

Munsingwear Sales And Earnings Up As Is Efficiency

For the seventh consecutive year Munsingwear's sales, earnings and earnings per share have exceeded those reported for the preceding year, Don Viergever, manager of the Eastland plant, announced this week.

The Eastland plant set records in number of employees, amount of salaries paid to employees and in dozens of finished garments shipped during the past year, he said.

Efficiency of the local plant employees have resulted in the increased gross profits picture, he said. And the current year to date is also ahead of last year, he added.

Net sales in 1963 were \$51,927,564, a 4.5 per cent increase over 1962, (\$49,672,237); and net earnings of \$2,240,344 in 1963 were four per cent

greater than in 1962. Munsingwear's board of directors have declared a quarterly dividend of 30 cents per share, payable March 13, 1964 to common stockholders as of Feb. 14, 1964.

A district court at Abilene freed him from a \$10,000 peace bond in Cisco justice court following his trouble that resulted in the shooting.

Amending The City Charter May Be 'Unconstitutional'

Amending the Eastland city charter may be unconstitutional and therefore, impossible. That would appear to be the case, based on a report from the Texas Municipal League.

City Manger Lewis Tiner wrote the League, asking advice, after recent recommendations by a special city charter committee submitted its report.

Mr. Tiner asked: "We are a home-rule city. When our charter was adopted, we had more than 5,000 population; now, we have less. Can we legally amend our home-rule charter now that our population is below 5,000?"

Riley E. Fletcher, general counsel for the League, answered: "Once a city has legally adopted a charter there is no question about the fact that it remains a home rule city under its existing charter, even though its population falls below 5,000 inhabitants. In fact, it might be essential

Farewell to a Landmark -- Goodbye to a Homestead

A sight so familiar to Eastlanders that it was almost unnoticed, has suddenly become conspicuous by its absence.

The 70-year old house at 310 East Main for over 40 years, the Cornelius family home, has now been demolished.

Its boards creaky with wear, its odd, forged nails rusty with age—it was beyond repair. But it was with a degree of sadness that some saw the vanishing of a familiar landmark.

C. U. Corneliee acquired the land in 1878, but the history of the house itself, as most local old-timers recall it, dates back to its acquisition by Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Dugan, a widow who with her children, moved here from Glen Rose.

One of those children was Ava. Later, as a young lady, she was courted at the house by the late Judge Earl Conner, Sr., whom she married.

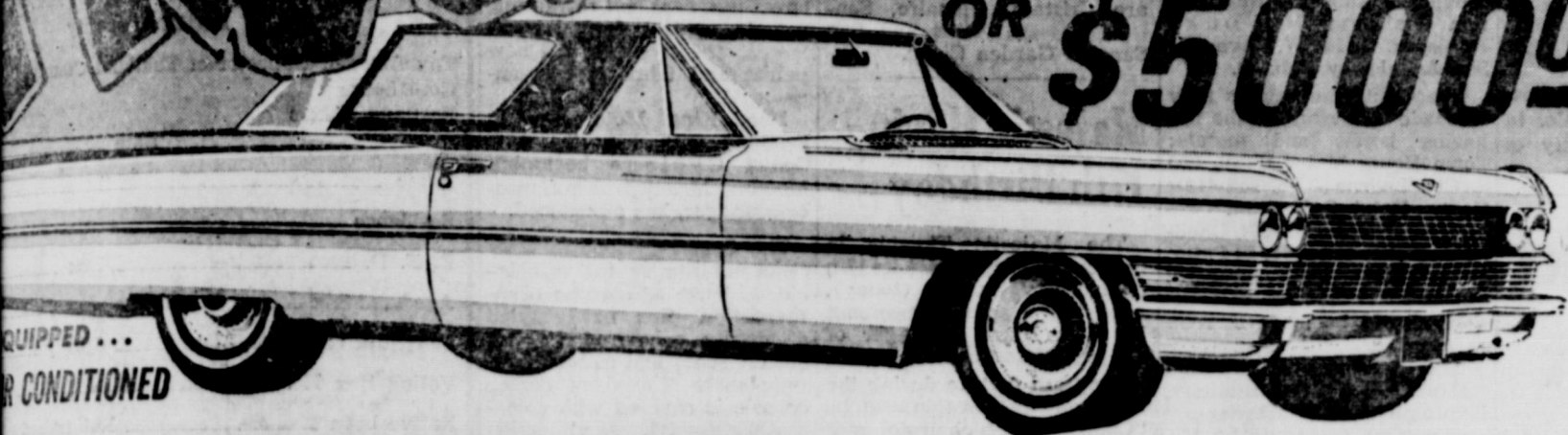

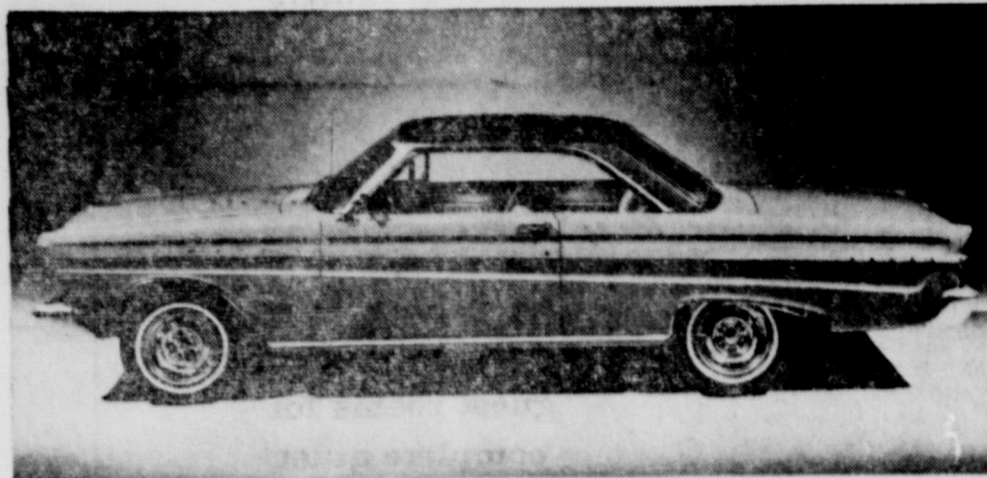

Upper Leon Conservation District Make Coastal Bermuda Report

Elaborate plans are being made for acres and acres of Coastal Bermuda planting this spring. Several local farmers plan to purchase new sprigging machinery.

The Upper Leon District has two one row machines which will be planting, and the Palo Pinto District has a two row planter which will be running in the east part of the county. In addition, some six or eight commercial contractors will be planting. There is a good possibility three to four thousand acres will be planted. Some 1,200 to 1,500 acres is scheduled to be planted under the Great Plains Program.

In all probability a like amount will be planted under the A. C. P. Program.

Much land was plowed before the January snow in preparation for planting. At present, most land is too wet for seedbed preparation which is a most welcome change from the situation a year ago. A few more days of sunshine and many tractors will be running. Coastal is becoming a popu-

lar crop in this area largely through the general trend toward grassland farming. High production costs in row crop farming is forcing farmers to turn to livestock and grazing crops. Where it is adapted Coastal Bermuda has a very high potential of production provided the management and fertilization program is adequate.

It fits our livestock operations in that it reaches its peak of production in late spring when our native grassland is on the decline in palatability and production of green forage.

It fits our conservation programs in that it furnishes first class grazing during the very period our native grasses need a rest for seed production and recovery from grazing.

In addition Coastal Bermuda is an excellent soil builder. Under proper management it furnishes complete protection of the soil from the elements and so erosion becomes only past history on coastal land. The rebuilding of land with

Coastal was recently illustrated by a series of soil tests in the Desdemona area.

These tests indicate that Coastal will more than double the organic level in our local sands in a relatively short period. The soil tests were made by the Stephen F. Austin Soil Testing Laboratory in cooperation with Desdemona farmers and a local fertilizer dealer as fertility tests for fertilization recommendations. In the analysis of some half dozen fields all showed an organic matter level of 1-10 to 2-10 of 1 percent.

One Coastal planting made in 1960 showed an organic level of 4-10 of 1 percent. An eight year old planting showed an organic level of 1 and 1-10 percent (1.1 percent).

Also of interest was one field in which common bermuda was destroyed last year and the land returned to peanuts. This field showed an organic matter level of 3-10 of 1 percent. Organic matter level is our best indication of the fertility and health of our soil.

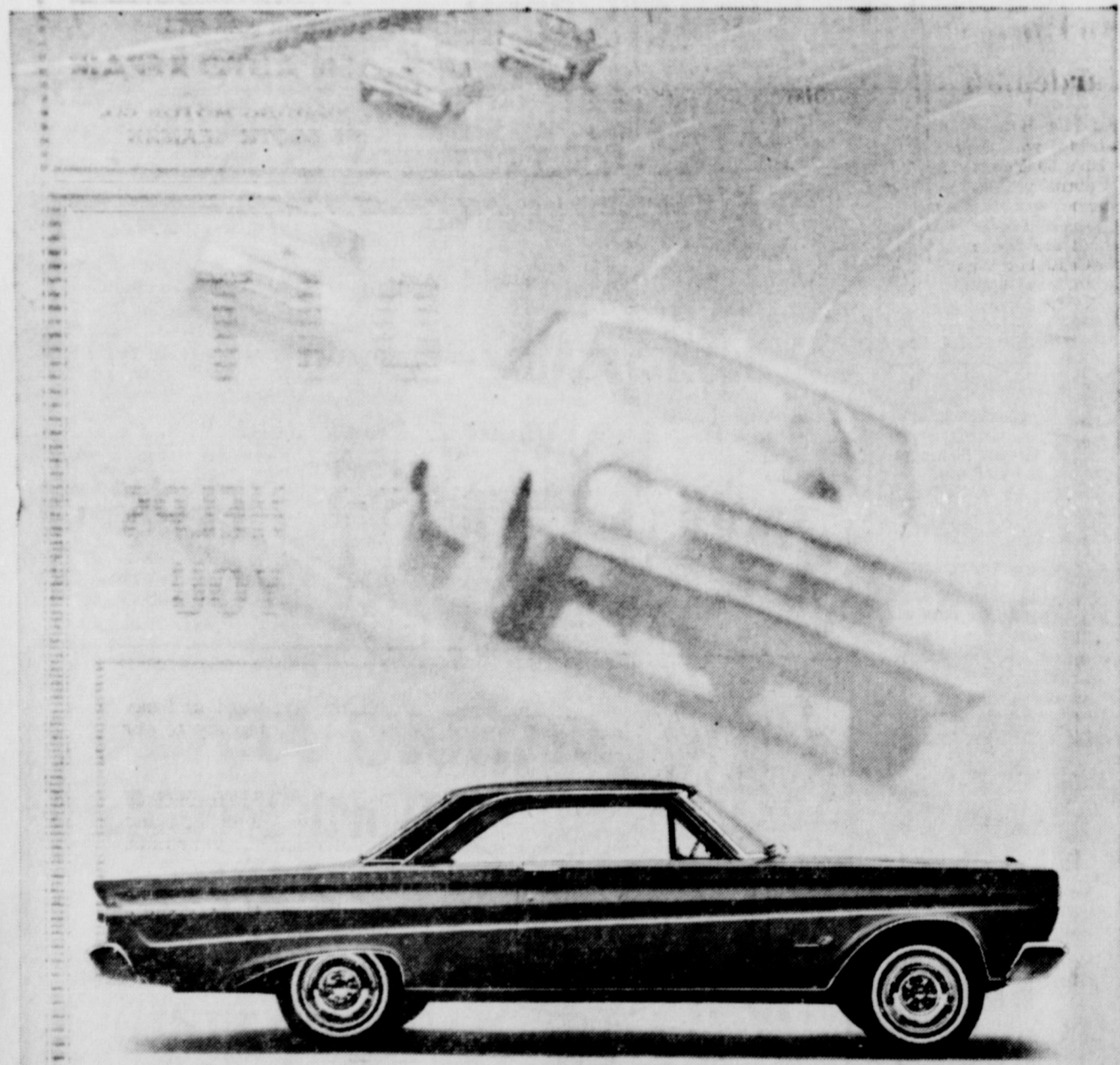

WORKMANSHIP Look for a tag or pocket stuffer that gives facts about the lining. Good quality linings are closely and firmly woven, yet supple. Pocketing should be closely woven twill cotton, heavier in the trousers than in the coat. Squeeze the coat front in your hand; it should feel soft and springy and resume shape quickly when released. Pockets should be flat and neat and reinforced at the openings. Sleeves should not pucker at the shoulder seam and should hang so that the front fold comes to the middle of the coat pocket. In trousers, look for a waist interfacing of linen, which preserves fit of the waist. The crotch of good trousers is not pieced. All seams should be

stitched with silk thread for strength and elasticity and should be generous for letting out. In striped and patterned material, check the pattern matching at back coat seam, front coat overlap, and waist pocket. Although matching doesn't improve the serviceability of the suit, it usually means quality workmanship throughout.

Look for a label or tag that tells how to care for the suit and follow it carefully.

Honey and maple sirup are two natural sweeteners that blend very well. The flavor of one enhances the other. Add a few nuts and you've got some of the best chewy candy there is.

Right now U. S. Department of Agriculture statisticians say honey supplies are at record levels. The pecan crop is more than four times that of last year, and there are large crops of walnuts, almonds and peanuts in the offing.

Only the maple sirup crop is off. You may have to pay a little more for maple sirup this year, but the quality is excellent.

Here's a home-type recipe that combines honey, maple sirup and peanuts in a delicious candy. Other nuts may be added to or substituted for the peanuts. You can even add 1 cup coconut or 1 1/2 cups puffed wheat, if you like. Be sure though, you make the candy only during the colder months. It will absorb moisture if exposed to a damp atmosphere.

PEANUT CHEWS
1/2 cup honey
3/4 cup maple sirup
1/4 teaspoon baking soda
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 cup roasted peanuts

Pour honey and maple sirup into pan and cook until the temperature reaches 252 F. (the hard ball stage). Remove from heat, add soda and cream of tartar. Mix thoroughly.

Add nuts and mix until they are coated.

Pour into buttered pan. When cold, cut into squares.

Harrell Lovelace Serving Aboard CG Cutter Salvia

Harrell P. Lovelace, chief electrician's mate, USCG, son of Tom Lovelace, Sr. of Eastland is serving aboard the Coast Guard Cutter Salvia which established the world's first nuclear powered deep-sea automatic weather station Jan. 31 in the Gulf of Mexico.

The station is called NOMAD II and is now automatically radioing air temperature, barometric pressure, surface and sub-surface temperatures, sea current, wind velocity and wind direction every three hours. A storm sensor triggers hourly transmissions during severe weather conditions.

The NOMAD system is being developed to provide frequent and accurate weather information. The station is moored to nearly three miles of nylon line and includes meteorological equipment, electronic and power supply.

that it remain in that status for the protection of bond holders, if it has any outstanding general obligation bonds. A home rule city has a maximum tax rate of \$2.50 per \$100 valuation of assessed property, while a general law city can have no higher rate than \$1.50.

However, the power to adopt new charter or to amend the old charter presents a different problem. Article 11, Section 5, Texas Constitution, provides in part:

"Cities having more than five-thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that purpose, adopt or amend their charters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature." (Emphasis added)

Calvary Baptist To Observe 10th Anniversary In March

Calvary Baptist Church will celebrate its 10th anniversary in March of this year. The church was organized on March 24, 1954 by 44 people and called Rev. Harl L. Williams as pastor. Lots were purchased shortly thereafter on North Oak Street and work was begun on a building. The building was completed in the summer of 1954 and has been improved yearly.

Rev. Williams has served the church as pastor since its organization with the exception of the period from Jan. 27, 1960 through July 15, 1962 when Rev. Floyd Osborne, was pastor. Rev. Williams was recalled to pasture the church on September 23, 1962 from Belton where he was pastor of a Baptist Church there. Rev. Williams held pastorates at Merriman Baptist Church, Ranger and in Rising Star before coming to Calvary.

Rev. Williams and his wife, Bernice, have five children four of whom are married. They live at 205 North Oak near the church.

In addition to growing in material value and numbers, the church has grown spiritually. The church has ordained three ministers, Neilton Shipman, Buck Hillin and E. D. Overstreet.

The church supports two missionaries. Mrs. Georgia Webb and Milton Martin, both missionaries to Old Mexico. Ten percent of all offering taken by the church goes di-

rectly to the mission field. Calvary Baptist Church is a part of the Bible Baptist Fellowship and the Central West Texas Fellowship, but does not work through these Fellowships either in government or mission work.

The church does not have any ordained deacons. The trustees are J. T. Berry, Roger Noble and Reece Rodgers and R. L. Kellar. Mrs. Bobby Kellar is church clerk and J. T. Berry is treasurer.

The church averages 75 in Sunday School. Jimmy Stewart is Sunday School superintendent and teachers are Roger Nobles, Intermediates; Mrs. Bernice Williams, Young Married Couples; Mrs. Olene Berry, Young People; Mrs. Bobby Kellar Juniors; Mrs. Inez Fox, Primary; and Mrs. Beulah Wilson, Beginners.

The Sunday School uses no literature except the Bible. The text is chosen at the discretion of the pastor.

The two church ordinances are Baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is held to be necessary for membership in the church, but unnecessary as a part of the salvation experience. It is done by immer-

sion in the name of the Trinity.

The Lord's Supper is administered at no set times. It is a symbol of the resurrection of the Lord and is taken because it is a command of the Lord. "Thus, both ordinances are acts of obedience and have no special powers within themselves".

Rev. Williams says, "As a Fundamental Baptist Church, we believe in the supernatural Christ, Who had a supernatural birth, Who spoke supernatural words, Who performed supernatural miracles, Who lived a supernatural life, Who died a supernatural death, Who rose in supernatural powers, Who ascended in supernatural splendor, Who intercedes as a supernatural priest, and Who will one day return in supernatural glory to establish a supernatural kingdom on the earth."

"We also believe that the fourfold platform of the church is: 1. To recognize Christ as its only Head. 2. To obey the Holy Spirit as its only Administrator. 3. To proclaim the Word as its only message. 4. To win lost souls as its only mission."
