The people of Eastland County have an unusual opportunity to learn about the civilization, and country of Iran through citizens of that country. The two junior colleges in Eastland County have a number of foreign students attending their classes, many of whom come from Iran. Cisco Jr. College presently has 23 Iranian students and Ranger Junior College has approximately 10

As the Middle East countries assume more and more importance in world affairs, it might be interesting to citizens of Eastland County to speak directly with some of these representatives of a growing Middle East power. Many cultural and economical changes have occurred in Iran during the last 50 years and it is the stated aim of the Shah of Iran to develop Iran into the leading Middle East power.

Since beginning his rule in 1941, the Shah of Iran has made sweeping economical and social changes in Iran. One of the most important changes made was the breaking up of the feudal land system and the redistribution of land to over three million rural families. Equally important, if not more so, are the changes made by the Shah in the industrialization of Iran. Industry has grown and improved to such an extent that a stock exchange now exists and industrial workers have the power of collective bargaining and many own shares in the

industries Less than ten years ago, the illiteracy rate in Iran was over 80 percent. Today, more than a million rural children and half a million adults are being educated by Education Corpsmen. Iran possesses three universities; one of excellent academic standards with a teacher exchange program involving several American universities. Though the government does not support students who attend universities in other countries, it does encourage students to study in foreign countries and to bring their knowledge back to Iran. Iranian students study primarily in Germany, France, England, and the United States.

Persian is the official and literary language of Iran. Other languages which are spoken there are Kurdish, Arabic,

Turkish Armenian. In religion, 98 percent of the population are Shia Muslim - - which is also known as Moslem, Islam, or Mohammedism. Interestingly enough the five major prophets of the Muslim religion include

Moses and Jesus.

Tehran, which is the capital of Iran, possesses the major airport of the country. Many of the students studying at our junior colleges come from Tehran and Shiraz. The from Sl American friends that the city is known as "The City of Plovers and Nightingales" or "The City of Love and Lovers" and is a great tourist attraction even for the Iranians. During Iranian New Year celebration, which occurs during March, hotels are packed and reservations must be made several months in

Over 10 percent of the \$5 million people comprising Iran's population live in Approximately 60 percent of the population is still rural, though that is rapidly changing with the industrialization of Iran. Oil provides 80 percent of the costs of the country's development plans; and Iran rates as the fourth largest oil producing country in the world and it is the leading oil producing

country in the Middle East. Iran has an area as large as that of Texas, New Mexico. Arizona, and California. It is bordered on the north by the Soviet Union, on the east by Afghanistan and Pakistan; on the west by Iraq and Turkey. and on the south by the Persian Gulf.

It is well worth the time spent in trying to bridge the language gap with Iranian students, since it gives one a fascinating view of both an ancient civilization and a nation emerging into the modern world as a leader of the Middle East. The Iranians are eager to share their heritage and to learn more about the American heritage and culture. Most of the students presently attending school here in Eastland County will go back to Iran to positions of importance and leadership let's give them some warm memories to carry back with them of Texas and

(ED. NOTE: Channel 8 Station Manager Mike Shapiro recently commented on Eastland's Channel 9 - 5 problem in response to an Eastlander's letter...and he apparently didn't research the subject sufficiently according to letters sent him by Eastland's Victor Cornelius and Robert Cooper, Cable television expert. The two letters follow).

Dear Sir: You will recall that on your 6:30 p.m. program, Saturday, January 31, you answered a letter from an Eastland lady in which she complained that Abilene's KRBC - TV had caused the Eastland cable system to remove Channel 5 from network viewing by

Eastland citizens.

Mr. Shapiro, more than 2,100 people of our 3,200 population signed a petition asking Mr. Bill Terry of KRBC - TV to relax his position in denying Eastland citizens the privilege of viewing Channel 5 on our cable system. Mr. Terry said it was the law and he could not do

anything about it. Since then our citizens have contributed \$780 to pay for advertising in the Abilene Reporter - News, to let the people of Abilene and the surrounding area know that what Mr. Terry said about removing Channel 5 was not a fact. The truth is that the FCC does not enforce this rule unless requested to do so by a station manager.

Then comes the painfully misleading message from you on WFAA, telling the Eastland people and others that it is the law. It puts Eastland back where we started. Our \$780 went down the drain. We believe you should have given the matter more study than you did - - or do all station

managers think alike? You know, and we know, that there is nothing mandatory about enforcing this rule. The FCC does not care either way whether or not Eastland is on or off Channel 5. The things you said, on top of what Mr. Bill Terry has already done to us. are very discouraging to our citizens.

We are enclosing with this letter copies of the two ads that were run in the Abilene Reporter - News in January in an attempt to clear up the misleading information given by Mr. Bill Terry as station manager of KRBC - TV;

Dear Mr. Shapiro:

On your January 31st "Inside Television' segment you responded to a viewer in Eastland, Texas, who had written to ask you to explain why cable viewers in Eastland should be prevented from viewing NBC programs on KXAS while the same programs were being telecast by another NBC outlet, KRBC in Abilene. Your response was "because that is the law"

While I appreciate your desire not to muddle the poor viewer's mind with things like '55 mile protection zones' "simultaneous duplication" and "1.000 subscriber and below exemptions", I do believe your response was a tad curt. And perhaps not altogether factual.

Actually, it is not a law at all;



VHF network affiliates in small markets averaged 26.2 percent Wilson, assisted by new return on the original cost of members Myrle Thompson and their tangible property (less depreciation) in that single year. I know of very few, in fact no, cable systems that average 26.2 percent return per year on original investment. Assuming arguendo that cable can or could hurt the long term profitability of small market VHF stations, it is our rationale that protection such as proscribed by 96.91 should be limited to those specific situations where stations are being or have been hurt; and hurt to the point that their continued operation for the public good is in fact in real (not alleged) danger.

I think, Mike, you ducked the issue. I believe you ducked it because if the public knew the full truth about the nature and extent of the rules governing cable systems, protectionistic rules designed largely to protect the established television broadcasters, the public would react with some unkindness against your participation in this ploy.

good management program for pecans includes fertilization, spraying and irrigation.

Apply one pound of ammonium nitrate or ammonium sulfate to each tree for every inch of trunk diameter. This should be applied in two applications, one now, in February and one in May. Take care not to apply a heavy concentration of fertilizer in one place, since this will kill lawn grasses.

maintenance program followed. Fertilizing shade trees once every three years is generally sufficient except in sandy areas.

Over - fertilization of trees can force excessive top growth, making them vulnerable to storm damage

The safest method of computing the amount of fertilizer to apply to a tree is this: figure the number of square feet included in the branch spread of the tree and then use two pounds of actual nitrogen per 1,000 square feet. For example, a tree having a 36 foot branch spread would cover about 1,000 square feet. This would require 12 pounds of 16 - 20 - 0 to supply the needed nitrogen. The same complete fertilizer recommended for lawn use will be satisfactory for fertilizing trees, in Eastland County.

We see a lot of cows throughout the county that are in very poor condition. If we should have some severe winter weather we would probably see many dead cattle. Cattlemen are in a financial bind as hay and feed are still costly while cattle are cheap. In

most cases pastures are short

in quantity and quality. Dry cows and those with calves should be separated if at all possible because their requirements differ greatly. If adequate amounts of low quality hay or standing forage are available, the nutrient most deficient in the diet of a dry cow is protein. Under these conditions, a high - protein, natural supplement is often the cheapest means of supplementation. The amount of supplement required might

range from less than 1 lb. to 2

lbs. per day depending on the

quality of forage available.

On the other hand, a cow with a calf is usually deficient in energy, or simply fuel to operate as well as protein. Here a medium protein (15 - 25 percent crude protein), medium to high energy supplement is often most feasible. These supplements include range cubes and mixtures of oilseed meal and grain. A common mix of the latter type would contain by weight 1/4 to one - third oil meal and 34 to two - thirds grain. Anywhere from 3 to 6 pounds per day of such supplements may be necessary. The appropriate amount of feed would vary according to the quality and quantity of hay or grass.

Americana By Charles Crowder

THE INAUGURAL JOURNEY On the day before his birthday in 1861, Abraham Lincoln left his home in Springfield, Illinois, for Washington to be inaugurated President of the United States,. His speech from his railroad car to the Springfield folks who had gathered in a Monday morning drizzle to bid him farewell, is often quoted as one of the best examples of his power to express sentiment. It began:

My friends, no one, not in my situation, can appreciate my feeling of sadness at this parting. To this place, and the kindness of these people, I owe everything....Here my children have been born, and one is buried. I now leave, not knowing when or whether I may return, with a task before me greater than that which rested on Washington.

Lincoln's journey was the strangest ever made by a president-elect to his inauguration. At each place his train stopped, he took the time to make a speech intended to calm fears of the consequences of his election, but a holiday was declared; and children turned out in masse to cheer. Crowds waved and greeted him along the way as he was driven by coach from the Hudson River Railroad Station in New York to the Astor House.

In Philadelphia word reached the party of an assassination olot in Baltimore. Such a strong feeling had been whipped up against him by Secessionists that it was deemed wise for Lincoln to go through that city without stopping, or to by-pass it altogether.

While agreeing not to stop at Baltimore, Lincoln insisted on stopping at Philadelphia to take part in a Washington's Birthday celebration at Independence Hall. These ceremonies were highlighted by his raising a 34-star flag, hailing Kansas' admission to the Union as a free

After the ceremony was over, Lincoln was hidden as an invalid in a Pullman berth, and he began his secret midnight journey to Washington. At six o'clock in the morning, a wool muffler around his neck and covering part of his face, he slipped into Washington unnoticed and quietly checked in at the Willard Hotel.

Rumors arose, especially in Baltimore, that the president-elect had made his whole inaugural journey in disguise in fear of his political enemies.

Johnson Site Is Different Park

Many of the nearly 300 areas administered by the National Park Service honor former presidents of the United States.

There is the Abraham Lincoln Birthplace, the Andrew Johnson Historic Site, Ford's | Theatre, the Home of Franklin D. Roosevelt, the Jefferson Memorial, the Washington Monument, Mount Rushmore and the White House itself to name a handful.

But there is no place in the system quite like the Lyndon B. Johnson National Historic A Site in Texas that includes, among other things, a working cattle ranch, a blacksmith shop, a school house and a former First Lady.

The historic site, which operates in close harmony with the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park, is actually two separate units.

The Johnson City site includes the 36th president's boyhood home and the Johnson Settlement, a living history area where park employees interpret life in the 1860's.

Fifteen miles to the west along Highway 290 is the LBJ State Park and LBJ ranch area of the National Park. Since the historic site, like Texas, is a big place, today's column will be devoted to the ranch. We'll take up the Johnson City Settlement at a later date

The state park is located on the south bank of the Pedernales, a spring - fed river that flows through the Texas Hill Country. Visitors should set aside about an hour and a half at the state park to see the exhibits, a film in the auditorium, a slide show in the visitor center, nature trails and a living history program in the Sauer - Beckman House.

There are also tennis courts and a swimming pool, which operates in summer, at the state park. The only fee at either park is at the pool.

At the state park, tour buses depart regularly across the Pedernales to the LBJ Ranch on an hour and a half trip. Johnson City is 50 miles west

In viewing TV contest shows, one usually hears contestants asked, "Where are you from?" Invariably, you sense a pride in the person's reply when the town is mentioned. The contestants are mostly ordinary people; no spellbinder, no do - gooder, no politician. It is this sort of civic loyalty and pride that has helped America become big and strong...and envied.

In our American way of life, we take many things for granted - - including our home town. Maybe once in a while we ought to adopt and dedicate ourselves to a personal creed, somewhat along these lines - -

"This is my home town. My home is here. My business or work is here. It is where my vote is cast; where my children are educated; where my neighbors dwell; where my life is centered. My town is entitled to my citizenship; not my partisanship. It is entitled to my friendship, not my dissensions; my sympathy, not my indifference. It supplies me with protection, trade, friends, education, friendly and reliable merchants, schools and churches. It has done some things better than others. The best things I should seek to make better, the worst things I should help to suppress. My town supports me. 
