3:30 and 4 p. m. about the same spot it went down.

He was born in Ranger, September 23, 1891. The Moores came here from Morgan, Texas. He was a retired oil driller and was a member of the Methodist Church.

He married Mrs. Rosa Lee of Barstow, Texas about seven years following the death of his first wife.

Survivors include his wife; two daughters, including Mrs. Ima Lee of San Antonio and another, address unknown; one step-son, Fred Castleberry of Wickett; one sister, Mrs. Fannie Harmon of Stephenville.

Arrangements are pending at Hamner Funeral Home here.

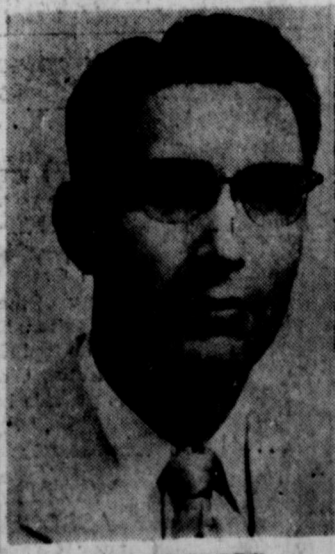

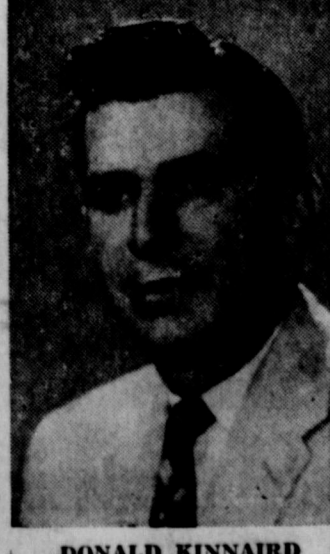

Quality and wholesomeness is the next consideration in buying turkey. The bird should have a broad breast, large drumsticks, and bulging thighs, be well covered with fat over the body and be fully fleshed. It should be free of defects such as torn skin, bruises, and broken bones, and should be free of pinfeathers.

Wholesomeness means the condition of the bird as to cleanliness, freedom from disease and completeness of processing. If processed under USDA supervision, tags on the wings of the birds will show their grade and that they have been inspected for wholesomeness.

Turkeys vary in price from one to another because of differences in quality, wholesomeness and in some cases because of special sales at holiday seasons.

Former Ranger Banker Foils Extortion Plot

Wilson Guest, former Rangerite now president of National Bank of Sweetwater, foiled a threatened bomb plot and \$250,000 extortion attempt resulting in the arrest of a 25-year-old Sweetwater investment salesman late Friday by the FBI.

Guest received a letter Oct. 23, signed "The Saxon," outlining plans to trigger allegedly pre-set bomb explosions threatening the lives of about 4,300 persons in Sweetwater

schools, hospitals and the five-day deadline to meet the extortioner's demand for payment of a quarter million dollars in cash.

Guest immediately notified the FBI and local law enforcement agencies who went to work undercover on the case and the fantastic plot was kept secret until the pickup of Ronney Marvin Mason in Sweetwater Friday at 6:30 p.m. Had the public known of the bomb threat, officers said, it would have created almost "uncontrollable panic" among citizens of that city. A native of Strawn, Guest was a former vice president

of Commercial State Bank, Ranger. He continues to serve as a director of the Ranger institution.

The accused investment salesman, who admitted engineering the plot, was arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Gladys Walls in Abilene Friday night. His bond was set at \$10,000.

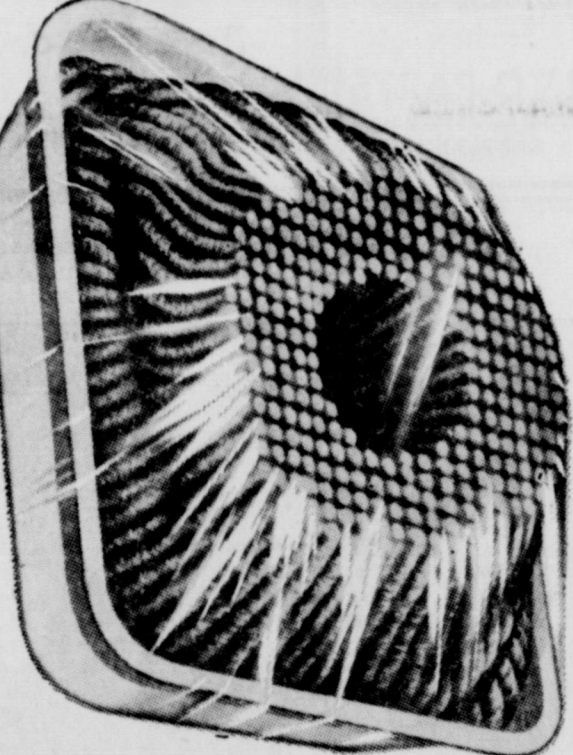

The constitution for the Cisco Literacy Council was adopted last Monday morning at a meeting of the Council held at the public library in Cisco. Mrs. H. E. McClain, president, presided over the meeting, during which Mrs. O. L. Stamey was elected secretary.

The Cisco Literacy Council was formed last year following a workshop sponsored by the Twentieth Century Club and directed by Douglass Kelley, director of Literacy Workshops at Baylor University. Mrs. H. E. McClain was elected president of the Council, and members of the board of directors are Mmes. Jack Stephenson, R. E. Grantham, S. E. Hittson, O. L. Stamey, Harry Donica, Henry Fry, J. C. Dyer, Jr., and C. B. Rust.

Purpose of the organization, as stated in the constitution which was adopted, is "To find and teach adult illiterates and adult semi-illiterates of Eastland County so they may take their rightful places as adult literate citizens. All adults shall have opportunity to learn to read and write regardless of religion, economic position, or race."

The Cisco Council is one of many individual councils over the state comprised in 14 districts, according to Mrs. S. E. Hittson, board member. The General Federation of Women's Clubs on local, state, national and international levels, with the stated purpose "To Strengthen the Arm of Liberty," is providing through CARE educational material to be used in conjunction with adult literacy and primary educational programs under the direction of trained teachers and technicians. The program for 1962-64 includes the promotion and teaching of literacy in Costa Rica, Guatemala, Hong Kong, India, Iran, Mexico, Pakistan and Turkey.

As the period ended, Navarro recovered a fumble on the Cisco 28. Four plays moved the ball to the 15 and a pass went to the one. As the second quarter began, FB Richard Cutler plunged over to score and kicked goal.

The Wranglers then opened a new drive from their 32 with short gains, Navarro penalties and a 15-yard run by Sloan setting up a first on the seven. Sloan then got five yards, and Love drove over to score.

Cisco kicked off, and Linton hit Navarro for two losses to their 25, and then the Wranglers blocked a quick kick effort, covering the ball on the Navarro 3. Sloan scored, and Love converted to give Cisco a 20-7 half-time lead.

Navarro's second touchdown came midway in the third quarter when HB Willie Cherry broke loose for a 54 yard touchdown run. Cutler converted.

Minutes later after Cisco had failed to go and punted Navarro had the ball on their 30. On 4th down, the center passed the ball over the punter's head and he was nailed on their 6-yard line. On fourth down, Sloan drove over for six points.

The final quarter was scoreless. Once, the Bulldogs drove to Cisco's 7-yard line but Gonzales intercepted a pass. The Wranglers then accepted a safety to get the ball out as the final seconds ticked off the clock.

Coach Jim Puryear said his team came through the game

without serious injury, and they hope to be at top strength this week for Ranger. Cisco scored a 20-14 victory over Ranger in the Peanut Bowl last Sept. 14.

The victory at Corsicana gave Cisco a 3-2 record for the first half of their season. Four conference victories in the second half would give Cisco at least a tie for the crown.
