## Six FB Members To Attend Texas FB Convention

Farm Bureau members and their families will convene in Fort Worth for the 30th Annual meeting of the Texas Farm Bureau, the state's largest organization. Headquarters for the convention, which is expected to draw over 750 official voting delegates representing 200 counties, is the Hotel Texas.

Six Farm Bureau members from Eastland County will attend and will be the official voting delegates from Eastland County. Those who will attend are Jack Cozart, president; R. L. Ricks, B. T. Graham, Mrs. Henry Fry, Cisco; Mrs. Lena Jones, Ranger; and Howard Wade, Desdemona. Pat Moseley and Edwin Lephley, agents, will attend one day of the convention.

Delegates will adopt state policies for 1963 and approve recommendations which will be forwarded to the American Farm Bureau Federation for consideration at the National convention in December in Chicago.

In addition to policy formulation, the annual state meeting program includes outstanding guest speakers, queen contest, Talk Meet and Talent Find completion, election of directors, annual report by the secretary-treasurer and an annual message by the president, a general commodity conference and several special conferences.

The general session on Tuesday morning, Nov. 12, will feature speeches by Marvin L. McLain of Washington, D. C., assistant legislative director for the American Farm Bureau Federation; Hon. Joe H. Kilgore, United States Congressman from Edinburg; and Governor John B. Connally of California.

Clayton R. Gullport, Miss., a well known speaker and writer, will speak at the annual convention banquet on Tuesday evening.

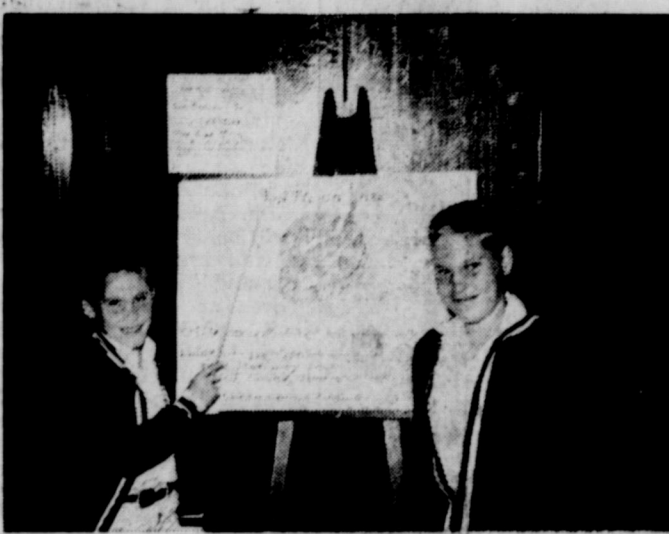

## Eastland County U.S. D.A. Group Requests 'Disaster' Designation

The U. S. Department of Agriculture Disaster Committee has requested that Eastland County be approved as a disaster county, Emmett E. Powell, County Agricultural

Stabilization Conservation Committee office manager, has announced.

The committee, composed of E. E. Blackwell, ASC chairman, County Agency J. M.

Cooper and County Farm Home Administration Manager Homer Cole, voted Thursday to request consideration as a disaster county.

Basis of the request is the drought conditions which many believe will result in one of the worst winters ahead in many years. If the request is approved, the stockmen in the county will be able to buy milo for \$1.67 a hundred from the Commodity Credit Crop warehouses, it is reported. Other feeds may be available later.

Several area counties are under the program now, including Brown, Comanche and Erath. Stephens and Callahan are under consideration, it is reported.

This step to assist county livestock raisers has nothing to do with the federal government's Area Redevelopment Program, one official said.

## County Feed, Range Picture Not Favorable for Winter

"Bleak" are feed and range conditions of Eastland County according to a survey made by County Agent J. M. Cooper, to determine the outlook for the winter months ahead.

Mr. Cooper received 84 of 100 questionnaires mailed to county farmers and ranchers, and the consensus of opinion seems to be that there isn't much to feed in the county.

The county agent voted Thursday to request that the county be declared a "disaster county" to qualify for cheaper government feed.

The questionnaire asked four questions:

1. What percent of hay crop would you say was made in your community this summer. A rising Star farmer answered "none," and most other points reported from a quarter to half as much as normal.

2. Supplies of bundle feed in the community are normal, average, short, very short. In almost every case the replies were "very short."

3. The grain sorghum crop (heads or gain grain only) was about what percent of a normal crop? The farmers and ranchers answered from "none" to ten to 30 per cent below average.

4. Grass in our permanent pastures at the present time is about normal, average for this time of year, short or extremely short? "Extremely short" was almost the universal answer.

All members of the county group are urged to be present for this meeting. The public is also cordially invited, as these meetings are for visitors and anyone who is interested in the preservation of historical items and documents.

## Friday's Rain Good, But Late

"Nice, but too little, too late" seemed to be the evaluation of rain that began falling in Eastland early Friday morning.

Accompanied by heavy thunder, but little lightning, the rain fell most of the day out of a heavy sky. By noon about half of inch had been measured.

Rain was extremely scarce during October when only 1.65 of an inch fell — and it all came on one day, the 24th. The October rain brought the year's total to 20.74. Average for October is 2.74.

### COUNTY HISTORICAL SURVEY COMMITTEE ATTENDS MEET

"Time has been a destroyer of too many landmarks", Dr. Rupert N. Richardson, member of Texas State Historical Survey Committee and President Emeritus Hardin-Simmons University told the members of County Historical Survey Committees who met in San Angelo, Saturday, November 2, for a regional meeting at Fort Concho.

Twelve counties of the nineteen county area, including Eastland County, gave oral reports on what their County Historical Survey Committees have accomplished. Millard Cope, San Angelo, presided.

Mrs. Bernie McCrea, Eastland County chairman, reported marking historical buildings and Civil War Veterans graves as county wide projects, and setting up a registry in the lobby of the Courthouse for tourists, and showcases in the lobby for the display of historical items. Mrs. McCrea presented Founder Membership cards to Dr. Richardson and to John Ben Sheppard, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee.

Mrs. Lee White, secretary of the Eastland County Historical Survey Committee, from Rising Star, and Mrs. Charles Cofer, were the other Eastland countians who attended the meeting.

John Ben Sheppard, Odessa, spoke on the purpose of Regional meetings and the T.S. H.S.C. services to the county committees. Mr. Sheppard is also chairman of Texas Civil War Centennial Advisory Committee.

Following the morning addresses and reports, another historical building at Old Fort Concho deserving a medalion, Officers Quarter No. 4, was unveiled with appropriate words by Mr. Sheppard.

The group, approximately 75, convened at the River Club for lunch.

The concluding portion of the day's program was the dedication of the State Confederate Marker for General Tom Green, placed on the Courthouse lawn. The Honorable Dorsey B. Hardeman gave the dedicatory address and recognized descendants of Gen. Tom Green, for whom the county is named. A grandson, Happy Bently and the wife of another grandson, Max Bently, and two great grand-

daughters, Mrs. Howard and Mrs. Dunlop were present for the dedication.

### Art Club Hears Program Sunday On Wood Carving

Robert McCann of Dallas presented a program on methods of wood carving and explained some of the problems of different techniques at a meeting of the Cisco Art Club held last Sunday at the First National Bank.

## SUCCESS FINDS OLD EASTLAND COUNTRYMAN AND TEXAS RANGER

The following article appeared in Ben Beagle's column in the Roanoke Times of Roanoke, Virginia, recently:

Ed Hiler, late of Eastland County, Texas, has a face lined with the gullies time makes.

He is an 83-year-old ex-Texas Ranger who has learned a lot about the proper publicity methods since his guns stopped flashing in anger almost a half century ago. He is a personable old gent who doesn't act old and he pronounces all of his "ing" endings. He lives in a neat trailer with a picture of Christ on the wall.

Ed Hiler, in tailored whipcord trousers, tooted boots, lights up an unfiltered cigarette and, without a great deal of urging, tells you about himself. He was born April 2, 1880, out in Eastland County. He has been hit six times by various persons shooting at him and knifed once by a Mexican. "Forty five there," Hiler says, pointing to his balding head. He holds up his left hand, exhibiting a long, thin scar along the heel of the hand. He swears he has shrunk a full inch — to 5 feet 3 inches — in a long lifetime.

Any Publicity is Good Publicity. The old Ranger, far from the streets of Laredo and the

banks of the Bravo, is perfectly at home, a man savvy in the ways of show business and of the publicity show business gathers to itself so jealously. He tells about a time in Martinsville during a show when, wiping leather Ranger fashion, he shot himself in the thigh with a blank. It hurt. It burned. It was right embarrassing. It was all right. The Associated Press picked up the story.

It is shopping centers and retail promotion which have kept a good horse under Hiler in recent years. He gets \$100 a day for his show. That's better than Ranger pay. Through Sunday he will be at Ward Mobile Homes, promoting and shooting and spinning tales.

He used to have a bigger show, even a television series, but times change. Before the shopping centers came, he had a larger cast, more props and the gunsmoke in those days curled up from municipal ball parks and football fields. "I made an awful lot of money until I got a lot of crooked promoters and drunks around," Hiler says. He rode off into the sunset, one imagine, in a Coupe de Ville, an automobile which he favors.

Long ago, before "Black Jack" Pershing ran Pancho

Villa down along the Rio Grande and after World War I, a cowboy named Tom Mix "painted a beautiful picture" of the glories and the gold to be found at a West Coast town called Hollywood. They made pictures there, Mix and Hiler. "He made all the money and I did all the hard riding," Hiler says, not without bitterness.

### Name Dropping Not Exaggerated

It would appear natural, when Hiler starts telling the names of the people he has known that skepticism would erupt among the adults who come along with the children to see him. . . . Bat Masterson, Wyatt Earp, Pat Garrett, the sheriff who got Billy the Kid. That's not the case, Hiler claims. Skeptics don't bother him anyway. He can prove everything. "Everything I tell a man is the truth. I don't misrepresent to nobody."

Because Hiler is 83, good form inevitably calls for a question about how he has managed to live so long and still stand up long enough to give shooting exhibitions as part of his show. And, also inevitably, Hiler credits it all to that old virtue: "A good, clean life." A good, clean life without alcohol. "I took one drink of liquor when I was a boy and it nearly killed me."

Hiler, lightly profane at times, will tell you about practicing the first draw in the Rangers, but he'd just as

soon not mention the number of men he has killed. He will tell you how they shot a man and signed the death certificate "self-defense" but that kind of thing isn't healthy. "That isn't a good thing to talk about," is what Hiler tells the "kiddies . . . the kiddies, I love 'em."

## Vets Questions And Answers

Q — A newspaper story in August said 160,000 Korean Conflict veterans had not taken advantage of a special dividend for converting their GI term insurance to either a lower cost term policy or to a permanent form of insurance. How many did make the change by the deadline date, September 13?

A — About 48 percent of the 160,000 converted their policies.

Q — As a so called peace-time veteran, am I entitled to any service-connected disability compensation from the VA?

A — Yes, such disability compensation is generally 80 percent of the wartime rate. However, if the disability occurred under extra-hazardous conditions or simulating wartime; i.e., service in Vietnam, wartime rates apply.

Q — I bought a home with a GI loan in 1952. My wife is now confined to a wheelchair, and cannot maneuver

steps to the basement or to the second floor. Can I sell this home and buy another one-story home with a GI loan?

A — Your wife's disability is a compelling reason for selling your present home. But the VA must be released from all financial liability on the first property. Contact your VA Regional Office for details. Q — My hitch is almost up. I did not have any wratime service. Am I entitled to any educational benefits like the GI Bill?

A — Only if you have a disability resulting from service-connected injury or illness. Congress has made available vocational rehabilitation training in such cases. If so, check with the VA office nearest your home.

Q — Are dividends payable on U.S. Government Life Insurance policies after approval of a waiver of premiums?

A — No. Approval of a claim of waiver on premiums under the Total Permanent Disability provision matures this type of policy. The proceeds of the policy are payable in monthly installments but dividends cease.

Q — I hear a lot about deadline dates for GI loans. Does it make an difference if the veteran is disabled?

A — If discharged (or retired) for disability incurred in the line of duty, a veteran is entitled to the maximum deadline date for the war in which

he was disabled. This means July 25, 1967, for World War II service and January 31,

## Browsing With Bev

If you're wondering what to do with all those apples from the tree in your backyard—or if you'd like to take advantage of the good buys at stores and markets—try freezing some. Apples frozen for pie or sauce will retain good eating quality for 8 months to a year.

You have your choice of three freezing methods: a sirup pack recommended for apples; or an unsweetened pack for dietetics or those who prefer to sweeten to taste later. Select full-flavored apples that are crisp and firm, not mealy in texture. Wash, peel, and core. Slice medium apples into 12ths, large ones into 16ths. Pack as follows:

**SIRUP PACK** — Make sirup of 3 cups sugar and 4 cups water. To each quart sirup add ½ teaspoon crystalline ascorbic acid. Slice apples directly into cold sirup in freezer container, starting with ½ cup sirup to a pint container. Press fruit down and add enough sirup to cover. Allow ½ inch space at top. Seal and freeze.

**SUGAR PACK** — To prevent darkening of apples during preparation, slice them into a solution of 2 tablespoons salt to a gallon of water. Hold in this solution no more than 15 to 20 minutes. Drain. To retard darkening, place slices in a single layer in steamer; steam 1½ to 2 minutes, depending on thickness of slice. Cool in cold water; drain. Over each quart of a apple slices sprinkle evenly ½ cup sugar and stir. Pack apples into containers and press fruit down, leaving ½-inch space at the top of each pint, 1-inch space for a quart. Seal and freeze.

**UNSWEETENED PACK** — Same as for sugar pack, only omit sugar.

## Party Line Chatter

Out of Idaho's bean bags and your scrap bag comes Beanie the Clown with a partner or three. Fun to make while dinner's Pot-o-Beans slow-bakes unattended, sending its tantalizing fragrance all over the house.

We've tried them and found that these Baked Beans have something which cannot be bought—the flavor of Home! Served with a tossed green salad, they are perfect for a Saturday night buffet.

The bean "receipt" is traditional except for the use of Idaho-grown large white Great Northern variety of dried beans. Sometime, break with tradition and use instead Idaho's dappled Pinto beans, a flavor treat indeed. Both kinds can be found on Eastland County grocery shelves.

**Old-Time Pot-O-Beans**  
2 pounds (4 and 2-3 cups) Idaho Great Northern Beans, washed and soaked  
2 medium onions, chopped (1 cup)  
¾ pound salt pork  
½ cup brown sugar  
2 teaspoons dry mustard

2 teaspoons salt  
1 cup molasses  
Wash beans; add 3 quarts water. Bring to boiling point rapidly. Boil 2 minutes only. Add ½ teaspoon soda. Cover; let stand 1 hour. Or soak overnight in measured amount of cold water and the soda.

Either method — bring to boiling point in the soaking water. Add 2 tablespoons salad oil or butter to cut down foam. Reduce heat, cover and simmer until beans are tender but firm, about 1 hour.

Using a slotted spoon, place beans in cooking pot in alternate layers with chopped onions and the salt pork cut in ½-inch slices.

Mix together remaining ingredients with the bean liquid. Pour over the beans, adding enough boiling water so that beans are covered.

Put on the tight-fitting lid or foil and lid. Bake in a 250 degree F. (slow oven) for 8 hours, adding some boiling water if beans are not quite covered.

Just before serving, remove lid; raise oven heat to brown surface. Makes 12 hearty

servings.
