**SEVERAL AROUND** the Square are reporting what must be a common malady, not entirely based on the Dog Days weather of August - that old unpopular complaint known as the hives. Here's a recent Texas Medical Association report on the subject, and judging from it, it must be very common.

### HIVES AFFECTS ONE IN FOUR

Hives - known to the medical profession as urticaria - is such a common problem that it is estimated that about one out of every four persons as the affliction at some point during his lifetime.

The disorder most frequently takes the form of skin eruptions (wheals) which are white at the outset and later turn reddish. These slightly elevated lesions sometimes are quite small and at other times cover virtually the entire body. The most troublesome aspect of the disease is that the wheals itch intensely. There may also be a burning or a stinging sensation.

Often the wheals disappear after a few hours, although chronic hives may recur for months and months. Acute urticaria occurs most commonly in young people; chronic cases tend to show up among middle-aged women.

Hives occur because histamine is released from its natural storage places within the body. This causes tiny blood vessels to distend, and the plasma which leaks from them causes the characteristic swelling. The range of occurrences which can conceivably affect histamine in such a way as to cause an attack of hives is almost endless - which explains why the disorder is so common.

Perhaps the most common triggering agents for an eruption of hives are foods and drugs to which one is sensitive or allergic. Among the foods which may produce this reaction are shellfish, fish, oranges, nuts, eggs, chocolate, strawberries, tomatoes, beef, pork, chicken, cheese, corn, green peas, wheat, milk, grapes and bananas. Drugs which have been known to cause hives include aspirin, some antibiotics, insulin, contraceptive creams, and certain of the drugs used as tranquilizers and sedatives. Hives also may be caused by cosmetics; insect bites; infection; exposure to heat, cold or sunlight; and infestation by parasites. For some persons, psychological tension will result in an outbreak of hives.

Although hives is characteristically a disorder of the skin, the same type of swelling from the same causes occasionally involves other organs, such as the larynx, the gastrointestinal system, and the large blood vessels. In these infrequent instances the problem may be serious and call for prompt medical attention.

The more common types of hives can be readily treated, and recurrences frequently can be prevented. The usual approach is to search for a possible food, medication, or other substance which has caused the reaction. Once the agent which caused the eruption has been identified, it should be avoided thereafter. Skin tests are of little use in detecting the offending substance, and since the reaction to a specific food, cosmetic, or drug may occur from minutes to weeks after exposure, tracking down the cause of hives may take time and patience.

Various medications may be given to relieve the discomfort - antihistamines for some patients, tranquilizers for others, and low-dosage steroids for others.

## School Begins Monday

Tomorrow is the big day!! It is the first day of the 1975-'76 school year in Eastland. All students and teachers are to be present.

Lunches for the school year will be 50c for elementary and 55c for junior high and high school students.

Students are to bring their school supplies and any money they have been asked to bring for workbooks or fees.

Elementary students will be tardy at 8:15 a.m. and junior and high school students will be tardy at 8:00 a.m. So get on your smiling faces and be on time.

Eastland Independent School District today announced its policy for free meals and free milk for children unable to pay the price of meals and milk served under the National School Lunch and Special Milk Programs.

Local school officials have adopted the following family size income criteria for determining eligibility:

Children from families whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free meals and free milk. In addition, families not meeting these criteria, but with other unusual expenses due to unusually high medical expenses, shelter costs in excess of 30% of income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, and disaster or casualty losses are urged to apply.

Application forms are being sent to all homes in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application is confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility. Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If a family has foster children living with them and wishes to apply for such meals and milk for them, it should contact the school.

In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color or national origin.

Under the provisions of the policy the School Building Principal will review applications and determine eligibility. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the official, he may make a request either orally or in writing to Ray Pruitt, Superintendent, Box 31, Eastland, Texas, 76448, Tel. 629-2646 for a hearing to appeal the decision. The policy contains an outline of the hearing procedure.

Carbon residents may contact Supt. Marshal Hickman for details on the program for the Carbon Schools.

Each school and the office of the superintendent has a copy of the complete policy which may be reviewed by any interested party.

"Translating an Emily Bronte novel to the screen becomes more a matter of establishing and maintaining a mood, rather than telling a story," states Robert Fuest, director of American International's new film version of the Bronte classic "Wuthering Heights."

"The characters Miss Bronte created are so powerful and their state of mind so important, that her story line becomes merely a vehicle which brings them together and the result is an atmosphere charged with fascinating drama."

It is this facet of Emily Bronte's work which has absorbed the wonder of those who studied her life. They marvelled that one who was so much a recluse and so distant from her surroundings could have produced a story of such human and electric emotion. As once described by Somerset Maugham, "I can think of no other novel in which the pain, the ecstasy, the ruthlessness of love have been so powerfully set forth."

Much is known about the Bronte family thanks largely to the pile of letters and documents left by Emily's sister, Charlotte, the author of "Jane Eyre." But Charlotte has told really very little about Emily, and Emily herself has told nothing. It is known that their father, the Rev. Patrick Bronte, was the incumbent of Haworth Parsonage on the Yorkshire moors; that his son, Bramwell, the "black sheep" of the family, became a drug addict and drank himself to death and that Anne, the youngest of the Bronte sisters, wrote "Agnes Grey."

But Emily, regarded as the intellectual superior of them all, remains a shadowy figure. We know she was a loner who stayed aloof from the world. Charlotte, Anne, and brother Bramwell all had friends. Emily had none. From those who knew her we have it that she was "unsociable," "impenetrable to friendly advances," had a violent temper, shunned men like the plague and never showed any regard for any human creature. Her sisters were said to be afraid of her.

From where, then, did Emily, the semi-recluse, the non-hater who was "contemptuous of human beings" draw the talent, the inspiration that could produce a mass of first-class poetry and a classic novel like "Wuthering Heights"?

Freudians believe that the book and its two main characters, Heathcliff and Catherine, were created out of Emily's sexual repressions. Some scholars claim that she modelled Heathcliff on Byron whose influence they have detected in her poetry.

Somerset Maugham put it like this: "I think Emily put the whole of herself into Heathcliff. She gave him her violent rage, her sexuality - vehement but frustrated - her passion of unsatisfied love, her jealousy, hatred and contempt for human beings, her cruelty, her sadism." These character points were noted by Timothy Dalton, the young star who portrays Heathcliff in the American International "Wuthering Heights."

Maugham also believes that she put a lot of herself into the character of Catherine, that "she loved Catherine with Heathcliff's masculine animal love."

The role of Catherine in the film is played by Anna Calder-Marshall who also shares Timothy's feeling of their parts. "Cathy, as written by Emily Bronte, is a wonderful character for an actress to tackle. Not that I'd like to meet her because Cathy is really nasty ... but she's real," Anna said.

Summarizing the personalities of the author's principal characters, director Fuest says, "We show Heathcliff as a man completely fascinated by Catherine's passion, sexuality, jealousy and cruelty; and Catherine as equally hypnotized by Heathcliff's violence, brutality and vengefulness. It winds up as a film about difficult children who become impressive adults but marvelous lovers."

**HUD Announces Allocation Figures For New Program**

The Dallas Area Office of the Department of Housing and Urban Development announced today the dollar allocation figures for the new Housing Assistance Payments Program established by Section 8 of the 1974 Housing and Community Development Act.

Under this program, eligible tenants will rent decent, safe and sanitary housing from private owners or local public housing agencies at fair market rents with subsidy assistance from HUD. Eligibility of prospective tenants will be as approved by HUD within the income limits established in each locality. An eligible tenant will be required to pay not less than 15% and not more than 25% of his gross family income toward the total gross rent figure which includes utilities.

The maximum fair market rent in each locality will be established by HUD. After becoming qualified, the tenant will search for housing which best meets his needs and meets the other qualifications of the program including the rent ceiling. Each unit will be inspected for compliance to HUD standards by the local public housing authority. If found acceptable, the local public housing authority signs a one-year contract with the

housing owner on behalf of the tenant. The subsidy, which will be the difference between the amount the tenant will pay and the fair market rent, will be paid to the owner directly by HUD. The tenant will pay his share of the rent as approved by HUD directly to the owner, also.

In those localities where there is a shortage of suitable existing housing, this program can be tied to new construction. This program may be administered directly by HUD or the local public housing authority in the community. The program utilizing existing housing will be administered by local public housing authorities. The program involving new construction will be administered primarily by HUD. Applications under this program will be accepted from local public housing authorities in March.

The Dallas Area Office jurisdiction includes New Mexico and all of Texas except South Texas which is in the San Antonio Area Office Jurisdiction and Bowie County which is in the jurisdiction of the Little Rock Area Office.

The total Dallas office allocation is \$28,912,000 of which \$20,520,000 will go to cities and towns within SMSA's and \$8,392,000 to non-metropolitan cities and towns. It is estimated that the funding will subsidize

approximately 16,000 families and elderly individuals in existing, newly constructed or substantially rehabilitated housing.

The dollar allocation figures listed below are subsidy amounts which will support payment of fair market rents. The distribution is by County with a further distribution down to cities if those cities are automatic recipients of Community Development Block Grant funds under the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974.

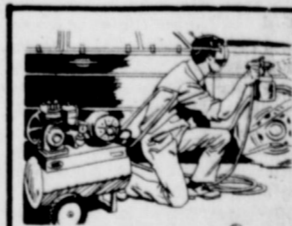

these past 20 years. Pears will be ready to harvest soon, and appear to be plentiful this year. Pear mincemeat is delicious to have during the coming winter months. You might like to try this recipe...

**PEAR MINCEMEAT**

- 7 lbs. ripe pears
  - 1 lemon
  - 2 (1 lb. pkg. seedless raisins
  - 6 1/2 cups sugar
  - 1 Tbsp. cloves
  - 1 Tbsp. cinnamon
  - 1 Tbsp. nutmeg
  - 1 Tbsp. allspice
  - 1 tsp. ginger
  - 1 cup vinegar.
- Core and quarter pears. Cut lemon into quarters, removing seeds. Put pears, lemon and raisins through food chopper. Combine remaining ingredients in large kettle. Add chopped fruit mixture. Bring to a boil over medium heat; simmer 40 minutes. Pack at once in hot pint jars. Adjust lids. Process in boiling water bath 25 minutes. Yield: about 9 pints.

It's difficult to produce a Vitamin E deficiency in man. Vitamin E deficiency is almost entirely restricted to premature infants. By eating a balanced diet daily, adequate amounts of this important vitamin are obtained.

MODERN FURNITURE materials need special care. What was good for wood isn't necessarily good for the plastic and metal furniture so popular now.

Here are some pointers to help you care for your non-wood furniture.

Acrylics sold under the brand name Plexiglas and Lucite:

Remove grease and oil stains with kerosene, white gasoline or isopropyl alcohol, followed with soap and water.

A mild cleaner-polish can be made with one part liquid detergent and three parts water.

Past wax takes care of minor surface scratches.

Solvents such as acetone, benzene, carbon tetrachloride or lacquer thinner damage these acrylic materials. Also, never use a cleaner-wax combination.

Plastic including Micarta, Formica and Melmine:

These materials are used for laminated tops and sides of case goods and counters and washing with detergent and water, followed by polishing with a soft, dry cloth is sufficient.

If the finish is dull, polish it with a low luster cream or silicone base wax.

For badly worn areas or spots, use a single step auto cleaner polish. Pour it on a cloth and rub with the grain in long, even strokes. Do not use a whirling motion.

Rub those worn areas or spots until an even gloss appears, then apply a cream polish or silicone base wax.

As with acrylics, never use solvents such as carbon tetrachloride, benzene, acetone, or lacquer thinner.

Stainless steel: Ordinary cleaning methods with soap, synthetic detergent and water should be sufficient for stainless steel.

For difficult stains, use rubbing alcohol or a high quality metal polish.

Remove scratches with extra fine steel wool—using a light touch—then towel dry parallel to the polish lines.

Water softener in a paste will remove water spots.

Stubborn spots on chrome can be removed with a paste of whitening and household ammonia.

### Texas Loses Hog Cholera Status

With a second case of hog cholera confirmed near Hereford, in the Texas Panhandle during the month of July, Texas has lost its "hog cholera free" status.

The state was declared "hog cholera free" about a year and a half ago but has now lost its designation as the dreaded swine disease has spread in the area where it was first detected on July 4.

Since the disease can remain undetected in a herd for a number of months, officials with the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service will be keeping a close check within a 100 square mile area that is under state and federal quarantine.

The infected herds have been destroyed along with 23 additional herds that were possibly exposed to the infected animals. Five herds have also been destroyed in Oklahoma due to possible exposure to the diseased herds. Producers are indemnified on the basis of an appraisal.

Hog cholera is a highly infectious disease usually fatal to swine. However, it affects no other livestock and is not transmissible to humans.

Swine producers in the county are urged to keep a close check on their herds and to report any suspicious disease signs to local veterinarians or animal health officials.

Signs of hog cholera include high fever and loss of appetite. Other signs may include abnormal death losses among young pigs or possible abortions.

The disease can spread rapidly and deal a severe blow to the swine industry unless producers keep a close check on their herds and report any sick animals.

## Do You Remember

There was not much publicity when a prisoner of war camp was established in the states to keep captured prisoners of war under guard and from escaping to return to their units to fight again. One such camp was established in connection with a training camp in an adjacent community and very few people knew about the enemy prisoners being placed in the camp so near their homes. It seems the prisoners were well informed about the various camps in the States and were given information on the best means of escape and what to do in case they did escape from the camp. The prisoners knew that there was a community of people who had cause from their own country a number of years back and settle on farms, ranches and other business in the community. These people still talked their

native language among the older members of the community and if a prisoner could reach this area, he would have a better chance of getting back to his own country. The prisoners dug a well camouflaged tunnel extending under the high chain link fences. Only four at a time would escape by night and with a stolen car or pickup make their way to the people who would help them. The car or pickup would be abandoned near a small and they would walk the balance of the way. The native people fed and clothed the prisoners who were kept hidden for several days until the search was given up then a selected member of the community would take the four into Old Mexico where arrangements had been made to help them get back to their country to fight again.

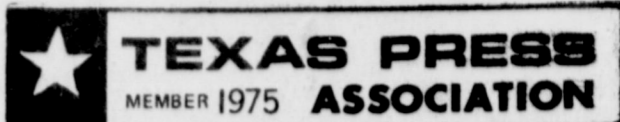

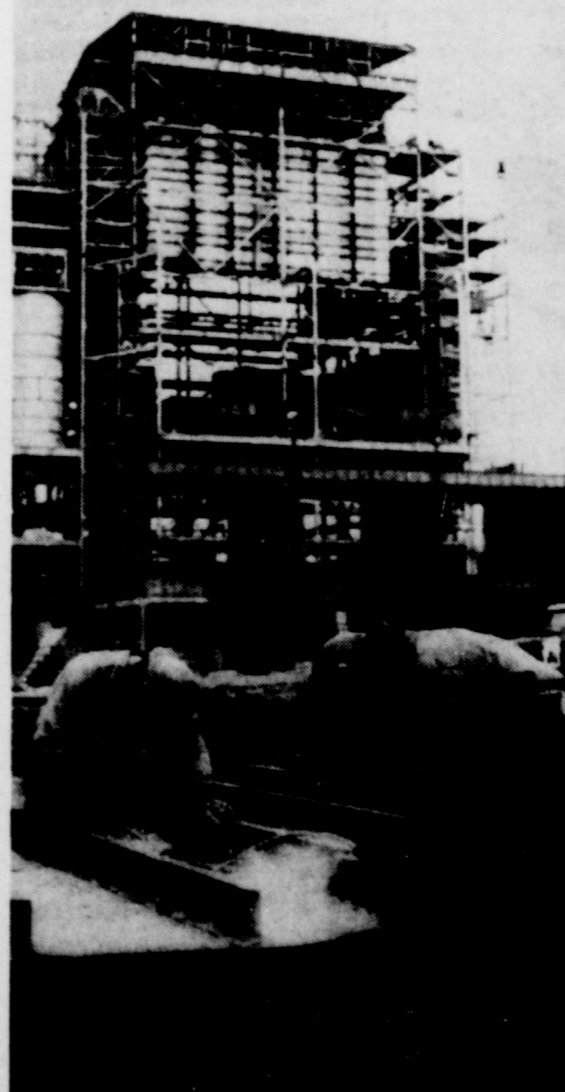

### Invite Birds To Your Home

People who enjoy having birds around their homes will find a new Soil Conservation brochure, "Invite Birds to Your Home," a big help in planning and landscaping for birds.

The brochure, written by Olan W. Dillon, Jr., SCS biologist, tells the birdlover how to satisfy habitat needs of nesting and wintering birds with trees, shrubs, and food. It tells how a conservation landscape plan used in the selection of trees and shrubs will beautify your yard and attract the kinds of birds you like.

"A conservation landscape plan will guide you in placing bird-attracting features near a window, patio, or terrace so you can observe the many varieties of birds that accept your invitation," Ronald Bailey, SCS district conservationist at Eastland states.

Even birdlovers in dense residential areas can attract birds by providing water for drinking and bathing and living fences and other shrubs for cover. "A single plant, the elderberry, is used by 51 species of birds and will dress your yard nine months out of the year with the white flower clusters and red-black berries," Bailey said.

"Invite Birds to Your Home" will tell you the kind of food preferred by different kinds of birds, and how you can provide for them during foodshort winter months.

Single copies of "Invite Birds to Your Home," Program Aid 1093, are available free at the Soil Conservation Service office in the Eastland National Bank Building. The booklet can also be purchased for 75 cents from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20402.

### JAYCEES READY FOR OPERATION REST STOP

Jaycees across the State are gearing toward expansion of the Operation Rest Stop to include more holidays and more locations.

According to State Jaycee Executive Director, Bob Cass, presently over 300 Jaycee Chapters are participating in the rest stop programs and more are expected to help as the project grows. "We have found the rest stops to be one of the exciting projects for Jaycees and we know we'll have an even stronger program next year too," said Cass.

Cass noted the programs have been underway in Texas for many years. He said a project manual for the rest stops was written and is given to each of the 370 Jaycee Chapters across the State. "Citizen support helps motivate the Jaycees, but more importantly, they know they are providing an excellent service," Cass commented.

"Many of our chapters combine their efforts and operate a singular rest stop to keep from having too frequent locations on any particular highway. This allows the chapter to participate in other holiday projects, while continuing the rest stop. I think we can also look forward to seeing more chapters operate for other holidays like Memorial Day, Fourth-of-July, and long weekends, but presently Labor Day is still the biggest push," reported Cass.

The rest stops have been operated by Jaycees and supported by police agencies, governmental outlets and private citizens. News reporters often give the rest stops extra coverage in order to alert motorists as to locations. It is almost a tradition to find the

Jaycee rest stops along the highway during the holidays.

Bill Leonard, Honorary Vice-President of the Texas Safety Association and safety assistant to the Jaycees, says over 8,000 Jaycees and wives participated in the Labor Day rest stops in Texas last year. "Over 300,000 cups of free coffee were served to travelers from throughout the United States, Mexico, and Canada," said Leonard.

At the Texas Jaycees State Convention in Houston's Astrodome, awards were given to the Jaycee chapters demonstrating outstanding performance to the field of traffic safety. Besides trophies and medals, the Jaycee chapters were read letters of commendation from Governor Briscoe, and representatives of the National Safety Council, Texas Safety Association, Texas Police Association, Texas Department of Public Safety, American Automobile Association and from Bill Leonard.

The rest stops make a definite contribution to the overall safety of all drivers during the holiday periods. Even if a motorist fails to take advantage of the rest stop, he is reminded of his driving responsibility as he passes by each rest stop location.
