



## Eastland Receives Certificate Of Merit

Eastland was one of several Texas cities honored this week for its continuing efforts in beautification and celebration of the Bicentennial. Eastland received a Certificate of Merit in the First Annual Janey Briscoe Bicentennial Awards.

Six Texas cities were named winners of the governor's Community Achievement Awards competition Wednesday by Governor Dolph Briscoe.

Eastland was not eligible this year because it was a Bing winner last year.

Winners of the award included Fort Worth, Tyler, Eagle Pass, Cameron, Mount Vernon, and Devine.

The Award of Excellence, given by the Council to the city which has done the best overall job of community beautification and improvement of environmental quality during the past year, was awarded to Tyler.

The Governor's Community Achievement Awards are made of six cities and communities which have accomplished more in community beautification and improvement of environmental quality than any other city in their population categories.

Winners were announced at a luncheon at the Hilton Inn where several hundred persons were attending the eighth

## Exes Honor Dr. Harris Isbell As Distinguished Ex-Student

### Victor, Downs Given High School Diplomas

Some 2,000 Eastland High School Ex-Students "came home" this weekend to hold reunion, held every five years, and the 1975 edition of their get-together has got to go on the record books as the "biggest and best".

Dr. Harris Isbell, Ex of 1927, received the Association's - highest honor in ceremonies Saturday evening at Maverick Stadium.

The Most Distinguished - Alumnus Award was presented to Dr. Isbell by the Eastland High School Ex-Students Association in grateful acknowledgment of his pre-eminent and world recognized contribution to the welfare of his fellow man by his drug abuse research.

Now retired, but still highly active as a consultant, Dr. Isbell within the past few weeks was given a meritorious service award from the National Institute on Drug Abuse at Lexington, Kentucky, for work he did there during many years as director.

He only returned Thursday from Atlantic City, N.J., where he addressed the some 15,000 members of the American Medical Association on drug and alcohol abuse research.

Living quietly at 417 Foch St., he remains a busy man, writing papers and sharing his knowledge with the medical and government world.

Eastland's beloved Victor Cornelius, chief benefactor to his home town, and Mrs. Virgil T. (Downs) Seaberry Jr., were both presented Honorary Eastland High School Diplomas for their unselfish efforts in behalf of the Ex-Student Association.

**THE CONTRIBUTIONS OF DR. HARRIS ISBELL TO DRUG ABUSE RESEARCH**

It is especially pleasurable for me to be able to introduce Harris Isbell by summarizing his research accomplishments in the area of drug dependence on this occasion.

Dr. Isbell received his Bachelor's degree with honors from the University of Arkansas and his M.D. from Tulane University Medical School in 1934. Following an internship at the Charity Hospital in New Orleans, he entered the U.S. Public Health Service, and from 1935 to 1936 was part of the original staff of the Narcotic Hospital at Lexington, Kentucky. From 1936 to 1938 he was on general duty in the U.S. Public Health Service. Dr. Isbell served as a Public Health Service Fellow in the Department of Medicine at Tulane University from 1938 to 1939, during which time he completed his training in internal medicine. He then spent five years at the National Institutes of Health at Bethesda conducting research in nutrition, an exciting area to which the Public Health Service has contributed so much. In 1944 he was transferred to the Addiction Research Center. He became the Director of the Addiction Research Center in 1945, a position he held until 1963 when he retired to become Professor of Medicine and Pharmacology at the University of Kentucky. Dr. Isbell continued to conduct clinical research at the Addiction Research Center until 1966, at which time he assumed the Acting Chairmanship of the Department of Medicine at the University of Kentucky.

Dr. Isbell joined the staff of the Addiction Research Center at a time when the development of totally synthetic narcotic analgesics was beginning. He continued Dr. Himmelsbach's studies with meperidine and with his collaborators at the

Addiction Research Center demonstrated the morphine-like properties of methadone and methadone congeners, including LAAM, in man. With his close collaborator, Dr. H.F. Fraser, he studied many other chemical classes of narcotic analgesics. As a consequence of these studies, Dr. Isbell's first proposed methadone as a drug for detoxifying dependent narcotic addicts. He also was very much involved with his collaborators, Drs. Abraham Wikler and H.F. Fraser, in the study of narcotic antagonists, and as a part of this work Dr. Isbell introduced the use of nalorphine and the precipitated abstinence syndrome as a tool for diagnosing narcotic dependence. In the late 1940's his research interest turned to barbiturate and alcohol dependence. In these unequivocal studies he demonstrated that grand mal seizures and delirium tremens were abstinence signs of barbiturate and alcohol dependence and developed procedures for safely detoxifying both barbiturate- and alcohol-dependent patients by stabilizing patients on barbiturates and reducing the doses. He further developed a procedure using the phenomenon of cross-tolerance as a method for diagnosing barbiturate dependence.

In the mid 1950's the study of drug-induced psychoses became the major focus of Dr. Isbell's research. For the next decade he published a series of papers dealing with LSD-like

hallucinogens, in which he not only studied their mode of action in man using neuropharmacologic tools but also demonstrated the pharmacologic equivalence of LSD-like hallucinogens using the phenomena of direct tolerance and cross-tolerance.

Although his final papers emanating from the Addiction Research Center were concerned with marijuana and the pharmacology of several tetrahydrocannabinols, his interest in marijuana predated these studies by over ten years. Dr. Isbell already had studied the effect of the N-heptyl (CA-101) congener of tetrahydrocannabinol in man. These studies were never published, however, because they were classified.

While Dr. Isbell was conducting these important and highly relevant studies, he was also the skillful and tactful Director of the Addiction Research Center and one of the great authorities on virtually every aspect of drug addiction. During the late 1950's and early 1960's when the United States and other countries were becoming more cognizant of the problems of drug abuse, Dr. Isbell's opinions and advice were sought by state and Federal legislatures concerning drug abuse legislation. He served as a close advisor to Dean Markham, who was President Kennedy's Executive Director of the Prettyman Commission. In 1962 he was presented the Public Health Service Meritorious Service

Award by Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy.

Harris Isbell's research has embraced every major drug abuse problem and he has made major contributions to their diagnosis, treatment and pathophysiology. His knowledge of drug abuse is encyclopedic. He is a member of a small cadre of committed investigators, scholars, and teachers who have done so much in helping to define the biomedical aspects of drug abuse and to delineate those pathologies that physicians have unique capabilities of treating definitively.

**AUSTIN** — A new program to boost the economy has identified more than 6,000 available jobs in its first month of operation.

Executive Director Jim Harwell of Texas Industrial Commission said the effort represented a 50 per cent increase over projections for the entire year.

Lists of new jobs, starting Monday, were posted on windows of local Texas Employment Commission offices.

Harwell indicated the "Texas First" program may result in identification of more than 15,000 jobs during the year — with an economic impact of more than \$1 billion annually.

Texas Education Agency, Texas Employment Commission, Texas Department of Community Affairs and the Governor's Division of Planning Coordination are participating with the Industrial Commission in the program.

Employees lacking skills are offered training through the Texas Start-Up Training Program conducted by the Industrial Commission and through sponsors of manpower training projects.

More than 200 of the top 1,000 Texas industries responded favorably to a questionnaire on expansion needs.

The Board's bulletin to insurance companies will require the filing of rules, rates and policy forms presently used in writing medical malpractice coverage in Texas. The Board will act immediately on the statistics, Christie said.

**GOP Race On**  
A hot race is being waged by Rep. Ray Hutchison of Dallas and Midland Mayor Ernest Angelo for chairmanship of the state Republican party.

Both want to give the party more visibility in state political affairs. Angelo, although he isn't emphasizing it, favors dumping Vice President Nelson Rockefeller from the GOP's 1976 national ticket.

He is also an admirer of former California Gov. Ronald Reagan and wouldn't mind seeing Reagan head the ticket instead of President Ford.

Hutchison says its too early to get involved in the presidential issue and is basing his campaign on strengthening the state party organization.

**Courts Speak**  
The State Supreme Court will review for the first time a case raising the issue of an unwed father's paternal rights.

An intermediate court held the state family code did not intend to give an unwed father absolute right to establish a parent-child relationship.

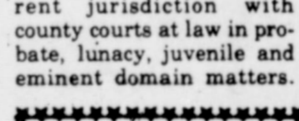
The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the 90-year sentence of a man convicted in the Hutchison County stabbing death of a woman in 1971. The Court noted the state introduced testimony in the murder trial that the man had raped a woman four days earlier in Odessa. The appellate Court said the alleged rape was unrelated to the murder, and testimony was prejudicial to the defendant's right to fair trial.

Federal suits have been filed to redistrict Waller and Harrison counties (commissioners' precincts) to increase black representation.

**AG Opinions**  
A commissioners court cannot legally purchase supplies from a farmers' cooperative in which a commissioner owns one or more shares, Atty. Gen. John L. Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: The county court of Jefferson County has concurrent jurisdiction with county courts at law in probate, lunacy, juvenile and eminent domain matters.

The Governor asked designation of Fayette County and Cameron County as disaster areas — one due to rainfall and windstorms, the other due to year-long drought.

There is convincing evidence of a break in the recession, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen has urged the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development to stop a program designating new 100-year flood plains in Texas until local governments are given more say in designation.

Comptroller Bob Bullock said audits and field examinations by his office found \$1.8 million owed the state in back taxes.

Distribution of Callie bermuda grass will begin at 10:00 a.m. at the Brooksville Experiment Station. The limit is one 30 gallon plastic bag--such as used for garbage disposal. You must take your own bag, but planting material is free. Brooksville is approximately 70 miles north of Meridian, Mississippi, on U.S. 45.

That's a long way to drive to get a bag of bermuda grass, but

someone might want to get an early start on this new grass. As was stated in our last column, the new grass has not been evaluated under our conditions.

Gardeners growing Irish potatoes have been calling our office for information on harvesting and storing the crop. Potatoes can be dug any time they are of sufficient size, and the crop can be considered mature once the stalks begin to turn brown and die. Waiting until the crop is mature assures top yields and increases the storage quality of potatoes. Most potatoes should be ready to dig in 90 to 120 days following planting.

Cutting the stalks several days prior to harvest will help "set" the skin on the potatoes and cause less skinning at harvest. It will also increase the storage life of the tubers. Freshly dug potatoes should be kept in a warm, moist place for several days to allow cuts and skinned areas to heal. This will improve their storage life. Potatoes should then be stored in a cool, dark location.

Abnormalities in the shapes of potatoes are caused mainly by changes in soil moisture. This is especially apparent in years where rainfall varies considerably. A sudden increase in soil moisture can cause growth cracks, second growth and rough, knobby potatoes.

Heavy rainfall causes potatoes to have enlarged lenticels (pores), resulting in small warty spots on the surface. This calls for extra care to avoid skinning and bruising the tubers.

Irish potatoes can be planted again in late summer and early fall for a second crop. Small potatoes from the spring crop can be saved for "seed" but it's best to plant new seed stock if possible to avoid carrying over any disease problems. Also, proper storage of the small potatoes over the hot summer may be difficult. We have a three page instruction on storage of potatoes in our office if you are interested in more information on this subject.

Blossom-end-rot of tomatoes. This problem is caused by a water stress of the plant. These could be soils which are too wet, soil that is too dry, or drying winds which increase water loss from the foliage. The plants lose more water to the atmosphere through its foliage than it can absorb through its roots. This will result in water loss from the plant and the fruit resulting in a slight desiccation of the blossom-end.

A good mulching will also help as it reduces water loss from the soil and makes it more available to the plant during dry periods. A uniform and consistent watering program is also vitally important. Foliar applications of calcium chloride at the rate of 2 to 4 level teaspoons per gallon of water applied when conditions are favorable for the occurrence of blossom-end-rot will help prevent this problem. The applications of calcium chloride should be made at 5 to 7 day intervals until the condition no longer exists.

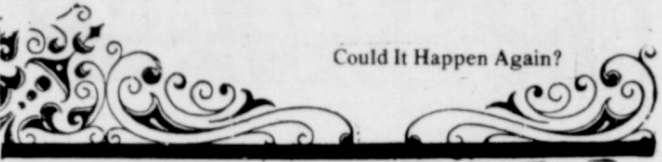

### Do You Remember

One of the first gasoline motor driven trucks that came into use in the early oil boom was a chain drive. There were sprockets fixed to a shaft extending from the transmission to a position directly in front of the rear wheels. There were sprockets on the rear axle on the inside of the wheel. A chain pulled from the front sprockets furnished the power to turn the rear wheels. There was no cab for the driver. He had no windshield. The contraption could travel twenty miles per hour down hill on a smooth road.

These trucks were equipped with solid rubber tires formed in a steel rim on wooden spoke wheels. The rubber was so solid there was very little cushion even when the truck was loaded. Since there were no paved roads, the trucks had to be used during dry weather on graded roads. Many times when drivers ventured off on pasture roads during wet conditions, he would have to get some farmer to hook up a team of mules or horses to pull the truck back to the graded road. Although these trucks would appear crude when compared to trucks developed later, they were a much improved mode of hauling tools and materials for use in the oil boom activities. The truck replaced the horse drawn wagons for moving the tools and material.

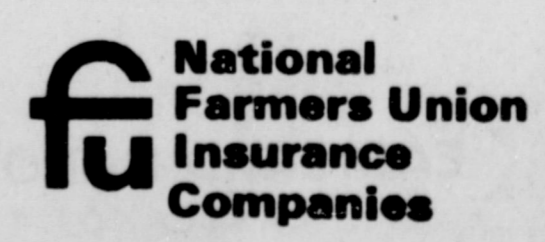
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
