Rev. Foote is retired and is employed by the Fort Worth Star Telegram. In his years of ministry Rev. Foote has pastored at Amarillo, Little Rock, Arkansas; Montgomery, Alabama; Dayton, Ohio; and the First Methodist Church in Fort Worth.

The Reverend attended Southern Methodist University in Dallas and received his B.A.

and B.D.; he attended Cliff School of Theology in Denver University, Th.D.; Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, D.D. 1974; Wilberforce University, LL.D. 1949; and Texas Wesleyan College, Fort Worth, D. Lit. 1958.

He is a member of Fort Worth Knife and Fork and was president in 1955; also is a member of Fort Worth Council of Church and was president in 1958; and is a member of the Rotary and Masons.

Rev. Foote's activities include: Delegate Jurisdictional Conference since 1948; Delegate General Conference 1952, 1964, 1968, 1970; Delegate World Methodist Conference London 1966, Denver 1971; Exchange preacher London, 1949, Guatemala, 1956; Guest Preacher U.S. Air Force, Okinawa, Japan, and England; President Conference Board of Missions 1952-56; Member of General Board of Social Concerns 1968-1972; Editorial - Writer, Fort Worth Star Telegram since 1952; Distinguished Alumnus of Southern Methodist University, 1966.

## Mrs. W.H. Groves Celebrates 100th Birthday June 20

A long time Eastland resident, Mrs. W.H. Groves, 407 S. Walnut St., celebrated her 100th birthday Friday, June 20.

Mrs. Groves is the former Susan Paulina Puett, and was the third child of the late Mr. and Mrs. Monroe Puett. She was born in Temple, Texas, in 1875. The family later moved from Temple to a farm at King, Texas, a small rural community near Gatesville.

Mrs. Groves, who is now bedridden, but in basically good physical condition, has received

good wishes on attaining her 100th birthday from local and national political figures, including the President.

She lives with her daughter, Mrs. Ruby Pledger, who said her mother's family moved in 1885 to Downey, California, from their farm near King, traveling by train all the way. They stayed in Downey, California area for three years, moving back to Texas in 1880 where they settled on a farm near Wichita Falls.

After a short time, the family moved again, this time to a farm in the Jewell community in Eastland County, Jewell, which is now non-existent as an organized community, was about four miles southwest of Carbon.

It was while living in the Jewell area that she met and married W.H. Groves in 1893. She and her husband continued to live in the area, where they farmed--raising corn, cotton, peanuts, and a variety of vegetables.

Mr. Groves died in 1933. In addition to Mrs. Pledger, Mrs. Groves has another daughter Mrs. Everett Ligon of Houston, six grandchildren, and 10 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

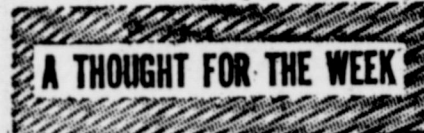

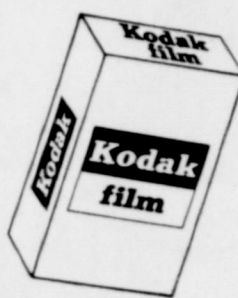

## Oil News

George S. Galbraith of Abilene will drill two wildcats in the area three miles southeast of Moran in Stephens County.

Both are slated for 4,000 feet. No. 1 H.L. Kendig Unit is located on a 165 acre lease.

It spots 1,350 feet from the south and 1,486 feet from the east lines of Section 38, Block 7, T&P Survey.

Other wildcat is No. B.A. Elliott Unit, located on a 160 acre lease. Brillsite is 3,149 feet from the north and 436 feet from the west lines of Nathan R. Brister Survey.

Sigmar Corp. of San Antonio completed No. 6 G.E. Langford in Lake Necessity (2,900) Field 11½ miles southeast of Breckenridge.

Location is 330 feet from the south and 2,200 feet from the west lines of Section 30, Block 6,

T&P Survey.

Daily potential was 48 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus eight barrels of water. It is pumping from perforations in the interval from 2,841 to 2,889 feet, treated with 500 gallons of acid and fractured with 60,000 pounds of sand.

Operator set the 4½ - inch casing at 2,964 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 2,966 feet and plugged back to 2,964.

Guy E. Pyron Jr. of Dallas completed two regular field wells nine miles southeast of Breckenridge.

No. 1 Flourney is located 1,050 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 33, Block 6, T&P Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 3,200,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations at 1,799 to 1,850 feet. The pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid and fractured with 150

sacks of sand in water.

Operator set the 4½ - inch casing at 1,950 feet, total depth. The hole was plugged back to 1,945 feet.

Other well is No. 2 Fambro Land & Cattle Co., spotting 2,250 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 10, BAL Survey.

Absolute, open flow was 2,000,000 cubic feet of dry gas daily from perforations of 1,796 to 1,840 feet. The pay was treated with 100 gallons of acid. Operator set the 4½ - inch casing at 1,941 feet. The hole was drilled to a total depth of 2,209 feet and plugged back to 1,941 feet.

Location for a proposed 3,450 - foot wildcat was staked eight miles southwest of Rising Star in Brown County.

It is Discovery Petroleum Corp. of Rising Star No. 1 Earnest Allen, located on a 152 acre lease.

### Growers Warned About Mixing Varieties

Due to the severe wind and sand damage incurred last week, some growers are having to replant entire fields or spots within a field. Shellers are not likely to buy loads of mixed varieties as they will not meet U.S.D.A. grade standards, and loan peanuts with 11% or more of the second variety will have to go as Segregation 2 with a \$10 per ton penalty.

AUSTIN — Texas may run out of money for new highways, according to State Highway Commission Chairman Reagan Houston.

Houston said the financing picture for road building is critical.

"Costs are rising and available financing is not adequate," the Chairman told Texas Good Roads and Transportation Association.

The time may come, he warned, when the state can afford outlays only for maintenance and operation of its highways.

A new study, Houston said, will examine "the widening gap between needed construction and available revenue... the desire for higher levels of transportation service, as well as the need to demonstrate to the public benefits of proposed projects.

New legislation signed by Gov. Dolph Briscoe merged the Highway Department and Mass Transportation Commission into the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The state completed purchase of land, nearly tripling size of Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall.

A couple accepted \$336,339 for the 133.9 acres of land across the Pedernales River from the late President's ranch. Cost of enlarging the park from its original 269 acres to 717.8 acres will total more than \$1 million.

#### Allowable Set

For the 40th straight month, the Texas Railroad Commission extended the wide-open, 100 per cent oil allowable for July.

However, the East Texas field was again restricted to an 86 per cent allowable. Nominations of major purchasers decreased 2,821 barrels—to 4,018, 347 barrels daily.

#### Pool Organized

A risk-sharing pool, authorized by the legislature, was organized last week to help provide a temporary solution to the medical malpractice insurance crisis.

The pool will not begin issuing policies until a plan of operation is approved by the State Insurance Board.

The Joint Underwriting Association was instructed to have the operating plan ready by July 7. August 3 is the target date assigned by Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie to place the pool in full operation. The new law directs that it actually be provided insurance to doctors and hospitals by September 1.

#### Courts Speak

Asking the State Supreme Court to restore an injunction prohibiting a Bell Telephone Texas long distance rate increase, Atty. Gen. John Hill said the company openly claims "unlimited power" to set any rate it wants on such calls.

Third Court of Civil Appeals struck down a district court order that Oak Cliff Savings and Loan Association cannot change its name to First Texas Savings Association.

A Dallas man, through an appeal to the Court of Criminal Appeals, received a new trial on charges of burning a two-year-old child.

Another Dallas case — for murder — was reversed, on grounds evidence which resulted in a man's life sentence was too weak.

#### AG Opinions

Interest from funds transferred to Angelo State University on dissolution of Tom Green County Junior College District may not be used to supplement the president's salary, Attorney General Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:

A district judge would be prohibited from appointing his grandnephew to represent an indigent defendant if compensation is paid from public funds. Also, a district judge should not appoint the district probation officer to represent a defendant in a criminal case.

A two-mile spacing rule for beeyards is valid if necessary to control spread of honeybee diseases. Unemployment compensation records are, in general, available under the open records act to employing units and claimants.

#### Appointments

Governor Briscoe appointed Pedro A. Mendoza of McAllen to the Commission on Fire Protection Personnel Standards and Education.

Mrs. Peggy D. Gutierrez of Laredo was named by the Governor to the Texas Cosmetology Commission.

James M. Bailey of Fort Worth will serve as chairman of the 1975 State Textbook Committee.

Sen. D. Roy Harrington of Port Arthur will serve as chairman of a special artificial reefs committee of the Coastal and Marine Council to develop artificial reef programs for Texas bays and inshore Gulf areas.

#### Short Snorts

Agriculture Commissioner John C. White is the new president of the Southern Association of State Departments of Agriculture.

Seventeen new industries located in Texas during May and will pump an additional \$40 million into the state's economy. They will also create 1,500 new jobs and generate \$250 in taxes.

Tyler, Devine, Fort Worth, Eagle Pass, Cameron and Mount Vernon received community achievement awards from the Beautify Texas Council.

Other council awards went to San Marcos, Smithville, the Nacogdoches Federation of Women's Clubs, Gray County and the Christian Reinhardt Society of Longview for Bicentennial programs.

United Business and Industry Inc. opened headquarters here to promote conservation and the free enterprise system before the legislature.

## WALL ST. LAYS AN EGG

### Going Dumb Is Deadly to Hostess In Her Serious Dance Hall Profesh

A hostess at Roseland has her problems. The paid steppers consider their work a definite profession calling for specialized technique and high-power salesmanship.

"You see, you gotta sell your personality," said one. "Each one of us girls has our own clientele to cater to. It's just like selling dresses in a store—you have to know what to sell each particular customer."

"Some want to dance, some want to kid, some want to get soupy, and others are just 'misunderstood husbands'."

Girls applying for hostess jobs at Roseland must be 18 or older. They must work five nights a week. They are strictly on their own, no salary going with the job and the house collecting 10 cents on every 15 cent ticket. To keep her job, a girl must turn in at least 100 tickets a week during the cold season and 50 in the summer months. In a dull week girls buy their own tickets to keep up the record.

If a partner wishes to sit out a dance, he must pay for the privilege. "Sitting-out time" sells at eight tickets an hour, or \$1.25. It's usually a poor sport who will come across with less than \$1 many kicking in heavier for a little genial conversation.

The girl who knows her professional dancing trade will keep an alert eye open for potential "sitters-out," ascertain their hobbies and talk herself into a whole string of tickets. In this way she not only earns money easily, but saves wear and tear on her evening dresses and slippers.

Big money rolls in if she has a good line. One of the most successful girls at Roseland takes this part of her work so seriously that she reads up on current events (sports and stock market included) and has a smattering of current literature and art.

"There are two types of hostesses at Roseland," she said, displaying high brow leanings. "They are the mental and the physical. Surprisingly enough the physical ones are not those who make the most money. One customer will buy three tickets from them at the door. They rely on their sex appeal and go dumb between dances—and that's the surest way to lose a partner going dumb."

**Mental Girls**  
"The mental" girls, being good conversationalists, can wine-drink with the dippant, sympathize with the lonely and know how to salt the fresh boys and make them like it. I have one client who has been coming up every Monday night for two and a half years. Some times he dances all evening, other times we sit out every dance and just talk. He's a good spender, but his wife doesn't understand him."

Usually the hostesses change every two years, although one or two girls have been there for eight years. Some marry, some go into the chorus, others get hat-checking. (Continued on page 63)

When the oil boom started  
completing oil wells in the  
community, there was usually  
natural gas to produce the oil  
into oil storage tanks near the  
well. There were no markets for  
the natural gas from wells in

by the rural families. These  
conveniences contributed in  
part to the increased speed in  
the way of living in the rural  
communities.  
One of the families in a  
community which was enjoying  
the new conveniences invited  
the father's sister from a rural  
community in Arkansas to visit  
with them for a week or so  
during one summer. The Senior  
Citizen sister arrived on the  
train and was met at the depot  
by the family in their horseless  
carriage. She could not restrain  
from displaying an awe-some-  
ness attitude toward the un-  
heard of conveniences. After a  
few days, she decided to go  
back home. She seemed to think  
that turning a handle could give  
water and heat, pushing a  
button bringing on lights and a  
toilet in the house could be the  
work of the Devil.
