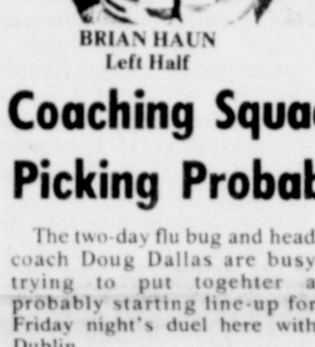

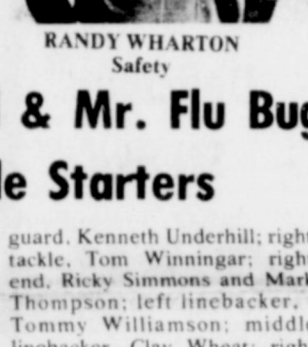

### Oil News

Safari Drilling Company of Abilene has completed a Conglomerate gas discovery in northwest Eastland County, four miles northeast of Putnam.

The No. 2 Agnew rated an absolute open flow potential of 28 million cubic feet of gas per day, with a gas-liquid ratio of 147,740-1 from perforations at 3,653-57; 3,661-67; 4,026-42 and 4-073-85 feet. Gravity of the liquid is 62 degrees.

Hole was drilled to 4,095 feet, and 4 1/2" casing was set at 4,090 feet. No treatment was reported.

Top of the pay was picked at 3,650 feet on ground elevation of 1,508 feet.

The opener spots 330 feet from north and east lines of Section 3174, TE&L Survey.

## Peanut Field Day Announced

STEPHENVILLE. (Spl) ... The 1975 Peanut Field Day highlighting research in progress on the state's fifth most important money crop will be held Thursday, September 11, at the Texas A&M University - Tarleton Experiment Station at Stephenville.

Plans for the annual event have been announced by James S. Newman, associate professor in charge with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Tours, educational displays and peanut implement exhibits will be open to the public from 1 to 5 p.m.

"Research on peanut diseases and new varieties will highlight the field day this year," said Newman.

Other topics to be featured at various tour stops will include fertility, insects, nutgrass control and irrigation. New bermudagrass hybrids and other forage studies will also be

on the tour. A shuttle service will carry field day visitors from the Station headquarters every 15 minutes to the various research sites, Newman pointed out.

Research scientists and specialists participating in tour discussions will be on hand to discuss specific problems with producers.

The field day is being sponsored by the Experiment Station in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Peanut Producers Board, Tarleton State University, Texas Department of Agriculture, Southwest Peanut Growers Association and the Agricultural Research Service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Sixty-five percent of Texas' peanut acres lie in Central and North Texas. Statewide, peanuts are second only to rice in income to producers on a per acre basis, Newman noted.

The Experiment Station is located two miles north of Stephenville on U.S. Highway 281. Growers and other interested individuals from throughout the major peanut producing areas of Texas are invited to attend.

## Bullock: Federal Decontrol of Oil Prices More Than It Will Produce

AUSTIN - Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that federal decontrol of oil prices will cost Texans many times more than it will produce for the state treasury.

"Even as rich as Texas is in oil, Texans will come out the losers," Bullock said of President Ford's threatened veto of continued controls.

Bullock forecast that decontrol would cost Texas consumers during the next year \$625 million in higher gasoline prices and yield only \$170 million to the state in additional tax revenues.

"A poor trade," Bullock said. Bullock said that "the mammoth tax bill Texas faces in 1977 might be denied but it won't be knocked out by increased oil tax income."

Bullock said his projection on consumer gasoline costs were based on an eight-cent a gallon price rise "as a compromise between the three cents the Ford Administration talks about and the 15 cents it could be."

He said the oil estimates were based on oil prices of

## Better Place To Be

If you want your kids to have roots in your community, and learn about ecology, encourage them to adopt a tree. Whether you're a scout leader, school teacher, or den mother, it's one idea to help your "kids" learn about their environment. You might have each child individually adopt a tree of his or her own choice, or you could have the whole group adopt a tree to care for. Tell them to observe it closely - look at leaves, bark, insect holes, dead branches, and new growth. They can keep an on-going record of the seasonal changes in the tree by making an observation once a month.

This is just one of the ideas discussed in A Better Place to Be, an environmental learning guide from the Interior Department's Johnny Horizon Program. A copy of A Better Place to Be may be obtained by sending \$1.25 to Consumer Information, Dept. 48, Pueblo, Colorado 81009.

Other suggestions for activities include:

- Let the children form a few committees and be responsible for getting information. One group can write to various organizations for pamphlets and brochures. Another group can arrange for speakers such as:

- the children's school custodian to hear his views on the school's environment;

- a sanitation department representative to hear about city waste problems;

- a utility company representative to explain the energy situation in the city;

- a member of the town or city council to explain some of the overall concerns of the city government;

- a city planner to explain patterns and problems of urban life.

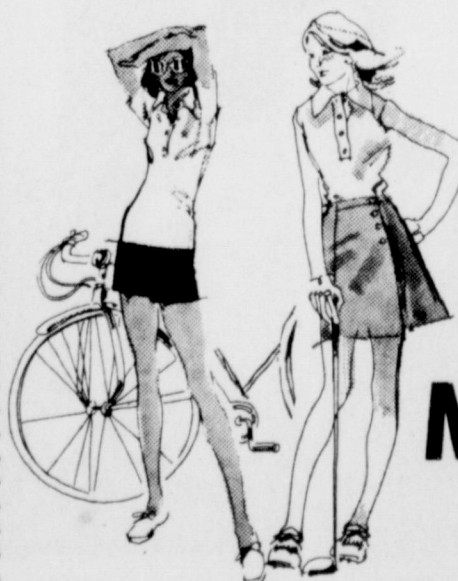

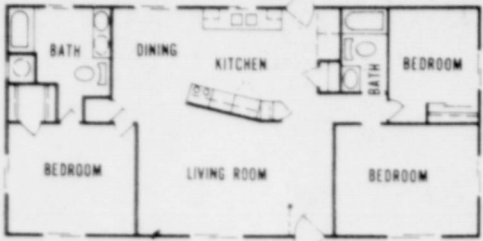

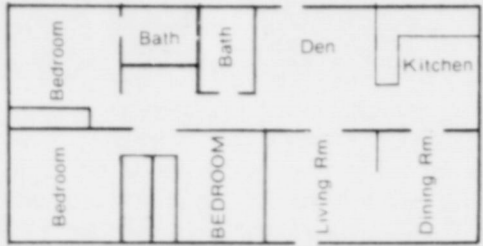

## Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — Organized crime is involved in Texas prostitution, bookmaking, fencing stolen goods, car theft and drugs, according to the latest report of Texas Organized Crime Prevention Council.

The Council's latest annual report estimates \$1 billion in illegal bets were placed with bookies last year, turning profits of nearly \$121 million.

Bookies were said to be operating in Belton, Brownsville, Corpus Christi, Dallas, Fort Worth, Galveston, Houston, Midland, Odessa and Wichita Falls and regularly contacting others in 117 Texas cities and 119 in other states.

Placing illegal bets on college and professional basketball games was pegged as the state's largest organized crime activity of 1974.

However, the Council said 1,628 prostitutes, 535 procurers and 89 madames have been identified by the Texas Department of Public Safety over the last seven years.

Income to organized crime from prostitution was estimated at about \$127 million annually, with pros-

titutes earning an average of \$1,500 a week.

The Council said no Texas membership in La Cosa Nostra has been identified, but more than 200 Texans are believed associated with the Dixie Mafia operating in Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mississippi and other southeastern states.

### Insurance Hearing Set

The State Insurance Board tentatively set its annual hearing on automobile coverage rates October 1, and the industry is making no secret of the fact another increase will be asked.

Industry spokesmen said inflation and increasing "average loss" cost will force rates up, though accident frequency may have declined slightly.

The Board granted an average 8.8 per cent rate increase for auto insurance effective last January 16 — less than half the industry's request. Rates are set on the basis of losses and future projections. The October 1 hearing date conceivably could be postponed.

### Hot Oil Probed

Atty. Gen. John Hill and the FBI have joined in the investigation of an alleged major crude oil theft ring which might extend into Louisiana.

Hill said thefts have occurred in West Texas (three were arrested in the Ballinger area) and in the Cherokee Field of Milam County.

A Railroad Commission representative said "spotters" for the thieves find out where oil is stored on leases, and participating truckers roll up in early morning hours to load the oil and haul it to a refinery with bogus credentials from an East Texas independent oil operator.

Roy Payne, Railroad Commission field operations director, said a syndicate appears to have been set up to steal the costly crude oil. Hill said he suspects an organized theft ring, possibly extending across state lines. Some operators complained of thousands of dollars in losses.

### "Recovery Begins"

Texas economic recovery, after a downturn, is starting slowly, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Encouraging signs included rising urban residential construction, a decrease in the seasonally-adjusted unemployment claims, lengthened work week and an improving job picture in individual labor market areas.

Austin, Dallas-Fort Worth and Houston areas reported large job increases. Corpus Christi, Longview-Marshall, McAllen-Pharr-Edinburg, Midland-Odessa, Tyler and Waco areas showed small increases in June. El Paso and Lubbock registered significant decreases in June employment.

### AG Opinions

Attorney General John Hill held bonds required on mobile homes cover liability only insofar as it grows out of the warranty of the manufacturer or dealer. He said surety on the bonds may minimize liability by requiring that its principal carry products liability insurance against such loss.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

- A new law authorizing payment of compensation to state employees killed or injured while performing duties of a hazardous position is subject to strict interpretation and definitions.

- A public hospital may contract with a private hospital for care of charity patients.

- Building information submitted to a public body as a requirement for a building permit is public. Whether plans are public is a question of fact.

- A justice of the peace may hold court for any other

justice whose precinct is in the same county.

- Juvenile probation officers in Tarrant County are not subject to the county civil service act.

- Ten dollars of each optometrist renewal fee must be deposited with the University of Houston: Development Fund for the School of Optometry.

- The State Board of Professional Engineers may not restrict use of the word "engineer" in academic titles such as dean or professor of engineering.

Briscoe picked Mrs. Billie Jean Bell of Houston and Dr. Barbara Woodard of Dallas to the State Board of Nurse Examiners; Dr. S. M. Elliott of Dayton, Dr. John P. Johnston of Houston and Dr. Clifford E. Nearpass Jr. of Dallas to the Board of Chiropractic Examiners and Dr. James Walter Simmons of San Antonio to the Governor's Commission on Physical Fitness.

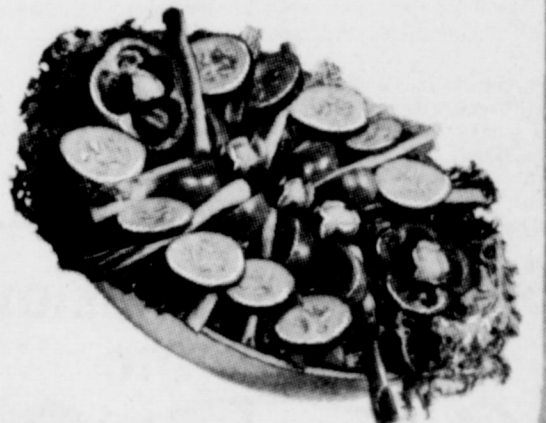

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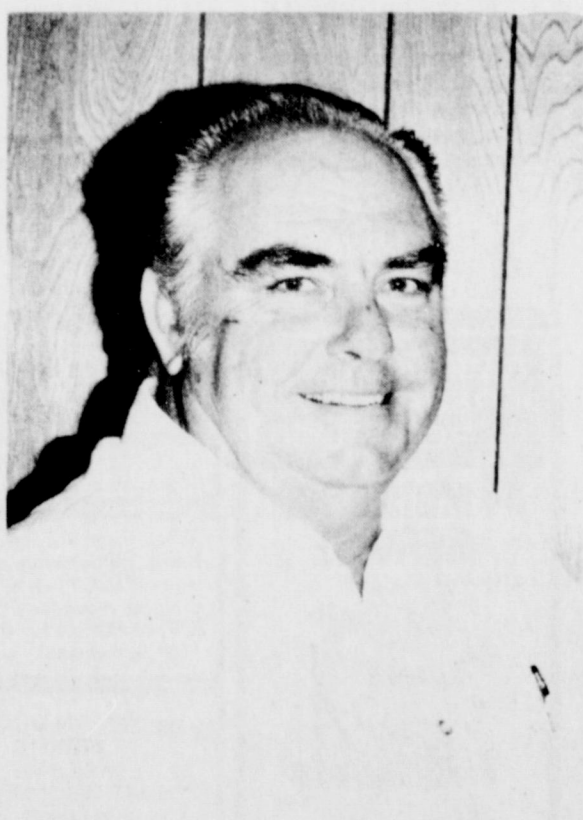
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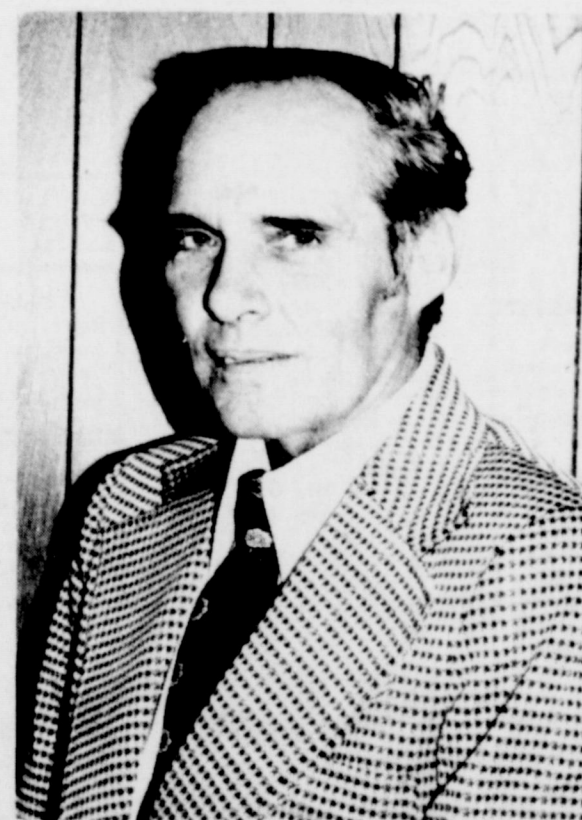

COLLEGE STATION -- "Reasonable" turkey prices are getting end - of - summer attention at meat counters, Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt said this week.

Prices are lower due to a larger - than - usual turkey crop produced last year - with another crop expected in a few months, the consumer marketing information specialist explained.

Fryer chickens, however, are up in price.

"At beef counters, features are scattered, but some appear on chuck roasts and steaks, round steak and ground beef - with a few on sirloin and rib cuts," she added.

Mrs. Clyatt is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

Summer (soft shell) squash underscores vegetable economy this week, while moderate prices accompany supplies of cabbage, okra, carrots, corn, cucumbers and cshaw.

"Most fruit counters are well stocked with cantaloupe, watermelon, plums, prunes, nectarines and seedless grapes," the specialist said.

At dairy counters, milk continues to be a good value, and, elsewhere in most grocery stores, canned tuna is a feature.



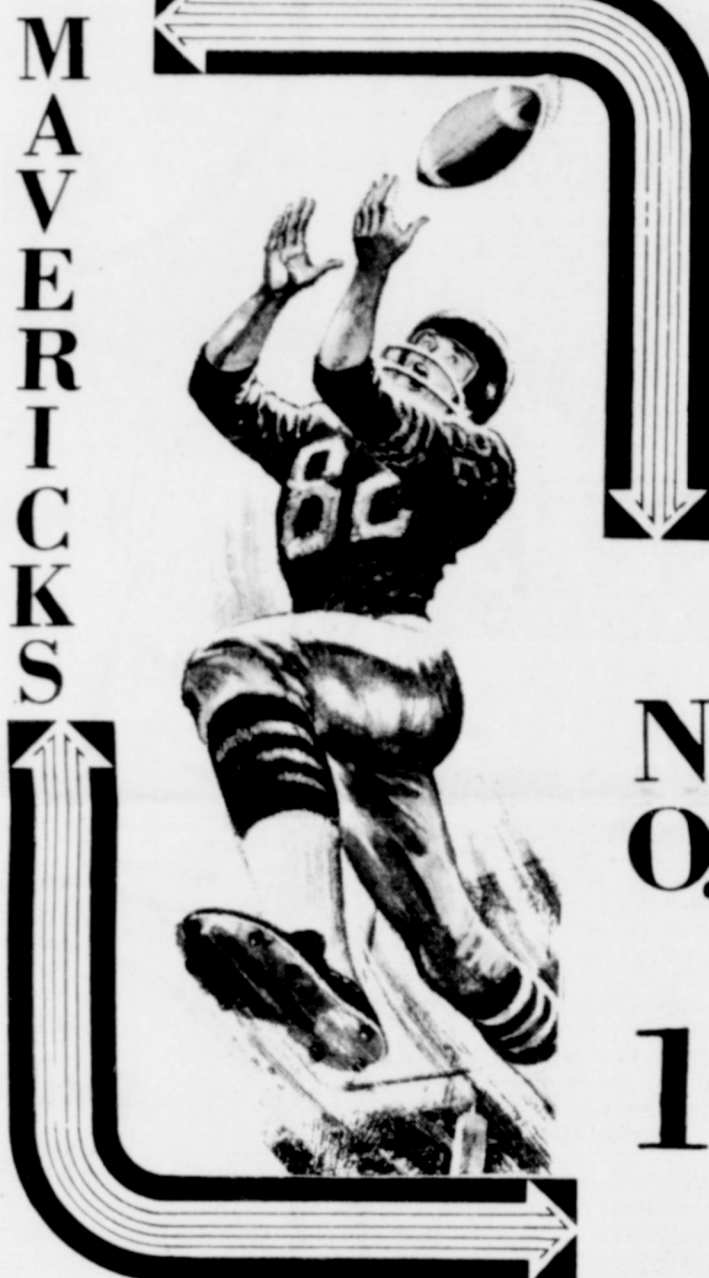
