Party Leaders Talk At County Democrat Meet

Mrs. Boddy was one of 24 persons who served recently on the President's "Status of Women" advisory committee. She described the work of this group, and their findings for county Democrats and dignitaries gathered for a kick-off meeting at the Roof Garden of the Village Hotel in Eastland.

State Committeeman Randall Jackson of Baird introduced Mrs. Boddy and Mrs. Juliann Cowden of Alvarado, who gave advice and instructions for holding precinct and county conventions.

Eastland Man's Mother Killed In Wreck

Mrs. D. Sikes, 75, mother of E. L. Sikes of Eastland, and a native of Stephens County, was dead on arrival at Stephens Memorial Hospital in Breckenridge shortly after 6 p. m. Wednesday after the car she was driving went off Farm Road 576 and hit a culvert eight miles southeast of Breckenridge.

Her husband, a passenger in the car, was reported in fair condition in the hospital Wednesday night.

The attending physician said death was from a heart attack, but it is not known if the attack occurred before or after the accident.

The couple had just left their home and were still within sight of the house when the accident occurred.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Friday in the First Baptist Church in Breckenridge with burial in the Hart Cemetery under the direction of Melton Funeral Home.

Born Jan. 15, 1880 in Stephens County, she was Rosa Lee Fincher, before her marriage to Mr. Sikes on Jan. 15, 1904 in Stephens County. The couple farmed and ranched in the county since their marriage.

She is survived by her husband; three sons, E. L. of Eastland, W. A. and A. M. both of Breckenridge; two sisters, Mrs. Julia Vick and Mrs. Pernia Aldridge, both of Abilene; one half-sister, Mrs. Ethel Fuller of Long Beach, Calif.; six grandchildren and 11 great-grandchildren.

County School Superintendent To Be Named to Complete Year

Election Is Due For 2-Year Term

A county school superintendent will be appointed by the County Commissioners Court to serve for the remainder of this year, according to information Friday. The office became vacant last week with the recent death of H. R. (Pop) Garrett, who had held the office for about ten years.

Persons seeking election to the office have until April 6th (25 days prior to the May 2nd Democratic primary) to file. Requirements, in addition to general specifications, include certain professional qualifications, including college degrees and teaching certificates.

Abolishment Talked
There was also the possibility that an election could be called to decide if the voters want to abolish the office. A petition is being circulated, it was reported, asking that the County Judge call an election for that purpose.

The judge is required to call such an election if a petition bearing the signatures of at least 25 per cent of the

qualified voting population is presented. Estimates are that some 1,250 signatures would be necessary in this county with some 6,000 voters.) The law further provides that even if this is done, the office could not be abolished in the county until the end of the current term. Mr. Garrett's term began Jan. 1, 1963 and therefore would terminate at the end of 1966.

No Applicants
Candidates would file with the county Democratic chairman. There have been no applications for the appointment, County Judge Scott Bailey said Thursday, but his office has received several inquiries about qualifications, and other matters relative to the office.

The office of county superintendent has been abolished in several other Texas counties, and in such cases, certain of the offices responsibilities are transferred to the county judge.

The Eastland County office has in addition to the superintendent, seven staff members. They are:

Rev. Fowler, 33, is a native of Pawhuska, Okla., and attended grade school with the Osage Indians on their reservation there. A graduate of Odessa High School, he entered the ministry at the age of 17. Graduated from Howard Payne College in 1952, he attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary until 1956 when he was graduated there.

He has served as pastor of several student pastorates and the First Baptist Churches of Moran, Van and Ballinger. He conducted a preaching mission in Fairbanks, Alaska, in the fall of 1959, and participated in the Japan Baptist New Life Movement.

He is presently a member of the nominating committee of the Baptist executive board, the 1964 convention memorials committee and the convention committee to nominate members of institution boards.

Bobby said, "but actually, women are pretty well treated here, compared to that received in other states."

The Status of Women study pointed up the fact that one of the greatest problems facing America is that of school dropouts, she said.

The study had a budget of \$331,000, which seems an enormous figure she said, but realistic, in that the total represented the salaries of several staff members "loaned" to the special group for its work.

She described the work being done for the re-training and education of women for the work force. "Eight of ten women will enter the labor market at one time or the other," she said, emphasizing the need for instruction. She pointed out that junior colleges across the nation, and in this county, for this goal.

She concluded by saying that women's role in politics is "vital". In view of the staggering tax load, she said, "I urge every woman, particularly mothers, to get to know their political leaders from the brass roots up, and to become active in politics themselves."

A telegram of congratulations from National Democratic Chairman Paul Butler was read to the audience at the conclusion of the meeting.

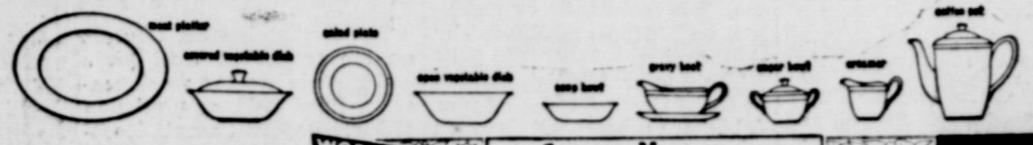

Bethel Baptist Began As Mission In 1954

The Bethel Baptist Church, on the corner of West Main and College streets, was opened in June, 1954, as a mission of First Baptist Church, Eastland.

Rev. Horace Buddin, a missionary on leave from Brazil, served as interim pastor until June, 1955, when Rev. James Flaming was called as pastor. A graduate of Hardin-Simmons University, Rev. Flaming attended the Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth while serving as pastor. Dr. Flaming is now serving as pastor of a Dallas church.

Other former pastors are Rev. David Cooper, now of Arcadia, Louisiana, and Rev. James Roberts, now of Memphis, Tennessee. The present pastor is Rev. H. B. Terry, Jr. He lives with his wife and son Homer at 710 West Patterson. His home phone number is MA 9-1639; his office phone number is MA 9-1052.

Rev. Terry says, "It is my sincere desire to be of help to the people of Eastland. I urge anyone to call me at any time or come by my home or the church. My wife and I are always ready to serve anyway we can."

Rev. Terry is a graduate of Hardin-Simmons University and has attended Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary.

Before coming to Eastland, he served churches in Aspermont, Denton Valley, and Tuscola. Both he and his wife, the former Faye Tarrant, are natives of Clyde.

The mission of First Baptist Church was organized as an independent church in May, 1956. There are now 210 resident members.

The main building was erected by the members during the months of May through November, 1957.

It was dedicated the week of Nov. 17-24, 1957.

The new educational building was dedicated June 5, 1960.

Bethel Baptist is affiliated with the Texas Baptist Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. The missionary activities of the church are carried on through the Foreign and Home Mission Boards of the Southern Baptist Convention. Each church in the convention contributes as it feels led and is able. Bethel Baptist sends a percentage of its budget to the mission boards. In addition, the church participates in the Annie Armstrong, Marh Hill Davis, and Lottie Moon mission offerings.

The church is governed completely by democratic rule; that is, the church members vote on all business conducted by the church. The deacons are the servants of the church. Each deacon is elected by the membership and is ordained by the church. The deacons are Tom Clark, chairman, Gene Falk, secretary, Duice Weems, Truett Gregory, Luce Pittman, Wade Coan, L. A. Bennett, Marcus O'Dell, Jess Cavanaugh, J. C. Allison, Delbert Hagar, Lawrence Woods, H. J. Lane, W. L. Sullivan and J. A. May.

Trustees are Tom Clark, J. C. Allison, and Gene Falk. Other church officers are L. A. Bennett, treasurer; Mrs. Marcus O'Dell, church clerk; J. L. Pittman, song leader; and Homer Terry, organist.

The Sunday School is graded according to age, with classes for adults as well as for children. The lessons are based upon the Bible and taught with guiding literature published by the Baptist Sunday School Board.

The Sunday School department conducts a Vacation Bible School each summer for children through 16 years of age. The Sunday School is under the leadership of L. C. Brown, superintendent.

Baptist Training Union is based upon the Biblical admonition to "Study to show thyself approved, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed." Its general officers are Kenneth Watson, director; Wade Coan associate director; Mrs. David Weems, secretary; Departmental directors are Jess Cavanaugh, adult; H. J. Woolsey, Intermediate and Young People; David Weems, Junior; Mrs. J. L. Moon, Primary; and Mrs. H. J. Woolsey, Beginner.

Mrs. A. W. Hennessee is hired by the church to keep the nursery during all educational and worship services.

The church observes two ordinances, baptism and the Lord's Supper. Baptism is administered in the name of the Trinity by immersion only and only after a public confession of faith by the individual. The church believes that baptism is an act of obedience after salvation, but that it has no actual part in the salvation experience. Bethel Baptist does not recognize the baptism of any other denomination for membership purposes.

The Lord's Supper is given by the deacons, under the direction of the pastor, as the members sit in the pews. It is held in "remembrance of our Lord and the sacrifice He made". Both baptism and the Lord's Supper are symbols of paramount importance and are more than symbols only in the sense that through them each Christian has a dynamic encounter with Jesus Christ. Neither ordinance can, in and of itself, bring Christ into a life.

The church feels that Christianity is not primarily a religion, set of ethics, doctrine or creed. Christianity is a person, Jesus Christ. Christianity rises or falls not upon the infallibility of the church, the ministry or even the Bible. It completely stands or falls upon the person and work of Christ. The unique element that sets Christianity above other religions is a risen Christ. As a local church, Bethel Baptist is part of the greater church, "The Body of Christ".

Rev. Terry says, "The aim of this church is to serve and witness in this community as the Lord commanded us to do in the great commission found in Matthew 28:1-20. Our purpose is to win men to Christ and help them grow into Christian maturity."

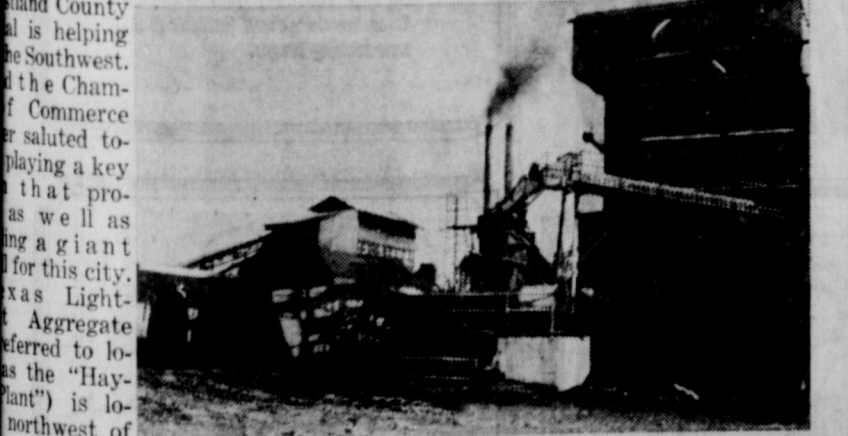

The aggregate and help from engineers testing the shale, found in large
quantities in the county, played an important part in the plant's begin-
nings. Purchased in 1952 by the then-new Texas Industries, it was in fact,

Haydite was primarily used for the building block industry but today
90 percent of production goes into modern multi-story buildings as light-
weight concrete aggregate, making new designs possible through weight
reduction and additional strength. When Eastlanders see these giant
structures they can take pride in knowing that chances are good that
they are the product of their construction passed through "their" own town, was
produced at "their" local plant, and shipped to the site. Shale is being
quarried now from a quarry south of Eastland, located on Mrs. Blanche
Harris place.
Haydite is made by heating shale or certain types of clay to more than
2000 degrees. This causes the raw material to expand similar to pop
corn. The result is a clinker containing millions of non-connecting cells
which are retained after cooling and processing. It is light in weight, yet
retains structural strength when used as aggregate (the mix such as
gravel or rock) in concrete.
The modern, compact plant runs around the clock, with 14 area men
employed.
