But the 100 copies to be given away Saturday in Eastland will be valid to some lucky winners. The Scrip will be redeemable in merchandise at any chamber member's store in Eastland. And like it says on the scrip, "Like Old Rip, good only in Eastland, Texas."



Saturday is the day when several lucky people are going to be given an "extra shopping boost" in Eastland.

That's the day the Eastland Chamber of Commerce will give away \$100 in merchandise certificates, "spendable" with any chamber member in Eastland.

Local merchants have been giving qualifying tickets away for several weeks, and according to Chamber President James Smith, a large crowd is expected in town for the event.

Special entertainment will be part of the festivities, but the lure of redeemable "Old Rip Scrip" will undoubtedly be big.

In all, \$100 worth of scrip will be up for claim. There will be a drawing for two lots of \$10 worth; a drawing for a \$30 book; and the grand prize drawing for a \$50 book. The scrip is redeemable only in Eastland, and can be spent only with chamber members, but that's about where the restrictions end. The winners may select any items in the stores, and pay for them with the scrip.

Entertainment on the square will feature the "Gems" a popular musical group, "well-known for their versatility. Beginning at 2 p.m. the group will hold forth with country and western, pop, rock and roll and a spokesman said there might even be some "Beatle"

The aggregation is made up of Jim Wright, electric guitar; Larry Slatton, guitar; Mickey Sargent, drums; Floyd Robertson, guitar, drums and other; and Dick Sanders, saxophone, Slatton and Sanders are both from Cisco.

James Wright will be master of ceremonies, and assisting with the event will be President Smith, and Retail Trade Committee Chairman B. W. Robertson.

Stage for the event will be from the bed of a truck furnished by Wayne Jackson. The new public address system owned by the Jaycee Club will be used.

Approximately 145,000 qualifying tickets have been distributed so far, Smith said. In case the \$50 prize isn't claimed, it will be carried over and added to for the next drawing, he said.

Eastland merchants are paraded as "Third Saturday" tiptoeing in the event, designing special bargains to shoppers through reductions and special prices for the day. These are described in advertisements in this newspaper.

Scrip will be redeemable for merchandise only, so indications are that with Easter approaching there will undoubtedly be a lot of shopping after the names have been drawn.

The chamber is using this type of promotion to emphasize the importance of shopping in Eastland where the local merchants do their best to provide the merchandise people want and need.

It has been decided that the stubs will be left in the drum as long as possible in order to give every one an opportunity to win the scrip. At the chamber directors meeting set Thursday at noon, discussion is to be held regarding holding the drawings often, perhaps twice a month, it is reported.

Chamber officials expressed hope this week that there will be four winners Saturday, in this initial event. That would mean that two people would win \$10 worth of scrip each; one person, \$30 worth; and another, \$50 worth.

There will be, as usual, free parking all day Saturday in Eastland, it is noted, so that persons will not have any difficulty in finding a place to park when they come to town, but it might be advisable to plan to come early because hundreds of people are expected.

Proposed Telephone Rate Hike Clearing Hurdles in Three Towns

Southwestern Bell Telephone Co., through its district manager, Bill Boothe of Cisco, got a few steps closer to its proposed rate increase for Eastland, Ranger and Cisco — but it's been "round and round the mulberry bush" with city commissioners in the three towns.

The Eastland city commission gave the rate increase proposal its second reading during a regular session Monday evening, but agreed not to sign the final agreement until after similar agreements have been signed by Cisco and Ranger commissions.

Manager Boothe told the Eastland commission that Cisco commissioners had given the proposal its first reading Monday at 8:15 a. m. in a special session. Ranger last week gave it its first reading. Eastland had been the first of the three to give the measure the first of two required readings.

Ranger was expected to give it a second reading Thursday evening, and Cisco will probably make the second reading next Tuesday night, Boothe said.

Boothe proposed a date (first billing in May) for the increase to go into effect in the three towns. Frank Deaton pointed out that the Eastland commission's original

agreement was that this commission would give it its first reading and then the increase was to go into effect in the three towns at the same time. "I wouldn't want us to be the one to set a date," Mr. Deaton said.

Bob Gans, band director at Winters High School, was the guest director of the band.

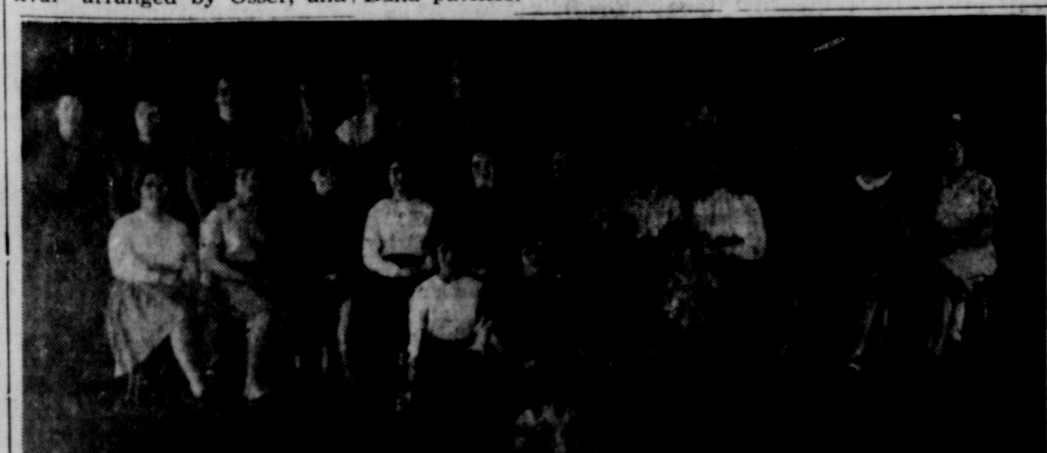

National Guard Echelons To Go To 'Paper War'

DALLAS - Top echelons of the Texas National Guard's 49th Armored Division will move into Fort Sam Houston March 20-22 for what a division spokesman calls one of the most comprehensive map-paper wars waged in the Lone Star Unit's history.

Major General Harley B. West, the 49th's commanding general, said the maneuver will simulate offensive operations for staff sections of divisions and brigade headquarters. The code name for the operation is Cloverleaf VII. Elements of division headquarters and the Support Command from Dallas, Division Artillery from Wichita Falls, and brigade headquarters at Dallas, Houston and Fort Worth will participate.

General West said that over 100 officers and enlisted men from the division will take part in the weekend "mock battles."

Another first will be scored when the bulk of the 49th personnel is airlifted to Fort Sam Houston by the Air National Guard. It is the first time a project of this size has been coordinated between the services.

The maps to be used in the exercise actually depict existing terrain. The area covers nearly an entire continent and the "paper" war will require the staffs of three divisions at one time. Joining the 49th Armored Division will be "players" from the 39th and 45th Infantry divisions. Exercise direction will be by the 75th Maneuver Command headquarters in Houston.

The Cloverleaf exercises are staged each year to perfect staff teamwork at division level. A 49th spokesman said that the 1964 operation marks the first time that subordinate units will be included in the exercises.

Commissioner Dale Troutt said, "We were first to read the proposal, therefore I think we should be last with the final reading."

During a bit of by-play the commissioners "kidded" Mr. Boothe by pointing out that Commissioner Virgil T. Seaberry would abstain from voting (which he did) because he owns A.T.&T. Stock, and Mayor Don Pierson, who is also going off, would vote only in case of a tie. (Troutt and Deaton were the only other commissioners present).

However, on a motion by Troutt, seconded by Deaton, it was agreed to give the proposal its second reading, but not sign the measure until after the other two towns have signed.

Ranger observers believe that Mayor Morris Newnam and members of the Ranger City Commission probably will be the last to grant the phone rate increase.

Some say that commissioners in Eastland and Cisco are being reluctant to approve rate hikes in view of upcoming city elections - only three weeks away.

That situation, however, is not similar at Ranger. Ranger's Mayor and members of the City Commission are elected every two years and serve concurrent terms. The present Commission will remain intact until April, 1965.

In other business, the Eastland commission:

Authorized City Manager Lewis Tiner to accept bids for a new police car.

Endorsed Tiner's present curbing program at Eastland Cemetery, where curb is being put in the new area in the northeast corner for about 45 cents a foot.

Heard Troutt ask about some gradework on East Conner St., where he said water is backing up bad in yards following rains, because of heavy use of the street by trucks. Tiner is to investigate on Conner, and reported that S. Daugherty St. also has a severe water problem.

Heard Tiner report on status of the demolition of the old city hall, in which he said that he believed the man would be back to finish the job. Because of illness and financial problems, he is already overdue on the contract, it was pointed out.

Discussed the additional installation of safety (yield right-of-way) signs in town, particularly on Plummer St.

Agreed to cooperate with the Jaycees in their upcoming Kiddy Carnival in giving them access to one block on White St., and to encourage "no parking" on West Main St. in the block in front of the Wag-on Yard during the carnival for safety of youngsters.

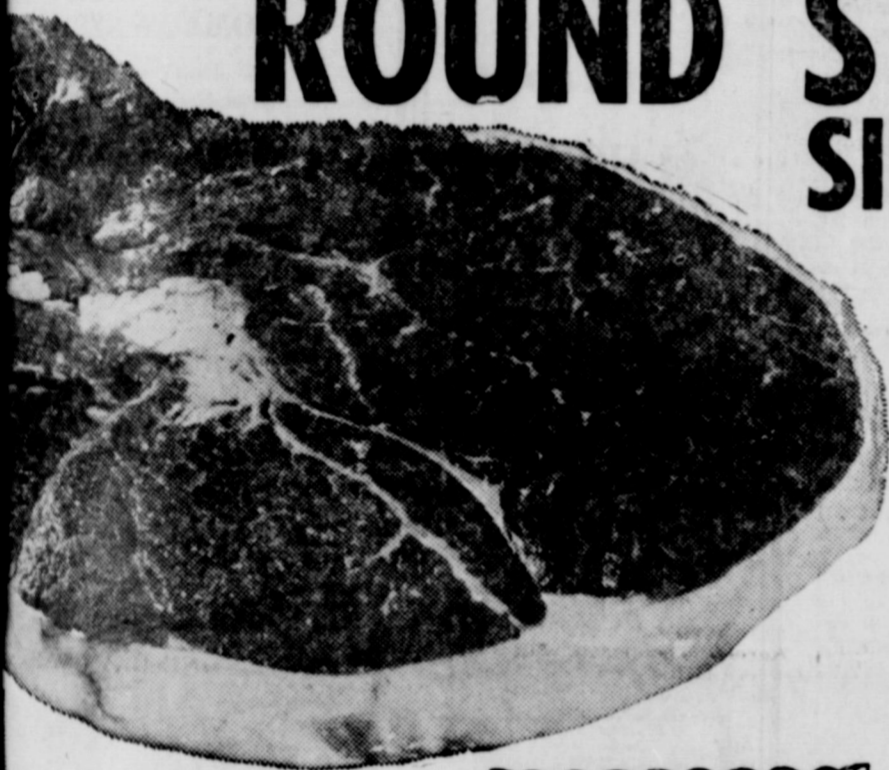

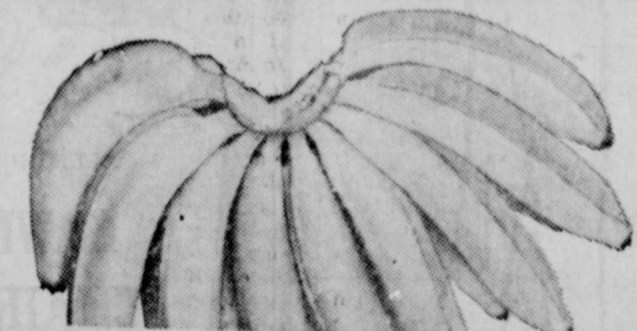

**Texas Motorists Are Killed
At High Rate In Past Year**

AUSTIN — Texas motorists, barreling along the streets and highways at a clip of 99,000 miles each minute, killed themselves at the rate of one person every three hours and 12 minutes to rack up the worst year in history for traffic tragedy in 1963.

Col. Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, reported today that DPC Statistical Services officially closed the traffic death book for 1963 at noon Sunday, recording an all-time record of 2,729 motorcides.

"This tragic toll of lives was 308 or 13% higher than in 1962, and 129 or five per cent higher than the previous all-time high of 2,611 in 1956," Garrison said.

"Even though many more miles were traveled in Texas last year than in previous years, the fatality rate per 100 million miles traveled increased from 4.9 deaths in 1962 to 5.2 deaths in 1963.

"We are shocked and saddened by this terrible loss of human life in our state, which was accompanied by untold suffering among an estimated 161,000 persons who were injured, and a staggering economic loss of \$432,715,000."

In order to point up the magnitude of the traffic situation in an effort to bring about public awareness of its seriousness, Garrison listed these facts:

— The 312 motorcides in December 1963 was the highest number for any month on record. Second high was 303 in December 1950.

— Only one day during 1963, Tuesday, September 3, was a motorcide free. It followed Labor Day when 22 persons were killed in traffic.

— On both Sunday, May 5 and Friday, December 20 there were 25 persons killed in 17 accidents.

— During 1963 there were 21 days with 15 or more motorcides. There were only 19 in 1962, 14 in 1961 and 13 in 1960.

— The worst accident in 1963 occurred on September 2 in Libraty County where 10 persons were killed in a head-on collision near Dayton. The last previous 10-death accident occurred on February 15, 1959 in Hidalgo County under similar circumstances.

— The estimated economic loss from motor vehicle traffic accidents in 1963 was \$13.72 per second.

The Public Safety Director pointed out that the 13 per cent statewide increase in traffic deaths in 1963 was reflected almost equally in rural and urban areas. The rural traffic death increase was 13 per cent, while the urban increase was 12 per cent. He added:

"The fact that this upsurge in traffic fatalities appears to be part of a current national trend — and I might add that many other states had their worst traffic year in 1963 — does not alter the seriousness of our situation here in our home state.

"Certainly, with these facts

before them, the people of Texas are challenged to do everything in their power to halt this trend which, incidentally, seems to be continuing into the new year.

"The records consistently reflect that two things stand out in general as the leading causes for serious traffic

accidents — carelessness and willful or unwitting disregard for the laws of safety.

"Therefore, we wish to issue an urgent appeal to all Texans to charge themselves with the responsibility of doing a better and safer job of alert driving and thus bring down this terrible toll of lives

and suffering and economic loss in our state."

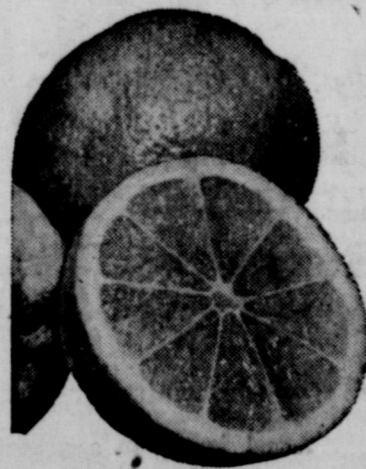

Here's how you can add zest to a fresh fruit salad or a seafood platter:
Blend 1/4 cup orange juice concentrate into 1 cup mayonnaise. Use as a topping.

Another potential new food product from research — powdered grapefruit juice — is ready for market testing to determine consumer acceptance, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reports.
This new powder dissolves in cold water to make a nu-

tritious grapefruit juice with a remarkable fresh flavor, according to scientists of the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and Florida Citrus Commission, who developed the powder.

Like other dehydrated foods, the new grapefruit powder offers substantial savings in shipping and storage costs. Although storage temperatures needed to preserve its quality have not been determined, scientists believe the product will need little or no

refrigeration.
To make the powder, specially prepared concentrated grapefruit juice is whipped into a stable foam, which is forced through a press in spaghetti-like strips onto a moving belt and dried in a stream of heated air. The dried strips are then ground into powder.
Approximately 200 pounds of the powder have been made in a small pilot-plant at the Winter Haven laboratory for consumer evaluation in the United Kingdom and West Germany. The consumer tests will be conducted by the Florida Citrus Commission and the USDA's Statistical Reporting Service.

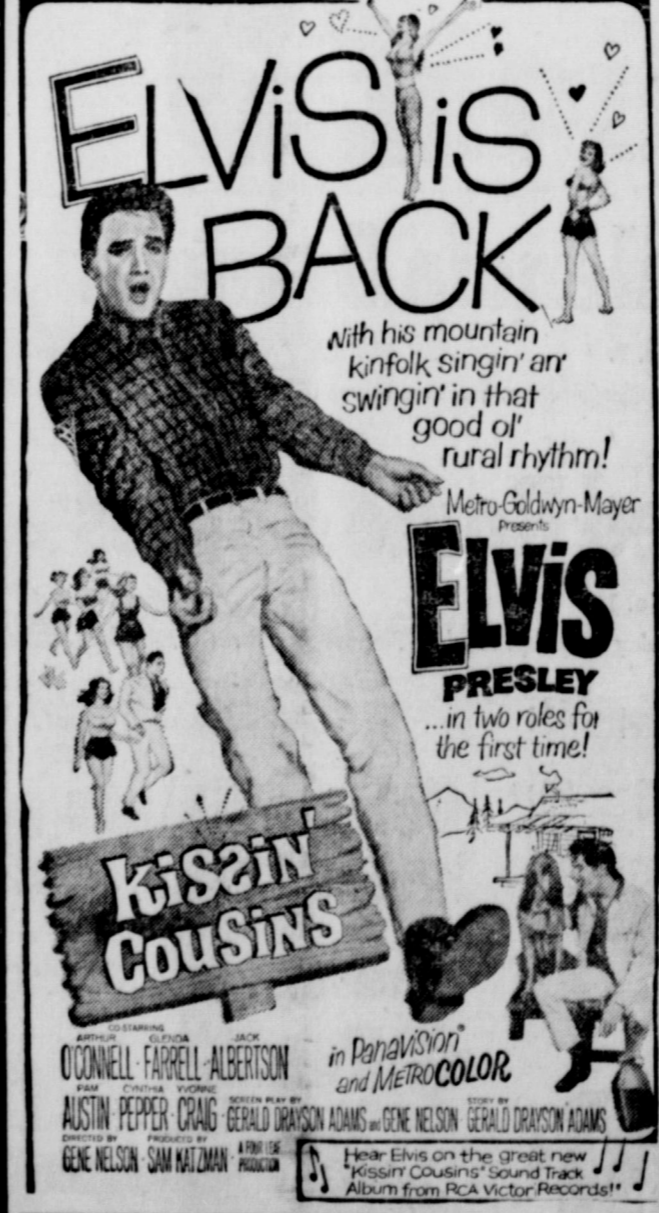
