



Countians Inspect Lignite Coal Power, Land Reclamation

Strip-mining is a dirty process in most parts of the world and has justifiably earned its equally ugly name in most instances. But the process itself apparently doesn't have to be so undesirable--if certain steps are taken. In fact when it's done right it appears to be an "improving" condition, rather than damaging.

It all boils down to who's doing it and how they're doing it. A delegation from this area including a large group from Eastland County this week visited a strip-mining project that can best be described as a gigantic roto-tilling.

Visited was the Big Brown steam electric generating plant at Fairfield (about 125 miles southeast of Fort Worth). As fossil fuel becomes less available, the lignite coal-fired plant is the intermediate generating system before nuclear generation comes into its own. The lignite is mined at the site to feed the giant boilers which steam power the two generators which have been pushing 575,000 kw each (from 18,000 to 345,000 volts) into the power lines of Texas Utilities Co., which includes Texas Electric Service Co., since 1972.

Laugh A Day

It's easy to understand the truth of the recent report that says children of today behave worse than children of a generation ago. It's primarily because those weren't children--they were us.

The lignite veins average seven feet in thickness and unbelievable large draglines (70 cubic yard buckets on 285 feet booms) carefully lift out the sod from 30 to 140 feet deep where the coal is taken out. The sod is just as carefully put back, and due to its good roto-tilling, it's so fluffed that no additional soil is needed to bring it back to its original contour. Then seeding is accomplished, and the yield is improved: more than 20,000 bales of hay from 200 acres in 1973.

It takes a lot of crushed-to-powder fuel for the constantly hungry boilers: 20,000 tons per day and that figures out to be a ton every four seconds. The energy the plant will consume in its lifetime will be equal to two trillion cubic feet of natural gas. About 600 acres are mined and reclaimed each year from a production area in excess of 11,500 acres.

Lignite has a lower BTU rating at 6,750 than does Appalachian bituminous (13,240) and lower fixed carbon rating, but about the same volatile matter rating.

Environmentalists have no quarrel with this strip-mining operation: it's added a 50,000 acre foot recreation lake at Fairfield and it's improving pasture land across a wide area there. (It's interesting to note that there's very little, if any, weed growth in the stirred-up soil replantings.)

The local folks saw an important power supply in operation, and naturally one of the questions that came up was about the possibility of the re-opening of the coal fields around Thurber, and the answer, though general, indicated that there might some day be a process which could profitably utilize that coal. Recent negotiations with foreign countries has hopes for developing a process in which the coal might be burned underground and the resulting gas (though low in BTU) could be taken from the ground either for fuel or at least for the processing of petro-chemical by-products, such as carbon black, plastics and the like.

There were many eye-popping industrial sights on the tour--not the least of which was the fact that the giant earth-moving equipment is powered with electric motors.

You're right: it does have a long, long extension cord.

Dr. Moreton Appointed Chairman Of T.D.H.R.

While attending the recent five-year reunion of Eastland High School graduates with his wife, the former Alma Williamson, Dr. Robert D. Moreton heard for the first time of his appointment as chairman of the board of the Texas Department of Health Resources by Gov. Dolph Briscoe.

Under the National Health Planning and Resources Development Act of 1974 each state must set up an agency to coordinate all health planning and development within that state. It is intended that such agencies in each state will prevent duplication of services, thus saving tax dollars.

Dr. Moreton will chair the 18 member board appointed to fulfill this directive.

The board will perform the duties that until now were executed by the Texas State Department of Health. In addition, the board will prepare a preliminary state health plan and medical facilities plan. This will include the responsibility of determining the need for any new health care facilities and approving any changes or additions to any existing facilities.

Dr. Moreton will continue to serve the University of Texas in multiple capacities as vice president for professional and public affairs of the UT System Cancer Center, including M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute, and vice president for professional and developmental affairs for the UT Health Science Center at Houston.

An acknowledged authority in the specialized field of cancer radiology, Dr. Moreton has been the recipient of numerous awards for his scientific achievements and foresight. These include Gold Medals from the American Medical Association, the Radiological Society of North America and the Texas Radiological Society. He is the past president of the latter two organizations as well as of the Southern Medical Association.

A MILESTONE has been reached: the live oak trees downtown are coming into their own. An on - the - square newspaper customer couldn't find his paper one day this week, and yes, the carrier had indeed thrown it; but it just couldn't be found anywhere. Until, would you believe, the customer looked in his tree, and sure enough, there it was, lodged in a branch of the pretty little tree. The trees are doing nicely and rains that are extending all the way into deep July this year are making it mighty green everywhere.

OUR HANDS have been called on some data in the Eastland County recreation edition which ran in this paper this week. The edition was put together in a cooperative program with some local college students, and well, in their zest, they called Lake Leon the "largest" lake in the county. The killing of cattle put some money in circulation but only in isolated areas. This did not seem to help the masses of people who really needed the food. So the advisors again worked closely with the president and started the assembly of food to be distributed throughout the land. Now, this created a few jobs and people could begin to eat again. Of course they had to have local managers to issue the food to the right people. These managers possibly managed to keep plenty of food in their own house for emergencies during off days.

in the same shape when all the banks went broke and closed their doors.

In order to get the borrowed money in the right places, and to the right people, the government advisors started setting up new programs designed to require some form of work to earn the money. The programs all had a name such as the NRA so the government could keep up with which program was using the money and doing the most good.

The NRA built bridge abutments along county and state roadways. It took a lot of hand labor for these abutments were built from native stone cemented together much like brick walls are put up. At least it was considered a useful service. The relief programs also performed other useful jobs such as the installations of approved type outside privies.

Could It Happen Again?

It's good to be back in the County after a nice vacation in Wyoming. Seems all areas west of us have plenty of moisture, but as usually in July we need rainfall. However, the moisture conditions are better than usual for this time of year.

Upon our return we learned that neighboring counties have had some cases of screwworms. Eastland County has not had any confirmed cases, but livestock producers should be on the alert.

Screwworm cases have been increasing by leaps and bounds in South and Southwest Texas, and the flies are continuing to move out to other areas of the state. So it's vital to check animals regularly, to treat all types of wounds, and to submit all worm samples for identification.

Samples should be sent to the Screwworm Lab, Box 969, Mission, Texas 78572. Containers for mailing samples are available at the County Extension office and from local veterinarians.

Producers had better prepare for an onslaught of screwworms unless cases are reported rapidly so that sterile flies can be dispersed over the areas where cases are confirmed.

Farmers and ranchers put a considerable amount of time into planning their production operation. Yet, one of the most important plans - a farm safety plan - is often neglected.

Farm safety plans are being given special emphasis this year during National Farm Safety week, July 25 - 31.

A good farm safety program will help avoid accidents, protect you and your workers, save lives and money, show that you are concerned, and boost morale.

The first step in planning a

farm safety program is to make a checklist of the potential accident hazards on your farm or ranch. Such a checklist might include the following:

1. Clear out rubbish and litter around buildings, yards and roadways.
2. Check stairwells and ladder openings for secure handrails and check ladders for soundness.
3. Check roads, especially intersections, for good visibility.
4. See that guards and shields are secure on machinery and equipment.
5. Shut off power before servicing any power equipment.
6. Keep dry - chemicals fire extinguishers and first - aid kits in place.
7. Give careful attention to electrical equipment. Check wiring for proper insulation and possible breaks, be sure electrical circuits are protected by circuit breakers or fuses of the proper rating, use only tools with double - insulated construction or three - wire grounded cords, and watch for overhead wires when handling elevators, augers, irrigation pipe or ladders.
8. Store agricultural chemicals in original containers with legible labels and keep them under lock and key.
9. Wear protective equipment when using chemicals.
10. Keep elevated fuel tanks at least 40 feet from buildings.
11. Use special care if you smoke.
12. Keep livestock handling equipment - chutes, corrals, stalls - in good repair.

Planning does prevent accidents. A little time spent in planning a safe farm operation can spare you the pain, grief, time and money losses accidents can inflict on you and your farming and ranching success.

in Eastland County at the request of Eastland County Farm Bureau. The local farm organization is coordinating activities within the county for the special far safety campaign.

Using the combined reports of statewide and Farm Bureau member accidental deaths, Judge Bailey said "records show that at least 285 Texas farm and ranch people died during 1974 at the following rate: Traffic - 97, Tractors - 34, Drownings - 34, Firearms - 24, Fires and Burns - 21, Falls - 18, Machinery - 15, Animals - 13, Electric Current - 10, and miscellaneous - 19. Eastland County recorded no farm ranch deaths."

Eastland County FARM Bureau President C.M. Guthery said, "Our farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with the various agricultural safety regulation issued by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration and the Environmental Protection Agency." He said that the latest of the regulations call for the certification of licensing of farmers and ranchers to use restricted pesticides. Guthery says that another regulation commonly referred to as "ROPS" - Roll - Over Protective Structures for farm tractors won't apply until those come off the assembly line after Oct. 25, 1976; however, there are some provisions that become effective June 1, 1975."

The current rules mainly apply to nine employee operating instructions: (1) Securely fasten your seat belt IF the tractor has a ROPS. (2) Where possible, avoid operating the tractor near ditches; embankments, and holes. (3) Reduce speed when turning, crossing slopes, and on rough, slick, or muddy surfaces. (4) Stay off slopes too steep for safe operations.

- (5) Watch where you are going; especially to row ends, on roads, and around trees.
- (6) Do not permit others to ride.
- (7) Hitch only to the drawbar and hitch points recommended by tractor manufacturers.
- (8) Operate the tractor smoothly - no jerky turns, starts, or stops.
- (9) When tractor is stopped, set brakes securely and use park lock if available.

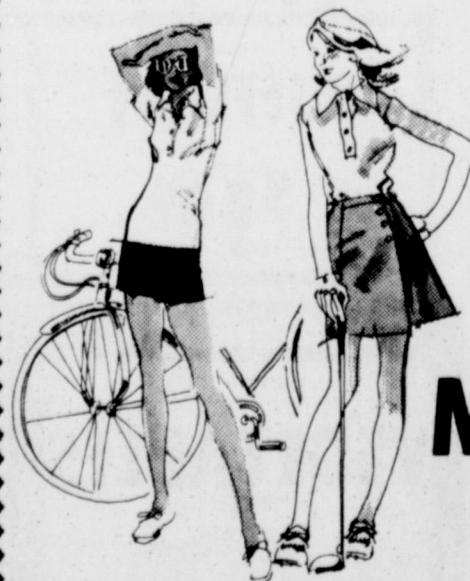

2 Places In Eastland To Buy Jars, Lids

It seems like every time you turn around there is a shortage. This time it's fruit jars and lids. Due to the high cost of living and food prices more and more people are turning to canning. According to a survey done on a few Eastland merchants, we have found only two places in Eastland that have fruit jars and lids.

The ones in the area who have jars and lids are Western Auto Store and Hamilton's Fruit Stand.

According to our research we have found that two main reasons for the shortage are that there are more people canning and there has been a tremendous amount of hoarding. Some of the jar companies are working seven days a week, 24 hours a day trying to produce enough jars and lids for the canners, but for the time being, the supply in Eastland is very short.

to produce their toxin. However, since the botulinum bacteria can survive 20 hours of boiling at normal sea level pressures, simple home canning methods may not succeed in getting rid of them, and during storage there is plenty of time for the fatal toxin to be produced.

Home canning can be carried out safely if correct procedures are carefully followed. A pressure cooking device is recommended for obtaining the combination of temperature and pressure which can kill the botulinum organism during the canning process.

Home Canning Can Cause Health Hazards

With the increase in food prices has come an increase in home canning, as families buy foods in bulk at their peak seasons to save on the grocery bill. And with the increase in home canning has come a

serious health hazard -- botulism. Botulism is a serious form of food poison that produces critical illness and is fatal in one-fourth of all cases, the Texas Medical Association states.

Unless strict precautions are followed, home-canned food may be contaminated with the spores of Clostridium botulinum. The danger does not come directly from eating the bacteria themselves. In fact, a great deal of fresh food contains the spores of the bacteria which, when eaten, pass harmlessly through the digestive tract. However, under special conditions Clostridium botulinum produces a toxin, a substance which may be the most lethal human poison in existence. Food canning, if improperly carried out, can provide perfect conditions for the production of this poison.

The problem of botulism is prevented in commercial canning by use of equipment producing a combination of temperature and pressure capable of killing the spores so they cannot grow into bacteria

precaution -- boil before using! Although the bacteria may not be destroyed by boiling, the highly dangerous toxin is made harmless by ordinary boiling -- 10 minutes at sea level, longer at higher altitudes. Make sure every particle of the food is heated at the boiling point in order to destroy all of the dangerous toxin.

Botulism kills through the paralyzing action of its toxin upon the nervous system. Control of the muscles is lost, beginning with those about the face and neck. Loss of the ability to swallow makes it impossible to eat, leads to choking which may introduce foreign materials into the lungs, and usually produces death in several days. Most patients give a history of having eaten food which tasted spoiled, followed in a few hours by nausea and vomiting. Later the symptoms of muscle weakness begin to appear. If medical aid is quickly obtained and the correct diagnosis is rapidly made, it may be possible to save the patient. A serum may be injected which, while it cannot help the nerves already damaged, is sometimes able to limit further paralysis.

But the best treatment for botulism is prevention. Commercially canned food can be considered safe. If you are given some homecanned food you can make sure it is safe by boiling at least 10 full minutes before use. Those who do their own canning should review their procedure to make certain it protects against botulism, even if they have been canning for years without incident! Never taste preserved food which appears to have spoiled for a very small amount of botulism toxin can produce illness. When in doubt, throw it out!

Activities and entertainment for the ladies are also planned throughout the four-day meeting.

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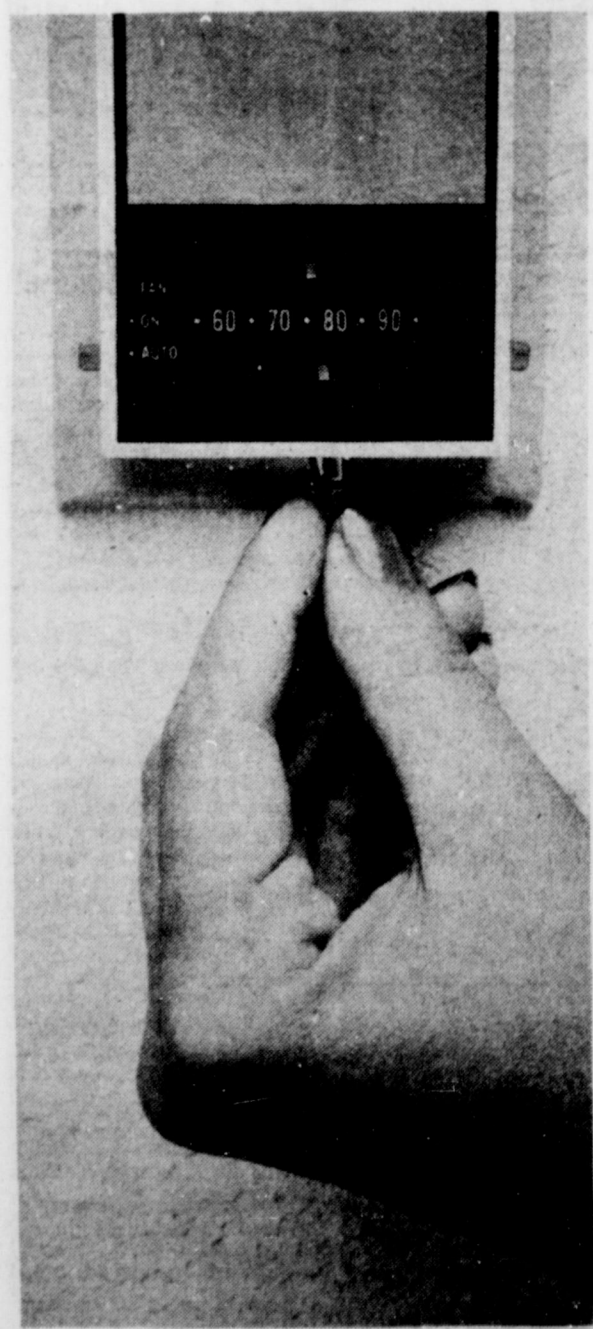

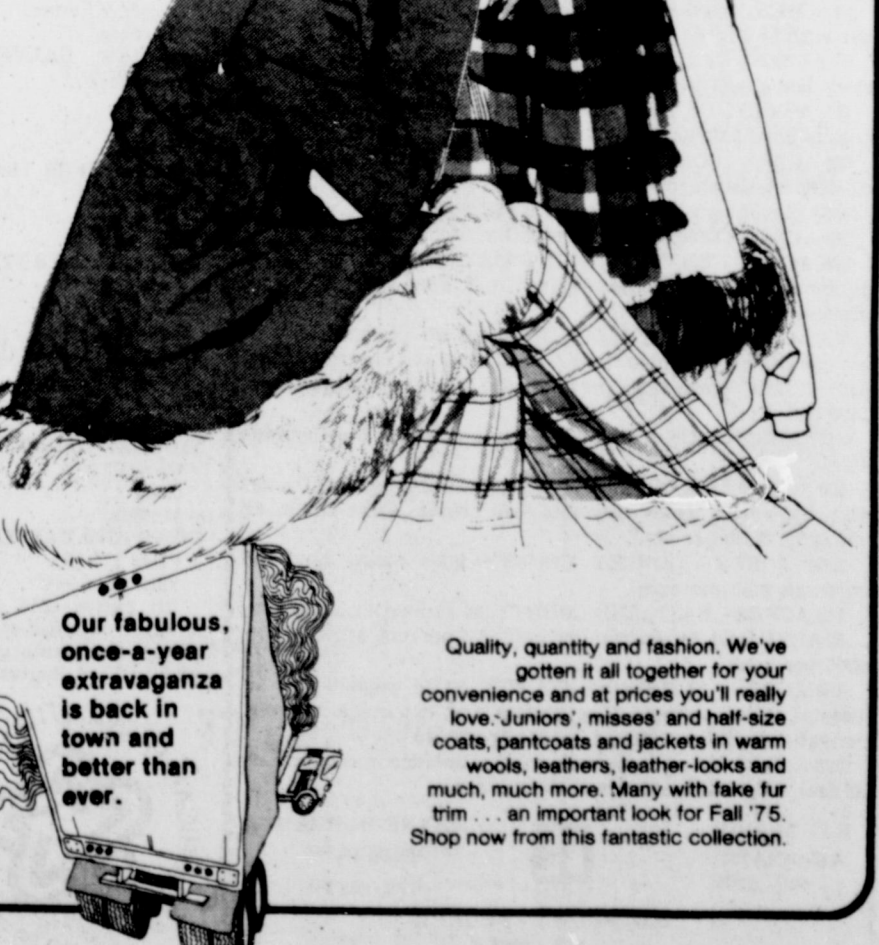

PROCLAMATION

By The
COUNTY JUDGE OF EASTLAND COUNTY

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

I, Scott Bailey, County Judge of Eastland County, do hereby declare the week of July 25 - 30, 1975, as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY WEEK in Eastland County, for the following reasons:

WHEREAS, the citizens of Eastland County are proud of our farm and ranch families from whom comes our abundance of food and fiber; therefore, our citizens are deeply concerned about the safety and well being of this segment of our population; and

WHEREAS, records show that at least 285 farm and ranch people died during 1974 at the following rates: traffic - 97; tractors - 34; drownings - 34; firearms - 24; fire and burns - 21; falls - 18; machinery - 15; animals - 13; electric current - 10; and miscellaneous - 19. Eastland County recorded no farm - ranch deaths; and

WHEREAS, our farmers and ranchers have become increasingly concerned with a new phase of agricultural safety through regulatory requirements for their hired labor and the added cost of new equipment (Roll - Over Protective Structures for Agricultural Tractors) as a result of these regulatory requirements; and

WHEREAS, during this week, a renewed emphasis on rural accident prevention education is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau, the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, the Texas Safety Association, the Texas and Eastland County Agricultural Extension Service, Texas 4 - H Clubs, Community Improvement Associations, Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Eastland County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Planning Prevent Accidents"; and

WHEREAS, planning for accident prevention includes a combination of proper attitudes, combined with practical, common sense precaution. The planning should include employee operating instructions for agricultural tractors and equipment; compliance of other agricultural safety standards; use tractors with roll - over protection, slow moving vehicle emblems, fire extinguishers, legal lighting equipment and rear - view mirrors; and

WHEREAS, the farmer and rancher can develop a check list for himself, members of his family and employees which would include the following: enroll in the (NSC) Defensive Driving Course; (NRA) - Hunter & Home Firearm Safety Courses; (ARC) Basic First Aid Course; and Basic Learn to Swim Course; and include SAFETY in the program of work and program calendar for schools, clubs, churches and other group meetings.

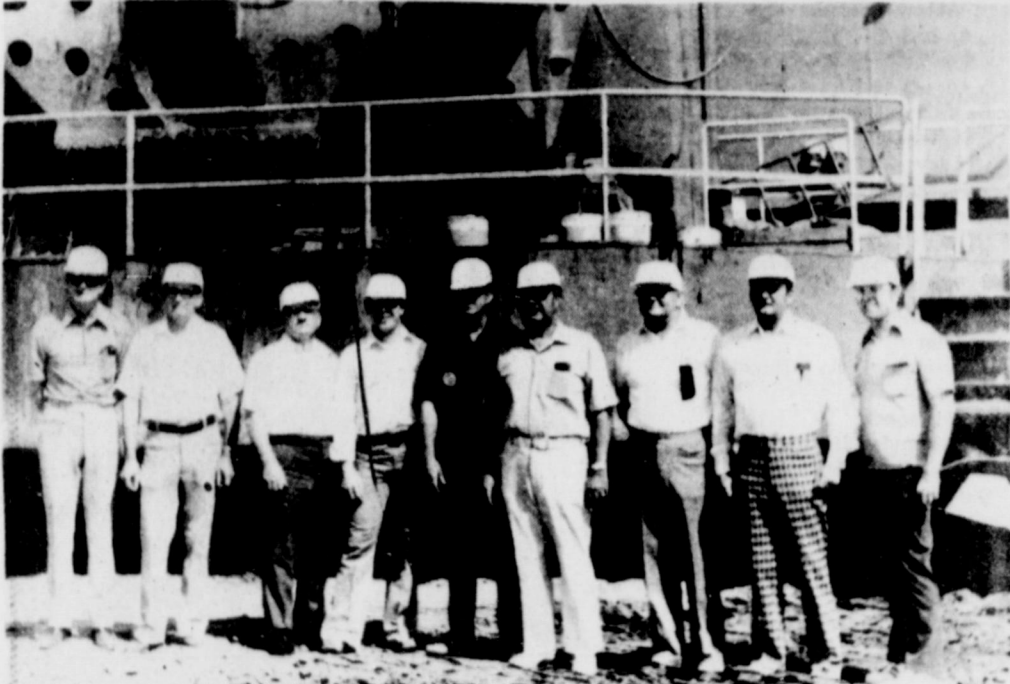

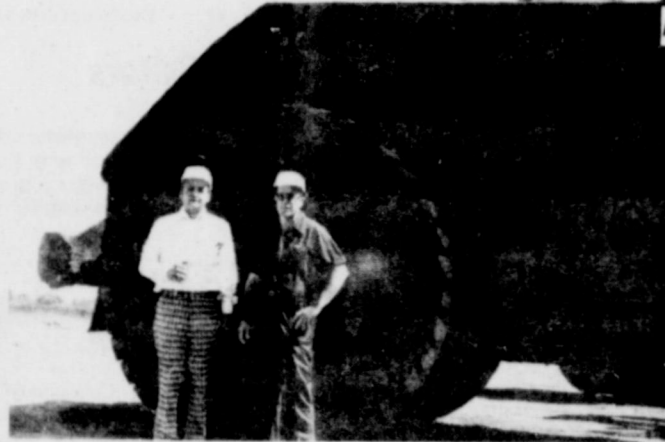
