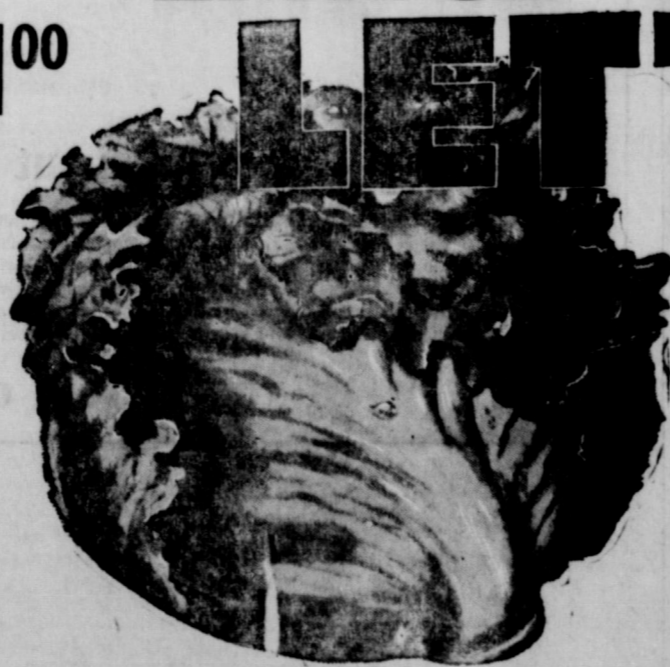

Rising Star News

The new sewage disposal plant now under construction east of Rising Star is expected to be completed next month and when finished, the city will have one of the most modern plants of this design in the Southwest. The tanks have 12 inch walls, built of reinforced concrete, and were designed by National Engineering Company of Austin, at a cost in excess of \$80,000 of which \$25,000 comes from Construction is being done by Anderson Engineering Company of Abilene, at a cost in excess of \$80,000 of which \$25,000 comes from state and federal grants. The \$64,000 remaining is supplied by a revenue bond issue voted by citizens. The bonds will be paid out of revenue from sewer assessments on city users.
