kites are filling the spring skies. Flying snake, bat, box and all the other kinds of kites can be delightful - - and dangerous.

Children know by heart the catalog of objects that can snare kites. Youngsters have found an equally wide variety of ways to injure themselves getting the kites down. The Texas Medical Association says telephone and electric lines present primary


Many children have been warned not to climb utility poles but they poke at trapped kites with sticks, rods and have even been known to use lightweight irrigation pipe. Phone or electric companies or even the fire department in some towns might rescue a kite. However, usually a kite is doomed if it gets tangled in a potentially dangerous utility line.

Aside from his high - flown scientific discoveries with a kite and a key, Benjamin F Franklin proved kites do conduct electricity. String and wood are not the best conductors but youngsters can get a charge out of a tangled kite.

Many electric lines are deadly because they do not have any insulation at all. They can carry anywhere from 7,200 to 138,000 volts DC. Even a small, supposedly well insulated residential line usually carries about 120 volts DC, enough to injure or kill someone.

Most phone lines carry between 24 - 48 volts DC and are well insulated if they are in good shape. These lines are usually joint use utility poles, according to a telephone company spokesman. It can be very difficult to tell the difference between more dangerous electric lines and phone lines. Also, some phone lines carry more than the usual voltage, insulation can be wearing out or a kite can act as a conductor. Electricity conceivably can travel from an electric line through a kite touching the line, to a phone line and

from there through a string or stick to a person. Other efforts to handle kites can bring about disaster. People can run in front of cars, fall into holes and crash into other hazards while attempting to keep a kite aloft - - or avoid utility lines. String can cut or "burn" hands if improperly handled. Some people, trying to find a substitute for breakable kite string, use fine wire

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

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Thoughts For Today

In viewing TV contest shows, one usually hears contestants asked, "Where are you from?" Invariably, you sense a price in the person's reply when the town is mentioned. The contestants are mostly ordinary people; no spellbinder, no do - gooder, no politician. It is this sort of civic loyalty and pride that has helped America become big and strong...and envied.

In our American way of life, we take many things for granted including our home town. Maybe oncer in a while we ought to adopt and dedicate ourselves to a personal creed, somewhat along these lines -

"This is my home town. My home is here. My business or work is here. It is where my vote is cast; where my children are educated; where my neighbors dwell; where my life is centered. Apparently a number switched parties in order to vote for (or against) President Ford. The Democrats voted 4.421 in nine boxes in the county and the Republicans turned out 239 in one combined box highest ever here.

The Democratic nomination for county sheriff went into a runoff between R.B. White (whot got 48 percent of the total vote, lacking less than 200 votes for a clear majority) and Johnnie W. Morren.

A number of state runoffs and one Constable runoff in Rising Star will be on the June 5 runoff ballots

Eastland County Democrats stayed with representatives in Austin but voted less strong for the two. Incumbent Sen. Tom Creighton probably got fewer votes in the county than ever before, and Incumbent State Rep. Joe Hanna had an Eastland County opponent which cut down his total.

Most Eastland County voters voted like a lot of other Texans in the Railroad Commission race, going for a familiar name (Jerry Sadler, longtime state land commissioner) but will get another vote when that contest goes into a runoff in June.

Likewise the state supreme criminal appeals and civil appeals court races were confusing for voters here and across the state. (A novice with a popular name (Don Yarbrough) got many a vote).

The County Commissioners Court composition remains unchanged as Commissioner Precinct One Danny Woods was re - nominated without opposition, and Commissioner Precinct Three L.T. Owens of Rising Star successfully defeated a Gorman challenger.

An attempted effort to secure delegates for Sen. Lloyd Bentsen failed in Eastland County (as it did in the state) as Georgia's Jimmy Carter swept the county - - and the state. Over at the Republican

balloting, Movie star and Ex -

Governor Ronald Reagan outdid President Gerald Ford here - - and across the state. Eastlander Mike Collins, a Bentsen delegate candidate, put together 800 votes, but locally - unknown Carter delegates scored above 2,000 each to swing the delegates to

the Georgian. Highest single delegate total for Ford was 70 while greatest Reagan delegate support read 166. (Democrats were picking three delegates and

The Winning Bicentennial Essay "My Colonial Hero"

MY COLONIAL HERO: PATRICK HENRY

If it were possible to turn time back to the Colonial days, would want to be like Patrick Henry. He had many characteristics which I consider important, characteristics which I would like to have. Although he failed at his two attempts to run a store and at his attempt to farm, his life was definitely not a failure. He finally settled down to a career as a lawyer, and, as a lawyer, ne became a leader of the people, respected by many. Although he faced almost unbeatable odds many times throughout his life and career, especially during his fight to convince people of the need for independence, he never gave up hope. Patrick Henry always stood up for that in which he believed, no matter what or how much it cost him. This quality, among others, was what attracted me to Patrick Henry.

Patrick Henry had a very interesting childhood which influenced his complishments and helped to make him what he was. He enjoyed being outdoors, and he had the reputation of lying around in the forest, apparently lazy. Yet he never shut his eyes to go to sleep; he was always wide awake, observing nature. As he grew up, he never lost his alertness or his reputation for being observant

Once he suffered a broken collarbone resulting from a fight with a bully who had killed a small boy's kitten. For, even as a child, he stood up and fought for that in which he believed. During his recovery, thirteen - year - old Patrick, accustomed to being up and about, chafed at having to stay in bed. However, his time was not wasted. He continued his lessons, and he learned to play the flute. With the help of his flute and his music, he became well acquainted with Sarah (Sally) Shelton whom he later married.

At the age of seventeen, Patrick tried his hand at being a storekeeper. However, he failed in that because he was over - generous with his credit customers. Although it was a failure money - wise, Patrick learned many things, including how to feel out other people and how to get their reactions to his suggestions. During his time between customers, he read books and thought deeply about the current affairs of the country. Then when a customer came in. Patrick told him about his ideas and carefully listened to the customer's opinions. Thus, he learned how to communicate with people and how to get their reactions were both very useful later, in his career as a lawyer.

He persuaded Mr. Randolph to examine him for the bar. After the examination Mr. Randolph agreed to give him a license, and two other examiners joined him to authorize it. However, George Wythe refused to have anything to do with him because he felt that Patrick did not know enough about the laws. The other examiners felt that Patrick Henry was capable of being a good lawyer, for with his determination and persuasive voice, he was very convincing, especially when he spoke about the people's rights. Thus, Patrick Henry, finding his feet on the ground at last, stood up and became a l leader of the people, determined to help the people as much as possible

Patrick Henry, the lawyer,

was soon respected (as I hope to be respected) by many people. He was even considered somewhat of a hero because of his part in the Parson's Cause in 1763. The Parson's Cause was Patrick's first big publicized case, and he did his best to defend his clients properly. He defended three tax collectors who had been sued by Reverend James Maury because Reverend Maury wanted to be paid with tobacco, not with paper money as the Two- Penny Act allowed. This act, a Virginia law, allowed debtors to make payments with paper money instead of with a stated amount of tobacco when a small crop increased the value of tobacco as currency. Peter Lyons, Reverend Maury's lawyer, claimed that the King had vetoed the Two - Penny Act; thus, it being void, payment had to be made with tobacco. However, Patrick, always the defender of rights and principles, made a speech as his argument. In his speech, spell - binding and convincing, he protested that the people in America should not bow to the King's veto of an American without making them feel like law, for if they allowed the King they were being questioned. to tell them what to use for force the colonists to obey other unjust rulings. Patrick Henry After his first failure he said that the Americans had the right to make their own laws King of England to tell the

> Americans what to do. In 1765, a neighboring county elected him to represent it in the Virginia House of Burgesses. He gladly accepted the post and made the people proud of him, for only nine days after taking his seat he, a "rookie", proposed seven resolutions, five of which were passed, denouncing the Stamp Act. He illustrated how bothersome the Stamp Act was by acting out a somewhat exaggerated scene in which a bridegroom prepared to put the wedding ring on his bride - to be's finger. Suddenly, he stopped and pulled out a stamp. After sticking it on an imaginary document, he placed the ring on her finger and said, "With this stamp, I thee wed." Thus, he illustrated once again that he protected people's rights and that he could propose the necessary action to uphold his beliefs. Even though the scene was

> exaggerated, it convinced about half of the burgesses that the Stamp Act was an outrage and that it should not be tolerated. In the final vote the resolutions barely carried, but they did. Some people referred to "the Virginia resolves" as "springboard of the Revolution". This showed that even though he was young,

> Patrick Henry was convincing. Patrick Henry served the public as a burgess until 1774. That year he was chosen to be one of the seven delegates from Virginia to attend the First Continental Congress in Philadelphia. There he met Sam Adams and John Adams, both of whom he came to know and like. The three of them



respected each other for their accomplishments and ideas, especially Sam and Patrick. Sam was considered to be the leader of Massachusetts while Patrick was the leader of Virginia. They considered it their duty to make their respective states the leaders of other colonies. Thus, Patrick Henry joined "forces" with other leaders of America and became a leader of Americans not just Virginians In this way he helped spread the nationalistic feelings of loyalty to a country instead of to a state.

When Congress adjourned in October, 1775, Patrick returned home, convinced that a war was inevitable. Therefore, he went to work organizing a militia for his county. Other counties in Virginia soon followed suit, and many of the groups sent word to George Washington requesting that he take command of them. Here again, as a leader he stirred the people who trusted him to action

Up to that time, Patrick Henry, a spell - binding speaker, had made many stirring speeches. However, it was not until March, 1775, while attending the Virginia Convention in Richmond, that he made his most famous speech. He felt that war was inevitable; therefore, Virginia should be prepared to defend America's independence. He knew that Virginians could, and would, put all of their energy into preparation for war, but only if they gave up all hope of unity with England. In his famous speech he convinced many people that it was necessary to quickly prepare for war. His dramatic, yet sincere speech ended with "Is life so dear, or peace so sweet, as to be purchased at the price of chains and slavery? Forbid it, Almighty God! I know not what course others may take - - But as for me, give me liberty - - or give me death!'

Since Patrick Henry convinced the people of the need to prepare for war, he was elected Commander - in - chief of Virginia's militia. However, his authority was limited because the committee to which all of his decisions were subject was headed by an old rival. Therefore, very soon after Sally's death in 1776, he resigned from the military because he felt that it was not fair to the people to have a Commander - in - chief who had his authority limited. Thus, he illustrated that he put the people above his personal ambitions, that he cared more for the people than for personal

titles or glory. However, his political career was not over. Later in 1776 he was elected as Virginia's first governor after serving on a state constitution, including a Bill of Rights. During his first several weeks as governor he suffered from malaria. He met and fell in love with Dorothea (Dolly) Dandridge while he was sick and recovering. He married Dolly because he needed someone to help him serve in society as a governor was expected to do. He also enjoyed her because she understood his work, and he could discuss his problems with her. Governor Henry served for three consecutive one - year terms from 1776 - 1779.

At the end of his third term he took his huge family and moved westward. There he bought a large plantation and settled down to enjoy life and his family. He often amused his family by stepping outside and yelling to a field hand one - half mile away. He also continued to play the fiddle, and he even had time to ride and hunt again. Although he spent much of his time trying to recuperate from the hold that the malaria had on him, he answered the call of duty to continue to help his country. Thus, for the five years that he lived on

plantation, he served as a state legislator, attending meetings as often as his health permitted. For the next two years, from 1784 - 1786, Patrick served his fourth and fifth (final) terms as governor. Patrick Henry "retired" several times, but he always felt duty - bound to help the people when they asked him for

In 1787 Patrick Henry was asked to attend the convention in Philadelphia to decide how to amend the Articles of the Confederacy. He refused to attend because he felt that the government should have had a constitution, including a Bill of Rights, like Virginia's constitution.

From 1787 to 1790 he served as legislator again and was chosen as a delegate to the Constitutional Convention, There he strongly opposed the adoption of the constitution because it did not contain a Bill of Rights. He finally convinced enough people that their rights needed to be expressed, not taken for granted. When assured that the amendments would cover the rights, he voted for the constitution.

Even though many people respected him, some turned against him because of his views about the constitution. He knew this, yet he continued to fight for what he believed was right. Though some did turn away from him, many people still believed in him and elected him to several posts which he refused because of his health. The general public also showed its feelings for him by calling him the "Father of the Constitution" because his opposition caused the Bill of Rights to be added.

In 1794 Patrick again retired. However, in 1799 at the request of several politicians he ran for the Assembly. There he hoped to bring harmony to the government by showing it how to operate under the Constitution. He was elected, but he never got the chance to serve. For on June 6, 1799, at the age of sixty - three, Patrick Henry died at his home.

Thus, a great American hero's life ended. It was sad that his life had to end then. Yet America propsered from this great man's life of devotion to his country and to the causes in which he believed -independence and freedom.

I know that it is impossible to live exactly as Patrick Henry did. However, I can cherish the two things - - independence and freedom - - that America is privileged to have today because of Patrick Henry's lifetime devotion. I can also respect Patrick Henry for several admirable qualities, especially the determination to

The history of music goes back to the times before Christ and was possibly used then for more religious purposes. Time progressed on and music, written to fit the respective times, progressed in man forms and fashions.


Music is a part of our culture and should be appreciated with the same respect as art and great literature, and in as much as literature and art have changed, music also has kept up with the pace.

TESCO Cuts Ties With WTU

Texas Electric Service Company has severed interconnections with West Texas Utilities (WTU) following WTU's violation of an agreement to keep interconnections between the two companies part of an intrastate

system only. The action came Tuesday after WTU connected a portion of Public Service Company of Oklahoma's systems to the WTU intrastate (within the Texas) system. WTU's intrastate system is connected to Texas Electric

That action violated a contractual agreement between Texas Electric and WTU that requires both parties to keep connections between the two as part of systems operating only within Texas.

WTU and Public Service Company of Oklahoma are both subsidiaries of Central and South West Corporation, an electric holding company. WTU has maintained one system completely within Texas and another connected across state lines.

Because of WTU's action yesterday, Texas Electric disconnected its transmission ties with WTU.

"We can serve our customers more economically and reliably by maintaining an intrastate system", said W.G. Marquardt, President of Texas Electric. "We are large enough to have economies of scale and we've acquired a substantial long range fuel supply."

Connecting the Texas Electric system to interstate facilities would require a substantial investment without adequate according benefit,



A suit against four persons seeking \$14.3 million for an Eastland man who claimed he was forced into a mental institution by conspiracy was dismissed Friday in federal court in Fort Worth.

Defendants in the case were Dr. E.E. Addy, Dr. Ayres R. Cermin, Joe Woodward Jr., and Eastland County Criminal Dist. Atty. Emory Walton.

They were sued by Woodward's father, Joseph Woodward Sr., who claimed they and three other persons conspired to have him admitted to the Wichita Falls State Hospital for a temporary confinement in the summer of 1973. Woodward Sr. stayed at the hospital 43 days.

The commitment came after Let's all get together July 4th 1973 incident in which and have an unforgettable Woodward Sr. proclaimed his religious views in a supermarket parking lot in Cisco. Woodward Sr. claimed his sons had him committed solely on

the basis of his action at the time, and claimed the two doctors who executed affidavits to county court here July 6, 1973, examined him outside a clinic without psychiatric tests.

Woodward Sr.'s suit claimed he was deprived of his civil rights when he was committed not through a trial, but by affidavits presented to Eastland County Judge Scott Bailey in

It also claimed that commitment papers were drawn up by county officials in the judge's chambers.

Woodward Sr. also said he was released from the mental hospital after 43 days of a 90 day commitment after the hospital staff concluded that for a man his age (70), Woodward was in "good health, mentally and otherwise."
