

The snow accounted for .12 of an inch of moisture, added to an 1.20 inch on the 4th, .05 on the 5th. .15 on the 6th, .28 on the 13th, .07 on the 18th, .12 on te 21st, and .13 on the 25th totaled up to a wetter

than usual second month. Average for the month is 1.38 of an inch, and this year's total was far above last Feb-.22 of an inch.

With 2.48 inches recorded in January this year, the rainfall is above average at 4.48 for the first two months.

Low temperature for the month just ended was 22 degrees, recorded on several occasions, and high was 69.

County Jailer George Carter has resigned and returned to his home in Rising Star, Sheriff Lee Horn announced this week.


A replacement will be named soon, Sheriff Horn said, and in the meantime, he and Mrs. Horn have taken residence at the jail and are operating it.



Favorable Season Page Two Seen For Farmers

Eastland County farmers are looking forward to a favorable season, with a very favorable moisture level in the soils, according to an announcement from E. E. McAllister, manager of the Eastland Soil Conservation Service.

Late winter moisture has small grain crops; however, some fields have no growing which causes soil loss and gullies.

March will start a critical period, when soils need protection. High winds and possible heavy rain can be anticipated. How crop residues are managed will determine the degree of damage done this

spring Research has shown approximately 2,500 pounds of residue is needed for adaquate soil protection from wind and water erosion. Approximately five inch sorghum or small grain stubble will usually provide this protection. Surface roughening tillage wll provde some degree of protecton from wind erosion, when inadequate residues are produced. Residues incorporated in the soil help maintain the fertility level of the soil.

Whether grain, peanuts, or forage is the cash crop, management of the crop residues is of vital importance for sustained farming operations Harvesting peanut hay, close grazing of small grain, too close cutting of sorghums, or plowing under plant residues may be done in some years without noticable damage however, in most years, following these practices results in moderate to severe erosion. This in turn increases the expense of farming the following






