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

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

most difficult insects to control on plants. In fact, they are often not recognized as an insect problem. Every year there are many euonymus plants and fruit trees killed in Eastland County by the scale

The scale are small insects that attch themselves to stems. leaves, and fruit. They suck sap from the plants while covered with a shell or armor. Most of them lay eggs that hatch into active crawlers. These crawlers are spread by birds and other animals. The scale insects are inconspicuous and usually go unnoticed until the plant is severely damaged.

the season to apply dormant oils for controlling some of the hard-to-kill insect pests on trees

and shrubs. Dormant oils are specially refined petroleum oils that contain emulsifying agents

which allow mixing with water. They are effective for controlling pests such as scale insects. mites, pecan phylloxera, insect eggs and hibernating caterpillars. These oils kill the egg as well as immature and adult stages of insects and mites by enveloping them in a continufilm of oil. thereby smothering and ultimately killing them.

Dormant oils have several advantages over most other insecticides, such as being less expensive, giving good covering action, leaving residues on fruit and nut trees that are exempt from tolerance, and being safe to handle. However, oils are toxic to leaves, have low toxicity to some insects, and are relatively unstable in water solutions.

A dormant oil can be used on any trees and shrubs that are in the dormant stage. However, better insect control will be obtained if used in late winter or early spring just before new plant growth begins. Apply the oil when temperatures are between 40 and 65 degrees F. Do not make an application if freezing weather is expected

within 48 hours after treatment. When mixing and applying dormant oils, use only the amount recommended by the manufacturer. Some trees tolerant to normal application rates of oil may be damaged if excessive amounts are used. Even normal applications of oil have been noted to damage beech, sugar and Japanese maple, walnut, butternut and some spruces. Cover tree trunks and limbs thoroughly with the spray but avoid excessive application of the oils.

When the men of the squadron lined up for inspection it was announced that a lady named Grandma Morris had asked the Army for permission to go up in o' them there airyplanes", and that one of the flyers was going to oblige. The crowd cheered this act of

courtesy. When Grandma, using a cane, walked slowly onto the air - field on the arm of a soldier, she created a sensation. A long black silk dress covered her spare frame, and a large poke bonnet shaded her face. She proceeded to the plane, and the soldier helped her aboard. The pilot helped her adjust and fasten her seat

belt, then went to the nose of the plane and began swinging the propeller. On the first two swings, the motor coughed; but on the third try it caught, as the pilot slipped and fell flat on his


The motor roared into action, and so did the plane. It sped down the field with Granny yelling and clutching everything in the cockpit. The crowd gasped in horror as the runaway plane swung around in a ground loop and headed straight for a row of trees at the edge of the field. By this time the wheels were off the ground, and the plane went into a steep climb that just cleared the trees. Men gasped and women hid their eyes in anticipation of a fatal crash.

Erratically the plane wobbled and circled the field, with Grandma Morris putting up a fight at the controls. Eventually the criaft miraculously leveled off, then went into a long gliding descent. It touched down, careened across the field and stopped. Neither the plane nor its unwilling pilot seemed the worse for the experience.

Soldiers dashed to help the old lady out; but with a wave of her hand she climbed lightly out of the cockpit, waved to the crowd, then hurried to the cover of a hangar. She seemed to have regained the vigor of

her youth. The crowd cheered. It was some time later that the people found out who Grandma Morris really was. 





Human Lice Back

The human louse, which seemingly almost disappeared from the scene since it plagued soldiers during World War II, is staging a comeback.

Some estimates say there has been about a 500 percent increase in infestation by lice in the past three years.

Three types of lice, small grayish-white insects 1/16 to 1/8 inch in length, infest human eings: head lice, crab lice and body lice. You can get lice from intimate contact with anyone who is infested with them or from contact with the personal possessions of an infested

Head lice are most often found in the hair behind the ears and on the back of the neck. They cause an almost intolerable itching. You can catch them from a hat, wig or curlers that have been worn by an infested person, by using his comb, brush or towel or if infested items come in contact with other

Crab lice are most commonly found in the genital region and are generally spread by sexual

contact, although it is possible to pick them up from toilet seats, shared bedding and clothing. This type of louse is sometimes found on the evebrows, beard, moustache and in the armpits. Crab lice, too. cause itching and, in addition, leave characteristic blue spots

on skin they have bitten. Body lice are less common and are the only type of this parasite which can be a disease carrier -of typhus, for example. The nits usually attach themselves to the fibers within the seams of clothing, and the itchy bite marks of the louse are often found where clothing comes in contact with the body -- for example, in the armpits and on the waistline.

You can rid vourself of lice effectively with a number of reliable products available. some requiring a doctor's prescription and others available at your drugstore without prescription.

Here are some pointers:

Once the presence of lice has been discovered, all contacts (family members, schoolmates, campmates, etc.) should be

Regular showering and bathing will not necessarily get rid

You must get rid of all the nits as well as the lice; most medication will accomplish

Dry heat, steam or pressing with ahot iron will destroy lice since they can live only a few minutes at 120 degrees Fahren-

Check with your doctor. The insecticide indicated for your condition may be one requiring a prescription.

Whatever preparation you use, follow directions carefully. Treat your body or hair with liquid preparations; clothing and hats with a louse powder or

aerosol spray. Wash your bedding in hot water. You can use a special insecticide in the water.

Remove the dead nits from your hair by washing in a solution of half-water, half-winegar and then combing with a very fine tooth comb.

Treating a home with insecticides will not destroy lice since the pests do not hide in crevices and cracks like cockroaches. However infested beds and other furniture can be treated. Using canine flea collars on humans may kill a few lice, but the collars ittitate and inflame

Although lice are rarely a serious health problem, they are certainly a troublesome one.

Lice are parasites that spend their entire lives on the body of their host. They suck blood for food and often stay close to the body for warmth. If they are once detached from the body and are unfed for ten days, they will die. All are hatched from eggs (nits) which are attached by a sticky substance to the hair or to the fibers of clothing.


