## Bell Telephone Employee To Demonstrate New Procedures

A human telephone line... experiment in short and long-term memory retention and a toy Snoopy dog that talks to children.

These components sound incongruous, but they will all come together when Southwestern Bell Science Demonstrator Glenn Scott presents his telephone communications program to members of the Eastland Lions Club at noon on June 17.

"Little Things Mean A lot is the title of the show. Scott has presented similar programs to more than one million Texans in his 30 years with the company.

According to Scott, the program centers on the company's dependence on little things—such as transistors, integrated circuits, diodes and

solar cells—to provide communications service these days.

Utilizing participants from his audience, Scott will demonstrate that transmitting a telephone conversation can be done without the use of wires or cables.

"In fact, it can be done using humans as the conductor," said Scott. "However, microwave signals and the use of space satellites are more conventional methods being used today."

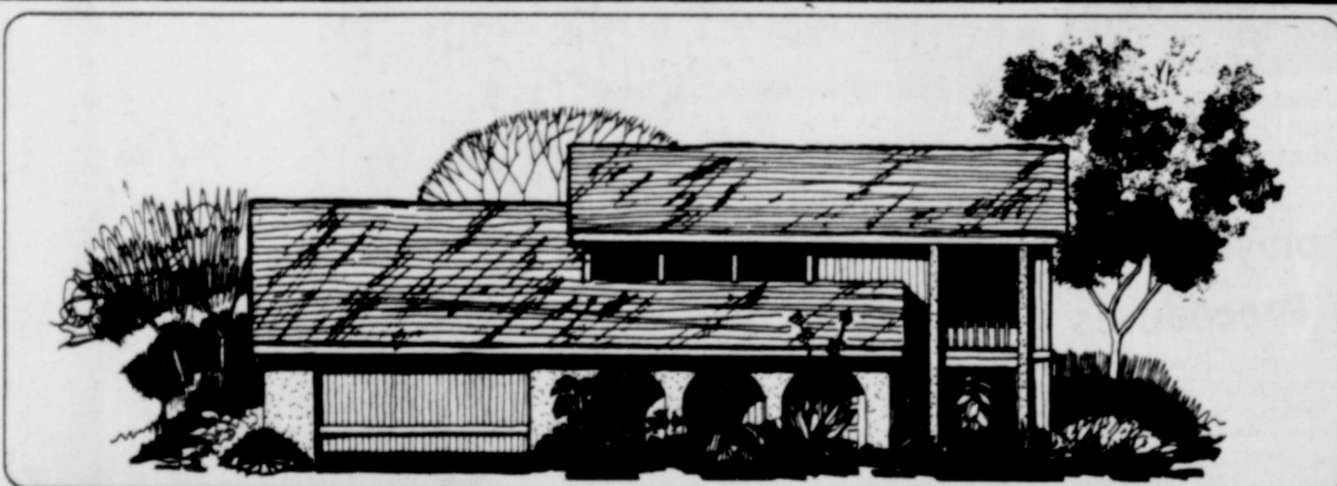

**STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights**  
 by Lyndell Williams  
 TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — A threatened slowdown of some doctors in major cities in protest to rising medical malpractice insurance costs was eased with signing of two new legislative acts.

Texas Medical Association's House of Delegates went on record against the work stoppage and said the short-term laws should be given a chance to work.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe urged immediate start of a study of the overall problem by a blue-ribbon panel of 18.

Former University of Texas Law School Dean W. Page Keeton was designated chairman of the Medical Professional Liability Study Commission established by one of the new acts.

The bill would also create a pool or joint underwriting association to issue policies up to \$300,000.

Another would authorize the State Board of Insurance to set malpractice liability rates and cut the statute of limitation on filing of suits to two years.

Both acts will expire in 1977. A bill pushed by doctors and hospitals to place a \$500,000 limit on claims in malpractice actions failed to clear the House of Representatives.

The Commission will report its findings and long range recommendations by Dec. 1, 1976.

**Legislature Closes**

Texas has a new \$654 million public school finance act and authorization for a Public Utilities Commission to regulate telephone rates and services and to control other utilities (except gas) in rural areas.

Cities may elect to come under the Commission after two years with utilities other than telephones. Gas will be regulated by the state Railroad Commission.

Both the school finance and utilities acts were among the last major pieces of legislation approved by the 64th Legislature which ended its session at midnight June 2.

A record \$12.1 billion appropriations bill passed by lawmakers on final night of the session has been certified by Comptroller Bob Bullock as within anticipated income.

Briscoe has until June 22 to decide which of the legislature's acts he will sign and which he will veto.

**Hearing Recessed**

A Railroad Commission hearing on phasing out natural gas as a boiler fuel has been recessed for 30 days after three days of testimony and opening statements.

Some spokesmen said converting plants to other fuels would be extremely costly.

Others urged that any phase-out should be "orderly" and with attention to what effect the changeover might have on rising consumer rates.

**Courts Speak**

The State Supreme Court suspended the Southwestern Bell \$45 million intrastate long-distance rate increase and set a hearing June 18 on the attorney general's suit to block the increase.

The Supreme Court will hear arguments in a McAllen city and school district appeal from lower court rulings that a nursing home operated as a public charity is exempt from property taxes. The local officials disputed the home is a true charity.

The Court of Criminal Appeals reversed the life sentence given a Dallas man in a murder case due to an inadequate definition of circumstantial evidence by the trial judge.

An Austin district court jury sentenced Robert Kleasen to death in the butcher-murder of a young Mormon missionary.

Assistant county purchasing agents are subject to the county civil service act, but adult probation officers and assistant county auditors are not.

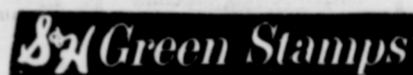

**NOTICE**

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND PARAGRAPH XIII OF ORDINANCE NO. 439 OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS (The "Parking Meter Ordinance") TO PROVIDE FOR EXEMPTION OF VEHICLES BEING USED UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS BY PEACE OFFICERS FROM THE PROHIBITIONS IMPOSED BY SAID ORDINANCE NO. 439 WITHIN CERTAIN SPECIFIED PARKING METER ZONES; AND, TO DEFINE PEACE OFFICERS, AND TO PROVIDE FOR PUBLICATION.

**ORDINANCE 439**  
 AN ORDINANCE RELATING TO PARKING WITHIN DESIGNATED AREAS WITHIN THE CITY OF EASTLAND, TEXAS; PROVIDING FOR THE INSTALLATION AND REGULATION OF PARKING METERS; PROVIDING FOR THE DESIGNATION OF PARKING ZONE STREETS AND PARKING ZONE AREAS; DEFINING VEHICLES; PROVIDING A METHOD OF PAYMENT FOR PARKING METERS AND THE MAINTENANCE THEREOF; PROVIDING REGULATIONS FOR THE USE OF PARKING ZONE AREAS; PROVIDING FOR LEASING OF PARKING ZONE AREAS; PROVIDING FOR EXEMPTIONS; PROVIDING FOR APPEARANCE ON VIOLATION; PROVIDING FOR PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION; PROVIDING FOR ENFORCEMENT; DECLARING DEFENSES TO PROSECUTION UNDER THIS ORDINANCE; PROVIDING FOR COMULATED AND SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND, DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, finds that in order to effectively and efficiently meet the parking needs of the citizens of Eastland, Texas, and others within the City of Eastland, Texas, definite and set guidelines should be established in relation to parking meters and parking meter zones; and,  
 WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Eastland, Texas, finds that the current system of parking meters and parking meter zones in the City of Eastland, Texas, is inadequate; and NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF EASTLAND:

I. As used in this ordinance

the term "vehicle" means every device in, upon, or by which any person or property is or may be transported or drawn upon a highway or street.  
 b. A "parking zone area" as used in this ordinance means each location upon which a parking meter has been set in accordance with this ordinance. Each parking zone area shall be clearly designated and marked by striping either on the street surface or curb surface and shall be of sufficient length and width so as to provide sufficient parking space for one vehicle, the length of such space shall not exceed 22 feet for parallel parking and 21 feet in length for diagonal parking. The width of such spaces shall not exceed 12 feet for either parallel or diagonal parking.

II. The following streets shall be parking zone streets and shall be marked into parking zone areas:

- (a) Seaman Street from its Southwest and Southeast intersection corners with White Street to its Northwest and Northeast intersection corners with Olive Street;
- (b) Commerce Street from its Northwest and Southwest intersection corners with Rosswood Street to its Northeast and Southeast intersection corners with Mulberry Street;
- (c) Lamar Street from its Southwest and Southeast intersection corners with White Street to its Northwest and Northeast intersection corners with Olive Street;
- (d) Main Street from its Southwest and Northwest intersection corners with Rosswood Street to its Southeast and Northeast intersection corners with Mulberry Street.

All parking zone streets as herein named are streets as per map or plat of the City of Eastland as same appears of record in Vol. 77, page 497, Deed of Records of Eastland County, Texas.

III. The City Manager is hereby vested with the authority and responsibility for the installation, maintenance and general upkeep of parking meters and markings in all parking zone areas, and shall install parking meters in all parking zone areas unless same are exempt as hereinafter provided, and shall mark with stripes all parking zone areas as hereinabove provided.

IV. Each parking meter installed and operated under this ordinance shall be constructed so that: (1) upon deposit therein of one cent of United States coin the meter will show a parking time of twelve minutes, with an increase of twelve minutes for each additional one cent coin deposited therein up to a maximum time of two hours;

(2) Upon deposit therein of one five cent coin of the United States the meter will show a parking time of one hour with an increase of one hour for each additional five cent coin deposited therein up to a maximum time of two hours;

(3) Upon deposit therein of one ten cent coin of the United States the meter will show a parking time of two hours;

(4) Upon expiration of the amount of time correlated to the amount of coins deposited therein, the meter shall show a violation flag or time expired flag.

V. (a) A person commits an offense under this ordinance if he stops or parks or allows to remain stopped or parked any vehicle in any parking zone area while the parking meter in said parking zone area shows a violation flag or time expired flag.

(b) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of 25c provided, however, if said fine is not paid or appearance made as hereinafter provided, on or before the fifth day following the date of the offense, the offense is punishable by a fine of \$5.00.

VI. (a) A person commits an offense under this ordinance if he stops or parks or allows to remain stopped or parked any vehicle on a parking zone street if said vehicle utilizes any portion of the space of an adjoining parking zone area or extends into any no parking zone area.

(b) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of 25c; provided, however, if said fine is not paid or appearance made as hereinafter provided, on or before the fifth day following the date of the offense, the offense is punishable by a fine of \$5.00.

appearance made as hereinafter provided, on or before the fifth day following the date of the offense, the offense is punishable by a fine of \$5.00.

VII. A person commits an offense under this ordinance if he stops or parks a vehicle in a parking zone area for a continuous period of time in excess of two hours.

VIII. (a) A person commits an offense if he permits any vehicle registered in his name to be parked in violation of any provision of this ordinance.

(b) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of 25c; provided, however, if said fine is not paid or appearance made as hereinafter provided, on or before the fifth day following the date of the offense, the offense is punishable by a fine of \$5.00.

IX. (a) A person commits an offense if he permits any vehicle registered in his name to be parked in violation of any provision of this ordinance.

(b) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine of 25c; provided, however, if said fine is not paid or appearance made as hereinafter provided, on or before the fifth day following the date of the offense, the offense is punishable by a fine of \$5.00.

X. (a) A person commits a further offense under this ordinance if, after having received a parking violation citation, he fails, refuses or neglects to appear before the Corporation or City Court of the City of Eastland on or before the fifth day following the date of

the offense. The date of the offense appearing on the parking violation citation constitutes a rebuttable presumption of the true date of the offense.

(b) An offense under this section is punishable by a fine not to exceed \$200.00.

XI. An appearance under this ordinance is made by payment of fine or by posting appearance bond in an amount set by the City Judge and approved by the Chief of Police of the City of Eastland on or before the appearance time. Appearance time is on or before the fifth day following the date of violation.

XII. It shall be an affirmative defense to prosecution under Paragraph 5 of this Ordinance that the time of violation the parking meter applicable thereto was not in working order.

XIII. It shall be an affirmative defense to prosecution under this Ordinance that the vehicle involved was then engaged or being used in an emergency of such a nature as to involve substantial risk of injury to person or property.

XIV. (a) The City Manager is hereby authorized to lease, on behalf of the City of Eastland, parking zone areas for the purpose of loading and unloading. Such leases shall be made to owners or managers of businesses only. Each business establishment shall be entitled to lease one parallel or two diagonal parking zone areas.

(b) Provided, however, no parking zone areas in or on the following portions of parking zone streets shall be leased: (i) Seaman Street from its Southeast and Southwest intersection corners with Main Street to its Northwest and Northeast intersection corners with Commerce Street;

(ii) Commerce Street from its Northwest and Southwest intersection corners with Seaman Street to its Southeast and Northeast intersection corners with Lamar Street;

(iii) Lamar Street from its Northeast and Northwest intersection corners with Commerce Street to its Southwest and Southeast intersection corners with Main Street)

(iv) Main Street from its Northeast and Southeast intersection corners with Lamar Street to its Northwest and Southwest intersection corners with Seaman Street.

XV. The fee for lease under Paragraph 10 of this Ordinance is \$50 per parking zone area per annum. No lease shall be granted under this Ordinance

until said fee has been paid to the City Secretary.

(b) Persons holding valid leases under this Ordinance shall be exempt from the provisions of Paragraph Five of this Ordinance.

XVI. No type of permits, leases, or other parking privileges shall be granted except as contained and set forth in this Ordinance.

XVII. The City is hereby authorized to enter into a contract for the purchase and installation of parking meters and to pay for same from the receipt obtained by the operation thereof as far as possible. Said means of payment shall be in addition to any other purchasing powers heretofore granted to the City by Charter or otherwise.

XVIII. The Police Department of the City of Eastland is hereby given the responsibility of enforcement of this Ordinance and shall make due complaint of any violation under this Ordinance.

XIX. The provisions of this ordinance are cumulative of all other ordinances, regulations or rules, or parts thereof, governing or regulating the same subject matter; all such ordinances, regulations or rules in conflict with the provisions herein are expressly repealed to the extent of such conflict.

XX. Should any portion of this ordinance be unconstitutional or invalid for any reason, such unconstitutionality or invalidity shall not affect any other part hereof, but the same shall remain as if such unconstitutionality or invalid portions originally had been deleted from this Ordinance.

XXI. The City Secretary is hereby directed to publish the descriptive caption of this Ordinance, together with the penalty provisions herein in the length time and manner provided by law.

XXII. The fact that the City of Eastland has no adequate means by which to regulate parking in the City of Eastland and has no adequate penalty for violation of parking regulations, and that such facts endanger the public peace, health and safety, creates an emergency requiring the suspension of rules requiring an ordinance be not passed on the day at which the same is introduced, and requiring that this Ordinance become effective upon final passage and publication as required by law and charter, and it is hereby ORDAINED AND ORDERED this 17th day of March, 1975.

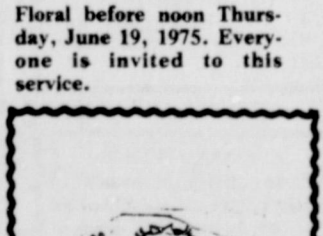

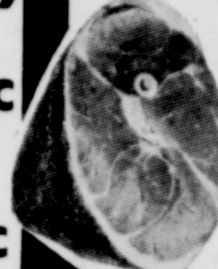

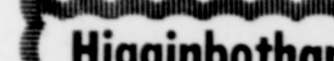


### Ellison Springs Marker Unveiled

He also recognized all the descendants present as well as County Commissioners who made the marker possible to be erected by appropriating funds for the marker and honored guests, Judge and Mrs. Earl Conner.

Replicas of paper weights to



be presented to the research committee are being made, were not presented as planned at the dedication. Members of this committee are Mrs. Alton Wilhite, Monahans; Mrs. R.D. Wright, DeLeon; Mrs. Raymond Anderson, Stephenville; and Mrs. Ellison Tom Jr., of Andrews.

Mr. Ellison Tom Jr., of Andrews, who is chairman of Andrews Historical Survey - Committee, gave the benedic- tion.

The reception hosted by the Ellison descendants was held under the lovely live oak trees at the site of Ellison Springs, and near the former home of Jimmy and Elza Ellison, who built a cabin in 1858 and a short time later erected a home at the same location, which is now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Bill Fraser. It is the oldest continually lived-in home in Eastland County. Mrs. Iva Buchanan, who is now 93, remembers vividly the many times she visited her grandparents at this home when she was quite young.

### Lloyd Bentsen Calls On D.H.U.D. To Stop Program

Washington, D.C. - Senator Lloyd Bentsen has called on the Department of Housing of Urban Development to stop a program designating new 100-year flood plains in Texas and other states until provisions for greater local input are made.

Calling the program a classic case of bureaucratic overkill, the Senator said the program was wrecking property values and housing development without sufficient knowledge of the areas involved.

In a letter to HUD Secretary Carla Hills, Bentsen made several recommendations which would increase local input into the designation of flood plains and asked that the program be halted until they were implemented.

"If this program has been in effect in 1940, much of the State of Texas would never have been developed," Senator Bentsen said.

"The Flood Development Act of 1973 established the concept that housing should not be allowed within a high risk flood plains area unless Federal flood insurance is obtained first. This was an attempt to lower the enormous Government costs of continually rebuilding disaster areas. The concept was a good one."

"But HUD has since been extremely inept in mapping out flood plains areas. The Department has not taken into consideration existing food control structures and has failed to properly consult with local officials."

"The program works through an agency in Washington that has no knowledge of local conditions. Any mapping is done by a company in Pennsylvania that has no idea of the typography of the State of Texas."

Bentsen's recommendations include notifying local governments that an area is being considered for flood plain designation and would require meetings between the Federal

Insurance Administration, the mapping company and local representatives. The Senator is also asking that specific criteria be established to determine the effectiveness of flood control devices on flood plains.

"The basic problem now is the almost total lack of communication between Federal officials administering the flood plains program, and the citizens that are being affected."

"Local communities are now at a distinct disadvantage, and the situation must be remedied immediately," Senator Bentsen said.

### Peanut Meeting To Be Held June 19

A peanut meeting for peanut producers will be held Thursday night, June 19, at 8:00 p.m. in the Gorman High School according to C.M. (Pug) Guthery, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Mr. Guthery said it is time for growers to engage in a review of the peanut program, study new issues, and make recommendations that will reflect the wishes of the majority. It is also important that a review be made of USDA's draft of a new peanut bill, needed research and others.

Don Petty, Associate Director of Commodity Activities for the Texas Farm Bureau, will be speaker at the meeting.

Mr. Guthery urges all peanut growers to attend this meeting. He said the success of the peanut industry depends upon the response of the peanut growers.

With the coming of the automobile the oil boom, many community families moving out of the boom areas and the migration of large numbers of oil field workers who worked seven days per week, the community schools and churches became less popular and many were finally abandoned.

The remaining church people in the community went into the nearest town in their automobiles to attend church. The records of the church were transferred to the town church and so the community church in many locations passed away leaving only the cemetery to permanently mark the location of what was once a pleasurable meeting place for friends and neighbors in the happy community.

Governmental bodies soon decided rural children could obtain a better education by

attending the larger schools in the town. Consequently the school district's reorganization eliminated the community - schools. Automobiles carried the rural children into town for the better education. Then, after awhile school buses were provided to gather up the children for transporting to and from the town school. Many of the community school buildings were maintained for a community meeting place for community affairs. One of the community meetings in the school building was a monthly meeting when the women in the area met with material and equipment to make homemade bed quilts which were sold to anyone who wanted to buy them. These all day quilting parties produced many prized prizes that brought in much money for community affairs.

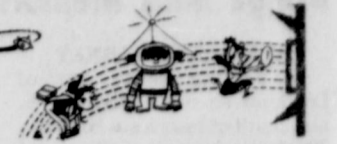

**Sale Of Flood Insurance To City Of Eastland**

WASHINGTON, D.C.—Congressman Omar Burleson advises that the Federal Insurance Administration of the Department of Housing and Urban Development has authorized the sale of flood insurance to the City of Eastland under the emergency program, effective June 10, 1975. The flood plain management regulations which Eastland has adopted have been accepted by HUD, pending further review.

Flood insurance at subsidized premium rates will be available on structures in amounts up to \$35,000 for single-family dwellings and up to \$100,000 per unit on residential contents and \$100,000 on non-residential contents. After a rate of study has been completed for Eastland, coverage up to double these amounts will be available at actuarial rates.

Policies of flood insurance may be obtained from any licensed property insurance agent or broker in the area. Further information may be obtained from the National Flood Insurers Association servicing office which is the Home Insurance Company, 2100 Travis Street, Houston, Texas, 77002.

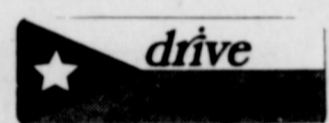

## Plant South Of Town Brings Back Memories

In driving south out of Eastland on State Highway 6, just south of Interstate Highway 20, the "remains" of what used to be the Kickcock & Reynolds (and later Graridge Corp.) gasoline plant can be plainly seen...in a shambles and ruin, a stark reminder of the years when the County boasted more than 20 casinghead gasoline refineries and booster plants.

And, in driving on FM 101, midway between Morton Valley and Ranger, the remains of the Lone Star Gas Company's plant 108, and Booster Plant 101, also shatter the view to the south of the highway, with the Booster plant having been replaced by a smaller and more modern semi-automated compressor plant.

One might think, "What's happened to the gas industry in the County?"

Well, true...there isn't the volume of natural gas available now that there was during and immediately following the boom years 50 years ago.

But, the industry is alive and doing fairly well just the same. Example, the five million dollar outlay by the Odessa Natural Corporation of Odessa, Texas, and their modern, automated, compressor located just north of FM 2526, about five miles west of Carbon on a 10 acre site.

The plant went into operation in February, 1973, and draws raw gas from wells in Eastland, Callahan, Brown, Coleman, and McCulloch Counties via a series of smaller booster plants along with a 14 inch pipeline. One such booster plant is located eight miles southwest of May in Brown County.

Superintendent of the Carbon plant is Bill Shepard, a native of Turley, Oklahoma. Bill, as he is known to his four assistants at the Carbon plant, has been with Odessa Natural for 29 years, and says the Carbon operation is a long way from the days of the old Cooper and Bessemer compressor engines (the kind Eastlandites used to wake up nights hearing as they puffed and groaned loudly at the Graridge Plant south of town.)

The Carbon plant has two 3,000 horsepower turbine compressors made by the Solar Corporation, of San Diego, California. The compressors burn incoming raw gas as their fuel, compressing the gas to over 1,000 pounds per square inch as it leaves the plant.

Coming into the plant, the line pressure will vary from 150 to 250 pounds, Shepard said.

In leaving the Carbon plant, the line runs northeast about 1/4 miles where it joins a 36 inch line belonging to Lo-Vaca Gas Company, a subsidiary of Coastal States Gas Company of Houston.

When asked what the volume and capacity of the new plant is, Shepard said the plant isn't running anywhere near its capacity, due to a shortage of natural gas. It is capable of handling 52 million cubic feet per day, but until more gas wells are completed, and tied on to the system, the compressors are "just loafing along".

As it now is running and operating, the noise level in and near the compressor building is deafening. So much so, that employees are furnished what appear to be stereo headphones to protect their ears...one wonders what it might be like of both compressors were running under full load to their maximum capacity.

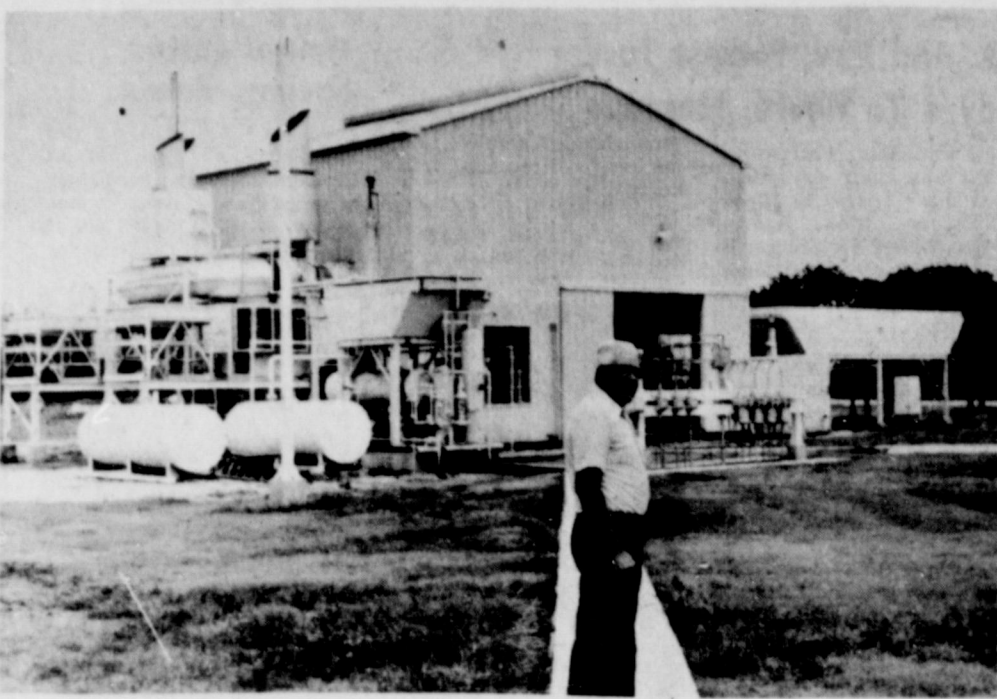
Assisting in the Carbon and May operation are Jim Hobbs of Cisco, A.D. Moyer of Cisco, George Sears of Zephyr, and Donald Hale of Eastland. Moyer and Hobbs were transferred to the Carbon plant along with Shepard in 1973 when it began operation.

The plant is automated and runs by itself most of the time. However, in case of serious trouble, or shut down, when the operators are not on duty, special leased telephone lines

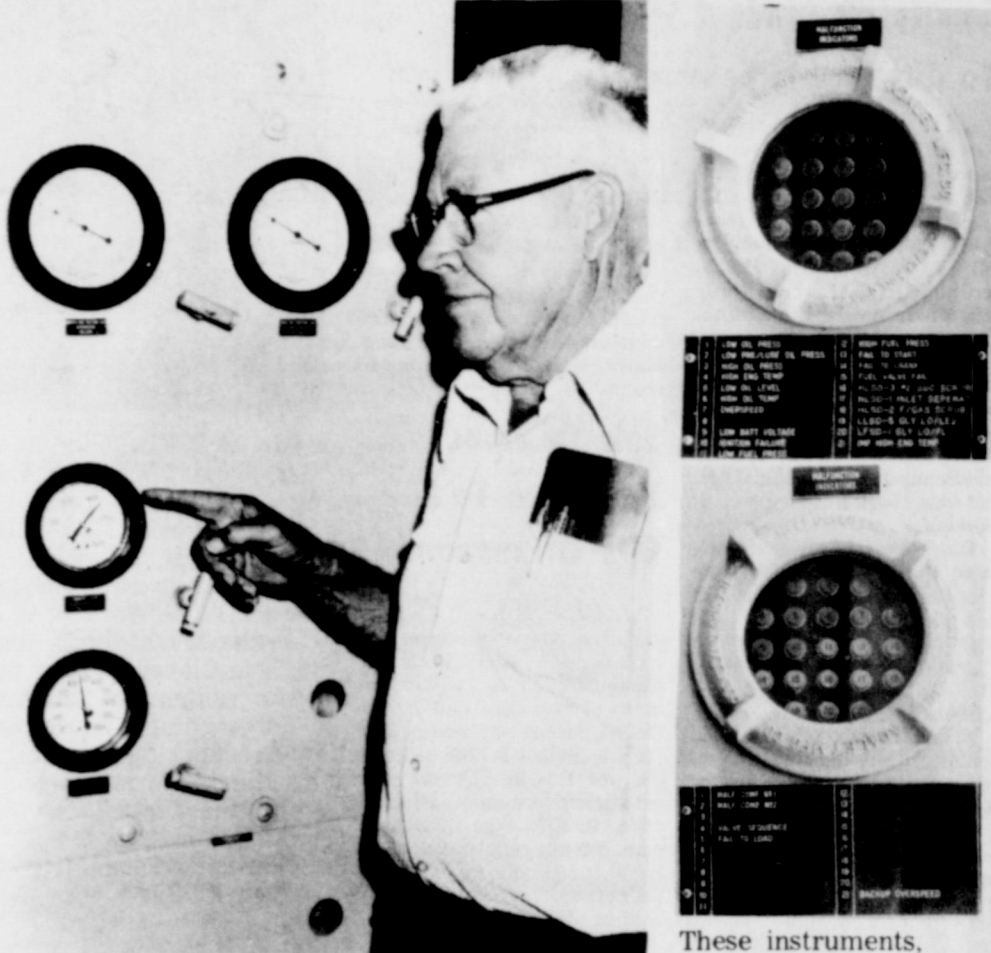
between the plant and A-1 Answering Service, in Eastland, carry signals for an alarm system.

Located in the compressors and at other points in the plant is a Quindar Transmitter that monitors key points, such as incoming and outgoing pressure and whether or not the engines are running or have shut down.

These indicators transmit a signal to the Quindar Receiver at A-1 Answering Service where a telemetering device, by means of an alarm and colored lights, the Eastland firm knows within a fraction of a second 24 hours per day, the nature of the problem, and can notify either by mobile phone, or telephone, one of the operators, who in turn can immediately rectify the problem.
