FARMERS SHOPPING for needed equipment in the coming program. She may be reached months may be faced with a rather pleasant change - - wider selections and, maybe, somewhat lower prices.

After a year of record low farm equipment inventories in 1974 and the resulting skyrocketing prices, equipment supplies are once again increasing to the point that prices may ease somewhat during the remainder of the year.

That's the contention of Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Although farm income was down last year and is projected to be down again during 1975, expansions in crop acreage and the recent strength in livestock prices may stimulate some equipment purchases later in the year", points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Of course, a big factor would be the softening or at least stabilizing of equipment prices.

During the first half of 1975, tractor sales have been 19 percent below the pace set during the first six months last year. However, the sales of self - propelled combines increased 25 percent during the first half of 1975 compared to the same time period last year.

The average price farmers paid for farm machinery rose 14 percent during the first half of this year while wholesale prices increased only 5 percent. Also, motor vehicle prices rose only 5 percent. "This indicates that dealer margins on farm equipment have increased in recent years, and with inventories increasing, the time may be ripe for farmers to do some bargaining" points out Hayenga

"Overall, it looks like the supply - demand situation for farmer equipment is shifting back from the imbalance of last year to a more traditional level", adds the economist.

Ranger General To Offer Coronary **Care Programs**

Ranger General Hospital is sponsoring a series of in . service programs for health care personnel who are interested in coronary care. The program consists of three weekly sessions - the first to be conducted by Robert Conner, M.T., an employee of the Ranger Hospital. He will instruct participants how to run 12 lead electrocardiograms. There will be ample opportunity for each person to practice this procedure until he feels confident of his performance. The second session, the following week, will be conducted by Dr. Luther Gohlke, Ranger physician, who will teach the significance of EKG results, the meaning of the various leads, and basic interpretations of the heart tracing. Dr. Watkins, also Ranger physician, will be in charge of the third session when he will discuss what expertise the physician expects from a coronary care nurse

The prupose of these programs is to help nurses gain more self - confidence in their ability to perform in a coronary care unit. 



If you are limited on freezer space and canning equipment, and still have fruit and vegetables you want to preserve--try drying them!

Fruits and vegetables can be preserved by drying--the oldest nethod known to man.

The local Extension Office has a new publication entitled Drying--Fruits and Vegetables at Home" which is free upon request. This bulletin gives nformation on drying, and oven drying methods. Fruits and vegetables generally make a better product if they are pretreated before drying and the methods recommended in the bulletin include sulfuring, steam blanching, syrup blanching, and treating with ascorbic

If you would like to dry apples, the directions are: DRIED APPLES

Preparation: wash, peel and core. Cut into slices or rings one-eighth inch to 1/2 inch thick or into quarters or eighths. To prevent browning during preparation, treat cut portions with an ascorbic acid solution (21/2 teaspoons of ascorbic acid to each 1 cup of cold water).

Pretreatment: Blanch in steam 10 minutes. Directions on how to steam blanch: use a kettle with close fitting lid, and a wire basket, colander, or sieve placed so the steam can circulate freely around the fruit. Make sure water does not come in contact th the fruit. Layer the apples in the basket no more than 21/2 iches deep.

Drying Procedure: Arrange apples on trays. (If ou use screen do not use galvanized screen wire.) A





Higher Education Committee To Study Interim Topics

The House Committee on Higher Education will consider six different topics during this legislative interim, and their recommendations could greatly affect the future of all Texas post-secondary institutions

One of the more weighty challenges to be tackled by the 11-member committee is to research and recommend improvements in the state funding procedure for all colleges and universities, as well as junior

This past legislative session brought to light some of the inequities in distributing state funds to both junior colleges and upper-level institutions", noted Committee Chairman Fred Head. "Too many postsecondary institutions are not accountable for how they spend state funds, and too many receive little or no support from their district's taxpayers.

'We've got to have a more uniform funding procedure so that each institution receives no more and no less than its fair share of state dollars", asserted Head. "There's no room for inefficiency in our state's higher education budget; we need to save money wherever we can.'

Other topics to be studied by the Committee on Higher Education include the role and scope of the Coordinating Board with an eye towards its efficiency in handling the problems and needs of higher



Publication Discusses Benefits

DALLAS--North Texas residents without retirement benefits at work can learn about the tax advantages of having their own programs by reading a new Internal Revenue Service (IRS) publication now available free from IRS offices.

A.W. McCanless, IRS district director for North Texas, said that the brochure. "Tax Information on Individual Retirement Savings Programs", explains portions of a new law that permits employed and selfemployed taxpayers who do not participate in pension, profit sharing or similar programs to make tax deductible contribu-tions to 15% of their earnings, up to \$1500 a year, into an

individual retirement program. The individual pays no tax on the contributions, interest or other income earned until the money is withdrawn from the program -- normally at retirement. At that time, chances are the individual will be in a lower tax bracket than during his or her earning years.

Mobile Home Dealers Could Be Forced Out

AUSTIN--Without some type Bond Pool program established within the next two weeks, approximately 80% of the mobile home dealers in Texas will be forced to close their doors, according to Frank Hopkins. Chairman of the Board for the Texas Mobile Home Association.

To alleviate this problem, a scries of six statewide meetings will be conducted on August 26 and 27 for the purpose of enrolling participants in the Bond Pool program. The meetings are scheduled for Lubbock, Arlington, Harlingen, and Houston on Tuesday, August 26. and Longview and San Antonio on August 27.

Under the requirements of the Texas Mobile Home Standards Act--passed in the last the Texas Legislature--all mobile home manufacturers, dealers and sales persons doing business in Texas must be bonded by Sept. 1. The ond for manufacturers is \$100,000, \$25,000 for dealers

and \$2.000 for sales persons. Ambiguities in the law have made it difficult for dealers and manufacturers to obtain bonding through normal channels due to financial underwriting requirements by the bonding companies calling for evidence of net worth of up to 10 times the face amount of the bond and, in many cases, the requirement of 100% cash collateral. There is also some question that many bonding companies will even write the bonds because of the wording contained in the act.

Despite a preponderance of evidence supporting the crisis facing many manufacturers and dealers. Texas Attorney General John Hill has rejected repeated requests for delays in the September 1 effective date according to Les Bearss. TMHA President. "we are not anxious to get into the bonding business". Bearss said. "but we do feel it is the only acceptable alternative to the fact that many of our dealer members and others face extinction unless the Bond Pool program can be successfully established.

It was also announced that the TMHA Board of Directors has authorized legal counsel to seek an injunction from the courts to gain the time necessary that dealers and manufacturers need to obtain their bonds. Bearss added that plans are also underway to challenge the constitutionality of the new law in federal court.

Wildlife Commission **Announces Dove Hunting Hours**

AUSTIN--A change to all-day dove shooting hours during a special 1976 season apparently has confused a great many

But the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is emphasizing that the full days of dove hunting will apply only during the second portion of a split season--from January 3 through January 18--in the South Zone of the state.

Traditional noon-to-sunset hours must be observed during the continuous mourning dove season Sept. 1 through Oct. 30, in the North Zone and in the first portion of the season in the South Zone, Sept. 20 through Nov. 2, except in those counties where white-winged doves and mourning doves may be hunted in early September, when the fall open season closes Oct. 26 instead of Nov. 2

According to P&WD Executive Director Clayton T. Garri-"The all day season was established by the Parks and Wildlife Commission on our dove populations. We were given the option to hunt full days during all or any part of our open seasons on doves by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, but chose to use it only during the winter hunt in the South Zone

The South Zone includes all those counties south and east of and including: Maverick, Zavala, Frio, Atascosa, Wilson, Guadalupe, Caldwell, Bastrop. Lee. Burleson, Brazos, Madison, Walker, Trinity, Angelina, San Augustine and Sabine.

Garrison said that Texans have not had day-long dove shooting since 1950. Another major departure this year is seven half-days of white-winged dove hunting--Sept. 1 and 2. Sept. 5, 6 and 7, and Sept. 13 and 14--the longest white-wing season since 1943.




Do You Remember

In the latter stages of the war, all the able bodied young men were gone away to take their place among the combat troops. Those young men from the community who could not pass the physical were used in the plants building materials and equipment for the fighting men. here were many young women from the communities who helped out in the plants. All this left the older folks to remain at home, run their stores and manage the farms. It was on the farms where the absence of the young men was most noticed. The older people could not keep up with the proper planting and cultivation that would produce the most grain and produce They did the best they could and hoped the war would not last too long. With the absence of the young men and their rifles idle, the rabbits increased in vast numbers. Even the hound dogs had become so weak and poor they could not catch a rabbit. The rabbits were eating vast amounts of the grain

crops, the produce from the gardens and even the grass in

the pastures It was evident something had to be done so a meeting was called in the community town to decide what to do about reducing the number of rabbits. They agreed to launch a rabbit This meant the people would gather up what ammunition they could and on a certain day they would meet at a certain place where they would form a ne and comb the countryside. They would kill the rabbits as they jumped and ran. Vast numbers of rabbits were killed and left along the path. The drive was so successful, neighboring communities organized their own drives and soon the rabbits were thinned out to an extent the damage they did to crops was hardly noticeable. Emergency Loans Made Available To Stockmen

COLLEGE STATION--Livestock producers facing financial problems due to current low market prices should take a close look at the Emergency

Livestock Credit Act of 1974. Just over a year old, the Act provides for emergency financial help to the producer whose business has a good chance of success if it can survive the current liquidity crisis.

Recent changes have been made in the Act that make it more palatable to both the borrower and lender", points out Dr. Wayne Hayenga, project leader in farm management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

These changes are as follows: 1. A "line of credit" is permitted, whereas the original Act permitted only a single

2. Anyone with a "substantial operation" in breeding, raising, fattening or marketing is eligible (one who devotes at least 25% of his time to, derives at least 25% of his income from, or has at least 25% of his capital invested in livestock opera-

3. The Act is extended until Dec. 31, 1976.

4. The loan period can be extended to seven years, with possible renewal for three

5. The guarantee by the Farmers Home Administration is increased from 80% of the

loss to 90% of the loan principals and interest.

6. The line of credit has been increased from the previous . \$250,000 to \$350,000 per loan.

. Secondary financing of the guaranteed portion of loans may now be made by the Federal Financing Bank, thus increasing the marketability of the securities to the lender.

8. The total authorization under the Act was reduced from \$2 billion to \$1.5 billion.

Under the original Act, almost 400 Texas lenders filled 624 guaranteed loans in 163 counties as of June 18, 1975. Total guarantee was for \$70,739 290, an average of \$113,364 per

Many cattlemen can use this type of financing, and the situation will probably continue into 1976, contends the economist. Therefore, the recent changes in the Emergency Livestock Credit Act should help them protect their operations from financial disaster in the coming months.

AUSTIN - First Texas impeachment trial in 44 years scheduled in the State

Senate September 3. A 10-count impeachment resolution against 229th District Judge O. P. Carrillo was voted by the House of Representatives August 5 by an overwhelming margin (128-16).

Gov. Dolph Briscoe fixed the trial date in cooperation with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby. presiding officer of the Se-

Leon Jaworski, Houston attorney who was chief Watergate prosecutor, will serve as special counsel for the Senate during the expected lengthy trial.

Terry Doyle of Port Arthur will serve as House special prosecutor.

Impeachment proceedings have been voted against only three Texas officials in the last century and just one, former Gov. James E. Ferguson, actually was removed from office and forbidden to run again. A two-thirds vote of the Senate is necessary for

Carrillo stands charged with a variety of wrongs, including abuse of judicial powers, political conspiracies and using county personnel and property for his personal benefit.

Campaign On

Advocates of a new constitution have opened campaign headquarters and named a campaign director for an all-out effort to begin soon after Labor Day.

The election is scheduled

November 4.

A rival "Committee to Preserve the Present Texas Constitution" also has filed necessary legal papers with the Secretary of State but

has scheduled no activities.

Rep. Ronald Earle of Austin will head the campaign office for "Citizens for the Texas Constitution." Former State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert is in overall

Atty. Gen. John Hill, House Speaker Bill Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby are among strong supporters of revision.

Governor Briscoe said he still has reservations about the legislative and financial articles, but has not decided whether to offer strong opposition.

Comptroller Bob Bullock is opposed to local government and financial articles but backs judiciary, legislative and executive article changes.

The AFL-CIO expressed opposition to judiciary and local government articles.

Tax Hike Disputed

Texas Research League disputes claims that the new state school finance law is forcing steep local tax increases.

In nearly all instances, said TRL, increases in the local share of school costs can be absorbed by shifting tax dollars from so-called "enrichment" programs into local Foundation matching fund requirements. Raising taxes is a local choice, according to

· Galveston County may not divert to other road projects \$5 million in bond proceeds committed to Bolivar

Crossing.

• A&M University may erect permanent improvements on certain land owned by the system subject to reversion to the U.S.



Eastland Philatelist Shows Rare Project

Some artists express themselves in oils or watercolors, some in clay, some in stone or metals. Marene Johnson Johnson of Eastland is truly an artist in If you haven't read about

the post office mural window, "Eastland" is probably just an exit sign on IH-20 West. But believe me, Marene's mural in stamps is worth a stop for anyone; if you're a philatelist, it's an absolute "must." Marene Johnson Johnson

was postmaster in Eastland from 1957 to 1968. Let her tell how the window was conceived in her own words. "Soon after I became postmaster, I was holding

some stamps up to the win-

their colors were-almost like stained glass. That night I actually dreamed the design of the window, and I doodled it next morning while I was talking on the phone."

THAT DOOLED sketch turned into a project that, according to the plaque under the window, used 982 hours out of seven years of her life, all on her own time; 11,217 stamps (she actually washed more than half a million); and \$12,500 of her own funds. It involved traveling to Washington. D.C. to obtain approval from the Bureau of Engraving, advice from Bureau artists and from Smithsonian Institution chemists, and correspondence with diplomats from each of the United Nations Stamps autographed by UN representa-

tives encircle the United Nations emblem in the window's central panel.

LOWER center THE panel depicts a map of Texas, using, naturally, the Alamo stamp. The panel also has the Lone Star flag, the Confederate flag and the United States flag.

"My grandfather was a dyed-in-the-wool Rebel." chuckles Mrs. Johnson. "I'm sure he would turn in his grave if he knew the red stripes in the Stars and Bars made from the stamp on which the United States capitol is pictured!

EVERY STAMP in the 6' x 10' frame had to be (ordinary glue washed would have caused the colors to deteriorate) and then mounted on tempered plate glass with a special glue. A second plate glass was then sealed on top by a glazier; the whole thing is held in place by silverplated screws, to avoid rust.

To appreciate it fully, you really have to hear Mrs. Johnson tell about the window, which she delights in doing. You can make an appointment simply by writing Mrs. Marene Johnson Johnson, Eastland, Texas 76448.

FURTHER EVIDENCE of Mrs. Johnson's creativity is the 40' x 18' floral United States flag on the courthouse lawn. Post office personnel maintain 1,250 petunia plants from April to the first frost ("Nematodes have almost ruined us this vear." wails Marene). An annual Flag Day (June 14) observance is held here each year.

to the floral flag?

"Well, one year Eastland had a Lion's Club convention," explains Marene. "I thought we needed a lion; so one of our maintenance helpers rounded up some chicken wire; we molded it into shape; then we stood off and sort of threw cement on it and, when it was dry, sprayed it with gilt

NEXT TIME you pick up menu in a restaurant, chances are it will have come from just across the street from the Eastland post office; Victor Cornelius supplies menus of every type to restaurants all over the world, from the Kip's on the corner to plush establishments you'd best not enter if you have to check the right hand column. Again, if you write in advance, Mr. Cornelius will be glad to arrange a tour through his bustling, sparkling clean plant.

NATURALLY you won't

without paying your respects to its other distinguished citizens-"Old Rip." 'Rip" made headlines when the present county courthouse was built in 1928. The cornerstone from the old courthouse, erected in 1897, was opened and "Rip" was found inside-a live horned toad! Evidently exposure to so much fresh air was more than "Rip" could stand; he died the following year and the remains are now on display in a velvet-lined, glassenclosed casket at the north entrance to the courthouse.
