5th Jan Herring Art Exhibit March 22 Through April 2

The fifth annual exhibit featuring the paintings of distinguished artist - author, Jan Herring, will be displayed in the lobby and conference room of the Eastland National Bank March 22, 1976 through April 2, 1976, and the public is extended a cordial invitation to visit during regular banking hours.

This exhibit is again being scheduled in conjunction with Mrs. Herring's popular two-week Art Workshop being held in Eastland. The regular classes for the workshop are already filled to capacity, but there are a few classes still available for the afternoon lecture - demonstrations. These lectures will feature "Composition Still Life", on March 22nd, "Floral" on March 23rd and 24th, "Landscape", March 25th; "Snow Scene", March 26th, "Portraits", March 29th and 30th, and "Figure Painting" March 31st and April 1st. Tuition for these classes is \$5.00 per lecture of \$35.00 for the two weeks, and anyone interested should contact Mrs. Austin McCloud at 629 - 1598 to secure the necessary reservations.

In addition to the regular exhibit this year, there will be included a small selection of lithographs of Mrs. Herring's original paintings, which she has had reproduced by master craftsmen under her personal supervision. Each lithograph has been inspected, numbered and signed by the artist.

Born in Montana, Jan Herring now lives in a one-hundred-year-old house in Clint, Texas. In private life she is Mrs. Henry Herring, married to a dairy farmer and the mother of three children. Her time is divided between these responsibilities, painting and teaching. Mrs. Herring received her education at Northern State Teachers' College in South Dakota, the University of Texas at El Paso, and Special Studies with Frederic Taubes. She is Associate Teacher with Frederic Taubes, Artist-in-residence at the El Paso Museum of Art, presents Art Workshops throughout the Southwest, lectures extensively throughout this area, teaches annually during summers in Clouderoft, New Mexico, and teaches in her home studio in Clint.

Among the major awards and recognitions Mrs. Herring has received are included the following: American Artists' Gold Medal; New York City Center prize for oils; New York Allied Artists Heydenrick Award; El Paso Sun Carnival, first, oils; Nomination, Ford Foundation Grant; Roswell Museum, sculpture; Member, Board of Election, Ford Foundation; New York

Knickerbocker Exhibition; New York Allied Artists, Grumbacher Award; New York, One Man Show Award, Burr Galleries; Fort Worth Art Center, Purchase Show, and International Designer Craftsmen, El Paso.

Included in Mrs. Herring's two hundred ten one-man shows have been: New York Burr Galleries; New York Petite Gallery; Tulsa Art Center; University of Idaho; Sand Hills Museum; El Paso Museum of Art; Fort Worth Art Center; University of New Mexico; Lubbock Museum; Roswell Museum; Brigham Young University, and the Santa Fe Art Museum.

The artist has public collections in the Grumbacher Collection, New York; Lubbock Art Center, Lubbock, Texas; Roswell Art Museum, Roswell, N.M.; Lubbock Art Museum, Lubbock, Texas; First National Bank Building, Lamesa, Texas, and the University of Idaho, Pocatello, Idaho.

Mrs. Herring has been featured in reviews and reproductions of her art have appeared in such periodicals as Art News; American Artist; La revue moderne; House Beautiful; House and Garden; International Platform Association, and Who's Who in American Art.

As a painter, sculptor, enamelist, teacher and author, Jan Herring is totally engaged in art. While living in a way she finds deeply fulfilling, she is also bringing pleasure to many others - to art lovers who own her paintings, or enjoy them in galleries and museums all over the country and to hundreds of students, many of whom have found in her dedicated teaching a key to the effective use of their own talents.

In extending to the public an invitation to the exhibit, a bank spokesman stated, "We eagerly anticipate Mrs. Herring's visit each spring, and consider it a privilege to present to art lovers of Eastland County and area this outstanding display of paintings created by one who is considered by many to be one of the best qualified art instructors in the United States today."

It's That Time Of Year For Lawns

COLLEGE STATION--About this time of the year home lawns need a boost to get them in shape for the spring season just around the corner.

A turfgrass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service suggests three operations that can get a lawn off to a good start--scalping, fertilizing and applying a weed killer. "Scalping a lawn in late winter serves to revitalize it and promote spring and summer plant growth," points out Dr. Richard Duble.

"Begin the operation by lowering the blade of your lawnmower one-half inch below the normal setting. Then mow the lawn in two directions that are at right angles to each other. Remove the clippings after each mowing."

Duble also recommends keeping the lawnmower blade lowered until mid-summer.

"After scalping the lawn, apply a complete fertilizer (one containing nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium) to promote leaf and root growth," advises the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Use one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. This is equal to 12 pounds of an 8-8-8 fertilizer or 8 pounds of a 12-4-8 fertilizer. Repeat the application in the fall."

For a dark green lawn, Duble suggests applying nitrogen every 60 days at the rate of one pound to 1,000 square feet. Monthly applications of iron chelate or iron sulfate during the spring and summer promote a healthy color in St. Augustine grass lawns.

"Proper maintenance is essential for a healthy lawn, and these practices will give new life to a dormant, weedy lawn," notes Duble.

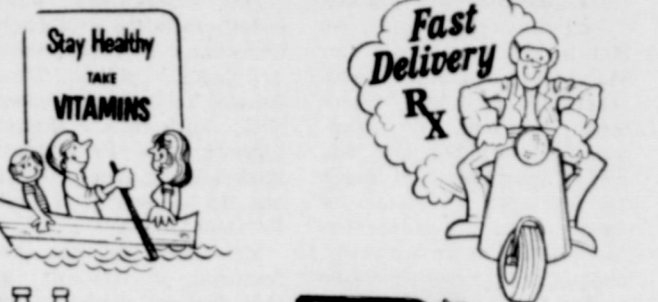

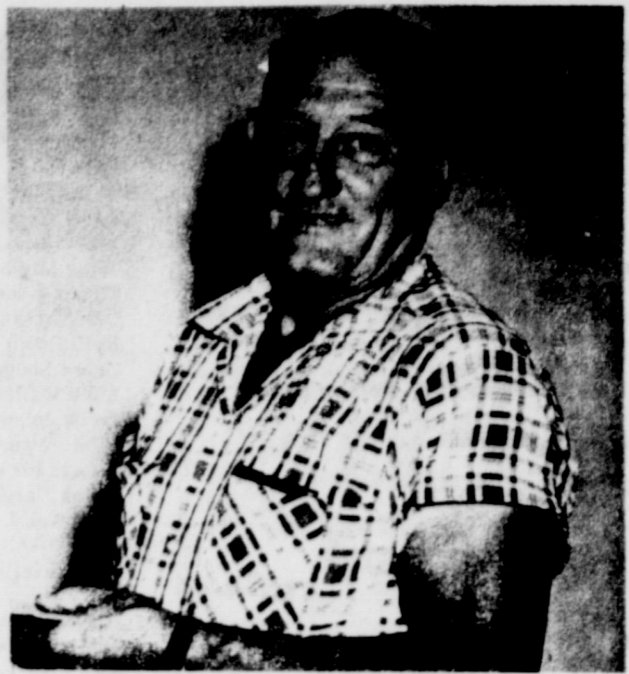

GREEN UP YOUR LAWN--

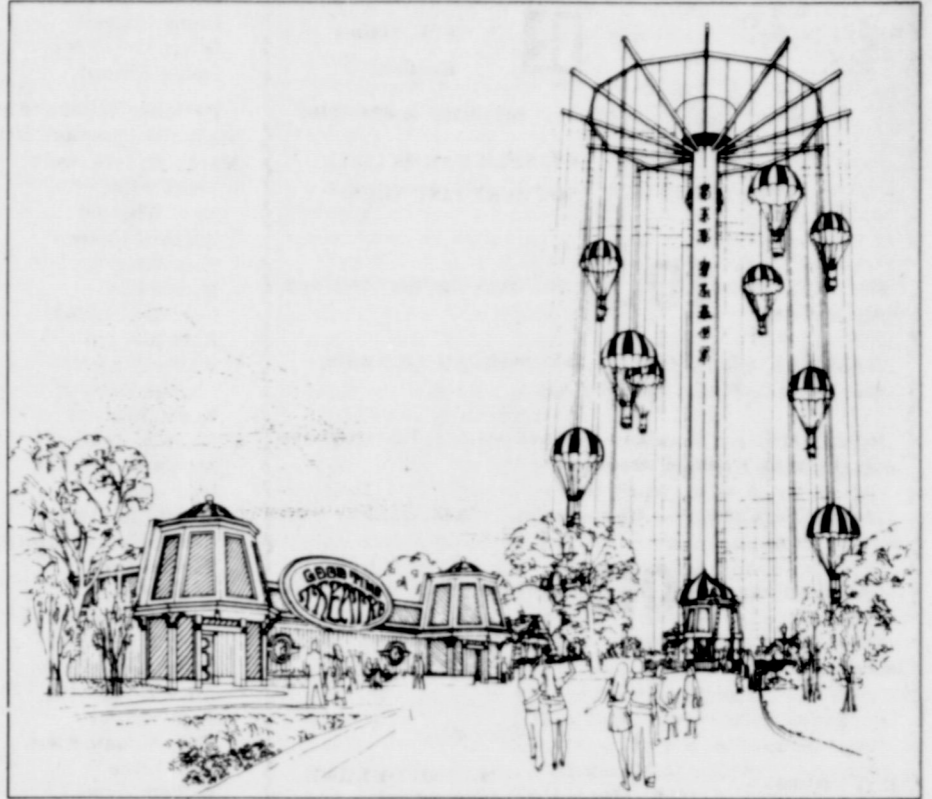
With the spring season just around the corner, a few maintenance practices can get your lawn off to a good start, says a turfgrass specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. First of all, scalp the lawn by mowing it with the mower blade set one-half inch lower than normal. Mow the lawn in two directions at right angles to each other and remove the clippings after each mowing. Then apply a complete fertilizer at the rate of one pound of nitrogen per 1,000 square feet of lawn area. Applying nitrogen every 60 days given the lawn a dark green color. Also apply a preemergence herbicide (weed killer) for crabgrass and other unsightly weeds.

WHAT'S NEW FOR '76 — Major attractions opening at Six Flags Over Texas this season are a \$1.5 million parachute ride and major revision of the park's former puppet theater, now known as Good Time Theater. A brand-new show, "American Pie Jamboree," which combines people, puppets and pictures, will open March 20 at the theater. The parachute ride is expected to begin operation in mid-April.

NEW ATTRACTIONS TO OPEN

Six Flags To Open Parachute Ride, New Shows

Arlington, Texas — Six Flags Over Texas' skyline is dominated by a new feature this year—a 200-foot-tall parachute ride called the Texas Chute-Out. The attraction, which is expected to open in mid-April, is one of the largest additions to the theme park in several years.

Riders taking a "jump" on the parachute drop will experience a sensation unlike any other attraction they have been on. Twelve parachutes carrying two to three riders each soar 175 feet up into the air and then drop at free-fall speed for 35 feet before the chutes billow open and slow down for a "soft" landing.

The parachute ride is another example of how the park has grown in size and attractions during 16 years of operation.

When the park opened in August, 1961, there were 45 attractions operated by 650 youthful hosts and hostesses. It was the nation's first historical theme park, encompassing more than 145 acres.

Today, there are more than 100 rides, shows and attractions tended by 2,300 employees.

Almost 2.3 million persons, a record for a single season, visited Six Flags last year.

Since 1961, almost 26.8 million persons have passed through the turnstiles of the number one tourist attraction in Texas.

Taking a cue from Texas history, creators decided to divide the park into six sections and develop rides and attractions that tell the history of the state under different sovereign governments.

They planned for guests to get a glimpse of the past through sight, taste, touch, and sound as they journeyed through the sections representing Mexico, France, Spain, the Republic of Texas, the Confederacy and the United States of America.

In the Republic of Texas section, for example, guests watch a gun battle between the sheriff and outlaws. Nearby is the Crazy Horse Saloon where one can relive bygone days watching lively song-and-dance routines by dancehall entertainers.

LaSalle's River Ride in the French section takes guests on an exciting trip through bands of hostile Indians and wild animals along the river.

In the Spanish section, guests climb aboard hollowed-out logs in the Log Flumes and float down water-filled passageways leading to a splashing plunge down a steep hill.

There are four hours of live shows, including a new one-of-a-kind attraction called the "American Pie Jamboree". The show highlights slices of American life using a blend of people, puppets and pictures.

This year's Southern Palace Show called "Celebrate" is an upbeat show that includes every type of music from hoedown to rock. A cast of 14 with a 16-piece orchestra are featured in this largest show production in the park.

On selected days, top-name entertainers perform at the Six Flags Music Mill Theater, giving guests an opportunity to see their favorite stars and take in park attractions at no extra charge.

Every night a costume-character named Prof. Cyrus Cosmo climbs aboard his Cosmobile to lead the Incredible Electric Light Brigade Parade.

All of these activities can be observed from the 300-foot-tall oil derrick, which also allows guests to get a bird's-eye view of the Dallas and Fort Worth skylines.

The numerous restaurants in the park add another dimension to sampling the diverse cultures which make up Texas. Several dozen restaurants offer everything from spicy Mexican food to crispy fried chicken. There are also numerous snack stands supplying the American standbys of hot dogs and hamburgers.

A one-price ticket costing \$7.50 pays for all rides, shows and attractions inside the park. Children under three get in free. The only extra charge is for food, souvenirs or games.

Some people opt to spend two days at Six Flags instead of crowding all activities into one day. A special \$11 ticket allows visits to the park on two consecutive days.

There are many aspects which set Six Flags apart from other entertainment centers. People visiting the park are referred to as guests. Employees are called hosts and hostesses.

Every staff member, including executives, are expected to help keep the park clean. Everyone is expected to pick up a scrap of paper or cigarette butt.

Extensive landscaping also adds color and beauty to the park. A new feature this year will be floral displays in red, white and blue.

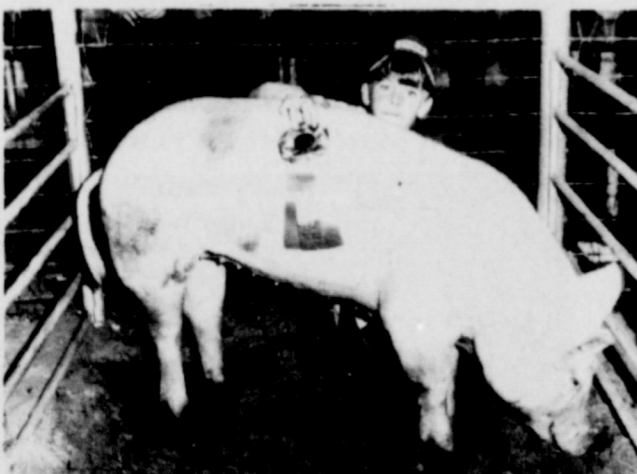

Fruit growers are watching the weather forecasts and hoping that there are no more hard freezes. We didn't think the fruit had been damaged by the light freeze, but Tommy Rice, manager of the Smith Fruit Farm at Carbon, called to report a 75 percent kill of fruit by the freeze. Mrs. Stan Weekes, whose husband owns the Freeman Orchard near Ranger, said she didn't think they had received much damage. Mrs. Weekes said the temperature had dropped to 28 degrees, but only for a short period.

The insecticide into the top four to six inches of soil and make sure it is evenly distributed. To cover 1,000 square feet of soil with diazinon, use six fluid ounces of 25 percent emulsifiable concentrate. Mix it with enough water to cover the entire soil area. If you use powder use 1/2 cup of 50 percent wettable powder mixed with adequate water. To cover 1,000 square feet of garden area with chlordane, use two fluid ounces of 72 percent emulsifiable concentrate mixed with water or 1/2 cup of 40 percent wettable powder mixed with water.

Before planting your vegetable garden this year, take precautions against harmful insects. Wireworms, white grubs, mole crickets, cutworms, flea beetle larvae, fly larvae and maggots are among the insects that feed on the seed, roots and other underground parts of vegetables.

Areas which have been in sod for over two years, that have had the same crops every year, or areas that have large amounts of organic matter are most susceptible to soil insects. It's important to use the right kind of insecticide on your garden. Many insecticides may be harmful to certain vegetables and only a few can be used safely.

Diazinon and chlordane are two commonly used insecticides that are safe for gardens. However, root crops should not be planted in soil treated with chlordane. Apply the insecticide about two to four weeks before the garden is to be planted. Work

Congressman Jack Hightower is a native of Memphis, Texas, graduating from Memphis High School with honors in 1944. After serving in the United States Navy, he entered Baylor University and was graduated with a Bachelor of Arts Degree in 1949 and Bachelor of Laws Degree in 1951. Upon graduating he established a law practice in Vernon, and was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1952. He did not seek re-election to this position, but was appointed District Attorney in January, 1955, serving until he resigned in December, 1961. He was elected to the Texas Senate in 1964 where he made an outstanding record. He has served on all of the major committees. In the regular session of 1971 he was elected President Pro Tempore, a position which placed him third in line for the governorship. On April 3, 1971, during the absence from the state of the Governor and Lieutenant Governor, he served as Acting Governor.

Congressman Hightower served as President of the Texas District and County Attorneys Association, and was appointed by Gov. Price Daniel to the Texas Law Enforcement Commission. He has also served as a Vice-President of the Texas Junior Bar Association.

In 1962, Gov. Daniel appointed Congressman Hightower to the Board of Regents of Midwestern University, where he served as Vice-Chairman until his election to the Texas Senate in 1964.

Congressman Hightower is married, the father of three daughters, and an active church man. He has served on the Board of Directors of the Baptist Standard, and is now serving on the Human Welfare Commission of Texas Baptists. In May, 1971, he was honored by Howard Payne College with an honorary Doctor of Laws Degree.

In November, 1974, Congressman Hightower was elected to the U.S. House of Representatives.

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**'The Dawn Of Freedom'
Comes To Cisco College**

Cisco Junior College has recently been selected as one of 60 sites in Texas to sponsor the highly acclaimed multi-screen film presentation, "THE DAWN OF FREEDOM."

CJC Public Relations Director Eris Ritchie has announced. The historical drama on film will show at the CJC Auditorium on Sunday afternoon, March 28.

The time or times of showings will be announced soon, Mr. Ritchie stated. "We will likely have more than one showing to accommodate school students from several schools in the Cisco area," he said, "and we will announce showing times as soon as the number of group reservations is determined. We now have only one scheduled, at 3:00 p.m., but we feel sure that there will be a demand for at least two or three," he said.

There will be no charge for the program, Ritchie said. Funding for the five-month tour of the unique presentation has been received through the American Revolution Bicentennial Administration and the Bicentennial Commission as well as private foundation and donations.

"THE DAWN OF FREEDOM" is a multimedia presentation depicting the historic events surrounding the Declaration of Independence. The presentation has received the National Recognition Award from Freedoms Foundation at Valley Forge - one of the top eight awards given from over 20,000 nominated entries.

The production relives the life and times of the signers of the Declaration of Independence during the critical days preceding July 4, 1776, and the years of sacrifice and war that led to final victory and freedom for the colonies.

The 50-minute presentation, which coordinates six slide projectors with recorded music and narration, was produced by Vickie Jones Foster and LeRoy Foster of Austin to commemorate the nation's Bicentennial by dramatically portraying the integrity, honesty, and selflessness of the nation's founders in their fight for freedom and independence.

The Fosters spent eight months working on the show producing it entirely at their own expense. During production for the show, the producers traveled to many of the historic sites that played significant roles in the dramatic events leading up to and following the Declaration of Independence. They also spent hundreds of hours in

researching and photographing historic paintings and documents that are used in the show.

The visuals, music and narration in the show are closely coordinated. The script is comprised of authentic quotes from the early patriots, comments from other historians and a structural narrative written by LeRoy and Vickie.

The producers are touring the entire state giving presentations to junior and senior high school students during the day and to the general public at night. There will not be a night showing at Cisco, however, due to the fact that the scheduled day is Sunday.

During the five-month tour which began January 1, the show is scheduled to visit 60

cities within the state in order to have showings within a 50-mile radius of more than 350 Texas Bicentennial communities.

It is estimated that as many as 250,000 school students will attend the presentation during

the state-wide tour, the producers said.
