EASTLAND FOLKS need to make themselves heard on a number of important matters - not the least of which is "Should local youngsters do their Trick or Treating on Halloween Carnival Night (Saturday, Oct. 25) or Halloween Night (Friday, Oct. 31) or NOT AT ALL? It's being discouraged in the big towns because of the increasing dangers from the mentally dangerous, and some are saying that the age-old practice is and will fade. In practice, it's probably a thing that couldn't and shouldn't be legislated, but determined by individual, responsible and concerned parents.

AND FURTHER: when do you pay respect to Veterans this year? Along with a number of others, nationally, Monday, Oct. 27, has been named (in providing another four-day weekend), but you may remember that Veterans Day will be observed in Texas on Tuesday, Nov. 11, as a result of legislation enacted by the 65th Texas Legislature which restored the holiday to its original date. State Sen. Lindon Williams of Houston, co-author of the bill, has been named 1975 Veterans Day Chairman for the state by Gov. Briscoe.

AND FURTHER: What's the over-all public local feeling on capitol improvements in the city? A number of responsible citizens are attempting to bring into being a first-class recreation facility for our young (and not-so-young) in the form of tournament type tennis courts. Sure they'll cost money, but there comes a time when "alternates to not spending" should be considered. Could it be that properly built, properly lighted, properly maintained courts would be more popular (and safer) gathering place for our young people than on grocery store parking lots? The school board and the city commission have been asked by this group of dedicated citizens to assist in cash, land and paperwork in helping bring this admitted asset to our town. Members of these boards are elected to serve the people and they need to know what the people think and want. Extra money is short and there's many things to do. The school people constantly scratch their heads and wonder "do we remodel and expand what we've got or should we wait to see what industrialization develops?" The city folks know they've got a big, big expense ahead in repairing the water storage tank on Park Hill. Repair and fiber-glassing planned there immediately as soon as water demand drops so that the small tank can be emptied is going to cost a lot of money. And there's water lines all over town that need to be replaced. Repairing leaks one by one is a killing undertaking. There's not just a few who think that Eastland's streets are a mess. Should a major repaving, paving effort be considered? Yes, it'd cost money, a lot of money. It'd provide jobs. Perhaps the water tower and water lines could be done on revenue bonds (without tax increases). Perhaps the streets and tennis courts could be done another way. Perhaps the city money spent now on trying to keep things patched could go a long way toward new facilities. (Right now, the city is hoping that a Moody Foundation Grant application will be honored to help pay half of renovating City Park Hill, along with half of the cost to be paid by the Board of Outdoor Recreation. And if this should all come to pass as hoped, it could be like a re-built park coming as an outright gift. It may be Christmas-book wishing but there's no harm in asking.) Perhaps a lot of things. But there's no doubt that our local people need to voice their opinions. Your school trustees and your city commissioners want to know. It's the Democratic way.

AND FURTHER: Locals will, on Tuesday, Nov. 4, help decide the fate of a proposed new constitution for Texas. Absentee voting is on right now at the County Clerk's office through Thursday, Oct. 30. There's eight propositions on the ballot, and statewide passage of either or all will put that particular portion into effect. The local Bar Association has come out against every section, as has State Sen. Tom Creighton and Gov. Briscoe. (State Rep. Joe Hanna has not taken a position, electing to just let the people decide.)

Our mail is FULL of "reasons why" various groups are for and just as many against. Today, the Texas Association of School Administrators speak against the education and finance articles. The Grain Sorghum Producers Association says, on the other hand, that the finance article "does not" delegate any new authority to the legislature. "In fact", a spokesman says, "it is more restrictive than the present constitution."

The ballot itself is a bit confusing and should be studied carefully because of the mixed-language arrangement: (the "for" portion appears to be for English readers only, and the "against" portion appears to be for Spanish readers, so voters should be especially careful.)

For what it's worth, we plan to vote against all the propositions; because we don't think the present document is all that bad, and because people whose judgment we respect are saying that the new document has more bad than good in it.

What is the background? On Nov. 4, 1975, the voters of Texas will have the opportunity to vote on a new Constitution, climaxing a series of events that began in 1972 when the voters approved a constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to sit as a Constitutional Convention.

Following several months of study and recommendations by a citizens' revision commission, the legislator-delegates assembled in Austin in January 1974 to revise the present document which has shaped the operation of Texas government since 1876. The Convention adjourned unsuccessfully, however, after failing by three votes to obtain the necessary two-thirds requirement for submission to the people. In January 1975, the 64th Texas Legislature, composed basically of the same people who had failed to adopt the Convention's document, overwhelmingly endorsed eight separate revision proposals that are substantially the same as the ill-fated Convention document.

The document will be presented through eight separate propositions covering eleven articles, with voters having the opportunity to approve any or all of them. An adaption schedule has been provided to take care of the technicalities should some articles be adopted while others fail. The Bill of Rights, Article I of the present Constitution, is retained in its entirety.

The present Constitution has been amended 218 times and contains approximately 64,000 words. The proposed document has eliminated much of the unnecessary language and contains only 17,500 words.

AND PLEASE don't ever say: "Well, I just don't understand it, so I won't bother to vote." Every vote is important. Guesses are that the big cities will probably turn out in droves to vote "for" the new Constitution, so it's doubly important that the rural vote be heard.

If you are asking, "What can I do? I am only just one person?", let me point out that -
By one vote, the House of Hanover won the English throne in 1701.
By one vote Oliver Cromwell won control of England in 1645.
By one vote, Thomas Jefferson, John Quincy Adams and Rutherford B. Hayes became President of the United States.
By one vote, the Nazi party in Germany in 1933 was elected as its ruler Adolph Hitler.
So don't under rate your individual importance. Each person does what he can and it all adds up.

Eastland County Ranks 4th In Peanut Production

AUSTIN - Eastland County made an important contribution to Texas agriculture in 1974 by placing fourth in the state in the production of peanuts.

According to Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, farmers harvested almost 37 million pounds. Short moisture conditions plagued most of the state's peanut crop last year, and many areas failed to plant full intentions because of too little moisture. Early stands made very slow progress. Adequate to surplus moisture was available from late summer to early fall, but cool weather retarded growth and development. Consequently, harvest was delayed, and both statewide yields and quality were affected.

Texas ranked third in the nation in the production of peanuts with over 413 million pounds.

The Japs Give Up Unconditionally-- Allied Troops Told to Cease Firing; Enemy Gets Orders for Surrender

A City Goes Wild-- And Nobody Cares

Every Whistle Summons Crowds --But the Church Bells Ring, Too

The end of the long haul came at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon in San Francisco—and the city went wild.

Split seconds after word of the war's end was flashed from the White House, the celebration started.

It spilled and surged and mounted through cradles upon cradles into a demonstration without parallel in the city's history.

MARKET STREET IS HUB

Market street was the center of the celebration, but there was hilarity and excitement and gratitude—and prayers—throughout the city.

The air rumbled with the sound of factory whistles and ship's whistles—and church bells. Anything that could make a noise was blown, or pounded or beaten.

People surged from their homes into the streets and headed down town. The down town stores closed within a few minutes and sent their workers and customers out into the streets. Some of these people headed for home, but most of them stayed down town, willy-nilly.

By 4:15 o'clock, scarcely a street car could move on Market street. Automobile traffic was at the peril of unattended, laughing, shouting passengers, who climbed aboard fenders or perched themselves on roof tops.

TRAFFIC SNARLED

Traffic was hopelessly tied up on the city's main thoroughfare—both because of the density of the crowds and the pranks of the celebrants. Stated servicemen swarmed over the

Today and Tomorrow-- Legal Holidays

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (AP)—President Truman tonight officially declared Aug. 15 and 16—Wednesday and Thursday—legal holidays to permit payment of time and a half to essential workers who must stay on the job.

He said that since the National War Labor Board had permitted the payment of straight time wages for employees who are excused from working on those days, many employers had requested that employees who do work on those days should receive premium compensation.

Whether there was a proclamation issued, or a state seal. All that mattered was that the war had ended—and the days of "blood, sweat and tears" were over.

The churchbells rang for victory, too, and the houses of worship of all faiths were crowded by the devout.

But there was nothing irreverent in the more spectacular observance which went on in Market street. Many who had lost brothers or husbands or sons in the war found that the void was somewhat less if they joined in the parading and shouting.

San Francisco let go for the celebration with the same energy with which it had fought during the war. There is still a clamp of military security over the number of San Franciscans who were sent into battle by their draft boards, but and tomorrow to be legal national holidays. Tokyo Radio Tells Nation To Stand By

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 14 (AP)—Tokyo radio said Tuesday (S. F. time), Emperor Hirohito, breaking all tradition, personally would broadcast an important announcement to Japan and Japanese-occupied areas of Asia at 8 p. m. P. W. T. followed by Premier Baron Admiral Kantaro Suzuki.

It seemed apparent that the Emperor would tell his people, for the first time, that he had surrendered Nippon unconditionally to the Allies.

Text of an official Japanese Domestic News Agency broadcast, recorded by United Press, here:

"His imperial majesty, the Emperor, will be graciously pleased to broadcast to the nation through the radio at 11 noon today (Wednesday).

"Following his majesty's broadcast, Premier Baron Kantaro Suzuki will speak. Important announcements will also be made.

"All Tokyo morning papers postponed publication until 1300 (11 p. m.) today, in order to carry an important announcement after the personal broadcast of his majesty.

Attlee Gives The Big News To Britain

By the Associated Press

LONDON, Aug. 15—In calm tones Prime Minister Attlee told millions of war weary Britons in a midnight (4 p. m. P.W.T.) broadcast that "Japan has today surrendered. The list of our enemies is laid low."

The Prime Minister, during his five-minute talk, quickly reviewed the Japanese war, paid tribute to "our fleet, armies and air forces that have fought so well in the arduous campaign against Japan," and said:

"Our gratitude goes out to all our splendid Allies, and above all to the United States, without whose prodigious efforts this war in the East would still have many years to run."

Attlee said that Wednesday and Thursday would be holidays in Britain.

The fact that the Prime Minister was to broadcast at midnight was disclosed only a short time in advance, but listeners everywhere crowded around available radios and stood in hushed silence as the chimes of Big Ben tolled the hour of peace and then Attlee came on the air.

The Potsdam Declaration Accepted, Truman Declares In an Official Statement

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14—Peace came to the world tonight when President Truman announced that Japan has accepted unconditional surrender and that Allied forces have been ordered to cease firing.

General Douglas MacArthur, "the man who came back," was named Supreme Allied Commander to receive the formal Japanese surrender.

World War II—the bloodiest conflict in human history—was at an end, except for the formality of signing surrender documents.

V-J day will not be proclaimed until after the instruments of surrender are signed.

America's three allies in the Pacific war—Great Britain, Russia and China—will be represented at the signing by high-ranking officers.

Mr. Truman proclaimed the tidings (at 4 p. m. Pacific War-time), shortly after he received Tokyo's formal reply to the Allied surrender terms.

Summoning reporters to his office, he read a statement which said:

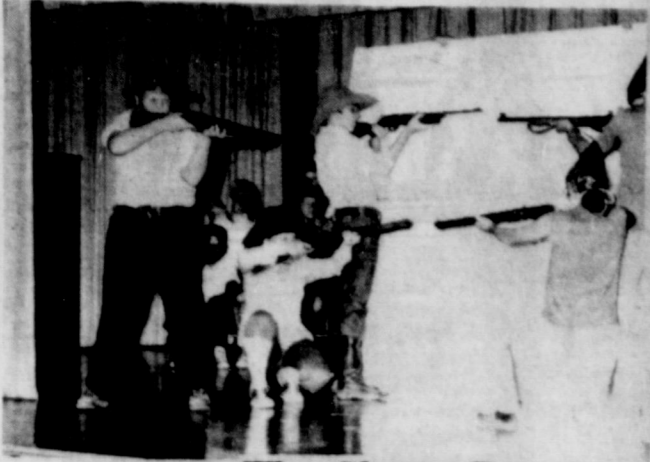
"I deem this reply a full acceptance of the Potsdam Declaration which specified the unconditional surrender of Japan.

"In the reply there is no qualification."

Swine Production Short Course Scheduled At Ranger High

A Swine Production Short Course for adult farmers will be held November 10-11-12-13 under the sponsorship of the Ranger High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. James Clark, Superintendent, and Mr. Beverly Dudley, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Robert S. Cohen, Swine Production Specialist with the Vocational Agricultural Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science of Texas A&M University.

Dr. Cohen received a B.S. degree in Animal Science in 1965, and a M.S. degree in Animal Nutrition in 1972 from Texas A&M University. He has also received the Ph.D. degree in Animal Nutrition from Texas A&M University, 1975.

He was raised on a swine and beef cattle ranch in Southeastern Llano County, Texas, and was very active in FFA and 4-H programs. During the early 1960's, Dr. Cohen was employed at the Texas A&M University Swine Center. Between periods of formal training, he worked for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Williamson and Eastland Counties and completed active duty with the U.S. Air Force Reserve.

The short course at Ranger High School is scheduled to begin Nov. 10 at 7:00 p.m. in the Vocational Agriculture class room in the High School Building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Nov. 11-12-13. During the dates the short course is in progress, Dr. Cohen will be available to assist Swine producers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Dudley.

Producers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. James Clark, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Beverly Dudley. An enrollment fee of \$5 will be charged.

Swine Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each Swine producer who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Cohen states that pork producers must make a serious effort to increase efficiency of production in the future. In-

creasing costs of equipment and services purchased, accompanied by fluctuating prices received at the market are contributing factors. The number of pigs produced per sow per year and the amount of weight gain from a pound of

between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University," states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas A&M.

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people."

Specialists are now available in the fields of Swine Production, Beef Production, Farm Electric Wiring and Safety, Farm Electric Motors, Farm Arc Welding, Tractor Maintenance, Pasture, and Oxy-Acetylene Welding.

He also states the course will include such important topics as swine selection and breeding programs, feeds, and feeding, housing and equipment, herd health and sanitation, management for profitable production, marketing, and records.

Short courses in swine production, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under the cooperative program

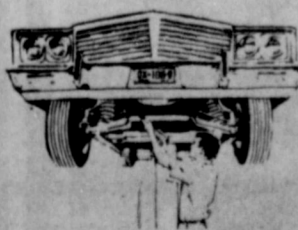

Young and old attended the auction buck sale and carried away hundreds of dollars in merchandise donated by participating Eastland merchants.

Stores in Eastland reported record breaking sales, both on sidewalk sales and inside sales.

missioner Bill Hoffmann made the motion for approval. Second came from Charles Marshall and the matter was passed unanimously. A second reading will be required and the rate is scheduled to go into effect on bills rendered on or after Jan. 1.

Comanche Trail Councilman Mike Collins appeared and reported that the council wished to continue its study for possible use of Ringling Lake, reporting that the council finds the Lake the best site in the eight-county council. "We just want to keep the door open", Mr. Collins said, "for continued study before definite proposals are made."

A committee seeking to develop four tournament quality tennis courts appeared asking assistance from the city. H.T. Wilson served as spokesman and joining were D.R. Martin, Steve Church, Larry Duncan and Jim Pat Miller.

Explaining the advantages of providing first class tennis facilities, the group explained that they had determined that estimates are that four such courts could be installed (at a site west of the present new gym) for about \$15,000 each for a total of \$60,000, half of which could be secured from the Board of Outdoor Recreation, provided that the other 50 percent can be obtained locally. The group has appeared before the school board asking that that body donate the land to the city for the tennis courts use and to provide \$15,000 toward the total cost. The city was asked to provide \$15,000 and to handle the application as well as assume the responsibility for low maintenance of the courts.

Commissioners explained that they certainly appreciated the value of good tennis courts and were sympathetic to the effort but that certain projects including the possible spending of up to \$50,000 to repair one of the water tanks on Park Hill, is just around the corner, and there just isn't any spare money available.

Asked if a bond issue for the courts was being asked, committeemen responded that they weren't in a position to suggest such. Duncan reported that he presently has some 30 students in tennis program at EHS and expects upwards of 50 after football and basketball season ends.

Engineer Billy Jacobs appeared and asked a change order on the sewer plant to increase the job by some \$2,158.35 to install different

types of pumps due to a heavy sand content here. This was passed and brings the total cost of the plant to \$310,992.16. On a motion by Mr. Hoffmann and second and unanimous passage it was agreed that the city will not pay off the final five percent \$15,000 until final acceptance comes from the Environmental Protection Agency.

In a discussion on taxes, it was agreed that there could be no waiver of penalty and interest on back taxes as requested by some citizens, and in fact that an active program be initiated with the assistance of attorneys to collect the some \$50,000 due the city in past due taxes.

Chairman H.V. O'Brien presided and other topics discussed included the appointment of a municipal judge and the formal naming of a city attorney of record.

Commissioners also discussed briefly the possibility of considering city employee salaries at the November

meeting and asked City Manager Lewis Tiner to be able to give some recommendation on how much (or how little) would be available to be considered.
