Lights Might Go Out

AUSTIN--"An abrupt phase-out of natural gas as a boiler fuel would simply mean the lights would go out", W.G. Marquardt, president of Texas Electric Service Co., said in a statement filed Tuesday with the Texas Railroad Commission.

Marquardt was one of several utility company officials appearing here before a hearing of the commission called for the purpose of determining the reasonableness of reducing or eliminating natural gas as a boiler fuel in the state.

The TESCO president said in his statement that his company already has a long-term plan to reduce its dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel and to use lignite and nuclear fuels for a major part of its boiler fuel requirements.

"This year, 20% of the kilowatt hours generated for our customers' needs will come from lignite plants", he said.

"In 1982 about 65% of our annual generation will come from lignite and nuclear fuels."

"We have reviewed the possibility of accelerating our fuel diversification program and believe it would be totally impractical. The financial problems would be disastrous", he stated.

If by some miracle it could be done at all, it would heavily burden our customers, he said.

"Such a program would not produce any additional kilowatt hours and would require our customers to pay approximately \$300 million per year in additional costs for electrical service. This sum is more than our customers are now paying annually for their electric service", Marquardt said.

"In 1973 our company supplied 12% of the total electric requirements in the state of Texas but used only 1 1/2% of the total gas produced in Texas that year. We do not believe it is

in the public interest to eliminate such a small amount of natural gas used for boiler fuel at a time when more than three times as much gas is being shipped out of state as utilities in Texas are using to generate electricity."

The company must continue to depend on natural gas for boiler fuel, particularly during peak use periods in the summer. "Not having enough gas or oil to run our existing plants for these peak periods would result in very expensive plants (lignite or nuclear) with a low-use factor. The plants we are building are for base-load operations and will be used year round. But to build the expensive lignite or nuclear plants for only peak-load operation is in our opinion an unwarranted burden on our customers and a questionable use of the limited financial resources of this country", he said.

"Our present plan of reducing our dependence on natural gas as a boiler fuel is very expensive. We must spend about \$470 million during the next three years, which is half as much as has been spent in the entire history of our company. Lignite plants cost about three times that of comparable gas-fired plants and a nuclear plant costs about four times as much. This will require frequent rate increases to obtain the funds necessary to support this increased investment."

"We have a farsighted and realistic plan. Even so, it will be difficult to carry out and especially difficult to finance. The economic and social consequences of restricting natural gas use during this orderly transition would be disastrous. We urge the cooperation and flexibility which will enable Texas to meet its energy needs."

Enroll Now For CJC Community Service Courses

Thirteen Community Service Courses will be offered by Cisco Junior College during the summer, beginning next week, Vocational-Technical Dean - Gerald Bint has announced.

Four classes will come under the general category of Art, seven under Physical Training, one will be in First Aid, and one in Photography. Most will meet during evening hours, although some work will be available during the daytime.

Art classes will include: Ceramics, an eight-week class meeting Monday and Wednesday mornings from 8:30 to 11:30 in the Art Room of the Fine Arts Building, with a cost of \$24.00 plus supplies; Art for Children ages 6-9, meeting Monday afternoons from 3:00 to 4:30 in the Art Room and lasting eight weeks with a fee of \$10.00; Art for children ages 10-14, meeting Tuesday afternoons for eight weeks from 3:00 to 4:30 in the Art Room, and also with a \$10 fee; and Flower Arranging, six weeks on Monday mornings from 9:00 to 10:00 in the Technical-Vocational Building Number 1, Room 33, with a fee of \$5.00 plus supplies.

Physical Training classes will include: Beginning golf, meeting Tuesday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 at the Community Gym, lasting 10 weeks and costing \$16.00; Advanced Golf, meeting Thursday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. at the Community Gym and also costing \$16.00; Bowling for ages 10-14, meeting Tuesday mornings from 9:00 to 10:00 for 10 weeks, costing \$8.00; Bowling for adults, which will meet 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. on Tuesday evenings for 10 weeks, costing \$16.00; Exercise and Volleyball for ladies 20 and older, meeting Thursday evenings from 7:00-9:00 for 10 weeks and costing \$16.00; Ballroom Dancing for Junior High and High School, meeting ten Thursday evenings from 7:00 to 9:00 in the Ballroom of the Student Union Building, with a cost of \$16.00; and Tennis for adults, meeting Wednesday mornings from 9:00 to 11:00 in the CJC campus gym, lasting 10 weeks and costing \$16.00.

The First Aid Class will be in General First Aid and Cardio-pulmonary Resuscitation, meeting Tuesday evenings from 7:00-9:00 p.m. in the Science Hall for 10 weeks, and costing \$16.00.

The Photography course will be held a time to be designated in the Photo Lab of the CJC

Administration Building. The class will last 10 weeks and cost \$16.00 plus supplies.

Registrations will be held next week, and all persons taking the courses should go to the location the class will be held for registration. The registration days and times are:

Mr. Bint said that at least ten students would be necessary in order for a class to be held, and that other courses would be made available through the Community Service Program of CJC providing there was sufficient interest and a qualified instructor could be obtained.

Dean Bint urged those living in or near Cisco to "enrich your summer weeks by participating in one or more of our fine Community Service Courses taught by people well qualified in each of the various fields." He said, "This type program can continue only with the support of the people of the area, and we hope to have good enrollments for each class."

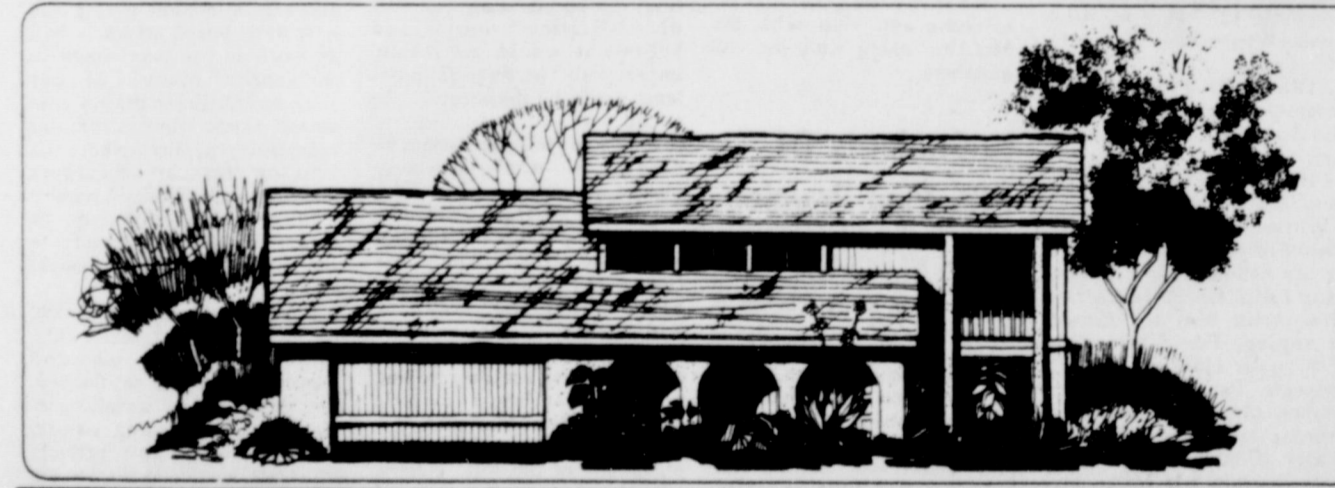

Control Of Foliar Disease Of Peanuts In Texas

In 1974 we requested financial support for studies on control of foliar diseases of peanuts in Texas. However, the reduced financial support was designated specifically for web blotch research. Therefore, the 1974 progress report is devoted solely to the presentation of results obtained in our web blotch research program.

The objectives of the 1974 web blotch experiments were (a) to determine the effect of different fungicide application schedules on control of web blotch in Wilson County, (b) to evaluate the effect of fungicides and fungicidal mixtures on the control of web blotch in Frio County, (c) to measure varietal differences in susceptibility to web blotch in a 1974 Frio County variety test, and (d) to study the biology of the web blotch fungus in an effort to find

vulnerable points in its life cycle, in order to develop appropriate control measures.

The pertinent results of the 1974 web blotch experiments were: (a) Ascochyta web blotch and other foliar diseases developed slowly at the Wilson County test site. Adequate disease control was obtained with either three applications of Bravo 6F or three applications of a mixture containing Benlate 50W, Manzate 200 and Sun-spray 7 1/2 oil. (b) Web blotch was the predominant disease in a Frio County test, but it did not develop rapidly until late in the growing season. Kocide 4045, a flowable copper sulfur mixture, gave good control of web blotch and significantly higher yields of Starr peanuts than any other treatment in the test. (c) The incidence of web blotch was low in a Frio County variety test. Nevertheless, Florunner was significantly more tolerant to web blotch than either Starr or Tamnut 74. Starr and Tamnut 74 were significantly different in their reaction to web blotch. Goldin I was significantly more tolerant to web blotch than either Starr or Tamnut 74. (d) Web blotch was observed on volunteer peanut plants on 15 March 1974, and it was present throughout the growing season in South Texas. Ascochyta produces at least three types of spores (ascospores, conidia and chlamydospores). It is a fungus that appears to be well adapted to survival and genetic variability. At the present time the peanut plant is the only known host of the web blotch fungus.

Dominoes, anyone?



WASHINGTON—"The discredited domino theory . . . You've heard that phrase before. It drips like honey from the tongues of television newscasters. It punctuates the lectures of political science professors. And it is the sum and substance of the geopolitical thinking of all too many Senators and Congressmen.

But when was the "discredited domino theory" discredited?

President Eisenhower put the "domino theory" into our political vocabulary when, at a news conference in April, 1954, he was asked what the consequences would be of a Communist victory over the French in North Vietnam.

President Eisenhower said: ". . . you have broader considerations that might follow what you would call the 'falling domino' principle. You have a row of dominoes set up, you knock over the first one, and what will happen to the last one is the certainty that it will go over quickly."

Eisenhower meant that if Communist aggression was not checked, it would spread throughout Southeast Asia in much the same way as Nazi aggression spread through Europe in the 1930s.

"We come to the possible sequence of events," he said, "the loss of Indochina, of Burma, of Thailand, of the Peninsula and Indonesia following . . ."

With the benefit of 20-20 hindsight, we can determine whether Eisenhower was right or wrong.

In 1954, shortly after the President's press conference, the Communists came to power in North Vietnam. After a bloody period of consolidating their gains, North Vietnamese Communists sponsored insurgents in Laos, resulting in the formation of a neutralist government there in 1961. With the Ho Chi Minh Trail through Laos now secure, the North Vietnamese stepped up aggression against South Vietnam. When the Cambodians threw out a pro-Communist ruler there, the North Vietnamese organized an insurgency against that beleaguered country.

The Thais have perhaps the most sensitive political antennae of all the Indochinese people. They "allied" themselves with the Japanese just in time to prevent an occupation of their country during WWII, and switched to the Americans before it was clear to most others that the Rising Sun was setting. The Thais have recently asked the Americans to leave their country. They know which way the dominoes are falling.

If Thailand makes an "independent accommodation" with the Communists, the road to Malaysia, the Philippines, Indonesia and Australia is clear.

In the 1954 press conference, Eisenhower said: "the possible consequences of the loss are just incalculable to the Free World."

That was true then, and it is true now.

Harris Isbell Named Second Recipient Of Nathan B. Eddy Award

WASHINGTON--Harris Isbell, emeritus professor of medicine and pharmacology at the University of Kentucky, has been named the second recipient of the Nathan B. Eddy Memorial Award of the National Research Council.

Dr. Isbell, who now resides in Eastland, received the \$2,500 award and delivered the Nathan B. Eddy Memorial Award Lecture on May 19, during the 37th annual scientific meeting of the NRC's Committee on Problems Dependence in Washington, D.C.

The award is presented annually by the committee for excellence in drug dependence research and honors Nathan B. Eddy, who headed the committee for 21 years. Last year's recipient was Maurice Seavers, chairman emeritus of the department of pharmacology at the University of Michigan.

In 1963 Dr. Isbell joined the department of medicine at the University of Kentucky, where he stayed until his retirement in late 1974. During his 40-year career, Dr. Isbell served on professional committees of the American Medical Association, Bureau of Narcotics and Dangerous Drugs of the Department of Justice, Food and Drug Administration, National Institute of Mental Health, National Science Foundation, and World Health Organization.

In addition, he served as a lecturer in pharmacology at the Universities of Cincinnati, Illinois, and Louisville, as an associate editor of *Journal of Pharmacology and Experimental Therapeutics*, and on the advisory board of *Psychopharmacologia*. In 1968 he received the Kentucky State Medical Association Award for Faculty Scientific Achievement.

Mr. Isbell is a former graduate of Eastland High School and is now residing in the family home, 417 Foch St. He has been invited to address the American Medical Association in Atlantic City in June. Mr. Isbell has received numerous awards for his work in the drug rehabilitation field.

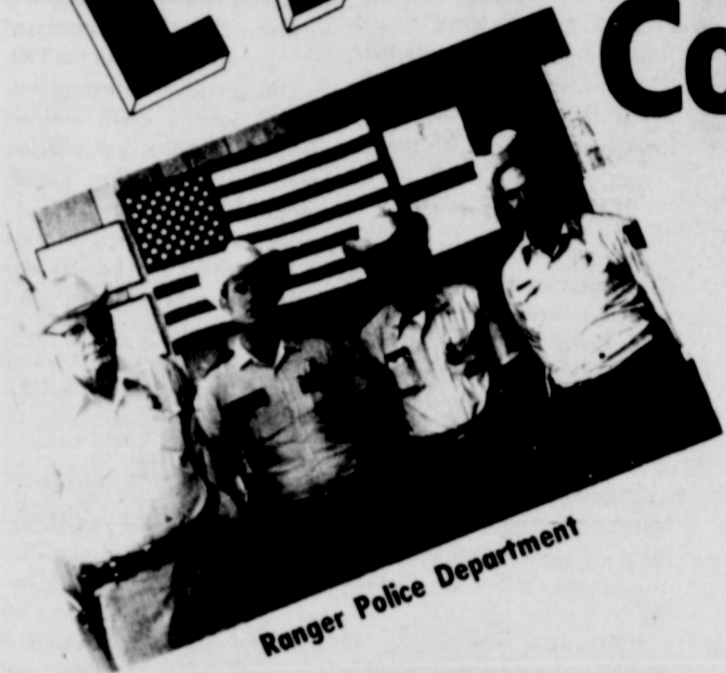

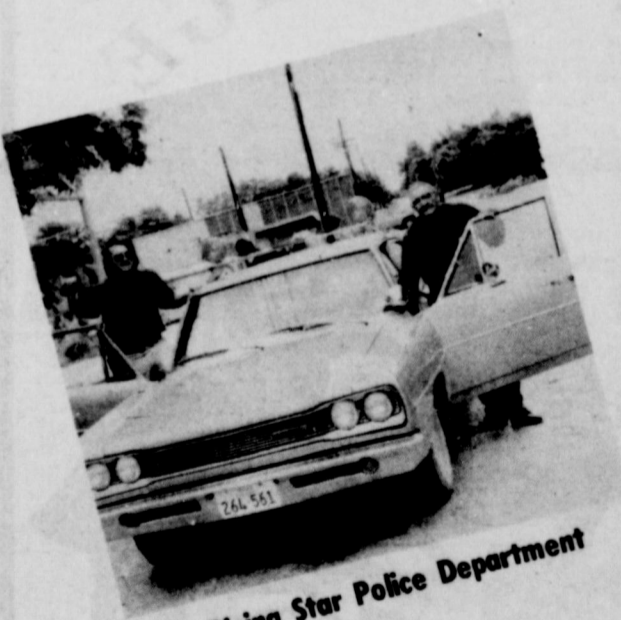

Law Enforcement Appreciation Day

Saturday, June 7, 1975



TAKEN IN RANGER - - \$100,000 street value of heroin and \$20,000 were taken from seven suspects during a September 8 raid at a Ranger motel. Ranger Police assisted county and state officers in the raid.

FINGERPRINTS

More than 5.5 million fingerprint cards were received by the FBI Identification Division during fiscal year 1974, and over half of these were criminal fingerprints that required expedite processing. Each workday during the year, approximately 22,000 fingerprint cards were received in the division.

FBI fingerprint experts made over 1/2 million latent fingerprint comparisons in more than 37,800 cases and testified in nearly 600 Federal, State, and local court cases.

BOMBINGS—1973

During calendar year 1973, 76 percent of all bombings occurred between 6:01 p.m. and 6 a.m. Eight hundred thirty-two incidents occurred between 6:01 p.m. and midnight, and 653 occurred between 12:01 a.m. and 6 a.m.

Tuesday had the highest frequency of bombing incidents with 339, while Saturday had the lowest with 235 during 1973.

Thirty-nine percent of all bombing matters occurred in cities over 250,000 population. California led the Nation in number of incidents with 573, or 29 percent of the total. The Western Region experienced 834 of the bombing incidents.

"CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE FBI"

Close cooperation among law enforcement agencies at all levels is highly effective and profitable. To suggest methods of implementing cooperation through effective correspondence, the FBI has available a booklet, "Correspondence with the FBI," which contains samples and suggestions for various correspondence law enforcement agencies may have with the FBI regarding evidence, fingerprints, wanted notices, death notices, disposition sheets, cancellation notices, or any other matter within FBI operations.

Requests for copies of this booklet, which may be obtained free of charge by interested individuals, should be submitted to the Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation, Washington, D.C. 20535.

NCIC

As the year 1974 ended, the computerized files of the National Crime Information Center contained more than 5.5 million active records on wanted persons, stolen property, and criminal offenders, an 11-percent increase over 1973.

LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICERS KILLED

During 1974, 132 local, county, State, and Federal law enforcement officers were killed due to criminal action—2 less than the year before.

According to information collected through the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting Program, 13 law enforcement officers were killed in December 1974, as compared to 11 officers slain in December 1973.

During 1974, 57 officers were killed in the Southern States, 37 in the North Central States, 20 in the Western States, 14 in the Northeastern States, and 4 in Puerto Rico.

Twenty-nine officers were slain handling disturbance incidents, 28 while attempting arrests for crimes other than robbery or burglary, 25 in connection with robbery matters, 12 while investigating suspicious persons, 11 while making traffic stops, 10 while handling prisoners, 9 in unprovoked or premeditated ambush-type attacks, and 8 in connection with burglary matters.

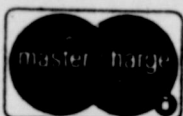


CONVICTIONS

During fiscal year 1974, there were 96 convictions under the Federal Kidnaping Statute, compared with 71 the previous year, resulting in 19 terms of life imprisonment and other sentences totaling more than 928 years.

During fiscal year 1974, there were 15,240 Federal convictions in FBI cases. This was the largest number in FBI history, exceeding the previous high in fiscal 1973 by more than 5 percent.

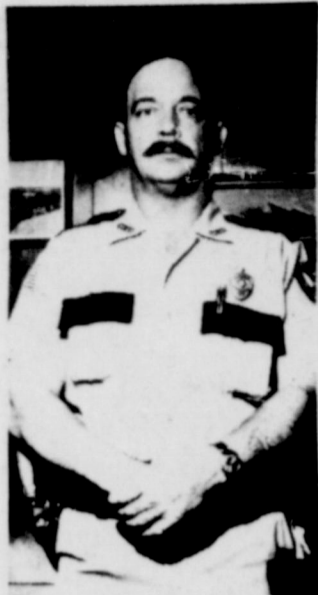


ZANE K. WELCH

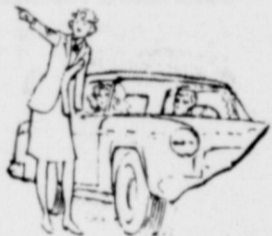

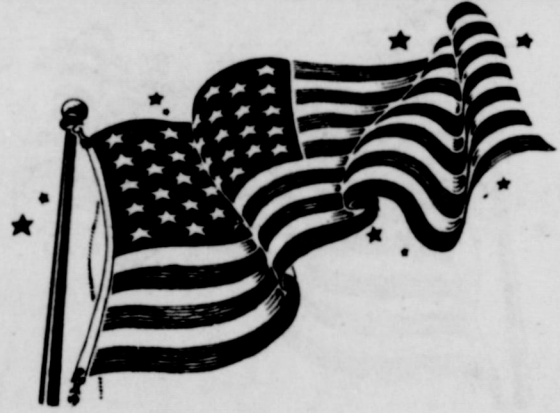

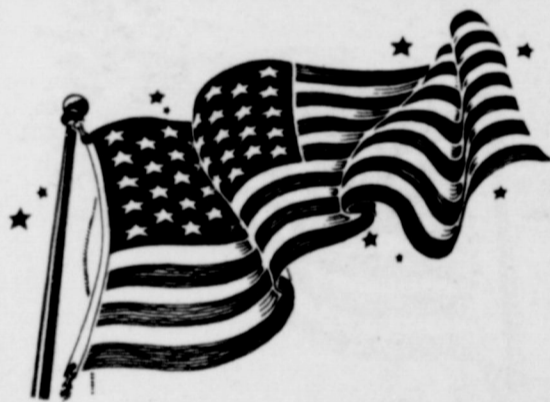
Lloyd Edward Thompson moved to Eastland in June, 1974 from Escondido, California. He came to work for the Eastland Police Department in August, 1974.

Concerning law enforcement Mr. Frailey says, "Your're always going to have to have policemen. The policemen of today are more educated than are those from the past."

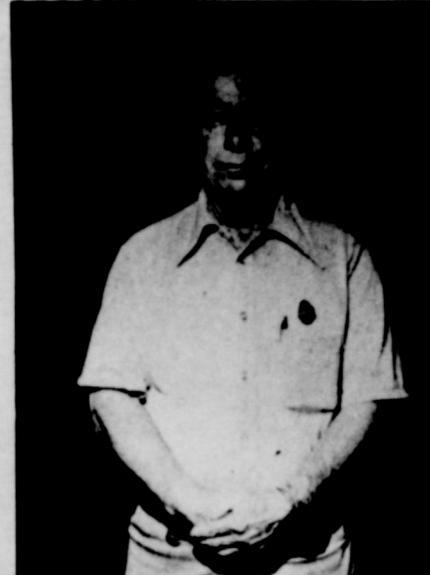


JERRY BONE

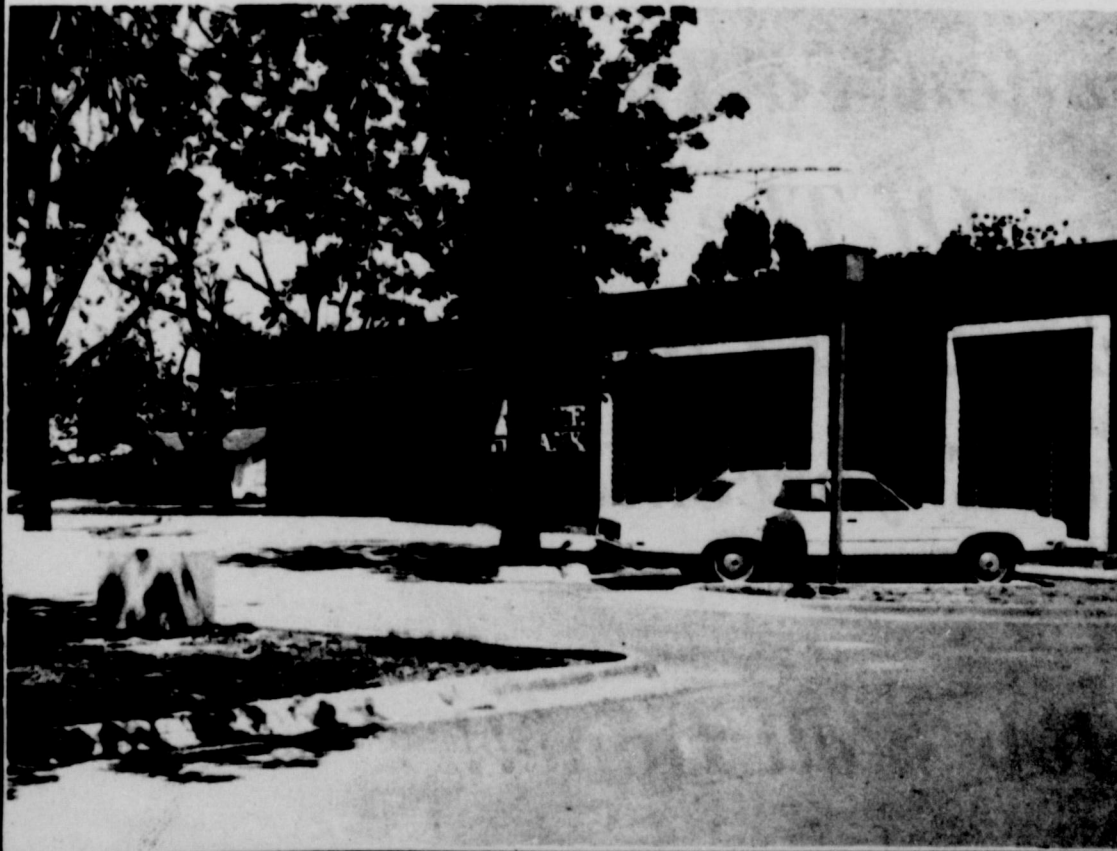
to them, and most of the time and can pick up something that helps."

Mr. Mohon belongs to Texas Public Employees Association and Eastland Masonic Lodge #467.



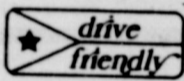

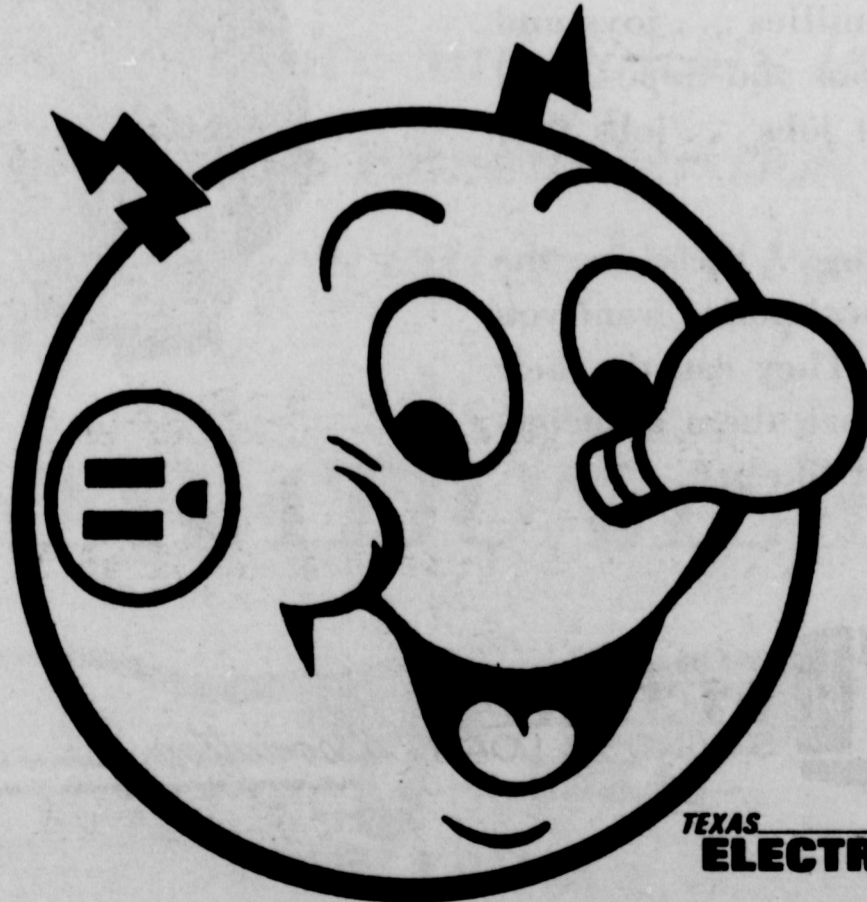

ALBERT EDWARD WHITE
CHIEF OF THE Gorman Police Department is Alber Edward White, a man with over 20 years experience in the law enforcement field.

Then he went to Borger, Texas, and worked for Phillips Petroleum Company in the gasoline department. He worked in the Post Office Department delivering mail and ice to Phillips Gasoline Plants. In 1935 Hunter transferred to the Gasoline Department as Plant Operator.

L.D. ADAMS

Eastland County's Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission Agent is L.D. Adams.

Adams was born December 23, 1933 in San Angelo. He lived there some time before moving to Cross plains, where he attended high school through his junior year, followed by a move to Big Springs where he graduated in 1952.

Following graduation from high school, L.D. farmed, and worked for the Texas and Pacific Railroad until March of 1956, when he entered the U. S. Army, spending two years in active duty, 14 months of which were in Germany.

On October 1, 1958, he joined the Big Springs Police Department as a patrolman, staying in that position until December of



1961 when he was promoted to Shift Sargeant.

After almost eight years with the Big Spring Police Department, he then went to work for the Texas Liquor Control Board (now called the Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission) on February 1, 1966. He was first stationed in the Corpus Christi area before coming to his present position in January of 1968.

L.D. and his wife, Johnnie, have a son Dale, who is 19 years old, and two daughters, April and Julia, whose ages are 15.

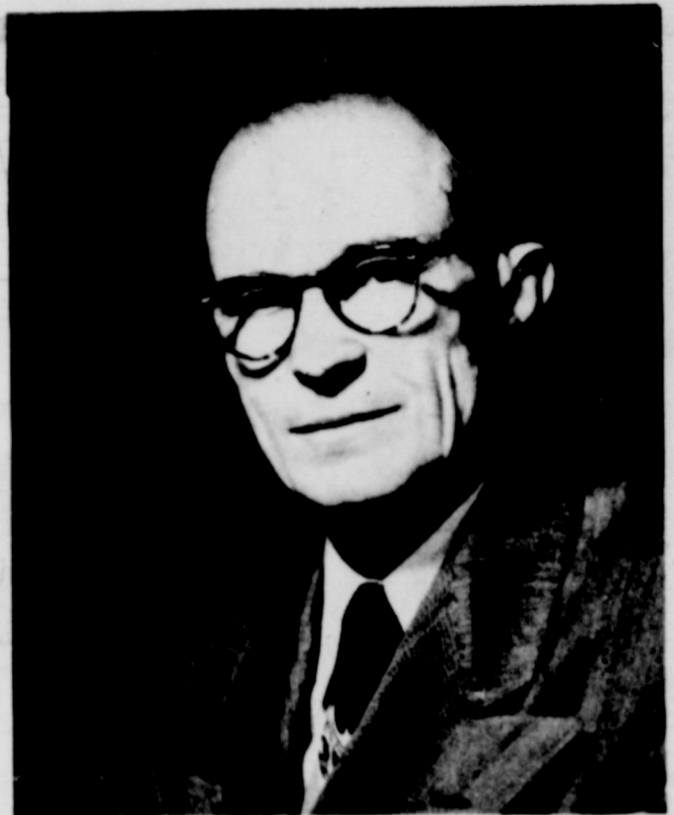

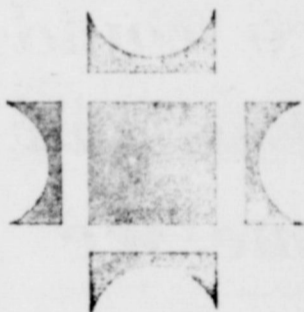
B.A. BUTLER
