



We have had several questions concerning white grubs in lawns. The grubs have done most or all of their damage by now. They are now emerging from the soil as adults (June beetles). After mating the female beetles bore back into the soil and begin laying eggs. which eventually give rise to smal grubs. These in turn result large grubs that feed voraciously on grass roots. The best time to control the

grub is after the egg hatch and the small grubs are just under the soil surface. This will be during the last two weeks of July and the first week of August. Recommended treatment is Diazinon or Chlordane

Crepemyrtle shurbs in this area are heavily infected with powdery mildew and aphids. These problems can prevent the shrubs from achieving their full flower potential. Young leaves and flower buds will take on a twisted and gnarled appear-The powdery mildew will

appear as a grey-white powdery substance on the leaves. It will be more prevalent in the early spring prior to bloom. It is much more common when the crepemyrtle is protected from the Powdery mildew control is

easily achieved with regular applications of the fungicide Benlate (Benomyl). It should be applied as a spray and applications may have to be repeated every two weeks throughout the season. Leaves infected with aphids

may curl, cup-up or turn yellow. Aphids damage the plants by sucking the plant juice from the leaves. They usually occur in colonies on the underside of the leaf. A Malathion of Diazinon
