Stacy Blair To Play In Recital Thursday

Stacy Blair, a 1973 graduate of Eastland High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Bob Blair

of 602 S. Daugherty, in Eastland, will play four musical instruments in his

junior recital Thursday, January 29, at Hardin - Simmons University.

Blair, who is legally blind, will play the B - flat trumpet, the C trumpet, the D trumpet and the piccolo trumpet. The program compositions include "Trumpet Concerto in E Major" by Johann Nepomuk Hummel, "Concerto for Trumpet" by Alexandre Aroutounian, "Concerto in D" by Giuseppe Torelli, and "Concerto in A Flat Major" by Antonio Vivaldi.

He will be accompanied by Laurene Peterson, junior from Houston.

Blair is from the studio of Bill Owens, assistant professor in brass and music education. The recital is presented in partial fulfillment of the bachelor of music degree with a major in applied music.

Blair is a member of the Cowboy Band and Celebration Singers, a volunteer student choir. He has attended the National Music Camp at Interlochen, Michigan, for two summers and plans to attend this summer. He plans to do graduate work at the University of Louisville and Eastman School of Music.

Blair recently performed for 5,000 college students and young adults at "Freedom 76", a Southern Baptist Convention Conference held in San Antonio.

Blair said that the difficulty in the recital lies not entirely on the literature that is being performed but on the four different trumpets that are being used.

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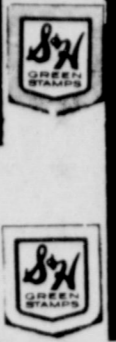

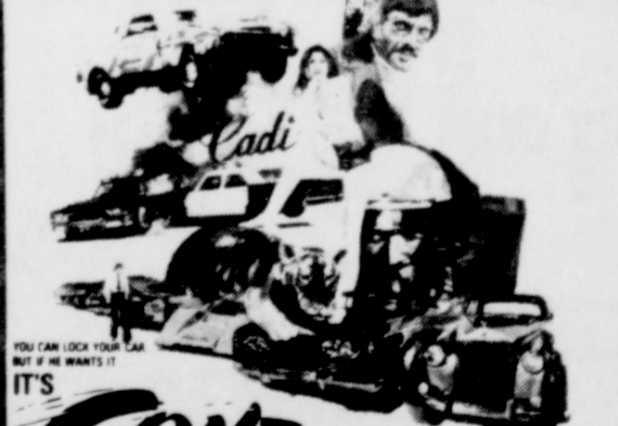

Scale insects are some of the most difficult insects to control on plants. In fact, they are often not recognized as an insect problem. Every year there are many eunymus plants and fruit trees killed in Eastland County by the scale insects.

The scale are small insects that attach themselves to stems, leaves, and fruit. They suck sap from the plants while covered with a shell or armor. Most of them lay eggs that hatch into active crawlers. These crawlers are spread by birds and other animals. The scale insects are inconspicuous and usually go unnoticed until the plant is severely damaged.

Religious Diorama Scheduled To Open Easter

A great tourist attraction and a moving religious experience is about to be completed in Eastland County. The Kendrick family has announced the completion of a New Testament diorama by Easter of this year at the Kendrick Amphitheater on Highway 80 between Cisco and Eastland.

Diorama is not the best description for the life size scenes of Christ's life and death. The scenes are not hidden behind glass, nor are they on a raised platform - they are at ground level where

spectators can become one with the scene. Narration is planned to come from the scene itself to further the sense of being during the time of Jesus. As Mr. Kendrick said, "We want people to feel that they are a part of the scene; not merely spectators. We feel this will bring the Bible to life for many people."

The New Testament scenes are the highlights of Jesus' life. Among the scenes are the Babe in the manger, Jesus in the Temple, the baptism at the River Jordan, the Sermon on

the Mount, the Lord's Supper, the trial, and the crucifixion.

The Kendricks plan to emphasize the choice between good and evil through the last two scenes, which will be the burning pits of Hell and a scene representing Heaven. Mr. and Mrs. J.H. Kendrick, and their son Phil, feel that people will be ready to make a decision about Jesus and their life after completing the tour.

The diorama is the result of four years of hard work by the Kendricks and their friends. It is housed in a beautiful building, formerly a chicken house. Joined to the New Testament diorama by a large and lovely lobby is a second wing where major scenes from the Old Testament will eventually be on display.

The Kendricks have made the rocks, river, and trees themselves. Mannequins will be used to represent people in the scenes. Mrs. Kendrick made the clothing in which the mannequins will be dressed.

Just as the Easter pageant, which the Kendricks present each year, is for all Christian faiths, so the dioramas of the New and Old Testament are for everyone. In order to help finance the building of the Old Testament diorama, a slight fee will be charged for the tour of the New Testament diorama. At present, tours are planned for each hour between 10 a.m. and 5 p.m.

The Kendricks are an unselfish and dedicated family who have spent enormous amounts of time and money in order to share their belief in Jesus and the Lord. Illustrating this dedication is a statement by Mr. Kendrick, "We did not build this for ourselves, or to make money. We built it for Eastland County, the State of Texas, and the United States. We believe it is unique in the U.S. With the help of the people of Eastland County, we can make the Easter pageant and diorama a big tourist attraction. And that would be good for everyone in Eastland County. This (referring to the buildings and grounds) will never be sold. At our death, it will go to an organization which we know will carry on with the work for which it was built."

January 23 - 30, 1876

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Americana

Charles Crowder
You probably remember him from the Homecoming of 1975. He began professional writing career in 1924, while still in Eastland High School, by writing a general interest column entitled "Charlie's Corner", for the Oil Belt News. After finishing high school, entered journalism classes at University of Southern California. Wrote articles for The Daily Trojan and scenarios for United Artists Studios. Had a long seagoing career, during which time news and travel articles were written for the Los Angeles Examiner and other newspapers. Wrote, produced, and starred in radio shows for many years. During World War II,

returned to the sea as deck officer, but also had time to serve as special correspondent. After the war, returned to radio and then to television as writer and producer. In 1955, began teaching social studies and gerontology for the Adult School Division of the Los Angeles City School System and continued to the present time. Am a member of the Gerontology Department of the L.A. School System. Have teaching credential for World Geography and Travel, World History, World Affairs, Contemporary American Problems, Gerontology, Navigation, Seamanship, Boat Handling, and Art. Wrote course outlines for World Geography, World

History, and Contemporary American Problems. Wrote social studies textbook, AFRICA, which is being used in secondary schools throughout the U.S. and in some foreign countries. Taught course in Anthropology at Everywomen's Village College in Van Nuys, California. Have traveled in, photographed, and written about almost all the countries of the world, as well as all our states. Have been writing my "Crowder's Corner" column for the Chicago Tribune's Van Nuys (Calif.) News and other papers for over 20 years. Have recently developed a new column, "Americana", devoted to the Bicentennial and to our national heritage, which is now running in several newspapers. Roy Coming Back

Roy Rogers, "King of the Cowboys" blazed across the silver screens of the Connellee, the Lyric and the Majestic theaters in Eastland through 89 epics, bringing thrills, excitement and perhaps some fluttering hearts to fans, young and not - so - young. His 90th, "Mackintosh and T.J." will flash on the Majestic Theater screen beginning Feb. 6, for five big days. Local Manager Ross Morgan has announced. The film was made in North Texas and will have its world premiere in Lubbock just one day earlier, on Feb. 5. Mr. Morgan has scored a booking triumph in bringing the brand new film to Eastland just one day past the world opening. (It will not be seen in the Dallas area until April.) Opening here Friday, Feb. 6, the film will run Saturday, Sunday, Monday and Tuesday, with matinees scheduled for both Saturday and Sunday, Mr. Morgan said. Roy Rogers, one of the most popular western stars in motion picture history, returns to the screen after a 20 year absence. As Mackintosh, a down - at - the - heels bronc buster, drifting through the modern West Texas panhandle, seeking work, he creates a far different character from the singing cowboy roles of his early career. Also starred is Clay O'Brien, a 14 year - old veteran of "The Cowboys" and "The Apple Dumpling Gang", as T.J., a tow - headed "stray" who reluctantly teams with Rogers. Together, they find refuge at the 6666 Ranch, tangling with wild horses, rabid coyotes and a more dangerous breed of two - legged adversary. Produced by Tim Penland and directed by Marvin Chomsky from a Paul Savage screenplay, Mackintosh and T.J. was filmed on location at the real 6666 Ranch, one of the most famous "spreads" in the West Texas cow country. For nearly two months, the sprawling ranch, 92 miles east of Lubbock, was converted into a make - shift movie studio, with ranchers and their families serving as extras and thousands of head of prize cattle providing an authentic backdrop. Other stars include "Emmy" and "Obie" award winner Joan Hackett as the victimized wife of a hard - drinking rancher; Bi Billy Green Bush as her husband; and Andrew Robinson (recalled as the psychopath in "Dirty Harry") as a windmill leading a menacing double life. Rodeo fans will also recognize six - time bronc - busting champion Larry Mahan in the cameo role of Dan Thompson. But it is Rogers, the "King of the Cowboys" and number one money maker in westerns from 1943 through 1954, who dominates the film. His last previous movie was "Son of Paleface" co - starring Bob Hope, a after which he limited himself to television, personal appearances and far - flung business interests and charities, conducted from his Apple Valley, California, Ranch. While Rogers doesn't sing in "Mackintosh and T.J." (It would be completely out of character", Penland explained), the film's theme is sung by Waylon Jennings. Recently voted the top country - western balladeer in America today, Jennings asked for the assignment after pre - screening "Mackintosh and T.J." and meeting boyhood idol Rogers for the first time.

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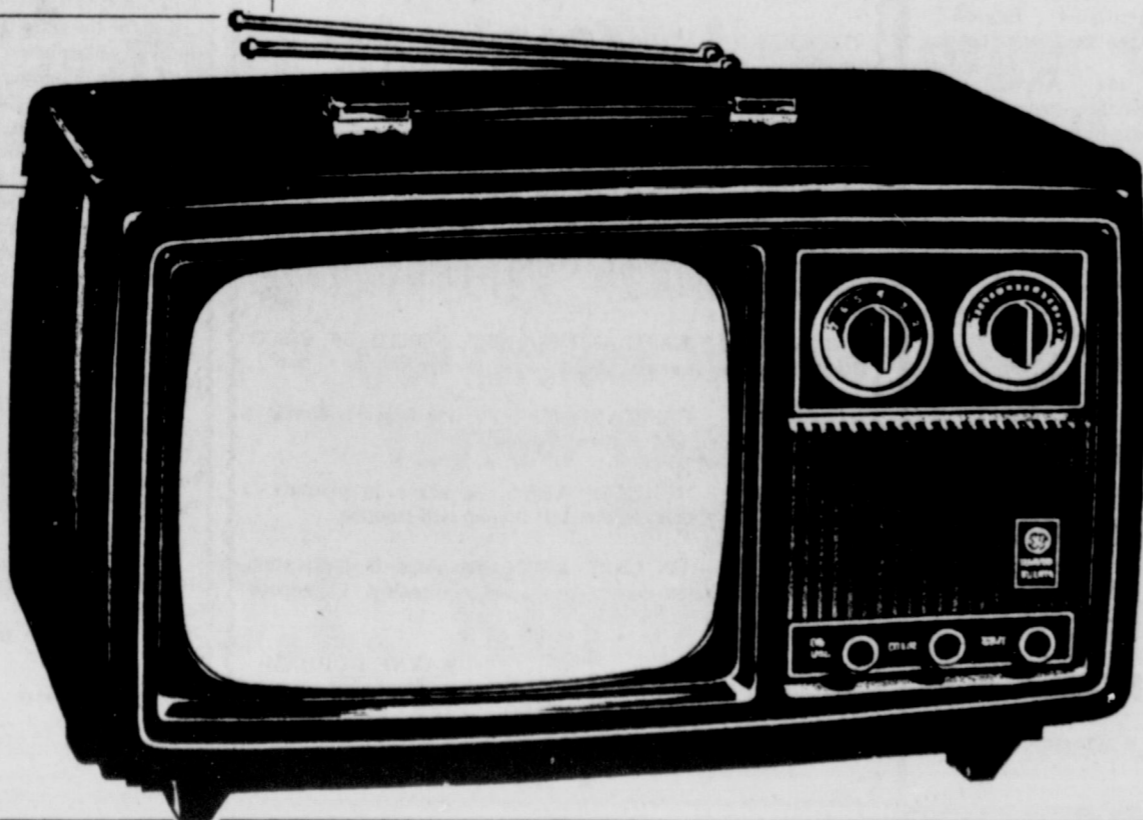

Farm News

Eastland County Farm Bureau was represented at the second annual Texas Farm Bureau Commodity Conference in Austin Jan. 20-21 by C.M. Guthery, President of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Those attending the conference met with key agriculture leaders to discuss commodity information, tools, and available assistance for producer-members. The conference featured talks by recognized authorities in private industry, government and agriculture. Main purpose of the meeting was to bring the latest information relating to the four commodities to the county farm leaders. The local commodity chairmen also reviewed current FB policies and made recommendations to the TFB Board of Directors on implementing those policies.

Human Lice Back

The human louse, which seemingly almost disappeared from the scene since it plagued soldiers during World War II, is staging a comeback.

Some estimates say there has been about a 500 percent increase in infestation by lice in the past three years.

Three types of lice, small grayish-white insects 1/16 to 1/8 inch in length, infest human beings: head lice, crab lice and body lice. You can get lice from intimate contact with anyone who is infested with them or from contact with the personal possessions of an infested person.

Head lice are most often found in the hair behind the ears and on the back of the neck. They cause an almost intolerable itching. You can catch them from a hat, wig or curlers that have been worn by an infested person, by using his comb, brush or towel or if infested items come in contact with other items.

Crab lice are most commonly found in the genital region and are generally spread by sexual

contact, although it is possible to pick them up from toilet seats, shared bedding and clothing. This type of louse is sometimes found on the eyebrows, beard, moustache and in the armpits. Crab lice, too, cause itching and, in addition, leave characteristic blue spots on skin they have bitten.

Body lice are less common and are the only type of this parasite which can be a disease carrier -- of typhus, for example. The nits usually attach themselves to the fibers within the seams of clothing, and the itchy bite marks of the louse are often found where clothing comes in contact with the body -- for example, in the armpits and on the waistline.

You can rid yourself of lice effectively with a number of reliable products available, some requiring a doctor's prescription and others available at your drugstore without prescription.

Here are some pointers: Once the presence of lice has been discovered, all contacts (family members, schoolmates, campmates, etc.) should be examined.

Regular showering and bathing will not necessarily get rid of lice. You must get rid of all the nits as well as the lice; most medication will accomplish both.

Dry heat, steam or pressing with a hot iron will destroy lice since they can live only a few minutes at 120 degrees Fahrenheit.

Check with your doctor. The insecticide indicated for your

condition may be one requiring a prescription.

Whatever preparation you use, follow directions carefully. Treat your body or hair with liquid preparations; clothing and hats with a louse powder or aerosol spray.

Wash your bedding in hot water. You can use a special insecticide in the water. Remove the dead nits from your hair by washing in a solution of half-water, half-winegar and then combing with a very fine tooth comb.

Treating a home with insecticides will not destroy lice since the pests do not hide in crevices and cracks like cockroaches. However infested beds and other furniture can be treated. Using canine flea collars on humans may kill a few lice, but the collars irritate and inflame human skin.

Although lice are rarely a serious health problem, they are certainly a troublesome one.

Lice are parasites that spend their entire lives on the body of their host. They suck blood for food and often stay close to the body for warmth. If they are once detached from the body and are unfed for ten days, they will die. All are hatched from eggs (nits) which are attached by a sticky substance to the hair or to the fibers of clothing.

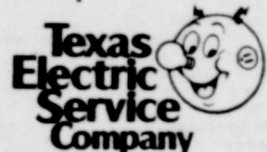

Keep valuable stamp, jewelry and coin collections in a safety deposit box rather than at home.
Trim any shrubbery around entrances so that it cannot provide a protective screen for burglars.
Make sure all locks on doors and windows are in working order.
Keep vehicles parked in your driveway locked.
