



## Postal Clerk Charged In Gorman Shooting

A 91st District Court grand jury deliberated facts in the shooting and killing of a Gorman man only hours after the incident happened in the lobby of the post office there. John Sutton, 40-year-old Gorman post office clerk, was

freed on \$2,500 bond Tuesday night, charged in Justice of the Peace Wells Dalton's court with murder with malice.

Dead is C. B. Sims, 51-year-old Gorman painter and carpenter, who was hit twice with slugs from a post office 38-calibre snub-nose revolver. As the grand jury pondered the case Wednesday morning, several had been subpoenaed to appear. Among these were Judge Joe Parker, 93, retired Gorman attorney, who is believed to have been a witness to the shooting.

Mr. Sutton gave a statement Tuesday afternoon. The shooting occurred about 1 p. m. and Sheriff Lee Horn took Sutton before the in-session grand jury about 4 p. m. The jury briefly considered the case and adjourned to return Wednesday morning. (The jury had been expected to recess for the term at 5 p. m. Tuesday, after reconvening Monday morning.)

Exact cause of the shooting was not known, but Gorman residents told of "bad blood" between the two, and there were reports that an argument had issued over the issuance of a money order.

Three shots were fired from the pistol Sheriff Horn brought to the jury room.

Sims had been convicted of auto burglary in 91st District Court and served time in the state penitentiary several years ago.

Arrangements for his burial are being handled by Higginbotham Funeral Home of Gorman.

Funeral services were held at 3 p. m. Wednesday in First Baptist Church of Gorman with the Rev. A. D. Kyle of Rising Star, formerly of Carbon, officiating. Burial was in Gorman Cemetery with Higginbotham Funeral Home of Gorman in charge.

## Marc Kincaid Is Buried Feb. 20

Funeral services for Marc Kincaid, 67, brother of Alvin Kincaid of Cisco, were conducted Thursday, Feb. 20, at Artesia, New Mexico, with burial in the cemetery there.

Attending the service from Cisco were the Alvin Kincaids, the Don Kincaids and the Robert Kincaids.

Mr. Kincaid, a prominent cattleman and extensive land owner, lost his life in a car-train collision Feb. 17 near Artesia. He moved to New Mexico in 1943 after living at Big Spring most of his life. He was well known as a cattleman in West Texas before going to New Mexico.

Survivors include his wife and one son, three daughters, three sisters and two brothers, including the Ciscoan.

## O. L. Stamey Is Appointed As County School Superintendent

### Ciscoan Succeeds Late Mr. Garrett

O. L. Stamey of Cisco, veteran educator and former Cisco Junior College president, was appointed Eastland County School Superintendent by

the County Commissioners Court after a long session Monday.

The office vacancy resulted from the death of H. R. (Pop) Garrett last week.

Mr. Stamey will serve the remainder of this year, and a superintendent will be elected in the general election in the fall. Mr. Stamey told the

court that he would continue to run the office as Mr. Garrett had.

There was opposition to the appointment when Jimmy Hughes of Carbon asked that the court wait one week to make the appointment. Both Mr. Hughes and Mr. Stamey have been serving as county supervisors out of the county school superintendent's office.

Mr. Stamey indicated that he will seek election as superintendent, and said that he had filed for the May 2 Democratic primary. (Candidates have until April 6 — 25 days before the primary — to file for the office, according to law pertinent to this case, it is reported.)

A group of Cisco businessmen attended the court meeting Monday morning. They were James McCracken, L. M. Cawley, Tom B. Stark and J. W. Sifton. The court was told that the County School Board had endorsed Mr. Stamey's appointment unanimously.

Commissioner Tip Arther of Eastland-Ranger Precinct moved that Mr. Stamey be appointed, and Commissioner C. B. Dill of Cisco seconded the motion. Commissioner Glenn Justice of Carbon moved that the court adjourn until 1 p. m. before taking action on the motion.

When the court reconvened Mr. Hughes was present and requested that the court postpone its appointment. He stated that he has a program outlined with which the county superintendent's office could help the educational standards in the county. He specifically mentioned an in-service training program in modern math for teachers, and a summer school to be carried out by the county office.

Mr. Hughes objected to the appointment of a superintendent now because, he said, if the appointee were defeated in the primary election, it would mean six or seven months of inactivity in the office. He indicated that the program he recommends should begin in the summer.

County Judge Scott Bailey reminded Mr. Hughes of the motion before the court, and pointed out that the only action possible would be a vote for a motion to table or amend the motion.

Commissioner Glenn Justice moved that the motion for appointment be postponed and given further consideration. The motion died for lack of a second, and Commissioner Justice voiced the only opposing vote, when the vote was called.

Present from Cisco during the afternoon session were Mr. McCracken, A. R. Westfall, Charles Sandier and Richard Moore.

During the discussion on postponement, Commissioner Dill said that he was afraid if the appointment was put off, that the court would have six applicants rather than two to consider.

The court wasn't required by law to make appointment in any specified time, it was pointed out.

Mr. Hughes said that he had been encouraged in his program by educators in the county, and that he would present his program to the county board if the appointment was put off a week. He had been able to talk only to Chairman I. C. Inzer, he said.

George Bennett, Kokomo stock farmer and former school teacher, suggested Monday morning to the court that the office be closed because "there isn't sufficient duties to justify the approximately \$20,000 spent annually by the office." Judge Bailey explained the procedure for abolishment, which includes a petition bearing the names of at least 25 per cent of the qualified voters in the office, necessary to call such an election.

Mr. Stamey, a native of Comanche County, was officially sworn in Tuesday afternoon.

Educated in Texas public schools, he attended Tarleton State College, and received his BA degree from Sul Ross. He took his masters degree from Hardin-Simmons University

and has done graduate work at the University of Colorado. He holds a professional permanent certificate, a professional administrators certificate and the supervisors certificate.

Mr. Stamey has had 34 years experience in Eastland County Schools. During the last five, he has been supervisor in schools at Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona, Olden, Scranton and Rising Star. He held positions of principal in elementary schools of Cisco; principal of Cisco High School for 11 years; dean of Cisco Junior College, 1940-45; and president of the college from 1946 until 1954. He served six years as director and vice-president of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce.

He has been a steward in the Methodist Church for the past 30 years, and has been active in Boy Scout work, having served as a scoutmaster.

He is an active member of the Lions Club, and as a past district governor, is a Lions International Counsellor, and has been a member of the directors and a committeeman for the Texas Lions League for the blind and for handicapped children.

## First Baptist Revival Begins Sunday Morning

William Chance, music-educator director of the church here, will be in charge of the music for the revival.

Rev. Fowler, 33, is a native of Pawhuska, Okla., and attended grade school with the Osage Indians on their reservation there. A graduate of Odessa High School, he entered the ministry at the age of 17. He is a 1952 graduate of Howard Payne College and attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary until 1956 when he was graduated there.

He has served as pastor of several student pastorates and the First Baptist Churches of Moran, Van, and Ballinger. He conducted a preaching mission in Fairbanks, Alaska, in the fall of 1959 and participated in the Japan Baptist New Life Movement.

Revival services will be a 10 a. m. and 7:30 p. m. daily, special prayer meeting at 7:15 a. m. each morning Monday through Friday, for men of the church.

## FUNERAL RITES HELD FOR OLDEN RESIDENTS KILLED IN AUTO-TRUCK COLLISION

Double funeral rites for two Olden couples — Mr. and Mrs. Paul R. Coltharp and Mr. and Mrs. O. T. Grubbs — were held in Eastland and Ranger earlier this week.

Mrs. Coltharp and Mrs. Grubbs, riding with their husbands, were killed instantly 5 p. m. Saturday when their car was struck by a truck going in the same direction at the intersection of State Highway 108 and U.S. 80 about three miles east of Thurber. Their husbands died later in Ranger General Hospital as a result of fatal injuries received in the crash.

Neither the truck driver, Charlie Hearne, 33, or his passenger, was injured. Highway Patrolman Neal Binford of Mineral Wells, investigated the crash and said the auto-

mobile had turned onto U. S. Highway 80 from State Highway 108 just prior to the accident. According to reports, the truck which was carrying heavy construction equipment, rolled over and was damaged extensively.

Mr. Grubbs was born Aug. 19, 1898 at Casey, Illinois. He was a member of the Olden Church of Christ.

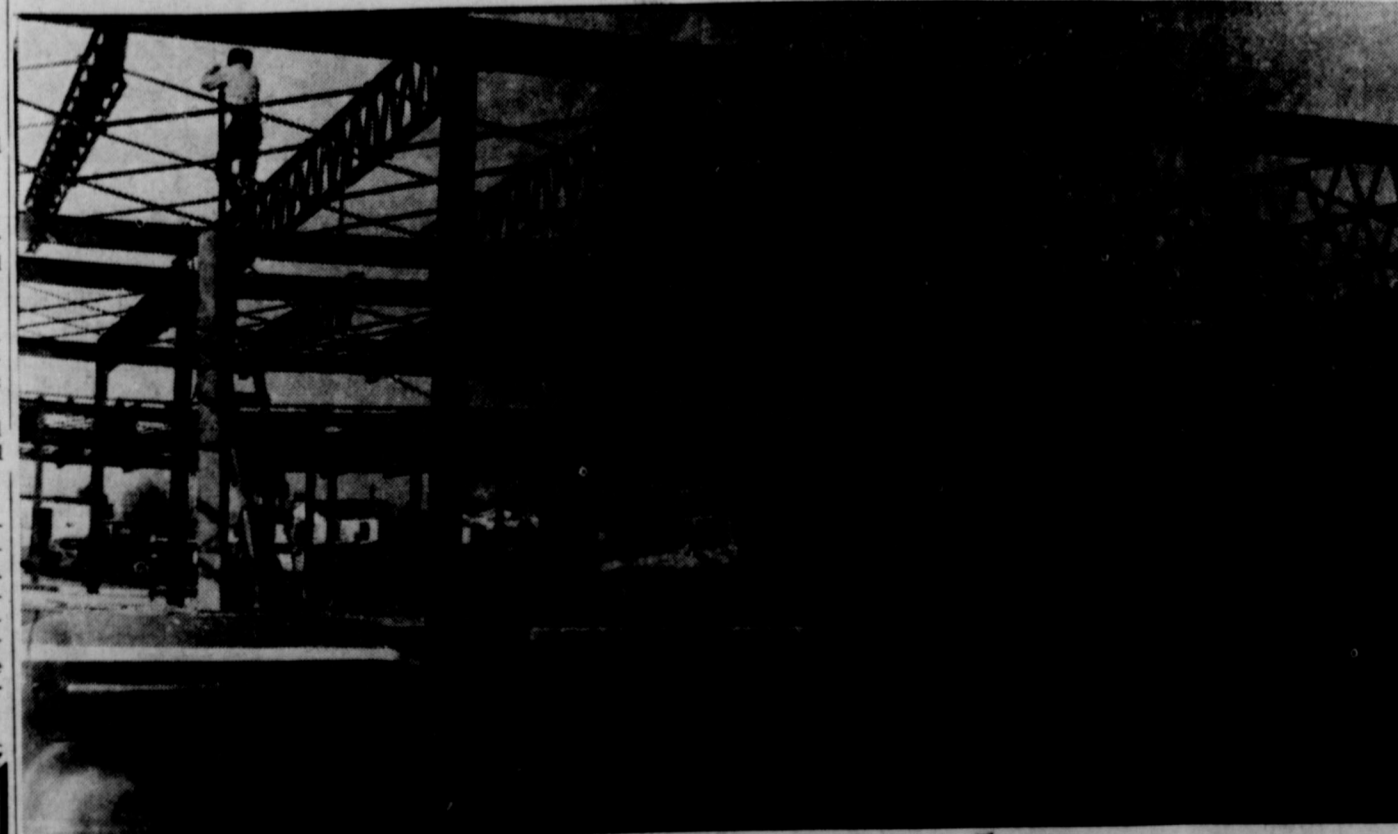
Survivors of the couple are one daughter, Mrs. Lois Cox of Cisco; one son, Jim C. of Albany; and four grandchildren.

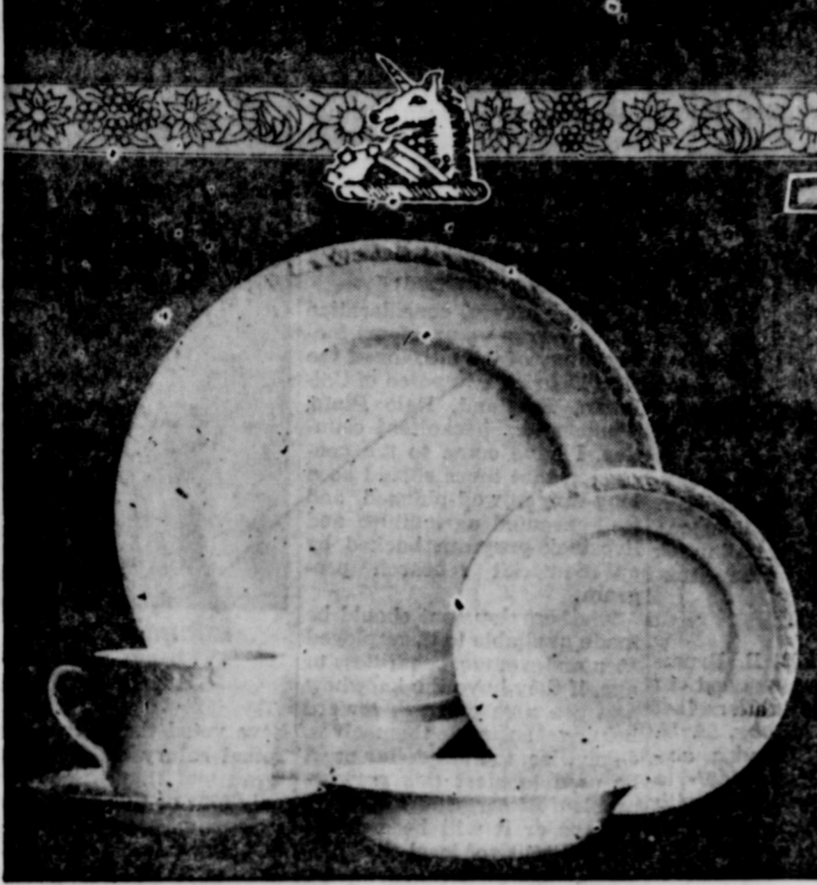

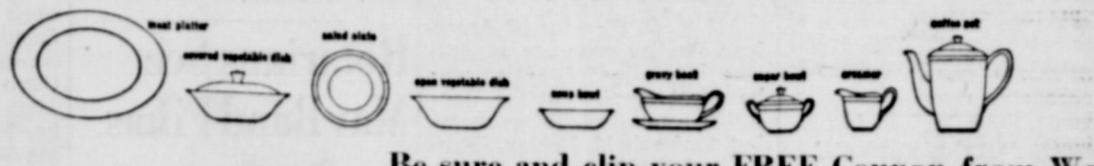

## Roger Q. Evans Of Baird Issues Formal Statement

Roger Q. Evans, Baird businessman and veterans' activities leader, Wednesday issued a formal statement concerning his candidacy for the 63rd District state representative post now held by Wayne Gibbons of Breckenridge.

The statement said: "After careful consideration of the economic problems facing many of the citizens of the 63rd District, composed of Calahan, Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens & Shackelford counties, I have come to the conclusion that there should be a long-range, well-planned and well-executed agriculture and livestock program backed by an industrial research program.

"Self-employment should be made available to unemployed men and women, regardless of age, if they have the knowhow and are able to work toward helping sustain themselves. Otherwise, the tax dollar must be used to meet this growing problem of carrying for needy citizens or it will become the responsibility of local charities.

The federal census, in its 1960 report, confirms that a large percentage of the population in most of this five-county district has an increasingly sub-standard income which is inadequate to provide even the necessities of life.

"When we reduce buying power, we reduce the profits of business and in time may close the doors of those businesses. Too much of this has already happened in our small towns and cities.

"It is the responsibility of our legislators to offer their assistance in research to bring about a program to remove poverty without new taxes.

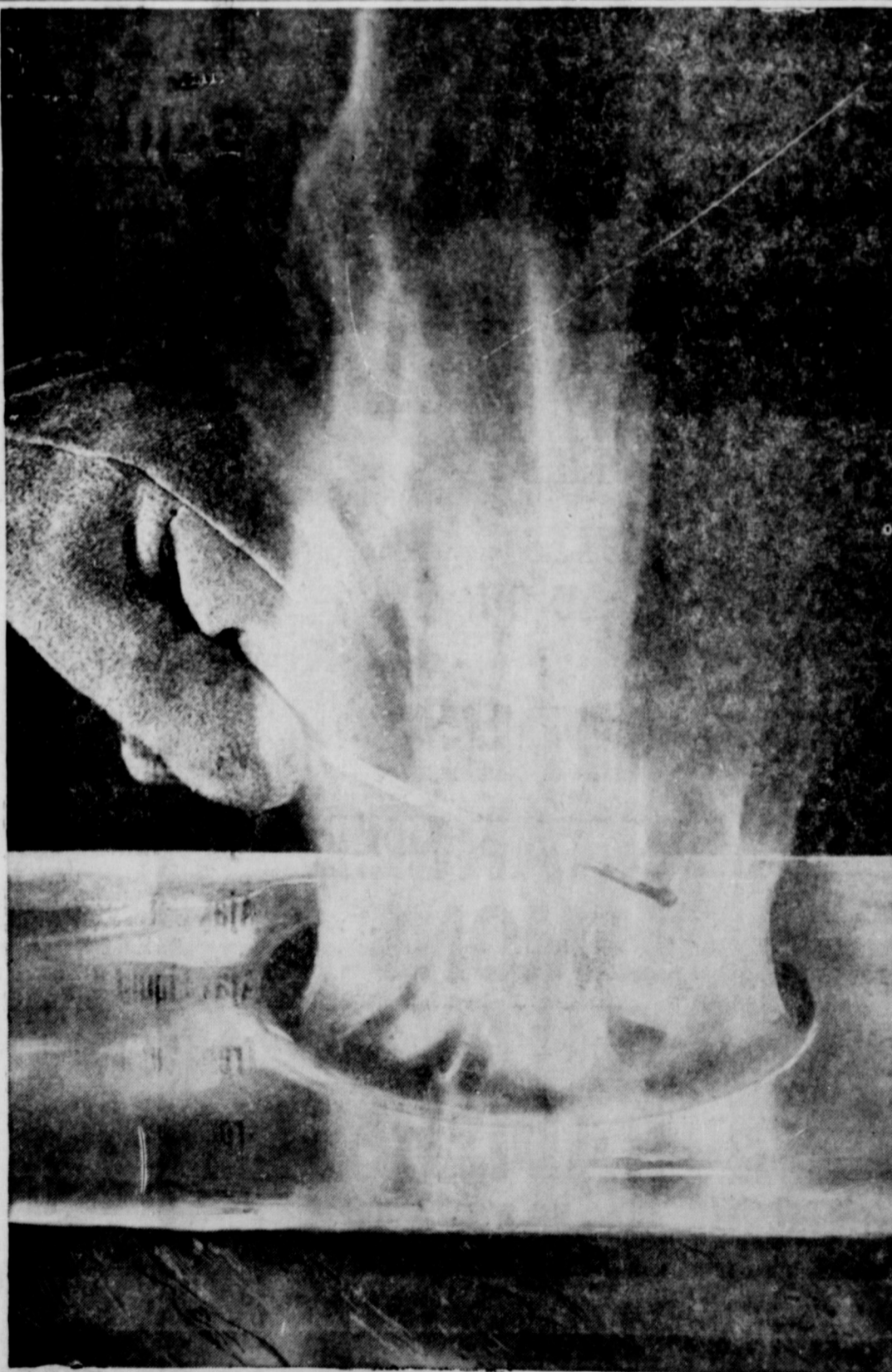

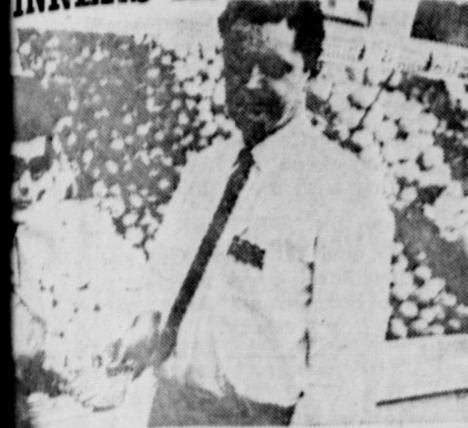

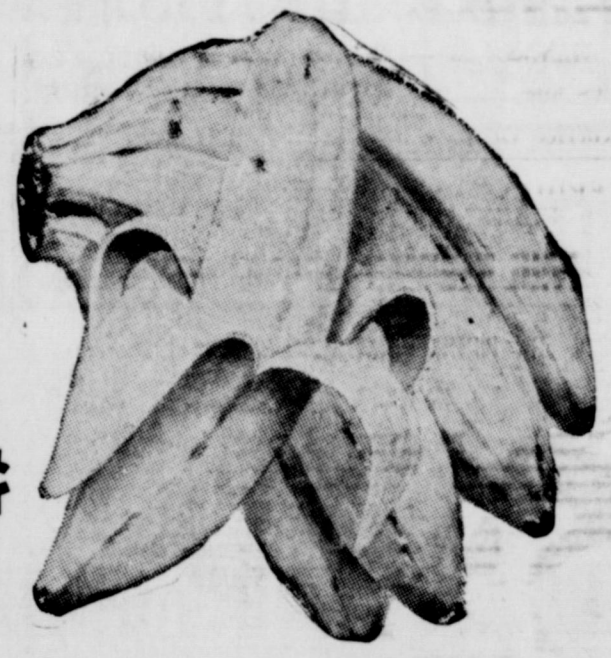

# BROWSING with BEV.....

The latest information answers "Yes" to the question: Is it necessary to process pickles and relishes? These products should be processed for a short time in boiling water bath. The reasons:  
Processing destroys spoilage micro-organisms, yeast and molds. Yeast and molds harmless in themselves, may start to grow in a jar of unprocessed pickles and reduce the acid content. In the resulting low-acid product, botulinum spores, if present, could grow and produce a deadly poison (before

thought possible only in non-acid foods).  
Processing stops enzyme action that may cause undesirable changes in texture, flavor and odor. (This can account for unexplained spoilage even when a recipe is followed to the letter.)  
Process times recommended for a number of pickles and relishes are given below. Start timing when water in the canner returns to a boil.  
Jar Size Min.  
Product Bread & butter slices Pt. 5

- Chutney Pt. 5
  - Dilled green beans Pt. 5
  - Pepper-onion relish Pt. 5
  - Piccalilli Pt. 5
  - Sweet Gherkins Pt. 5
  - Watermelon Pickles Pt. 15
  - Corn relish Pt. 20
  - Pickled Seckel Pears Pt. 20
  - Pickled peaches Qt. 20
- For dill pickles, start to count processing time as soon as filled jars are placed in boiling water bath. Process quart jars as follows:  
Fermented dill pickles (whole) 15 minutes  
Fresh-pack dill pickles (whole) 20 minutes


