## Tax Value Inflated By \$100,000.00

The city of Eastland increased its tax value by some \$100,000 in adding about 20 new pieces of property to its tax rolls and adjusted others in the annual equalization program now in session.

The City Commission, sitting as board of equalization, worked most of Thursday, reviewing the list of new pieces of property and interviewing some half dozen citizens regarding their property.

In an effort to equalize renditions, a number of larger home owners have voluntarily increased their assessments on

the city's tax rolls, and others are being urged to personally review their own individual assessments in an effort to seek equalization without an all-out, expensive professional review.

The city, like individuals and businesses, is feeling the money pinch, and is seeking to increase its revenue fairly without a general overhaul of the tax rolls or a tax increase right now.

The city strives for a rendition of one fourth of market value, and the tax rate is \$2.50 per hundred.

A neighboring city recently increased its assessment from 50 percent to 85 percent of market value.

Persons wishing to review their individual renditions may do so by contacting City Manager Lewis Tiner at the City Hall, 629-1754.

New homes throughout the city accounted for the major portion of the new renditions.

**WE'VE HAD** some nice thank yous from the nursing homes, the firemen and police for gratis newspapers which we regularly share.

**FARMERS SHOPPING** for needed equipment in the coming months may be faced with a rather pleasant change - wider selections and, maybe, somewhat lower prices.

After a year of record low farm equipment inventories in 1974 and the resulting skyrocketing prices, equipment supplies are once again increasing to the point that prices may ease somewhat during the remainder of the year.

That's the contention of Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Although farm income was down last year and is projected to be down again during 1975, expansions in crop acreage and the recent strength in livestock prices may stimulate some equipment purchases later in the year", points out the Texas A&M University System specialist. "Of course, a big factor would be the softening or at least stabilizing of equipment prices."

During the first half of 1975, tractor sales have been 19 percent below the pace set during the first six months last year. However, the sales of self-propelled combines increased 25 percent during the first half of 1975 compared to the same time period last year.

The average price farmers paid for farm machinery rose 14 percent during the first half of this year while wholesale prices increased only 5 percent. Also, motor vehicle prices rose only 5 percent. "This indicates that dealer margins on farm equipment have increased in recent years, and with inventories increasing, the time may be ripe for farmers to do some bargaining" points out Hayenga.

"Overall, it looks like the supply - demand situation for farmer equipment is shifting back from the imbalance of last year to a more traditional level", adds the economist.

**HD NEWS**

A dash of sour cream perks up summer salads—whether it's blended into the dressing or added to the salad.

Sour cream gives extra value because it adds the nutrients of milk, too.

Many consumers don't realize sour cream is just as delicious with fruits as with vegetables. Keep it on hand to try in new and tempting ways.

Some of the year's most luscious fruit is in season now—all of it appropriate for salads.

Take this opportunity to feast on fresh peaches, pears, -prunes, grapes or strawberries combined with crisp lettuce and cottage cheese, then topped with a creamy sour cream dressing.

Head lettuce will be delicious as a salad with sour cream thousand island dressing, so easy to make.

**SOUR CREAM THOUSAND ISLAND DRESSING**

1 cup dairy sour cream  
3 Tablespoons chili sauce  
2 Tablespoons chopped green pepper  
2 Tablespoons chopped pimiento  
2 Tablespoons chopped sweet pickles  
Dash of salt  
Mix well and chill thoroughly before serving over head lettuce.

If you are limited on freezer space and canning equipment, and still have fruit and vegetables you want to preserve—try drying them!

Fruits and vegetables can be preserved by drying—the oldest method known to man.

The local Extension Office has a new publication entitled "Drying—Fruits and Vegetables at Home" which is free upon request. This bulletin gives information on drying, and oven drying methods. Fruits and vegetables generally make a better product if they are pretreated before drying and the methods recommended in the bulletin include sulfuring, steam blanching, syrup blanching, and treating with ascorbic acid.

If you would like to dry apples, the directions are:  
**DRIED APPLES**

**Preparation:**  
wash, peel and core. Cut into slices or rings one-eighth inch to 1/2 inch thick or into quarters or eighths. To prevent browning during preparation, treat cut portions with an ascorbic acid solution (2 1/2 teaspoons of ascorbic acid to each 1 cup of cold water).

**Pretreatment:**  
Blanch in steam 10 minutes. (Directions on how to steam blanch: use a kettle with close fitting lid, and a wire basket, colander, or sieve placed so the steam can circulate freely around the fruit. Make sure water does not come in contact with the fruit. Layer the apples in the basket no more than 2 1/2 inches deep.)

**Drying Procedure:**  
...Arrange apples on trays. (If you use screen do not use galvanized screen wire.) A thickness of cheesecloth laid over the tray bottom will keep

**Wild Flower Workshop August 28**

AUSTIN—Everything you've ever wanted to know about growing wild flowers will be covered at the Wild Flower Workshop beginning at 9:30 a.m. on Thursday, August 28, at the Lyndon B. Johnson Library Auditorium in Austin.

Sponsored as a Bicentennial activity by the Beautify Texas Council, the workshop is aimed at private citizens who want to learn how to use the thousands of native wild flowers in their home gardens, and at community garden clubs and civic groups who wish to beautify public areas.

The workshop will bring together for one day experts in wild flower propagation, in landscaping with native plants, and in organizing communities for beautification projects. These experts include landscape architects, botanists, soil conservationists, and other representatives from Texas state agencies and universities who will lead informal sessions on

the basics of planting and maintaining wild flower gardens.

Hurley Thompson, garden editor of *Southern Living* magazine, will be on hand to lend his expertise, as will Texas garden club leaders who have been active in the organization of beautification projects. Mrs. Charles H. Davis of Hughes Springs, founder of Wild Flower Trails of Texas, is workshop chairman.

### KAY LENZ—ACTING VETERAN AT 22

#### Earle Named Coordinator

Robert W. Calvert, chairman of Citizens for the Texas Constitution, formally announced the appointment of Ronald Earle, a state representative from Austin, as the statewide campaign coordinator for the passage of a new Constitution for Texas.

The information and education program that Earle will head will be financed exclusively by citizen contributions. Calvert was joined in making the announcement by House Speaker Bill Clayton of Springlake, Lt. Governor William P. Hobby Jr., and Texas Attorney General John Hill. In a joint statement, the three top officials said the Earle appointment "marks the beginning of an all-out effort to inform the people of Texas about the need to update the antiquated document and to bring Texas government into the 20th century."

Clayton said that after working with Earle for the past two years, "I feel he is a particularly fine choice for the very demanding duties of coordinator. I know Ronnie is as totally committed to the passage of the new document as I."

"A new Texas Constitution will give Texans a guarantee that their state government will be truly responsive to the people of this great state. The new document preserves the best of the present Constitution, written in 1876, while providing additions that are necessary now that our state has come of age", Clayton said.

Lt. Gov. Hobby said, "The proposed Constitution which is being presented is a good basic document. It is not perfect, because we are not perfect. But, it is an admirable and impressive Constitution. Its adoption will free our government from the shackles it has worn for almost 100 years. It will give our government the tools it needs to maintain our state's tradition of independence."

Attorney General Hill commented, "I am a strong supporter of the new Constitution in its entirety. If its supporters will continue to take a constructive, positive approach, and give the public the facts, I am confident the people will approve the new document."

Calvert, former chief justice of the Texas Supreme Court, said, "We have a very strong obligation to the people of Texas to concentrate our efforts on distributing all the information possible about the new Constitution, so that Texas voters may base their decision on the document with all the facts before them."

Earle, 32, begins his duties as coordinator immediately. A former judge of Austin's Municipal Court, Earle served as chief counsel to the Texas Judicial Council before his election to the Texas House in 1973. In 1967-69, Earle also worked as a budget analyst for then-Governor John Connally. A native of Fort Worth, Earle practices law in Austin in addition to his duties as a Texas legislator.

Joining Earle on the campaign staff will be Mercy Kutcher who will act as office manager during the campaign. Ms. Kutcher is a veteran of San Antonio politics and a former legislative aide.

### Office Of History Under Heavy Load

AUSTIN—The newly created Office of Legislative History is busy these days. Its goal is to complete a biographical file of all the former members of the Texas Legislature since the first session in 1846, and so far, the progress has been good.

Former Representative Jake Johnson of San Antonio, serving as Historian, is really having his time with history. "The things that are to be found are...incredible!" says Johnson. "I can't believe there's so much history dying, simply because nobody's ever kept up with it."

When the project is completed, the State of Texas will have a photographic and biographical sketch of each member of the House and Senate and know a little bit about what he did after he left office.

Johnson says, "We want to be able to tell anyone who might ask us, "Oh, yes, he came from Tennessee back in 1828 and served for three terms in the House and one in the Senate. Would you like to see his picture? And, did you know he went on to become Governor in 1869?"

"We'll be contacting many of the Historical Associations - throughout the state to gather this information, and we're going to need a lot of help from the people to fill some of the gaps that we have. Sometimes the only picture we can find is one that a relative might remember having somewhere in the attic.

"This is the biggest manhunt in Texas history, and I'm asking for volunteers to join the posse", Johnson said.

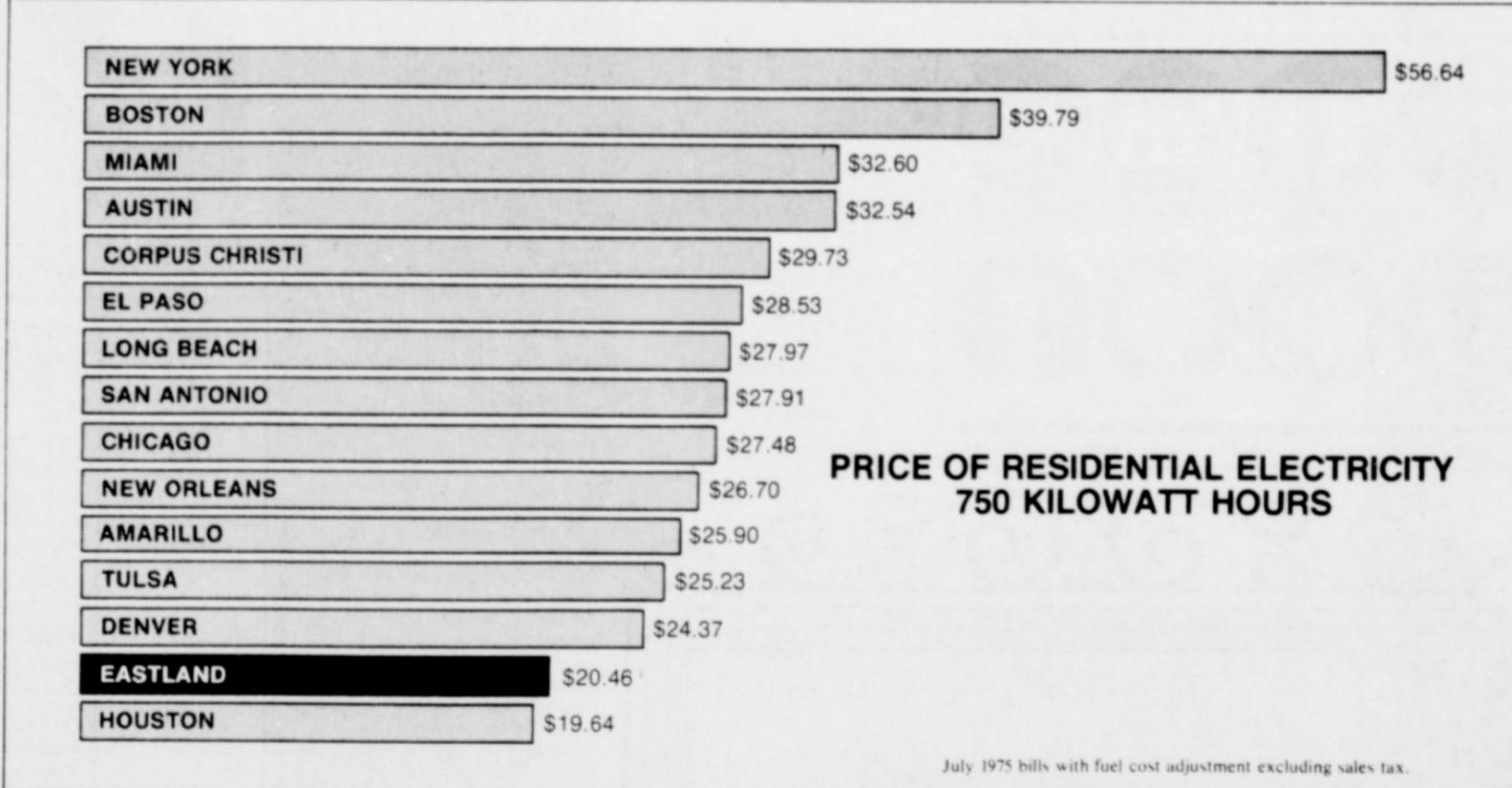

**Wildlife Commission Announces Dove Hunting Hours**

AUSTIN--A change to all-day dove shooting hours during a special 1976 season apparently has confused a great many hunters.

But the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is emphasizing that the full days of dove hunting will apply only during the second portion of a split season--from January 3 through January 18--in the South Zone of the state.

Traditional noon-to-sunset hours must be observed during the continuous mourning dove season Sept. 1 through Oct. 30, in the North Zone and in the first portion of the season in the South Zone, Sept. 20 through Nov. 2, except in those counties where white-winged doves and mourning doves may be hunted in early September, when the fall open season closes Oct. 26 instead of Nov. 2.

According to P&WD Executive Director Clayton T. Garrison, "The all day season was established by the Parks and Wildlife Commission on our dove populations. We were given the option to hunt full days during all or any part of our open seasons on doves by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, but chose to use it only during the winter hunt in the South Zone."

The South Zone includes all those counties south and east of and including: Maverick, Zavala, Frio, Atascosa, Wilson, Guadalupe, Caldwell, Bastrop, Lee, Burleson, Brazos, Madison, Walker, Trinity, Angelina, San Augustine and Sabine.

Garrison said that Texans have not had day-long dove shooting since 1950. Another major departure this year is seven half-days of white-winged dove hunting--Sept. 1 and 2, Sept. 5, 6 and 7, and Sept. 13 and 14--the longest white-wing season since 1943.

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights

AUSTIN — First Texas impeachment trial in 44 years is scheduled in the State Senate September 3.  
A 10-count impeachment resolution against 229th District Judge O.P. Carrillo was voted by the House of Representatives August 5 by an overwhelming margin (128-16).  
Gov. Dolph Briscoe fixed the trial date in cooperation with Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby, presiding officer of the Senate.  
Leon Jaworski, Houston attorney who was chief Watergate prosecutor, will serve as special counsel for the Senate during the expected lengthy trial.  
Terry Doyle of Port Arthur will serve as House special prosecutor.  
Impeachment proceedings have been voted against only three Texas officials in the last century and just one, former Gov. James E. Ferguson, actually was removed from office and forbidden to run again. A two-thirds vote of the Senate is necessary for removal.  
Carrillo stands charged with a variety of wrongs, including abuse of judicial powers, political conspiracies and using county personnel and property for his personal benefit.

**Campaign On**  
Advocates of a new constitution have opened campaign headquarters and named a campaign director for an all-out effort to begin soon after Labor Day.  
The election is scheduled November 4.

A rival "Committee to Preserve the Present Texas Constitution" also has filed necessary legal papers with the Secretary of State but has scheduled no activities.  
Rep. Ronald Earle of Austin will head the campaign office for "Citizens for the Texas Constitution." Former State Supreme Court Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert is in overall charge.  
Atty. Gen. John Hill, House Speaker Bill Clayton and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby are among strong supporters of revision.  
Governor Briscoe said he still has reservations about the legislative and financial articles, but has not decided whether to offer strong opposition.  
Comptroller Bob Bullock is opposed to local government and financial articles but backs judiciary, legislative and executive article changes.  
The AFL-CIO expressed opposition to judiciary and local government articles.

**Tax Hike Disputed**  
Texas Research League disputes claims that the new state school finance law is forcing steep local tax increases.  
In nearly all instances, said TRL, increases in the local share of school costs can be absorbed by shifting tax dollars from so-called "enrichment" programs into local Foundation matching fund requirements. Raising taxes is a local choice, according to

TRL.  
**AG Opinions**  
An act granting veterans preference in governmental employment is valid, although a five-year residency requirement may be unconstitutional, Attorney General Hill held.  
In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:  
• County regulatory authority over solid waste disposal within cities is limited to licensing disposal sites.

• The prison system has no authority to require inmates getting college education benefits to apply for federal veterans aid or to make reimbursement.  
• Port of Beaumont Navigation District may own and operate facilities within the Port of Orange, but must serve only the Beaumont district. Property and facilities may be leased to an individual or corporation for private industrial use.

• A Dallas County deputy sheriff may not also be a city councilman.  
• Galveston County may not divert to other road projects \$5 million in bond proceeds committed to Bolivar Crossing.  
• A&M University may erect permanent improvements on certain land owned by the system subject to reversion to the U.S.
