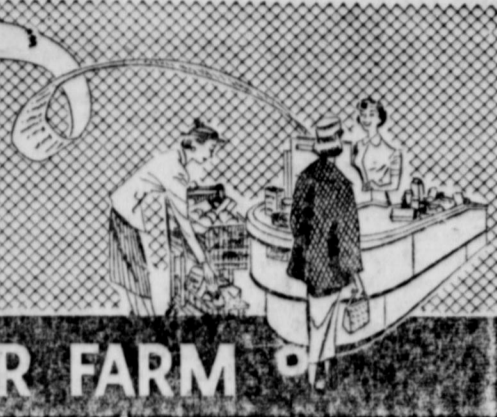

HOMEMAKING CHATTER

Homemakers getting ready to store electric blankets are asking if they are washable. The answer is YES... provided you use care. Equipment authorities state that laundering is the only recommended method of cleaning electric blankets. They tell us that dry cleaning damages the electric wiring. Tests show that electric blankets can be safely washed in an automatic washer and dried in the electric dryer.

The following instructions have been worked out for home laundering of electric blankets:

Fill washer with water at 100 degrees F. Add water softener and mild soap of mild detergent, agitate to dissolve. Add blanket and allow to soak 10 minutes. Badly soiled spots or bindings should be penetrated by brushing with water mixed to a paste with the washing compound to be used to wash the blanket. Agitate for one minute. Spin out water for two minutes. Fill washer with water at 100 degrees F. Agitate for one minute.

Spin out water for two minutes. Bindings of dark colored blankets may break unless a major part of the moisture is removed in the spin. Wash and dry only one blanket at a time. Blankets should not be stretched as this could cause

damage to wiring. Preheat dryer 5 to 10 minutes on High Heat. Add blanket and buffer towels and allow to tumble 15 minutes, until partially dried. Complete the drying on the line or on a clean flat surface. Brush lightly to fluff further, if desired. Iron bindings.

Blankets treated in this way will be soft and fluffy. There may be some shrinkage depending on the combination of fibers used to make up the blanket.

Recently we tried a Strawberry Shortcake recipe which we'd like to share with you as our "Recipe of the Week."

STRAWBERRY SHORTCAKE
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 tablespoon sugar
1 teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons fat
1 cup milk
1 beaten egg
Strawberries

Sift dry ingredients. Work in fat. Add milk and egg mixture all at once, mixing until product cleaves from sides of bowl. Turn onto lightly floured board or pastry cloth; knead about 20 strokes or until dough is smooth. Divide dough into two equal parts. Pat and roll out one portion to fit a pie or cake pan making a layer 1/4 inch thick. Brush top lightly with melted fat. Shape second portion of dough in same way and place over first. Bake in hot oven (425 degrees F.), 12 to 15 minutes. When done, separate layers, spread with butter, sprinkle with sugar, put crushed and sweetened berries on one layer, and place the other over it. Spread this with fruit mixture. Serve at once either plain or with whipped cream.

Have you had experience in sewing with synthetic fabrics? If so, you know that some synthetic fabrics have a tendency to pucker in stitching if not handled properly. Before you begin sewing it is necessary to make three adjust-

ments. First, shorten the stitch slightly. Test for the proper stitch on the lengthwise grain of the fabric. When the lengthwise grain shows the proper stitch, the crosswise grain and the bias will be correct, too.

Next loosen the tension slightly. Adjust the top tension first as this may be all that is necessary. If not, loosen the bobbin tension screw a bit. Many machines are set tighter than necessary for ordinary sewing.

For hard finish synthetics, such as nylon organza or a very smooth, tightly woven synthetic, increase the pressure from the pressure foot. Thicker fabrics will require only the usual pressure.

Thread may make a difference, too. Nylon, dacron, and mercerized cotton are used for sewing on synthetics. Be sure to use the same thread in the bobbin as in the needle, and wind the thread loosely and evenly on the bobbin.

Dehydrofreezing! Add this word to your vocabulary to keep up with the evolution of food processing. Dehydrofrozen foods take up less space and weigh less because of the dehydration but retain the convenience and freshness of freezing. Another advantage is that it is a more natural product. These foods are now commercially available. Thawed dehydrofrozen apples have a much firmer texture and make better pies than when frozen in the regular way. Fruits and vegetables now being dehydrofrozen commercially are apples, apricots, peas and pimientos. Reconstitution of dehydrofrozen food is very simple, just cook directly or soak... Be on the lookout for dehydrofrozen foods on your retail markets.

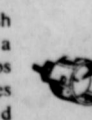

Countian Has Long Service In Red Cross

The Red Cross was born in the spirit of the Volunteer and without the Volunteer could not exist.

Of the 1,575,000 Volunteers who have made it their business to help neighbors over the rough spots in life and have joined in an organized fight against human suffering, there is one in Eastland County who has been volunteering her services since early 1916. She is Mrs. H. C. Croom of Ranger.

Her first Red Cross experience was as a student in a Red Cross Home Nursing taught in Strawn, about 1916. In 1917 a Red Cross instructor came to Strawn to conduct and supervise classes in surgical dressings and hospital garments.

From one of these classes Mrs. Croom was selected to supervise and organize other classes. She and her groups made many thousands of dressings and packed and shipped these with many hundreds of other needed hospital supplies for use of the men serving in World War I.

Mrs. Croom and her family moved to Ranger in 1937 where she immediately began helping in many types of Red Cross work. She served when her services were needed, including the annual Roll Call each year.

During World War II Mrs. Croom worked many hours in the Red Cross work room. She also served as Red Cross Camp and Hospital Chairman for Ranger. Eastland County Red Cross Chapter, together with other adjacent chapters, organized to help meet the needs of the servicemen stationed at Camp Bowie, Brownwood. Chairmen of this service met in Eastland monthly and went to Camp Bowie by chartered buses. There they discussed the needs of the hospitalized servicemen with the Red Cross volunteers and paid staff members.

Each Red Cross Chapter represented accepted an assignment to supply the needed articles. Mrs. Croom vividly recalls that one time Eastland County Chapter was requested to supply musical instruments and records, also a request to completely furnish two sun rooms for convalescent patients. She also helped in securing Christmas gifts for each patient. She asked everyone and all organizations to help in making ill servicemen more comfortable. All the churches and organizations and many, many individuals of Ranger helped Mrs. Croom to achieve the success of the Ranger unit of the Camp and Hospital Program.

At the end of the War when the sun rooms were no longer needed, the furnishings of the Sun Room were divided and given to Ranger Junior College and Cisco Junior College. This decision was made knowing that many veterans would be attending these two colleges.

Mrs. Croom is now and has been for many years a member of the Eastland County Red Cross Chapter Board of Directors. She is also serving as the Red Cross representative on the Board of Directors of the Ranger Community Chest.

This gracious lady has done many more things to help her community that she was too modest to mention. For instance, it is known that she has been a member of the Methodist Church for 56 years, has been a regular choir member for a long time, a member of the Eastern Star for 47 years, holds an officer position in the American Legion Auxiliary, served as a local and County PTA officer, served as a member of the board for the Ranger Community Library, as an officer in the Civic League, assists in all elections held at the City Hall and numerous other endeavors; however, her greatest pride is in her fine family.

Her husband, H. C. Croom, was an oil driller before he retired. He worked in Eastland County all during the boom and was one of the first drillers for the Hog Creek Oil Co. of Desdemona. They have six children: Bernice Brewer of Marlin, Lionel Croom of Artesia, N.M., Maurice Griffith of Ranger, Mary Smith of Fort Worth, James Croom now living in Refugio and Lewis Croom of Midland. They also have 10 grandchildren.

Mrs. Croom is a busy, useful citizen who somehow finds time to help in all worthwhile projects. She said she enjoys her Red Cross volunteer work because it means sharing in the work of people helping people.

Oil News Strawn Location, Wildcat Spotted In County Area

A new discovery from Strawn sand and a new wildcat location were reported in Eastland county this week.

The Strawn discovery was completed three miles northeast of Desdemona. It is Panuco Oil Leases, Inc. & Grace Oil Co., Houston, No. 1 V. Bowen Walton, et al, W. H. Sargent Survey, A-44.

Daily potential was 47.44 barrels of 40.4 gravity oil and 52 per cent water. It is pumping from 22 perforations at 1,861-65 feet. Casing is set at 1,985 feet and hole bottomed at 2,201 feet.

Request Ed name for the new area is the Northeast Desdemona (Strawn) Field.

The wildcat is E. J. Walter, Eastland, No. 1 Riley Gordon, located four miles south of Ranger. Having a proposed depth of 3,600 feet with rotary, it spots 1,263 feet from the north and 4,150 feet from the east lines of S. N. Mathias Survey.

DeLeon Burial Conducted For Child Aged 5
