On July 4 of next year, we will observe the 200th anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence.

In that document, the distinguished representatives of the colonies listed a series of grievances against King George III. Among those grievances: "He has erected a Multitude of new Offices, and sent hither Swarms of Officers to harrass our People, and eat out their Substance.

Those words are being echoed today by America's middle income taxpayers, who contribute the bulk of the money to finance government, as spending continues to rise at an alarming rate.

The federal budget for fiscal 1977, which begins Oct. 1, 1976, is likely to send federal spending beyond \$400 billion for the first time in the nation's history

It wasn't until fiscal 1961, ir 185 years after the Declaration of Independence, that federal spending reached \$100 billion. But it took only nine more years to reach \$200 billion; and then only five years to hit \$300 billion.

The jump to \$400 billion i taking only two year

Projections by the Office of Management and Budget show the pos ibility of a \$1 trillion annual federal budget by the end of this century.

Budget forecasts, however, overlook a vital factor that cannot be measured preci ely

That factor is how long middle - income taxpayers will put up with the triple impact they suffer under present fiscal policies. The triple impact is felt this way







Dublin Voters Give Approval Bond Issue

DUBLIN .- Voters gave ap-proval Saturday to an \$855,000, four point bond issue aimed at improvements.

Complete, unofficial returns were 278 for to 141 against Proposition No. 1 for \$350,000 in water system improvements; 283 to 135 for Proppsition No. 2: \$700.000 in sewer system improvements with \$200,000 contributed by the city; 238 to 175 for Proposition No. 3 providing \$275,000 for a new city hall and fire station; and 220 to 187 for Proposition No. 4 calling for \$110,000 in park improvements with \$60,000 contributed by the city.

Mayor Humphreys says the action was "a vote of confidence to the city council", which had worked for many weeks on the issue and then made a frank plea to the citizenry to approve

'It is a great step forward for little town like Dublin" Humphreys said.

Dublin. in Erath County. has a population of about 3.000. Humphreys said work should start within four or five weeks on doubling the capacity of the city's sewage treatment plant and on an analysis of water. new water lines where needed. better chlorination and other water system improvements. He said the city has a

ommitment from the state for 75% of the cost of the sewage plant, which will cost Dublin \$200.000 and approximately \$700,000 altogether.

The water system overhaul will cost the \$350,000 approved for it in the bond election. Humphreys said, but the city council will be investigating possible state and federal grants to reduce the local cost. He explained that the \$275. 000 approved for building a new city hall and fire station on a debt-free lot adjoining the existing city buildings also is enough. but that state and federal grants will be sought to reduce that expenditure of local funds as well.

Humphreys said he did not know which governmental agencies might be approached. He said matching funds for the park improvements have been committed by the Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife. A total of \$100,000 from the city and state will be used for new tennis courts, swimming pool repairs, and other improve ments, he said, and \$10,000 from the city will be used for a ew Fair Park Auditorium root. Humphreys said detailed







The GED series consists of five different test areas: Math. Natural Science, Social Science, Literary Material and English Grammar


