

#### Harrell Lovelace Serving Aboard **CG** Cutter Salvia

Harrell P. Lovelace, chief electrician's mate, USCG, son of Tom Lovelace, Sr. of Eastland is serving aboard the Coast Guard Cutter Salvia which established the world's first nuclear powered deep-sea automatic weather station Jan. 31 in the Gulf of Mexico.

The station is called NO-MAD II and is now automatically radioing air temperature, barometric pressure, surface and sub-surfact temperatures, sea current, wind velocity and wind direction every three hours. A storm sensor triggers hourly transmissions during severe weather condi-

The NOMAD system is being developed to provide frequent and accurate weather information. The station is moored to nearly three miles of nylon line and includes meterorlogical equipment, elec tronic and power supply.

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

A home rule city has a maximum tax rate of \$2.50 per of Cross \$100 valuation of assessed property, while a general law city can have no higher rate than \$1.50. However, the power to adopt

"Cities having more than five-thousand (5,000) inhabitants may, by a majority vote of the qualified voters of said city, at an election held for that nurpose, adopt or amend their chaters, subject to such limitations as may be prescribed by the Legislature,

." (Emphasis added) "The power of either "a dopt or amend" a charter flows from the Constitution, and such right is conferred only on those cities "having more than five-thouseand (5,-000) inhabitants." case I have found which tou-ches on this problem is Hufstedler v. City of Lubbock 40 S. W. 2d 982 (Tex. Civ. App.

1931, no writ history.) 'The City of Lubbock had over 5,000 inhabitants when t adopted its charter in 1917 but had 4,061 when the census was taken in 1920. The C i t y had annexed or attempted to annex adjacent territory in a manner which the appellants contended was not legal. The Legislature passed a validating act which confirmed the annexation or attempted annexation of territory by home rule city which did not have

a population of 5,000 in 1920. The court held that any defects in the attempted annexa-tion were cured by the valida-ting act. This does not quite touch our problem, but it is my opinion that the power to adopt or amend a charter is conferred only by those cities which have a population in excess of 5,000 inhabitants at All the time of adoption of a new
