ECT Picnicconcert

Diana Dill and Ben Karnes, both of Dallas, will present the music of Jerome Kern at Eastland Civic Theatre's annual picnicconcert, which this year has been designated as a bicentennial festival.

The story and songs of the American composer will be presented Thursday evening, May 6, at Bell Hurst Playhouse following a picnic which will begin at 7 p.m.

Diana Dill is the daughter of Tom and Georgia Dill of Dallas, who, as singers, have themselves presented several programs in Eastland. Diana, a graduate of the University of Texas, who studied for a year in France, has taught at Hockaday in Dallas. She is currently working with the Berlitz language school and is beginning her career as an entertainer.

Ben Karnes, who graduated from North Texas State University, has given a number of programs in Eastland appearing before the Music Study Club as a piano soloist and as pianist with the Eastland County String Ensemble.

He taught music in Breckenridge from 1958 to 1969. Since 1971 he has been pianist for the Old Warsaw Restaurant in Dallas, where he also works as a professional artist.

The two musicians will do a number of selections from "Show Boat". Kern's most popular musical. With it, the composer became one of the first to tie his songs into the plot. In so doing, he brought a new reality and contemporary freshness to the music world.

Two of his songs, "The Last Time I Saw Paris" and "The Way You Look Tonight" won academy awards. Kern's own favorite was "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes".

Kern was one of the first composers of "light" music to be presented in Carnegie Hall. His music seems never to lose its appeal. One of his songs was revived in the 60's and in the 1970's Barbara Streisand rediscovered his music.

As Karnes says, "His depth of influence on popular music was matched by the longevity of his contributing years (1914-1945)."

The public is invited to the festival-both to the picnic and the concert. No charge will be made for the program. Those who attend are asked to bring a covered dish to the supper.

Sam Herring Retires From TESCO May 1

Sam W. Herring retired from Texas Electric Service Co. May 1 after more than 24 years with the power company.

Born near the town of Emory northeast of Dallas, Herring has spent most of his life near here. His family moved to Okra, between Carbon and Rising Star, when he was five and then to the Flatwood Community a year later. He attended the Flatwood Grove School, where Herring recalls that his teacher taught 11 grades.

Herring worked in a number of jobs before settling with TESCO. He was with a pipeline company in San Angelo, "Busted blocks" for a cattle commission company in Coleman, was a carpenter in Corpus Christi and worked in a copper mine in Arizona. Interspersed between jobs were returns to farm life and he eventually bought 237 acres north of Eastland, where he presently runs 30 head of cattle.

Herring started with Texas Electric at the "Late" Leon plant in 1951 as a mechanical maintenance repairman. Seven years later he moved to the Eastland Transmission Division which has headquarters at the plant location. He first worked on the electrical crew and lately has been a heavy equipment operator.

Herring and his wife, the former Annie May Robertson, have three married children. One son, Clyde, lives south of Eastland. Another son, Joe, is in California, and a daughter, Mrs. Belinda Kay Turner, is just moving to Washington.

A lifetime member of the Eastland Volunteer Fire Department, Herring also is a past Noble Grand of the Odd Fellows, a past Chance Commander of the Knights of Pythias, a member of the Order of the Dokies and a deacon and choir member of Trinity Baptist Church.

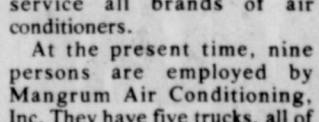

Sheriff's Race To Run-Off On June 5

Carter, Reagan, Creighton, Hanna Lead

Saturday's party primary proved provocative.

Eastland County Democrats voted 6,212 for Carter to 2,071 for Bentsen in Presidential Preferences.

In the Republican primary, Reagan got 62 votes to 277 for Gerald Ford.

In the County Sheriff's race, which had attracted much attention, ended in a runoff between Eastland Police Chief Johnnie Morren and Ronnie White.

White, a former Highway patrolman, tallied 2,095 votes while Morren got 1,655 to put the run into a runoff in the second primary to be held June 5. Other candidates in the sheriff's race were Bennie Moseley with 362 and Louis Hollywood with 206.

In the race for U. S. Senator, Lloyd Bentsen received 2,774 votes. Others: Dugi, 34; Wilson and Phil Grahmann, 1,013. Congressman Omar Burleson, unopposed, got 3,308 votes in this county.

In another race of much interest, Sen. Tom Creighton defeated Alex Tandy here by 2,632 to 1,538.

Funeral for Robert Edward Lee Reed, 12, will be held Monday at 2 p.m. at the First Baptist Church under the direction of Arrington Funeral Home. The Rev. Haston Brewer and Ruby Fambrough of Lueders will officiate. Burial will be at Eastland Cemetery with Arrington Funeral Home in Charge.

Young Reed, born Dec. 21, 1963, had been a resident of Eastland for seven years, died of accidental gun shot wounds Saturday. He was a member of the First Baptist Church and of Boy Scout Troop 103.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Stanley Wayne Reed; one sister, Katherine and one brother, Paul, both of the home; grandmothers, Mrs. L. B. Reed of Eastland and Eleya Baker of Tulsa, Okla.

In the constable race in Precinct Two, Incumbent J. W. Vison defeated his opponents by receiving 562 votes. His opponents, both former policemen of Ranger, Jesse Brown and Rodney Davlin received 199 and 109 votes respectively.

In the race for State Representative Joe Hanna won over Bob Vaught here by two to one by receiving 2,648 to Vaught's 1,503.

Total number voters in the county were: Olden, 109; Eastland, 1,257; Rising Star, 586; Cisco, 998; Carbon, 122; Desdemona, 137; Gorman, 383; Ranger, 646; Lake Leon, 94 and 99 absentee votes were cast.

In the race for county commissioner of Precinct three (south part of county), Incumbent L. T. Owen won over John Ingram of Gorman by 559 voters to 382.

Also in the Constable race in Precinct Three (Rising Star) a runoff between E.M. (Buddy) Turner and W. H. Korney will be held in June. Turner received 230 votes, Korney, 258 and N. B. Chancellor received 75 votes.

Danny Woods, Commissioner Precinct one Eastland, was unopposed and received 1,084. Other unopposed candidates included Judge Earl Conner, Judge Austin McCloud, Tax collector Nancy Trout, Eastland Constable Bill Hunter.

"A number of ideas have been brought forth and now we are ready for our sifting operation to begin," Hanna said of the meetings which will be in the House Chamber in Austin and open to the public.

**Public Invited

 Focus" May 6**

The public is invited to attend

 Service.

Crepmyrtle shrubs in this

The powdery mildew will
 appear as a grey-white powdery
 substance on the leaves. It will
 be more prevalent in the early
 spring prior to bloom. It is much
 more common when the crep-
 myrtle is protected from the
 sun.

Powdery mildew control is
 easily achieved with regular
 applications of the fungicide
 Benlate (Benomyl). It should be
 applied as a spray and applica-
 tions may have to be repeated
 every two weeks throughout the
 season.

Leaves infected with aphids
 may curl, cup-up or turn yellow.
 Aphids damage the plants by
 sucking the plant juice from the
 leaves. They usually occur in
 colonies on the underside of the
 leaf.

A Malathion or Diazinon
 spray will give satisfactory
 control of aphids.

GORDON SPOT

by DeMarquis Gordon

Almost 300 acres of potatoes
 are being grown commercially in
 Eastland County this year.

We spent one day recently
 working with Mr. Tom Long-
 brake, Vegetable Specialist,
 and four growers. The potatoes
 are looking good and should be
 ready for harvest about June 1
 to June 15.

Durwood Burgess and Jerry
 Warren are growing potatoes in
 the Gorman area. The other
 growers are Joe Butler and
 Kenneth Monfort in the Rising
 Star area.

We learned some things from
 Mr. Longbrake. He said soil
 fertility was very important.
 Large amounts of nitrogen is
 needed while the potato tubers
 are growing. The potato is
 nothing more than stored food
 for the plant. If the plant does
 not get any more food than the
 plant needs for growth, it will
 not make potatoes. The plant
 puts excess food (Mainly Nitro-
 gen) into the tubers thereby
 making the potatoes.

The potato bloom has nothing
 to do with the plant making
 potatoes. The bloom forms seed
 which is not needed in potato
 production.

There was another big
 turnout for the 23rd Eastland
 County Pecan Grafting School
 on April 23, a total of 110 people
 registered for the school.

The Eastland County Pecan
 Growers Association donated
 the book Pecan Culture to the
 Cisco Junior College Library
 during the grafting school. It
 was given in memory of A.D.
 Ellington, former president of
 the growers association.

We have had several ques-
 tions concerning white grubs in
 lawns. The grubs have done
 most or all of their damage by
 now. They are now emerging
 from the soil as adults (June
 beetles). After mating the
 female beetles bore back into
 the soil and begin laying eggs,
 which eventually give rise to
 small grubs. These in turn result
 in large grubs that feed voraciously
 on grass roots.

The best time to control the
 grub is after the egg hatch and
 the small grubs are just under
 the soil surface. This will be
 during the last two weeks of
 July and the first week of
 August. Recommended treat-
 ment is Diazinon or Chlordane.



Sugar Pie
 2 cups of sugar
 2 eggs
 1 cup buttermilk
 2 Tablespoons flour
 1 teaspoon vanilla
 1/2 cup melted oleo
 Mix together and pour into unbaked 9" pie shell. Bake 350 for 1 hour.

This recipe was called, when I was a little girl, a "Buttermilk Pie". Since times have changed the name just doesn't seem to fit anymore. Everytime I bake my "Sugar Pie", I laugh a little, to myself, and remember that even though several years have past the same happy faces have been seen on the other side of that pie, what ever we name it. First News-Letter Of TFOMC Mailed

If you are interested in learning more of Eastland's past, you should visit the Archives Room at the Centennial Memorial Library, where Mrs. Joseph M. Perkins has prepared another special display; this one was planned especially for National Music Week, May 2-9.

Included is a copy of the sheet music "Dear Old Texas"; words were written by Maud Garrett Taggart, and music was composed by Maud Shick Leonard, both charter members of the Eastland Music Study Club. The cover states that the sheet music was published by Leonard and Taggart in Eastland, Texas, in 1925.

The first news-letter of the Texas Federation of Music Clubs was published in Eastland and mailed state-wide by the members of the Eastland Music Club in February, 1928. Mrs. Charles Norton, who after leaving Eastland became well-known as a newspaper journalist in the Fort Worth area, was its editor. After she organized the music club here, she was instrumental in fund raising activities which led to the purchase of the concert grand piano for Eastland High School. Photographs of Mrs. Norton and her husband, also a journalist, and a sampler made by her are on display.

The concert grand piano which is now located in the Women's Club was first on stage in the original City Hall, located at the corner of Commerce and Daugherty. Its debut into Eastland music circles was made with the accompanist for Ana Case, renown opera star, who appeared in recital shortly after the acquisition of the piano.

Also on display are sheet music, a photograph, and a brief biography of Oscar J. Fox, a native of Texas, who was designated the "Interpreter of America" for his lyrical interpretations of American Life. Among his lyrics included in this collection are "The Blue Bonnet, Flower of Texas", "Will You Come to the Bower", "Sam Houston", and "Rain and the River".

An autographed copy of Texas William J. Marsh's "Texas, Our Texas" is also included in this display along with sheet music and hymnals which are a part of the permanent collection of the library.
