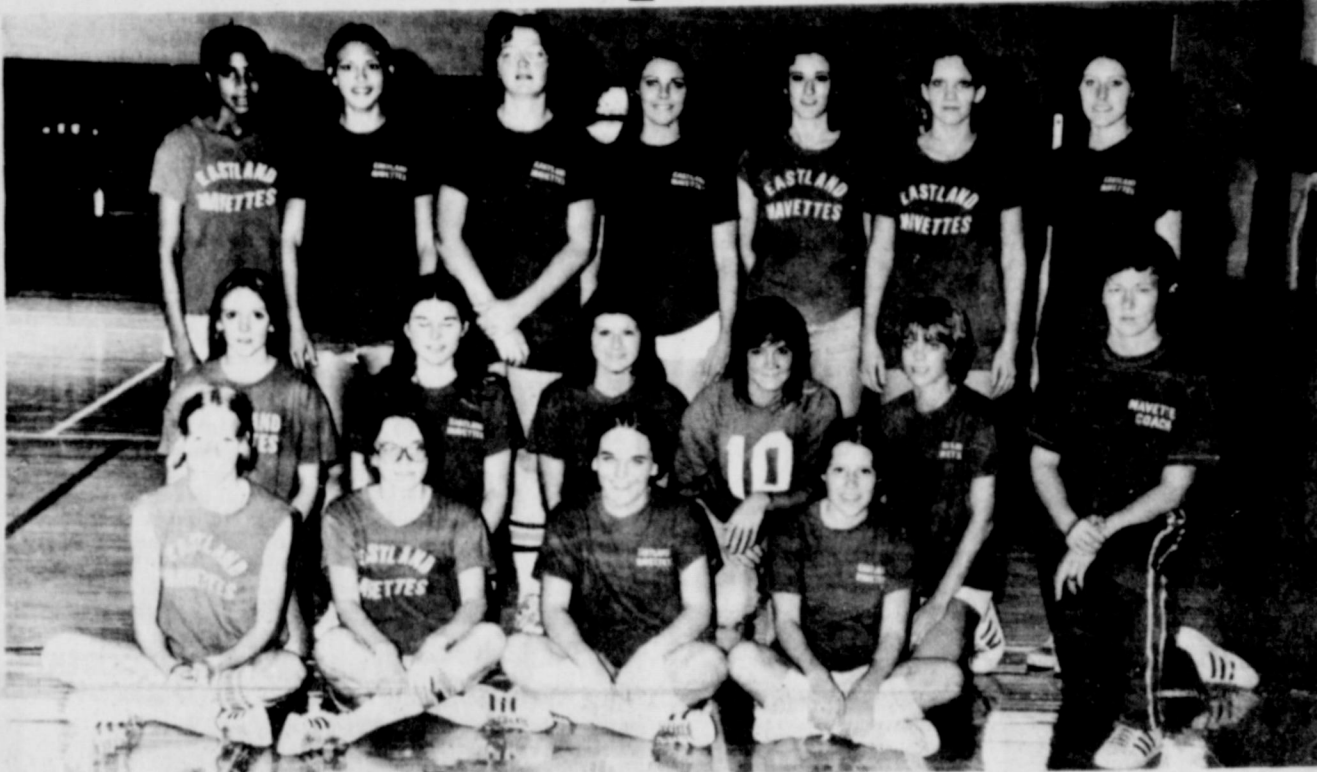

Oil News

Welcome Well Service and Boykin Brothers of Abilene will drill No. 1 Reagan Estate as a proposed 4,250 foot wildcat in Eastland County.

Location is six miles northwest of Eastland on a 120 acre lease. It spots 660 feet from the north and 1,319 feet from the east lines of Section 38, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

A well has been completed eight miles southwest of Rising Star, Brown County. In the Jett (Ellenburger) Field.

It is Southeastern Resources Corp. of Rising Star No. 1-A Kilgore, et al. spotting 1,860 feet from the north and 550 feet from the east lines of Lot 3, Juan Delgado Survey 789.

Daily potential was 35 barrels of 42 gravity oil, plus 30 barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations at 3,324-27 feet, treated with 250 gallons of 15 percent acid and fractured with 10 sacks of sand.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,367 feet, one foot off bottom.

Jackson Oil Co. of Ranger staked two locations in the Jackson (Strawn) Field 11 miles north of Ranger. Both are slated for 1,900 feet

and located on the Robert Jackson 160 acre lease.

Site for No. 7 Jackson is 200 feet from the south and 1,838 feet from the east lines of the north-half of Section 77, Block 4, T&P Survey.

No. 8 Jackson will be drilled 200 feet from the south and 728 feet from the east lines of the north half of Section 77.

W.H. Foster Jr. of Fort Worth will drill No. 1 Tucker as a proposed 3,100 foot regular field project 12 miles north of Rising Star.

Drill site is 330 feet from the

north and west lines of the southeast quarter of Section 36, Lavaca CSL Survey, A-350.

The lease is composed of 160 acres.

Laurel Energy Co. Inc., of Dallas completed No. 1 Kennedy in the regular field 1 1/2 miles southeast of Rising Star.

Location is 990 feet from the north and 1,647 feet from the west lines of Section 11, Block 3, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 52 barrels of 42 gravity oil pumping from perforations at 2,902-10 feet. The pay was treated with 2,000 gallons of acid.

Operator set the 4 1/2 inch casing at 3,500 feet, total depth.



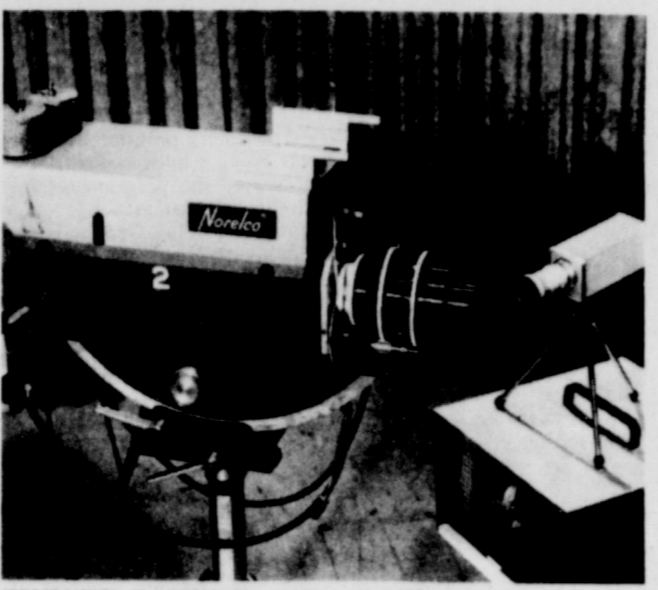

TINY TV CAMERA - - The small camera, dwarfed by its conventional cousin, is the first solid state television camera which meets the requirements for commercial use. It was developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories engineers and the miniature unit is made possible by a small image sensor, which replaces the bulky vacuum tube found in current cameras. Bell Labs, the Bell System's research and development unit, is exploring a wide range of applications for both the sensor and the camera.

Nationwide Video-telephone System Is Made Possible By Scientists

Bell Telephone scientists and engineers have unveiled a tiny solid-state television camera, which may be an important step toward a possible nationwide video-telephone system in the future.

Bell Telephone Laboratories, the research arm of the Bell System, recently developed the camera which is the first solid-state TV camera that meets requirements for commercial broadcast use.

Measuring only 2.5 x 2.5 x 6 inches, the camera is made possible by an image sensor. Bell Labs has worked in the area of video-communications for many years.

In 1964 experimental Picture phones were introduced. They enable users to see the person with whom they are speaking. Recently the service has been used in court proceedings by lawyers in New York City to present oral arguments before judges sitting in Washington, D.C., giving rise to almost limitless applications in the future.

Picture phones have not come into wide use, however, because they are relatively expensive for the average phone customer. With the development of the image sensor, that cost may be cut dramatically.

Bell representatives point out that the sensor is only one step in the development of an affordable video-telephone network, which is still years into the future.

Essentially, the sensor consists of a single chip of silicon covered with an array of electrodes. The sensors do not require the high voltage, electron beam deflection and vacuum envelope needed by conventional camera tubes, hence the cost savings.

In its continued search for better and more economical communications, Bell scientists are exploring further uses of the sensor to improve existing and future telecommunications systems.

Back in 1927, \$2 bought a resident hunting license. But the price was not the only difference between the 48 year-old license and a modern one.

Digging back in the archives, officials at the Parks and Wildlife Department came up with a 1927 hunting license and bag limits then included:

- One bear.
- Two buck deer, each must have at least three points.
- Doves, 15 in any one day, no more than 50 per week.
- Four geese per day and no more than 12 in any week.

Bag and possession limits on quail, squirrel and turkey have not changed in 48 years.

At that time it was unlawful to kill or possess antelope, mountain sheep, woodcock, wood ducks, egrets, doe deer, turkey hens, pleasant, song birds or insectivorous birds.

English sparrows, black-birds, buzzards, crows hawks, rice birds and, for some reason, rabbits also could not be hunted.

White-winged dove season was during the months of July, August and September.

Veterans Day At Lions Club

Veterans Day was marked in a special way Tuesday by members of the Eastland Lions Club who heard one of their favorite members tell of his unique World War II and Korean War experiences as a Marine.

Veteran Marine Sgt. James Reid, four years in the Pacific and two years in Korea, remembered that, like many others, he first heard of Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, when the Japanese pulled the surprise attack on the Hawaiian Islands.

His most unique experience was that exactly nine weeks later, he arrived at Pearl Harbor as a young Marine to begin pulling guard duty, after a short five-week basic training period.

He recalled that he left Dallas on a troop train on Dec. 30, arrived in San Diego soon afterwards to be issued one pair of coveralls (which he wore for five weeks with one washing) and a Springfield rifle. Basic training consisted of 4 a.m. to 10 p.m. training, seven days a week for five weeks. He was being paid \$21.00 a month.

Getting picked for guard duty at the end of basic prevented a Marine Corps liberty in San Diego, and a quick ship ride to Pearl Harbor and a last straggling Japanese plane strafed the island the day they arrived so, he went on immediate guard duty there: four hours on and eight off for what turned out to be a two-year stretch.

Reid was told by Admiral Nimitz late one night that he had better wake up or the corporal of the guard might sack him.

Even though he "knew better" he volunteered for an effort called Project Camouflage and sailed with the fleet for the Marshall Islands, getting his first introduction to Tokyo Rose and her radio propaganda.

After helping with the Marshall Island efforts he returned without scratch or harm, only to get off a bus at Treasure Island and be hit by a taxi cab. He wasn't hurt but it proved quite a homecoming.

It was here that he enjoyed his first liberty from a Marine Corps installation after three years as a Marine.

He told briefly about being recalled for the Korean "police action", and explained that the could understand young men's feelings about such as Vietnam where there was "war there" but no "war here".

Reid was given a standing ovation as he closed by remarking that "it might be gung ho, but the fact remains that he still gets chill bumps every time he hears the National Anthem."

President Ray Pryor presided and guest was Lynn Thorn. Monroe Rollins has the program next week.
