Simple Rules For Kite Flyers

Kite flying season is here again, and Texas Electric Service Co. urges young kite flyers to follow a few simple rules for their own safety.
Mr. F.N. Sayre, TESCO manager, warns them of the danger of flying kits in the vicinity of electric power lines.
"If your kite should get caught in electric wires, call Texas Electric Service Co.," Mr. Sayre says, "and someone will be sent to get it down for you."
Mr. Sayre also recommends the following safety rules for kite flying:
- Always use dry string, not wire, anything metallic or any string with metallic threads.
- Always use kites made of wood and paper, not wire or metal.
- Don't fly your kite on rainy days.
- Always avoid busy streets and highways while flying your kite.
- Don't pull on the string or climb a power pole to loosen a kite snagged in electric wires.
- Always fly your kite far from electric or power lines.
- Always fly your kite away from TV and radio antennas.
"Posters containing these safety rules have been distributed by the company to all schools," Sayre said. "Young people following these rules will get more fun out of flying kites and at the same time will keep from getting hurt or losing their kites."

THE INAUGURAL JOURNEY

On the day before his birthday in 1861, Abraham Lincoln left his home in Springfield, Illinois, for Washington to be inaugurated President of the United States. His speech from his railroad car to the Springfield folks who had gathered in a Monday morning drizzle to bid him farewell, is often quoted as one of the best examples of his power to express sentiment. It began:

"My friends, no one, not in my situation, can appreciate my feeling of sadness at this parting. To this place, and the kindness of these people, I owe everything. Here my children have been born, and one is buried. I now leave, not knowing when or whether I may return, with a task before me greater than that which rested on Washington."

Lincoln's journey was the strangest ever made by a president-elect to his inauguration. At each place his train stopped, he took the time to make a speech intended to calm fears of the consequences of his election, but a holiday was declared; and children turned out in masse to cheer. Crowds waved and greeted him along the way as he was driven by coach from the Hudson River Railroad Station in New York to the Astor House.

In Philadelphia word reached the party of an assassination plot in Baltimore. Such a strong feeling had been whipped up against him by Secessionists that it was deemed wise for Lincoln to go through that city without stopping, or to by-pass it altogether.

While agreeing not to stop at Baltimore, Lincoln insisted on stopping at Philadelphia to take part in a Washington's Birthday celebration at Independence Hall. These ceremonies were highlighted by his raising a 34-star flag, hailing Kansas' admission to the Union as a free state.

After the ceremony was over, Lincoln was hidden as an invalid in a Pullman berth, and he began his secret midnight journey to Washington. At six o'clock in the morning, a wool muffler around his neck and covering part of his face, he slipped into Washington unnoticed and quietly checked in at the Willard Hotel.

Rumors arose, especially in Baltimore, that the president-elect had made his whole inaugural journey in disguise in fear of his political enemies.

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Johnson Site Is Different Park

Many of the nearly 300 areas administered by the National Park Service honor former presidents of the United States.

There is the Abraham Lincoln Birthplace, the Andrew Johnson Historic Site, Ford's Theatre, the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Jefferson Memorial, the Washington Monument, Mount Rushmore and the White House itself to name a handful.

But there is no place in the system quite like the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historic A Site in Texas that includes, among other things, a working cattle ranch, a blacksmith shop, a school house and a former First Lady.

The historic site, which operates in close harmony with the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park, is actually two separate units.

The Johnson City site includes the 36th president's boyhood home and the Johnson Settlement, a living history area where park employees interpret life in the 1860's.

Fifteen miles to the west along Highway 290 is the LBJ State Park and LBJ ranch area of the National Park. Since the historic site, like Texas, is a big place, today's column will be devoted to the ranch. We'll take up the Johnson City Settlement at a later date.

The state park is located on the south bank of the Pedernales, a spring-fed river that flows through the Texas Hill Country. Visitors should set aside about an hour and a half at the state park to see the exhibits, a film in the auditorium, a slide show in the visitor center, nature trails and a living history program in the Sauer-Beckman House.

There are also tennis courts and a swimming pool, which operates in summer, at the state park. The only fee at either park is at the pool.

At the state park, tour buses depart regularly across the Pedernales to the LBJ Ranch on an hour and a half trip.

Johnson City is 50 miles west of Austin on Highway 290.

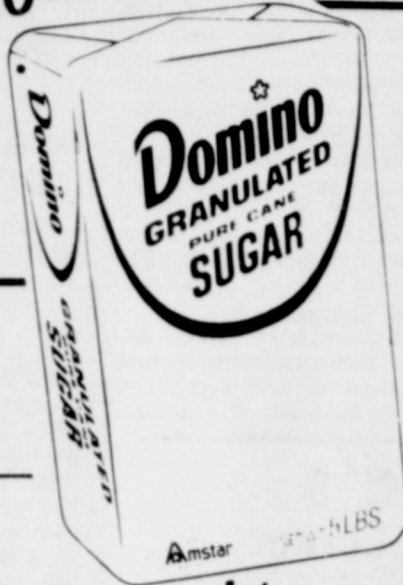
