55 MPH Speed Limit Decreases Deaths

Is John Q. Motorist obeying the 55 mph speed limit? Is it saving gasoline and lives? What are its drawbacks? Engineers at the Highway Users Federation have been studying these questions since the national speed llimit was approved January 2, 1974 and have come up with some answers.

On main rural roads, where the temptation to speed is greatest, about half of all drivers exceed the 55 mph speed limit.But before the 55 limit, about 70 percent of all drivers exceeded 55 mph, burning up far more gasoline than they do now.

The average driver on an intercity trip who, reluctantly or not, has reduced his speed five, ten or twenty miles per hour, knows he goes farther on each tank of gas. If he now drives a little under 60 in an average ccar when he used to go between 70 and 75, he has boosted his fuel efficienty at least 15 percent. He now goes 30 miles farther on each ten gallons of gasoline, saving one gallon for every 100 miles of intercity driving

Between January 1974 and July 1975, cars, trucks and buses travelled 650 billion miles on intercity roads and highways. At pre 55 speeds, they would have used three billion extra gallons of gasoline. Now, they are saving those three billion gallons which is more than enough to keep all the cars in Indiana and Arizona going for one year.

On the safety side, Federation engineers say there is no doubt about traffic safety improvement since the advent of the 55 mph limit. But they also say there are many different "findings" and opinions on how much of the safety improvement has been caused by the drop in speed alone. New travel characteristics

and traffic patterns have also boosted safety. More of the traffic on main rural roads now travels at about the same speed - - or at the same "pace" cutting the hazards of passing and overtaking. Federation engineers say this uniform traffic flow is a more significant factor in the accident reduction than the speed

One drawback to the 55 mph speed limit is the growing body of bureaucratic regulations which place heavy administrative, manpower, and financial burdens on state highway and traffic law enforcement agencies. Another drawback is the possibility of unrealistic goals for driver compliance. Federal regulations which discuss 90 percent compliance with the 55 mph speed limit by 1977 stand about as much chance of public acceptance as prohibition did, say many observers. Some highways are designed to handle higher speeds safely, and the motoring public knows

Another drawback is the danger that arbitrary national speed limits may be seen as a panacea for solving all traffic safety problems, when in fact a balanced safety program covering engineering, education and law enforcement, will always be

So, those who have studied the effects of the 55 mph speed limit say that no balance, it is working and working well.

WASHINGTON-The Senate has taken a "let them eat , cake" attitude toward American ranchers and consumers.

The Senate has approved a bill that would forbid the use of the chemical additive diethystilbestrol (DES) as a supplement in cattle feed. Ranchers and consumers will pay dearly if this unwise, uncalled-for bill becomes law. Ranch income will plunge, and consumer prices-especially beef priceswill soar

DES has two primary uses: as a growth-stimulating hormone intended for feeding or subcutaneous ear implanting in feedlot cattle, and as a "morning after" contraceptive. The controversy over DES stems from its use as an oral contraceptive. DES, when ingested, can cause a rare form of vaginal cancer in the female offspring, and sterility in the male offspring, or women who use it as a contraceptive.

There is no scientific evidence yet, however, to indicate that harm could come to a person who eats DES-fed beef. A small percentage of beef livers in U.S. Department of Agriculture testing have been found to contain up to two parts per billion of DES. But DES has never been found in red meat tissues. There has not been a single report of a harmful effect from eating meat from DES-fed cattle in 20 years of use.

If five per cent of DES-fed cattle livers contained two parts per billion of DES, a person would have to consume five million pounds of liver per year for 50 years in order to equal the intake of DES from a single treatment of the DES oral contraceptive.

Despite this evidence, the Senate bill would ban the use of DES as a cattle feed supplement, but would permit the continued use of the hormone as an oral contraceptive. I find this incredible

DES teeding saves an average of 81 pounds of feed for each 100 pounds of gain in beef steers. On a yearly basis, the saving is 7.7 billion pounds of feed-an amount roughly equal to the total feed grain purchases being made by the Soviet Union. In terms of corn, the saving is equal to releasing more than 1.5 million acres of corn land for production of other crops. This is an incredible amount of grain to throw away for nothing.

I am as concerned as any person can be about the possible health hazard posed by DES. It is imperative that we find out as much as we can about the possible effects of the hormone. If there is any evidence whatever that DES used as a cattle feed will cause cancer, it should of course be banned. But this drastic step would cost beef producers and consumers millions of dollars in additional costs, so it should not be taken unless and until there is evidence that DES, used as a cattle feed, is harmful. 

Dr. Treadwell Attends Academy Of Family Physicians

CHICAGO--Dr. M.A. Treadwell is attending the 27th Annual Scientific Assembly of the American Academy of Family Physicians in Chicago. The medical meeting began October 6 and runs through October 9. More than 3,500 family doctors are participating in this once-a-year continuing education conclave.

The local physician, who is a member of the Academy, will hear 18 nationally-known speakers discuss up-to-the-minute health care topics. He will also have an opportunity to attend clinical seminars on 38 different topics and visit some 100 scientific and 250 technical exhibits.

Subjects covered in this four day scientific session are of children, managing the difficult diabetic, and medical ethics.

The Academy, headquartered in Kansas City, is the nation's second largest medical association. It was the pioneer among medical organizations in requiring its members to take continuing education. Its 37,000 members must complete 150 hours of mandatory continuing study every three years.
