(Continued from Page 1) Boddy said, "but actually, women are pretty well treated here, compared to that received in other states."

The Status of Women study pointed up the fact that one of the greatest problems facing America is that of school dropouts, she said.

The study had a budget of \$331,000, which seems an enormous figure she said, but realistic, in that the total represented the salaries of several staff members "loaned" to the special group for its work.

She described the work be ing done for the re-training and education of women for the work force. "Eight of ten women will enter the labor market at one time or the other," she said, emphasizing the need for instruction. She payed particular note to the work being done by junior colleges across the nation, and

She concluded by saying that women's role in politics is "vital". In view of the staggering tax lord, she said, "I urge every women, particularly mothers, to get to know their political leaders from the brass roots up, and to become active in politics themselves.'

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


