

Smetana will point out that fire is like a three-legged stool - it can't work with one of the legs missing. The "legs" fire depends on are: (1) fuel. (2) heat, and (3) air. Gordon Moore Drowns In Leon River

Gordon Bedford Moore, 72, Eastland resident for about two years and a native of Ranger, drowned while on a fishing trip on the Leon River east of DeLeon, in the back waters of the Proctor Lake







The county trapper employs snares and traps to bag predatory animals. Cyanide poison is used only as a last resort — and even so, trappers always have written permission of the land owner before working on his property.


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
