Proposed New Constitution Could Cost

Texas Taxpayers Billion Dollar A Year

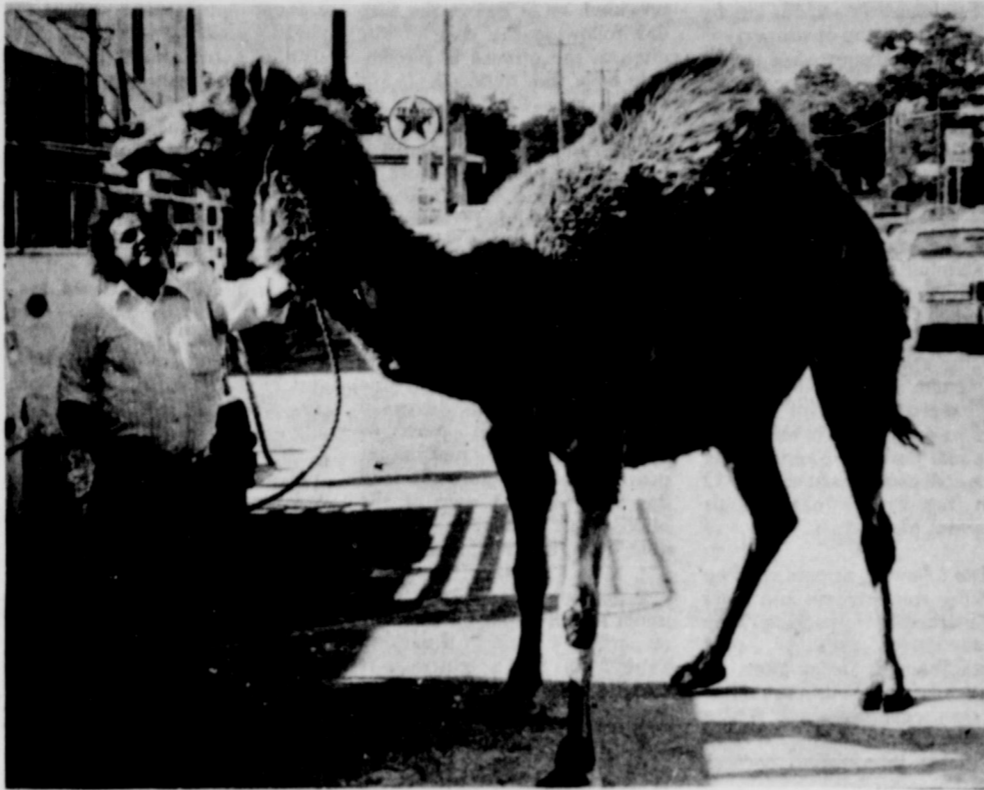
Austin--Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that the proposed new constitution could cost Texas taxpayers a billion dollars a year.

In fact, Bullock said, if some provisions such as water projects were carried out to the fullest the total costs could run more than \$11 billion.

The cost report by Bullock's office was requested by five state senators.

The report showed that proposed revisions would directly cost state government \$100 million a year in actual expenditures and would cost taxpayers another \$53 million a year in new taxes on such intangible property as bank deposits and stocks.

Local taxpayers could get hit for an estimated \$771 million a year under provisions calling for local property tax equalization and increased homestead exemptions for the elderly, according to the report.

Do You Remember

The drilling for oil in the early days was much different and required much more actual labor by experienced workmen. After the well location was established and staked, the rig builders had to build a rig from lumber which would be of sufficient structure to support the necessary drilling equipment. Power was supplied by boilers that created the steam to run the steam engine. This type of drilling was called a cable tool job. Many of the early day men to operate the cable tool rigs were imported from Pennsylvania where drilling for oil had been started earlier. The crews were made up of a driller who was in charge of the crew on his tour. They worked 12 hours per day seven days per week. At remote locations, the crews sometimes set up tents at the location and lived at the site until the well was completed.

The melons were getting ripe and in the wee hours of a morning the driller told one of the crew to go over and get one of the big melons for them to eat. It was very dark and the crewman had to make his way out into the melon patch in search of a big suitable melon. As he felt melon after melon to get one his boss would like, he heard a noise that sounded to him like a double barreled shotgun being cocked ready to fire. In his frightened state of mind, he called out "don't shoot Mr. Jones, it's just me getting a watermelon".

There was no answer and he picked the melon and left. After daylight he discovered the farmer had set up a home made windmill type contraption to scare away the crows from his melons.
