The Eastland Mavericks will be strengthened with assistance from the Junior Varsity squad when the Breckenridge Buckaroos come to town Friday for an important District 9-AA conference game in Maverick Stadium.

Kickoff time will be 8 p.m. and the Mavericks are reported to be ready for the visitors.

It could be one whale of a ball game, with Breckenridge coming off a tie with Comanche, and the Mavericks smarting from a pounding at the hands of Cisco last week.

Eastland's Seventh and Eighth Grade Teams will go to

Cisco Thursday evening with a 5 p.m. kickoff followed at 8 by the Eighth Graders. The Eastland JV, shown on the schedule to be playing, will be staying at home in preparation for assisting the Mavericks on Friday night. Coach Doug Dallas reports.

Breck's tie and their loss to Cisco are the only blemishes on their conference record, so they will be bringing a formidable force to town.

Eastland will be geared up for another win to go with their victory over Hamilton and their fans will be loud and strong to help keep the hard-working Mavericks in the action.

The Eastland team has and is showing exceptional spirit and attitude under highly demanding circumstances. It's getting close down to decision time, and Eastland needs every win to keep its hope alive. Dallas reports his charges in good physical condition and with precision playmanship the local squad could pull the impossible

out of the bag. Eastland has a reputation for doing just that.

An anticipated district shuffle for next year did not come to pass and the Mavericks will face the same conference foes in '76. Next year in the pre-season outings there'll be one new team face. Beginning Sept. 3, the Mavericks will face Cross Plains there. Ranger there. DeLeon here and Merkel here.

Another shift of importance will be switch of the opening date from the beginning of district play to the end, so the local team will tentatively play ten straight without a break. Naturally the here and there of this year will be switched next year. All told local teams including the Seventh, Eighth and JVs, will play some 16 home games and 18 away, with the younger teams to face some strangers too, in seeing 3-AAA teams like Stephenville.

Rubie Weaver, 78, of Gainesville and a former Eastland music teacher, died Monday at a Gainesville hospital.

Services were held at 10 a.m. Wednesday at Carrol Funeral Home Chapel in Gainesville.

Graveside services were at 3 p.m. Wednesday in Eastland Cemetery. The Rev. Robert Marsh, pastor of First Presbyterian Church, officiated with Arrington Funeral Home directing.

Born Rubie Wilson, April 3, 1897, in Thornton, she attended Eastland public schools and was graduated from Mary Hardin Baylor College in Belton. She returned to Eastland and taught music for several years.

She married Frank H. Weaver in 1922, and the couple moved to Kilgore during the oil boom. After Mr. Weaver's death in 1952, Mrs. Weaver was employed by the University of Houston.

She moved to Gainesville from Eastland in February. Mrs. Weaver was a member of First Presbyterian Church and the Eastland Music Study Club.

Survivors include a sister, Mrs. Eldon Willette of Gainesville; and several nieces and nephews, including Mrs. Virginia Weaver Russell of Eastland.

James H. Ross, 74, of Glen Rose, a retired barber, was found dead at his trailer home at 4 p.m. Sunday. Justice of the Peace H.C. Polley of Glen Rose ruled Ross' death due to natural causes.

Services were held Wednesday in the Bakker Funeral Home Chapel.

The Rev. Delbert Smith, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Carbon, officiated. Burial was in the Murray Cemetery of Carbon.

Born Nov. 25, 1900, in Blooming Grove, Mr. Ross farmed in the Rio Grande Valley for several years before he moved to Dallas in 1959.

He was employed as a barber in Dallas until his retirement in 1972, when he moved to Glen Rose.

A U.S. Navy veteran of World War I, Mr. Ross was a Baptist and a member of Hartlingen Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include two brothers, Edgar of Oregon and I.O. of Eastland; and three sisters, Mrs. Lillie Gertrude Lewis of Bakersfield, Calif., Mrs. Eucuba King and Mrs. Veneta Wesie, both of Houston.

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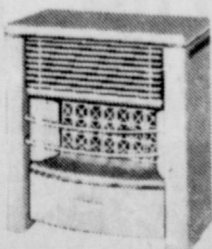

EDITORIALS

One indisputable fact has emerged from the spirited debate over the proposed new state constitution on the November 4th ballot: many of its provisions, written by the legislature, are so vague and ambiguous that they are subject to many different interpretations by state officials, including top-notch lawyers.

Presiding Judge John F. Onion Jr. of the Court of Criminal Appeals and former Chief Justice of the Supreme Court Robert Calvert disagree strongly, for instance, on the effect of the judiciary article. Onion contends that combining the state's two top courts into one, which would handle appeals in both civil and criminal cases, would slow down the wheels of justice; Calvert says it would speed them up.

Both sides do agree that the complete revision of the constitution would give vast new powers to the legislature. It would require annual legislative sessions, permit the legislature to set its own salaries and even permit the members to call themselves into session. Proponents claim this is good and that the people should just "trust the legislature." The opponents' view seems much more logical: ours is a government of laws, not of men, and should stay that way. We need a strong constitution to protect our basic rights from a legislature which can change complexion completely every two years.

Biennial sessions (every two years) now scare most of us to death. One can imagine what all could come out of annual meetings.

Governor Dolph Briscoe strongly opposes all eight propositions on next Tuesday's ballot. So do former Governors Allan Shivers and Preston Smith. And none of them are running for higher office. They have had some serious differences on political matters in the past but their experiences in government have led all three to the conclusion that the present constitution should be preserved.

Comptroller Bob Bullock says the new constitution would give so much power to the legislature that it is impossible to estimate how much it would cost the taxpayers.

Some proponents argue that there are some good features in the new constitution which outweigh the bad. The good features involved can be singled out in the future and adopted as individual amendments, without turning our Texas Legislature into a fulltime "little Congress" which would exercise enormous control over our lives.

The main proponents of the new constitution are members of the legislature. We prefer to keep them as our servants, instead of making them our masters. The way to do that is to vote "no" on all eight propositions next Tuesday.

A check on Hamblen revealed that he was wanted in Florida for fraudulent use of checks and investigation of auto thefts.

Condry said Hamblen is being held as a fugitive in the Eastland County Jail here for warrants from Florida law enforcement officials. No bond was set for Hamblen, who listed his address as Okeechobee, Fla.

Condry added that it would be several days before the Florida fugitive would be extradited.

Oil News

Three oil companies have been reported in the rapidly developing Strawn producing trend of east-central Stephens County.

Tru-Oil, Inc. of Temple No. 1 Bob Grammer, 5 miles southwest of Caddo, flowed 94 barrels of 42 gravity oil per day, plus 28 barrels of water, through a 24/64 choke from perforations at 2,787-2,808 feet.

Originally filed as a wildcat, but completed in the Little Cedar (Strawn) field, the oiler was fractured with 40,000 pounds of sand and 1,000 barrels of fresh water. Tubing pressure was 50 pounds, and casing pressure was 200 lbs. Gas-oil ration was too small to measure.

Hole was drilled to 3,992 feet, and 5 1/2" casing was set at 2,880 feet. Plugged back depth is 2,816 feet.

The oiler is 2,310 feet from south and 2,341 feet from west lines of Section 20, Block 16, T&P Survey.

Fifteen miles northwest of Ranger, C.B. Hazel of Ranger, No. 6-C Swenson Ranch flowed 155 barrels of 41-gravity oil plus 10 barrels of water per day through 24/64" choke from perforations at 2,914-28 feet.

The pay zone was washed with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 60,000 pounds of sand and 1,000 barrels of gelled water.

Total depth is 2,895 feet and 4 1/2" casing was set 4 feet off bottom.

Tubing pressure is 146 pounds and casing pressure is 800 pounds. Gas-oil ratio is 750-1.

also prorated in the Little Cedar (Strawn) field, the project spots 425 feet from north and 1,625 feet from west lines of Section 19, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Ortex Exploration Co. of Temple No. 3 R.J. Carey, 12 miles north of Ranger, pumped 57 barrels of 42-gravity oil plus 10 barrels of water per day from perforations at 2,940-54 feet, which had been fractured with 40,000 pounds of sand and 1,000 barrels of water.

Hole was drilled to 3,410 feet and plugged back to 2,954 feet. Five and one-half inch casing is hung at 2,995 feet.

Originally filed as a wildcat, the oiler is prorated in Stephens County Regular and spots 1,650 feet from north and east lines of Section 21, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Home Ownership Explained To Lions Club

Happiness is Owning a Home, was program title and details included the how and whereof of obtaining same, for members of the Eastland Lions Club luncheon Tuesday at the Ramada Inn.

Gary Gilman, program chairman, brought the program and answered a lot of difficult questions about the fine points of home ownership.

President Ray Pryor presided and guests included Ralph Cain, Allan Snead of Miami, Ariz., and Tom Stark of Cisco. Bruce Pipkin has the program next week.

Reasons given for home ownership according to Gilman include the sociological factor (civic pride, etc.) and personal which includes security and savings. (He pointed out that with increases, a home purchased in 1969 has increased in value by 45%--a pretty good investment.)

Method of securing a home are varied: buying a lot and building one yourself; selecting plans and hiring a contractor; buying an already built home; and buying an older home and remodeling.

Gilman gave some guidelines for examining homes to determine the soundness of their construction: check the visible concrete, inside fittings, doors and window fittings, nail and hammer marks, and be sure to make sure the doors fit.

He listed points for selection of a house included the trend of the neighborhood, the site, utilities and to determine how adequate the housework area is: how sufficient the group and private life areas are and overall how convenient the house is.

Discussing the methods of financing a home, he explained the FHA loans (now at about nine and a half percent); VA (Veterans) at nine percent; Farmers Home Administration (FHA) direct loans which now replace the old 234 plans; and the conventional loans which can range from 9 1/4 to 9 3/4. He also discussed the factors involved in closing costs and the new advance disclosure law.

Chase Ends In Arrest Of Carbon Man

A high speed chase through most of Eastland County Sunday involving a good number of law enforcement officers resulted in the arrest of a 38-year-old Carbon man who is now in Eastland County Jail.

The man's bond was set at \$7,500 and his case was to have been taken before the 91st District Court Grand Jury Monday, charging him with evading arrest.

The chase began at a Cisco drive-in restaurant where a man reportedly exposed himself indecently about 2:45 p.m. Sunday.

Officers said the man refused to stop for them in Cisco, drove

ten miles on U.S. 80 to Eastland at a high rate of speed onto west Commerce and S. Seaman Street refused to stop in Eastland and went south ten miles on Texas 6 to Carbon.

Those in the chase were Cisco Police Dept. officers Dale Burns and Zane Welsh, Sheriff's Deputy Louis Hollywood, Gorman Constable Albert White, Texas Dept. of Public Safety Patrolmen David Parkhill and Ken Rose.

The driver of the 1963 Chevrolet (six cylinder) pickup led the chase to Eastland, south on S. Seaman toward Carbon.

Deputy Hollywood passed the pickup between Eastland and

Carbon, and erected a hasty road block about four miles north of Carbon which the pickup and its driver successfully evaded. About nine miles south of Carbon on FM 1027 to Okra, Cisco policeman Burns apparently shot out a tire on the pickup which almost went out of control and the driver soon stopped. He reportedly made some effort to resist arrest but was soon subdued by officers who were on the scene almost immediately. The man was first taken to the Cisco City Jail.

Eastland Police units attempted to help stop the fleeing vehicle during the time it was within the Eastland city limits.

In The Kitchen

TRICK OR TREAT: It's Halloween time again. The ghosts and goblins will be arriving at your house tomorrow night dressed in their spooky costumes waiting to play a trick, if you don't have lots of treats. Shining from many windows in our town will be the happy faces of the Jack-O-Lantern.

Have you ever wondered what to do with that Jack-O-Lantern when Halloween is over? Some people just throw him in the trash and remember the fun and laughter he brought for a few hours, but some continue remembering how good he tasted.

Even though the pumpkin is relatively inexpensive at 10c per pound in many of our local stores, it is senseless to throw it away after the fun is over. This year keep the fun going for a few more hours and put Mr. Jack-O-Lantern to good use.

Cut it in half and wash thoroughly, inside and out. Dice the pumpkin halves into smaller pieces and remove the outer skin as you would a potato. Place the diced, pared pieces into a pan and cover with water. Boil for 25 to 30 minutes and

drain. Mash as you would potatoes, but don't add any seasonings.

There are numerous recipes for a variety of pies, muffins, puddings, and breads to make from the mashed pumpkin. A 30 ounce can of pumpkin fillings costs about 69c. You can get approximately three cups of pumpkin filling for every three pounds of raw pumpkin cooked. By making your own filling you can save a few pennies and you can enjoy making a pastry from "scratch".

You can make your holiday pies and breads ahead of time and freeze them. All you have to do when the big day arrives is warm them in the oven and you are ready to eat fresh bread of pie.
